# NOTES ON THE ISSUE

Governor Briscoe has amended two of his executive orders concerning water planning in Texas. With these amendments, the water planning function is removed from the jurisdiction of the Division of Planning Coordination of the Governor's Office and given to the newly named Special Advisor to the Governor on Natural Resources, General James M. Rose.

The Texas Education Agency is proposing to amend several of its rules concerning the bases for school funding, including bilingual and special education programs. In other proposed action, the State Board of Public Accountancy is proposing a rule of professional conduct which would allow members of the accounting profession to distribute informative publications outside of their firms.

The Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation has amended its rule governing the awarding of grants-in-aid to boards of trustees of community MH/MR centers. The rule sets out the formula to be used in allocating such grants-in-aid.

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## Executive Orders

### Executive Order DB 10-A

Executive Order DB 10 has been amended. New language appears in *boldface italic* type. Brackets appear around deleted language. The order shall be known as DB 10-A and read as follows:

Whereas, the State of Texas has completed and adopted a State Water Plan for the development and use of its water resources for beneficial purposes for present and future generations; and

Whereas, the Texas Water Development Board, Texas Water Rights Commission, and Texas Water Quality Board are conducting effective studies and investigations in carrying out their duties and functions; and

Whereas, the Senate of Texas, in S.R. 812, charged the lieutenant governor with responsibility for creating regional councils to work with state and local agencies involved in water matters; and

Whereas, river authorities, local units of government, and coalitions of local governmental units have developed plans for water development of their own needs; and

Whereas, the course selected by the state for developing its water resources must be rationally linked to the demands for and development of other resources and services; and

Whereas, the federal government, long a major participant of public works investment, appears to be altering its traditional role in support of water development, thus creating a need for strong state-level action to meet these trends at the federal level. At the same time, the state must pursue all available courses to assure an equitable level of continued federal participation;

Therefore, because of my growing concern that the maximum effective use be made of the vast planning effort for water resource development that has been accomplished here in Texas, and the urgent need to translate these plans and other related activities into a strong action program coordinating the efforts of the state and local levels of government with appropriate federal actions, I am creating the Governor's Water Resource Conservation and Development Task Force. This action is essential at this time as a means of establishing priorities and focusing and channeling the extensive plans and capabilities of state and local levels of government to meet water needs throughout the state.

The task force will be charged with the following duties:

(1) develop and recommend economic, social, and environmental goals to be met by water development in Texas;

(2) examine all feasible plans and proposals for water resource development required to meet the foreseeable needs of the state; and

(3) outline a statewide program for coordinated action of all state, regional, and local government agencies to assure continued, effective, and timely implementation of water conservation projects in Texas, with or without federal participation.

Membership of the task force will be drawn from the reservoir of knowledgeable professionals in the water resource field available here in Texas. Its deliberations will be aided and supplemented by related disciplines as appropriate. Initial membership is listed as Attachment A to this Executive Order.

*The task force will operate in a personal advisory capacity to me. The special advisor to the governor on natural resources will chair the task force. Administrative staff support to the special advisor to the governor on natural resources will be provided by the Governor's Office.* [The task force will operate in a personal advisory capacity to me. The director of the Division of Planning Coordination will chair the task force, and will provide staff from the division as required.]

The first meeting of the task force will be held here in Austin on November 27th and 28th, 1973. The urgency of its mission is great, and I will work closely with its membership as its program evolves.

The task force will report its findings, recommendations, and conclusions to me and make such interim reports as may be requested.

This amended Executive Order shall be effective on the 17th day of February, 1976, and shall remain in effect until modified or rescinded by me.

