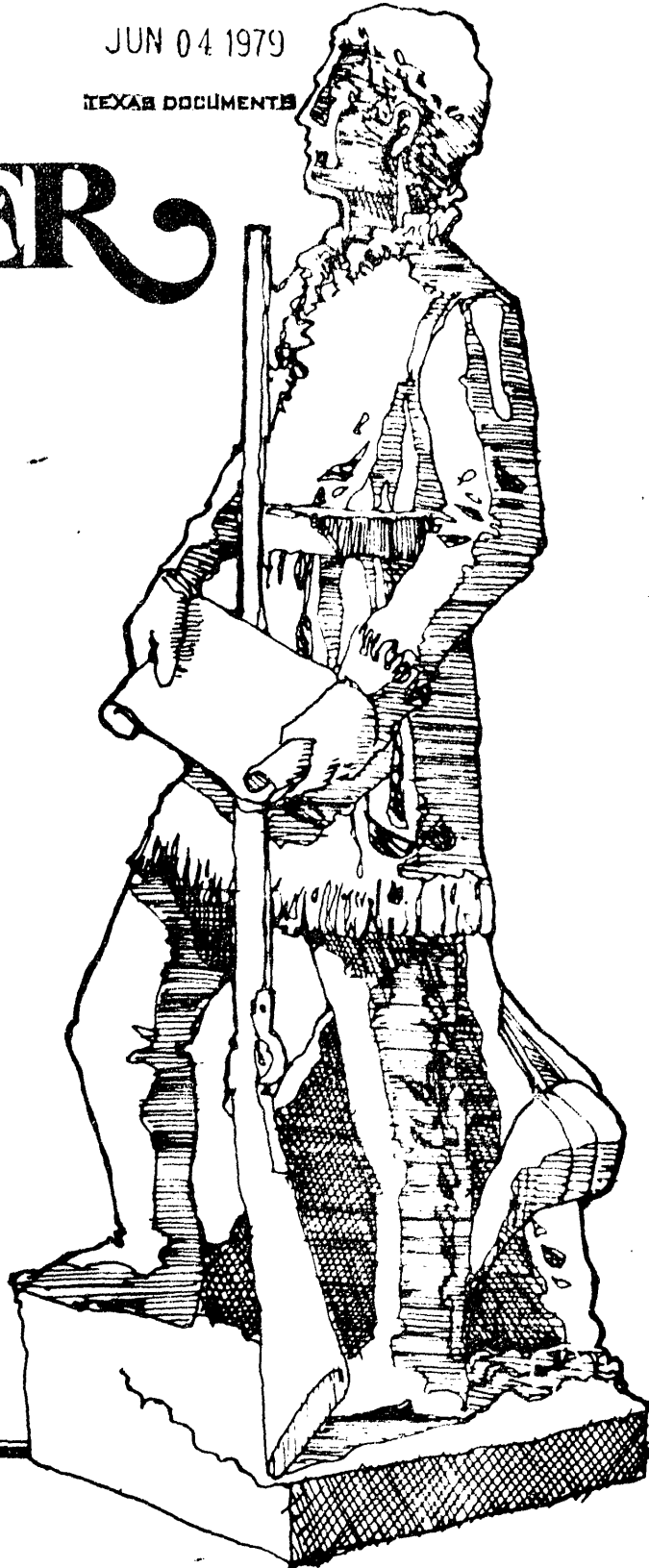

The names of applicants for a school superintendent's position are not required to be disclosed under the Open Records Act, according to a recent attorney general's decision. Appearing in the Attorney General section is a summary of the open records decision to keep the names of such applicants confidential.