## Executive Order DB 18-A

Executive Order DB 18 is amended as follows and will be known as DB 18-A:

Whereas, the Congress of the United States enacted the Federal Water Pollution Control Act of 1972 on October 18, 1972; and

Whereas, Section 208 of this federal enactment directs that the administrator of the Federal Environmental Protection Agency establish guidelines for identifying areas which, as a result of urban-industrial concentrations or other factors, have substantial water quality control problems; and

Whereas, Section 208, and regulations established by the administrator pursuant thereto, impose directly upon the governors of the states responsibility for making decisions required to implement the areawide planning and management functions set forth in Section 208; and

Whereas, I am determined that these planning and management functions, implemented in Texas pursuant to Section 208 and regulations of the Environmental Protection Agency, use to the fullest extent the capabilities of existing state agencies, river authorities, and local units of government; and

Whereas, at my request the Texas Water Quality Board, Texas Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations, other state and local organizations, and individuals have made an extensive analysis of the effects of implementing Section 208 on the water quality control problems existing in Texas and of the courses of action the state and the governor should most appropriately take acting in response to these federal mandates;

Now, therefore, I am by this order establishing the following procedures for implementing areawide planning in the State of Texas in compliance with the provisions of Section 208 of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act of 1972:

I. Purpose. To establish a process for implementing Section 208, P.L. 92-500, in the State of Texas that will enable the state to:

- (1) carry out areawide waste treatment management planning;
- (2) use to the fullest extent consistent with their legal authorities the planning capabilities of state agencies, river authorities, and other existing governmental bodies; and
- (3) minimize any possible duplication of effort or jurisdictional conflict that might arise in meeting the water quality objectives set forth in the Federal Water Pollution Control Act Amendments of 1972 (P.L. 92-500).

II. Authority. Section 208 of P. L. 92-500 and the regulations pursuant thereto issued by the Federal Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) establish the responsibility of the governor in implementing the areawide waste management planning provisions of P.L. 92-500.

Further, under laws of the State of Texas, the governor is the chief planning officer of the state with general and specific responsibility for providing coordination among planning activities conducted at all levels of state and local government.

III. Definitions. The following definitions will apply in carrying out the procedures contained herein:

- (1) Division of Planning Coordination (DPC)-- a division within the Office of the Governor that was created by the legislature in 1967.
- (2) State reviewing agency-- the Texas Water Quality Board (TWQB) shall be and is herewith designated as the state reviewing agency for Section 208 planning.

(3) Designated planning area-- those areas within the state where substantial water quality control problems resulting from urban-industrial concentrations or other factors have been identified, and which have been or shall be designated by the governor pursuant to Section 208.

(4) *Committees-- advisory committees will be established as needed and pursuant to EPA regulations. Appointments to the committees will be made by the governor through his special advisor to the governor on natural resources.* [Areawide planning advisory committee-- a committee named by the director of the Division of Planning Coordination, with representatives of the Texas Water Quality Board, Division of Planning Coordination, appropriate local and regional entities, and of the public.]

(5) Representative organization-- an organization with planning capability to develop effective areawide waste treatment management plans. Organizations so defined will include local elected officials or their designees as required by Section 208 and shall also include representation from river authorities or other entities with water planning and/or management responsibility in the designated area.

(6) *State planning area-- that portion of the state not falling within any of the planning areas that have been previously designated by the governor pursuant to Section 208.*

(7) *State quality planning agency-- the Texas Water Quality Board is herewith charged as the state agency for conducting Section 208 planning for the state planning area subject to the limitations and further designations contained in these amendments.*

(8) *Special advisor to the governor on natural resources (special advisor)-- an individual designated by the governor to advise him on items relating to natural resources. Primary responsibility for the 208 Waste Treatment Management Program in the State of Texas will reside in the Governor's Office through this position. James M. Rose is designated as the special advisor.*

(9) *Non-point source planning-- the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board is hereby designated as the planning agency for non-point source planning with respect to agricultural and silvicultural practices.*

(10) *Management committee-- a committee composed of the special advisor to the governor on natural resources, James M. Rose; the executive director of the Texas Water Quality Board, Hugh C. Yantis, Jr.; and the executive director of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board, Harvey Davis, will direct the non-point source management planning in the state planning area, and will coordinate the non-point source management planning with point source planning in the state planning*

*region and with management plans in the designated areas. The special advisor to the governor will chair the management committee.*

#### IV. Procedure.

(1) Determination of eligible areas.

(A) The TWQB, with the advice and concurrence of the *special advisor to the governor on natural resources* [DPC], shall develop criteria for determining the eligible 208 planning areas.