A rule governing allocation of grants-in-aid to community mental health and mental retardation centers is being proposed for amendment. The Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation is proposing to revise the rule subsection which outlines provisions on which the grants-in-aid are based. One change deletes the paragraph on riders in the appropriations act which specify minimum allocations to particular community center boards of trustees. The current appropriations act does not contain riders relating to these allocations. A community center may serve one or more counties and may be organized by cities, counties, school districts, or hospital districts. The grants-in-aid are matched by local support in an amount not less than 10 percent nor more than 30 percent of the state allocation. There are now 29 community centers in Texas eligible for the grants-in-aid.

The Summer Youth Employment Program authorized by the federal Comprehensive Employment and Training Act of 1973 provides jobs, training, and educational opportunities for eligible youth. The Texas Department of Community Affairs, which oversees the state's participation in the program, has submitted a grant modification to the U.S. Department of Labor. The modification involves over \$5 million in funds, available to 113 counties in the state. A notice of where to review the grant modification is published in the In Addition section.

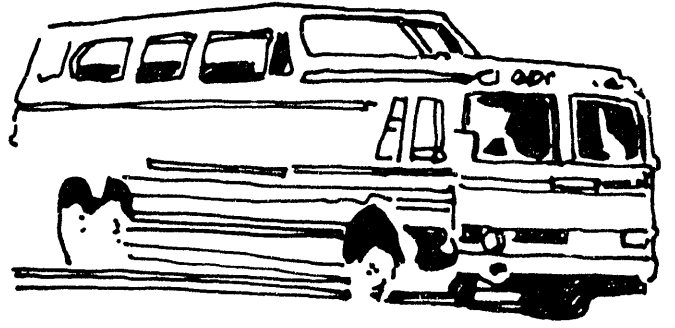

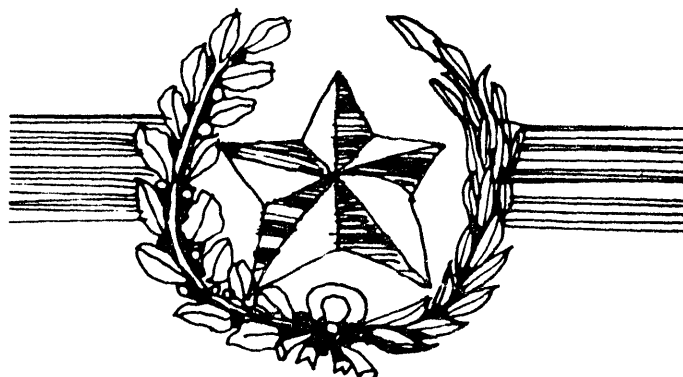

Summary of Decision: Where an individual seeks public employment rather than public office, where he has a legitimate and reasonable expectation that the fact of the application will be retained in confidence, and where he reasonably believes that his current employment would be adversely affected if it is disclosed that he has applied for a different job, we believe that disclosure of his name as an applicant would ordinarily constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy within the contemplation of Section 3(a)(2) of the Open Records Act and would not be required to be disclosed.

General 101.18.01

The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation proposes to amend the "Texas Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices for Streets and Highways," which was adopted by reference in subsection (a) of Rule 101.18.01.001. The proposed revision is to Volume 1, Part V, Traffic Control for Street and Highway Construction and Maintenance Operations. The revision also changes the Part V to Part VI to conform to the numbering of the "National Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices for Streets and Highways." The current Part VI, Civil Defense, in the "Texas Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices for Streets and Highways" will be revised at a later date to become Part II-G.

The proposed revision reflects recent changes in federal, state, and departmental regulations with respect to traffic control devices for construction and maintenance operations. The purpose of this revision is to bring the Texas manual into conformance with these current regulations insofar as they apply to such traffic control devices. Generally the revision: (1) changes the Texas manual format and wording to that of the 1978 national manual; (2) includes the addition of guidelines for sign placement on urban streets and highways based on speed; (3) defines construction and maintenance operation as major, minor, or moving activities; and (4) includes numerous other minor changes.