(B) Based on the above criteria, the TWQB shall present both oral and written recommendations to the governor, through the *special advisor to the governor on natural resources* [DPC], naming potentially eligible areas.

(C) *The special advisor to the governor on natural resources* [The DPC] shall then notify EPA and affected local governments of the governor's decision to consider designation in potentially eligible areas.

(D) The TWQB shall then notify affected local and regional governmental bodies of public hearings to be held in each area. The TWQB and the *special advisor to the governor on natural resources* [DPC] shall co-sponsor at least one public hearing in each potentially eligible 208 area.

(2) State 208 planning conference. If *the special advisor to the governor on natural resources* [the DPC] and TWQB agree that a state 208 planning conference is warranted they shall jointly sponsor such a conference.

(3) Designation of planning area(s).

(A) The TWQB, with the advice and concurrence of the *special advisor to the governor on natural resources* [DPC], shall develop criteria and procedures for determining designation of planning areas.

(B) Based upon the above criteria and information obtained during public hearings, the TWQB shall provide the governor, through the *special advisor to the governor on natural resources* [DPC], formal recommendations on area designations.

(C) The governor shall then notify EPA and local officials of his designation decision.

(4) Designation of planning agency (agencies).

(A) The TWQB, with the advice and concurrence of the *special advisor to the governor on natural resources* [DPC], shall develop criteria for evaluating the eligibility of areawide planning agencies.

(B) Based upon the above criteria and information obtained during public hearings, the TWQB shall provide the governor, through the *special advisor to the governor on natural resources* [DPC], recommendations on areawide planning agency designations.

(C) The governor shall then notify EPA and local officials of his designation decisions.

(5) Application process.

(A) The TWQB, with the advice and concurrence

of the *special advisor to the governor on natural resources* [DPC], shall develop guidelines for the preparation of grant applications.

(B) The TWQB shall review each application; grant or refuse to grant state certification of approval in accordance with applicable federal regulations and state requirements; and forward the application through the *special advisor to the governor on natural resources* [DPC] to EPA.

(C) *The special advisor to the governor on natural resources* [The DPC] shall coordinate A-95 review of the application prior to the TWQB's certification decision.

(6) Planning process.

(A) The TWQB shall monitor on a continuous basis the work of each designated areawide planning organization. The procedures to be followed to provide for this coordination will be contained in the guidelines prepared by TWQB and *the special advisor to the governor on natural resources* [the DPC] as set forth in (5)(A) above.

(B) *The special advisor to the governor on natural resources* [The DPC] and TWQB shall serve as members of each areawide planning advisory committee.

(7) Plan review and submission.

(A) The TWQB shall review each areawide waste treatment management plan upon its completion, and submit to the governor through the *special advisor to the governor on natural resources* [DPC] its recommendations concerning certification

(B) The governor shall either certify or refuse to certify each plan. Notification of this action shall be forwarded to EPA and the designated areawide planning organization.

(8) Waste treatment management agency designation.

(A) The TWQB with the advice and concurrence of the *special advisor to the governor on natural resources* [DPC], shall provide the governor its recommendations for designation of waste management agency (agencies) within each planning area.

(B) The governor, after consultation with appropriate areawide planning organizations, local officials, and TWQB, shall designate a waste treatment management agency (agencies) within each designated area.

(9) State guidelines.

(A) The TWQB shall develop criteria and procedures, in the form of state guidelines, which shall include but not be limited to the following program areas:

- (1) determination of potentially eligible area;
- (2) designation of planning areas;
- (3) designation of areawide planning organizations;
- (4) grant application procedures and criteria;

- (5) grant reporting procedures;
- (6) plan approval and submission;
- (7) designation of waste treatment management agencies; and
- (8) annual update of plan.

(B) State guidelines will be written so as to be consistent with the intent of Public Law 92-500 and published federal regulations and guidelines established pursuant to Section 208.

(C) *The special advisor to the governor on natural resources* [The DPC] shall review the guidelines prior to their adoption by the TWQB.

(D) State guidelines shall be binding on designated areawide planning organizations. The TWQB shall be responsible for monitoring planning organization compliance, and for reporting any lack of compliance through the *special advisor to the governor on natural resources* [DPC] to the governor.