It is not anticipated that the changes in this proposed revision will have fiscal implications for the cities or counties, since the changes affecting a city or county construction or maintenance operation would be beneficial and could be included in their daily routines with minimal expense. This analysis was made based on the engineering judgment of the department. The department will also face no additional costs since the changes only affect the placement and posi-

tioning of traffic control devices in construction or maintenance operations.

Public comment on the proposed amendment to Rule .001 is invited. Comments may be submitted by writing the Department of Highways and Public Transportation, 11th and Brazos Streets, Austin, Texas 78701.

The amendment to Rule .001 is proposed under the authority of Article 6701d, Texas Civil Statutes.

.001. *Uniform Traffic Control Devices*

Community Mental Health and Mental Retardation Centers 302.03.01

The Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation is proposing to amend subsection (c) of Rule 302.03.01.003, which governs the allocation of grants-in-aid to boards of trustees of community mental health and mental retardation centers established pursuant to Article 5547-203, Texas Civil Statutes.

The first amendment to subsection (c) would change the years specified in that section from 1978 and 1979 to 1980 and 1981. The purpose of the amendment is to make clear that the rule will govern the allocations of grants-in-aid to boards of trustees of community mental health and mental retardation centers for fiscal years 1980 and 1981.

The second amendment to subsection (c) would delete paragraph (3), which currently provides that riders in the appropriations act which apply to the allocation of state grants-in-aid to particular community center boards of trustees will be a basis for the allocation of such grants-in-aid. The subsection is being deleted since the appropriations act for fiscal years 1980 and 1981 will not contain riders which will specify minimum allocations to particular community center boards of trustees.

The Texas Board of Mental Health and Mental Retardation approved the proposed amendments to subsection (c) of Rule .003 at its May 18, 1979, meeting.

The promulgation of the proposed amendments to subsection (c) of Rule .003 will have no known fiscal implications for the state or for units of local government (source: Legal and

Claims Division). The primary purpose of Rule .003 is to specify the manner in which the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation will allocate grants-in-aid, the total amount of which is determined by the legislature in the appropriations act, to community center boards of trustees. Implementation of the rule will result in community center boards of trustees receiving state grants-in-aid to assist in the funding of their programs.

003 Awarding of Grants in Aid.

(a) (b) (No change)

(c) Grants in aid for fiscal years **1980** [1978] and **1981** [1979] shall be allocated to boards of trustees on the following basis

(1) An amount established by the department based on the zero based budget documents submitted to it by each community center for each of the following program categories, provided, however, that the aggregate amounts established by the department for each program category shall not exceed the appropriated funds for each such category

- (A) center administration,
- (B) screening and referral services,
- (C) outpatient services,
- (D) special education classes,
- (E) alternate residential and 24-hour residential care, and

(F) sheltered work training and day/evening care.

(2) The department, after consultations with community centers during the budget review process, may adjust the amount established under subsection (c)(1) above. Upward adjustments may be requested in increments of 10% of the amount established under subsection (a)(1) above.

(3) Riders in the appropriations act which apply to the allocation of state grants-in-aid to particular community center boards of trustees

Bills of Lading and Waybills 051.03.06

The Railroad Commission of Texas is proposing to amend Rule 051.03.06.004(1), which provides that a waybill shall show the number of the waybill, as numbered consecutively in each motor carrier's own series at the time of printing.

The proposed amendment would allow motor carriers to elect to establish a system of accountability by assignment of a control number to a waybill or other descriptive instrument at the time of equipment dispatch and prior to the receipt of freight from the consignor in lieu of preparing waybills numbered at the time of printing.

This matter was initiated by the application of Motor Express, Inc., et al., which sought an amendment to Rule .004 exempting the applicant from the requirements of that rule. Other applications for similar treatment were filed by Alexander Truck Lines, Inc., J. H. Rose Truck Line, Inc., Tom Hicks Transfer Company, Inc., C&H Transportation Company, Inc., and Billy Frank doing business as Frank Brothers. It was determined that the applications should be heard as contested cases seeking exceptions from Rule .004, and they were consolidated for hearing before examiner James O. Houchins. Hearings on these applications were completed on September 14, 1978.