This amended Executive Order is effective on the 17th day of February, 1976, and shall remain in effect until modified or rescinded by me.

Request for opinion sent to Attorney General's Opinion Committee by Arthur C. Eads, County Attorney, Bell County Courthouse, Belton.

#### **Summary of Request:**

(1) In setting the salaries of elected county and precinct officers, may the commissioners court provide that such officers be allowed a fixed number of days of sick leave each year and further provide that such officers be paid for accrued sick leave?

(2) If such officers may not be paid for such sick leave, are such officers or their estates or their personal representatives personally liable to the county for past payments of accumulated sick leave when the payments were authorized, made, and received by all parties in the good faith belief that such payments were lawful?

(3) What statute of limitation, if any, would apply to an action by the county to recover past payments of accumulated sick leave pay to county officers if such payments are unauthorized?

(4) Would the fact that Article 3912k was not in effect at the time of the original passage of the resolution of the commissioners court of Bell County providing that elected county and precinct officers should receive payment for accrued sick leave render such resolutions invalid?

(5) If county officers are entitled to receive payment for accumulated sick leave, do formal claims have to be submitted to the county auditor prior to the commissioners court passing on such claims?

## Texas Education Agency Comprehensive Instruction

### Multicultural Education Program 226.32.52

The State Board of Education and the Commissioner of Education propose to amend Rule 226.32.52.020 concerning bilingual education. Two additions to the administrative procedure section of the rule are proposed. Item (6) has been added to Section (a-b) and a new paragraph has been added to Section (c). The rest of the rule remains unchanged. The additions set out priorities in the allocation of operating expenses (Section a-b) and provide that native English-speaking children may be voluntarily enrolled in the bilingual program under certain conditions (Section c).

- .020. *State-Supported Required Bilingual Education.*  
(a-b) Operational Expenses Allocation.  
**(6) Priority for operational expenses allocations will be given to those districts implementing**

**required (grades K-3) and optional (grades 4 and 5) bilingual education programs. Second priority will be given to those districts implementing optional bilingual education programs with less than 20 children of limited English-speaking ability where sufficient need is demonstrated.**

(c) Enrollment of Children in Program.

**Native English-speaking children may be voluntarily enrolled in the program although no funding from the operational expenses allocation is provided for them. Both groups of children may be served in the same classroom, provided there is grouping within the classroom to meet the special needs of both groups.**

## Adaptations for Special Populations Special Education Program Elements in General 226.35.72

The State Board of Education and the Commissioner of Education propose to amend Rule 226.35.72.110 concerning contracting with approved non-public schools

for exceptional children. The change indicates the portion of the contract cost which must be borne by local school districts starting in the 1976-77 school year as provided in Section 15.12, Texas Education Code. The policy section and part (e) of the administrative procedure section are changed. The rest of the rule remains the same.

*.110. Contracting with Approved Non-Public Schools for Exceptional Children.*

*Policy*

The Commissioner of Education shall establish administrative procedures whereby accredited school districts may contract with nonprofit community mental health and/or mental retardation centers, public or private, or any other nonprofit organization, institution, or agency approved by the State Board of Education, for the provision of services to exceptional children as defined by these policies, who reside with their parents or guardians. *In 1976-77 and thereafter, any independent school district desiring to contract with an approved non-public school to serve handicapped students must pay an amount equal to its local tax revenue (debt service and local maintenance) per average daily attendance (ADA) as its portion of the contract cost.*

*Administrative Procedure*

(e) Method of Determining State Reimbursement. *In 1976-77 and thereafter, the school district will pay an amount equal to its local tax revenue (debt service and local maintenance) per average daily attendance as its portion of the contract cost. The state share will be equal to the average per pupil cost as determined by the Division of Finance for the preceding year for the specific type of special education service minus the local share of the contract cost. [The school district will be reimbursed an amount equivalent to the average per pupil cost as determined by the Division of Finance for the preceding year for the specific type of special education services.]*

## Foundation School Program

### Allocation of Personnel Units 226.41.03

The State Board of Education and the Commissioner of Education propose to amend Rule 226.41.03.011 concerning the allocation of personnel units to school districts. The proposed amendment allows average daily attendance for personnel unit allocation as provided in Section 16.102, Texas Education Code.