After the hearing, the parties waived preparation of the proposal for decision and agreed to the entering of a final order dismissing the applications and instituting a rulemaking proceeding proposing to amend Rule .004 as indicated.

The staff of the Transportation Division of the Railroad Commission of Texas has determined that the proposed amendment will have no fiscal impact on any unit of state or local government.

This amendment to the regulation is proposed under the authority of Texas Revised Civil Statutes Annotated, Article 911b, Section 4(a).

.004 - Contents of Waybills. Each waybill shall show, in addition to any other information required by law or by the applicable tariff or tariffs, the following information:

(1) The number of the waybill, as numbered consecutively in each motor carrier's own series at the time of printing. *In lieu of preparing waybills numbered at time of printing, specialized motor carriers may elect to establish a complete system of accountability through or by assignment of a control number to a waybill or other descriptive instrument at the time of dispatch of equipment, and prior to the receipt of freight from the consignor.*

(A) Such control number must be inserted on the waybill or other descriptive instrument by the driver prior to the receipt of freight from the consignor.

(B) Assignment of the control number must be in numerical sequence, centrally controlled by the carrier or its dispatching terminal.

(C) Carrier may not duplicate any control number assigned in a calendar year.

(D) Assignment of a control number must definitely relate to the month in which dispatch of the equipment was made and to the terminal dispatching the equipment.

(E) Such assigned control number must be entered immediately to the carrier's permanent dispatch records and relate to the equipment dispatched.

(F) All other information required by this rule shall be included in the waybill or other descriptive instrument permitted by this section.

Texas Supreme Court

Gage v. Railroad Commission

The trial court judgment refusing to enjoin the Railroad Commission order reinstating proration in Boonsville field, which "affirmatively reveals that the commission was without statutory authority to reinstate proration or issue proration orders," is reversed and the cause remanded to the trial court for judgment in accordance with this opinion. The finding in the commission order that the field is a "common source of supply of natural gas" is in statutory language and is not accompanied by a statement of underlying facts to support it. Other findings lead the Supreme Court to the conclusion that the field is in truth a consolidation of several separate and distinct "common reservoirs." The commission is authorized only to prorate production from "each common reservoir" to prevent waste or to adjust correlative rights; any difficulty in delineating a field boundary does not authorize the commission to consolidate separate reservoirs for proration purposes if such authority does not otherwise exist. 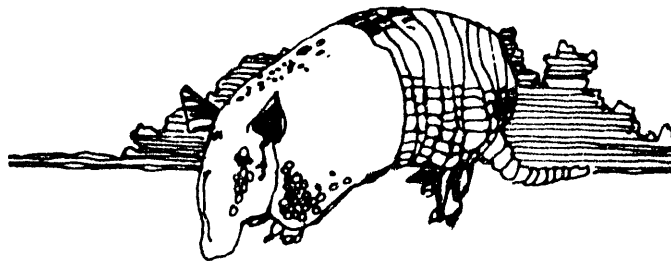
Wilson v. State

A grievance committee of the State Bar of Texas is not subject to the Administrative Procedure and Texas Register Act, Article 6252-13a, Texas Revised Civil Statutes. Thus, even if the hearing before the committee was not held in accordance with the Administrative Procedure and Texas Register Act the district court had jurisdiction to try the case de novo.

It is required only that each controlling issue raised by the pleading and evidence be submitted once, simply and succinctly. Decision of which issues are controlling and which are evidentiary rests largely within the discretion of the trial court and will not be disturbed by an appellate court except in cases of probable harm.

A complaint charging an attorney with misconduct must be filed within four years of the misconduct, but complaint may be verbal or in writing. The time is to be measured from the misconduct to the filing before the grievance committee. (16 TLWD 21, at 4)

The Texas Department of Community Affairs (TDCA) will consider proposals for state and local projects to be funded by contract under the Youth Employment and Demonstration Projects Act of 1977 and the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act of 1973 (CETA) as amended, Title VIII—Youth Adult Conservation Corps. Proposals for funding consideration will be for projects in the 1980 state grant program of the Young Adult Conservation Corps.

Purpose: to provide employment and other benefits to youth, ages 16 through 23, who would not otherwise be currently, productively employed through a period of service during which they engage in useful conservation work and assist in completing other projects of a public nature on nonfederal public lands and waters.

To the maximum extent practicable, projects shall (1) be labor intensive; (2) be projects for which work plans can be readily developed and initiated promptly; (3) be productive; (4) be likely to have a lasting impact, both as to the work performed and the benefit to the participants; (5) provide work experience to participants in skill areas required for the work tasks; and (6) be similar to activities of persons employed in seasonal and part-time employment in agencies such as the National Park Service, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Bureau of Reclamation, Bureau of Land Management, Bureau of Indian Affairs, Forest Service, Bureau of Outdoor Recreation and Soil Conservation Service.

Types and Sizes of Projects.

Residential project—a work encampment established and maintained to provide residential support services for participants seven days per week, 24 hours per day.

Nonresidential project—a work project in which participants commute daily from residence to work site or sponsor entity staging area. For 1980, the projects shall be operational from October 1, 1979, to September 30, 1980. For planning purposes, the range of individual projects for 1980 will be from 10 to 20 enrollees. Matching funds are not required for the State YACC Program.

Sponsor Eligibility. Applicant entities may be any state agency or institution; or any unit of general local government; or any public agency or organization; or any private, nonprofit agency or organization which has been in existence for at least two years.

Note: Preference will be given to those entities in or near areas of substantial unemployment (6.5% or over unemployment rate) as determined by the U.S. Department of Labor.

The Governor's Office of Energy Resources and the Texas Industrial Commission request proposals to assist the Texas In-

Tasks to Be Assumed. The specific tasks to be assumed under this proposal are:

- (2) By committee action, prepare a detailed agenda for the technical session's approval.

- (6) Arrange the technical sessions in the sequence established by the Technical Program Committee and the topics selected for each session.
- (7) Plan the technical sessions and any field trips (if appropriate) based on times allotted to these sessions.
- (8) Send letter of instructions along with mats to the authors selected for publication of the abstracts. Edit these abstracts and submit to the Texas Industrial Commission.
- (9) Send letter of instructions along with mats to the authors selected for publication of the final papers presented at the conference. Edit the final papers and submit to the Texas Industrial Commission.
- (10) Serve as the point of contact for selected authors prior to the conference and during the execution of the conference.
- (11) Establish a technical session "milestone" chart in coordination with the conference director, which will be followed to ensure a smooth, well-coordinated program.
- (12) Select the conference rooms available at the Houston Hyatt Regency Hotel for the technical sessions based on the anticipated attendance at each of the sessions (using as a guide the attendance data obtained at the 1979 technical conference).
- (13) Obtain from authors selected their visual aid equipment requirements and submit to the conference director.
- (14) Send a copy of all written correspondence to the Texas Industrial Commission, attention: conference director.

Selection Criteria. Project selection criteria will be based primarily on those factors which indicate the excellence of work or product that is offered and the ability of the respondent to produce what is actually proposed. Final selection will be made by the Texas Industrial Commission and the Governor's Office of Energy Resources based upon staff recommendations.

Budget. Responding firms should submit a complete budget showing total expenditures in accomplishing the aforementioned objectives. Those individuals not located in Austin that wish to respond should note that all travel expenses incurred traveling to and from Austin for consultation with the

Texas Industrial Commission or the Governor's Office of Energy Resources shall be included in the contract amount. No additional travel costs will be authorized.

All administrative support costs and necessary travel expenses incurred in the accomplishment of the tasks outlined above would be the responsibility of the individual awarded the contract.