*.011. Regular Formula.*

*Policy*

Personnel units shall be allocated on the basis of *current* regular average daily attendance.

*For the 1976-77 and subsequent school years, regular education program personnel units shall be allocated on the basis of the district's current average daily attendance (ADA) for the best 170 days of the 180-day school term.*

*Administrative Procedure*

Regular program average daily attendance is determined by subtracting the current average daily fulltime equivalent attendance of students in vocational education and special education programs from the current refined average daily attendance of students (less ineligibles) educated in the district. Regular program units are determined by dividing the attendance in each grade span by the following:

Grade Span	Divisor
K-3	19
4-6	21
7-9	20
10-12	18

*For the 1976-77 and subsequent school years, current adjusted regular average daily attendance shall be used. Current adjusted regular program average daily attendance is determined by subtracting the 10 days of lowest attendance during the required 180-day year of operation for the current regular ADA (gross ADA minus ineligibles and fulltime equivalent students in vocational and special education programs). Regular program units are determined by dividing the current adjusted regular average daily attendance in each grade span by the divisors shown above.*

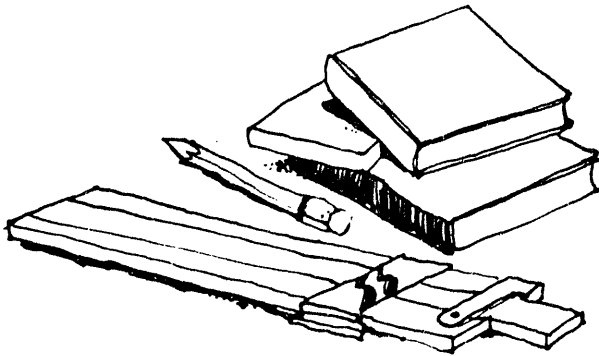
The units earned in each grade span are carried to three decimal places. The total number of units allocated is rounded to the nearest whole unit.

## Allocation of Operating Cost 226.41.06

## Local Fund Assignment 226.41.10

The State Board of Education and the Commissioner of Education propose to amend Rule 226.41.10.010 concerning the local share of the foundation school program. The proposed amendment clarifies the way in which local maintenance revenue will be determined for the 1976-77 school year. Only that part of the administrative procedure section which deals with the 1976-77 school year is changed. The rest of the rule remains unchanged.

### Public Education Finance-- Pupils Pupil Attendance Accounting 226.44.01

The State Board of Education and the Commissioner of Education propose to amend three parts of the administrative procedure section of Rule 226.44.01.010 concerning pupil attendance accounting for state funding purposes. The change in Section (a), Definitions, clarifies terms used in pupil attendance accounting. The change in Section (b), Pupil Attendance Accounting, deletes two sentences now covered in Section (a) and clarifies attendance which is earned by kindergarten pupils as provided in Section 16.102 of the Texas Education Code. The change in Section (f) reflects a change in data collected on the pupil contact hour register. The rest of the rule remains unchanged.

*.010. Requirements of Pupil Attendance Accounting for State Funding Purposes.*

Administrative Procedure

(a) Definitions.

(1) *Average daily attendance-- gross (gross ADA). The aggregate days attendance divided by the number of days school is in session. Kindergarten students attending a half-day session are computed as though these students are in attendance for one-half day. [ADM is average daily membership (pupils enrolled).]*

(2) *Average daily attendance-- refined (refined ADA). Gross ADA less ineligible ADA. Ineligible students are listed on page 2, Daily Register of Pupil Attendance. [ADA is average daily attendance.]*

(3) *Average daily attendance-- regular (regular ADA). Refined ADA less the total fulltime equivalent ADA of students in vocational and special education programs.*

(4) *Average daily attendance-- adjusted regular ADA. Regular program average daily attendance minus days of lowest attendance; or the 170 best days of attendance during the required 180-day year of operation.*

(5) *Average daily membership-- gross (gross ADM). The aggregate days of membership divided by the number of days school is in session.*

(6) *Average daily membership-- refined (refined ADM). Gross ADM less ineligible ADM. Ineligible students are listed on page 2, Daily Register of Pupil Attendance.*

(7) *Average daily membership-- regular (regular ADM). Refined ADM less the total fulltime equivalent ADM of students in vocational and special education programs.*

(8) *Enrollment. Original entry into a given school unit. That is, a student who for the first time in the United States or its outlying areas enters any public or nonpublic elementary or secondary school. For driver education funding (A.P. 4116.1) enrollment means refined ADM.*

(9) *Enrolled (driver education only). Those eligible students participating in the driver education program during the school year for which funds are provided. The student does not necessarily have to complete the course in the same year.*

(10) [(3)] *Eligible and ineligible pupils are pupils who meet the characteristics set forth in the Daily Register of Pupil Attendance.*

(11) [(4)] *Central Pupil Attendance Accounting is for pupil attendance accounting purposes. Teachers make a report of pupil absences to the prin-*

*icipal's office for the required classroom periods of instruction. The accumulation of the absences is posted to the pupil's attendance records.*

(12) *Contact hour (pupil). Fifty-five minutes of instruction or services rendered by a certified or approved professional person engaged in instruction in vocational or special education programs as defined in the vocational education-special education pupil contract hour register.*

(13) *Fulltime equivalency (student). The ratio of the number of hours per school day spent in vocational and special education programs to the number of hours of the school day (six hours). Determined by registering contact hours during five consecutive school days each quarter. This does not include self-contained special education pupils.*

(14) [(5)] *A self-contained classroom is a classroom in which the teacher remains with the same pupils for all or a major portion of the school day. In self-contained arrangements refined aggregate days of attendance are used to determine fulltime equivalence.*

(15) *Membership (the number of pupils on the current roll of a class or school as of a given date.) A pupil is a member of a class or school from the date he presents himself at school and is placed on the current roll, until he leaves the class or school for one of the causes recognized as sufficient by the district. The date of withdrawal should be the date on which it is officially known that the pupil has left school and not necessarily the first day after the date of last attendance. Membership is obtained by adding the total original entries and the total reentries and subtracting the total withdrawals.*

(16) [(6)] *Departmentalized instruction for purposes of pupil attendance accounting is instruction where pupils do not remain in the presence of the same teacher for all or a major portion of the school day.*

(b) Pupil Attendance Accounting.

[The formula to determine ADM is the total aggregate days of membership divided by the total days taught.

[The formula to determine ADA is the total aggregate days of attendance divided by the total days taught.]

(4-2) *Schools have the option of half-day or full-day kindergarten for all children. However, a kindergarten pupil enrolled in a full-day program may earn a half-day attendance for the full year or a full-day of attendance for half the year. Full-day/full-year attendance will be earned by educationally handicapped pupils. [A kindergarten pupil enrolled in a full-day program earns a full day of attendance for each day present. If present only during either the morning or afternoon session, he is to be given credit for a half day of attendance. A kin-*

ergarten pupil enrolled in a half-day program earns a half day of attendance for each session he is present.]

(f) *Vocational Education-- Special Education Pupil Contact Hour Register. Professional ... programs. "Contact hour" is defined as actual time spent rendering instruction or services.* Contact hours are reported, recorded, and accounted for in accordance with instructions printed on the *vocational education--special education Pupil Contact Hour Register* provided by the Texas Education Agency.

(1) A student may not be considered in contact for more than six hours during any one school day. For schools offering seven daily 55-minute periods, only six hours are considered in computing fulltime student equivalency. Hours spent in regular academic courses are considered first. Time spent in study hall is not considered as contact hours in schools offering more than six 55-minute periods.

(2) *Contact hours are recorded on the basis of one sample week in each quarter and are summarized by grade span as identified in Section 16.102(c), Texas Education Code, for personnel unit allocation purposes.*

(3) [(2)] For self-contained special education classes and vocational or special education campuses offering no regular program academic courses, fulltime student equivalency is considered to be exactly the same as refined average daily attendance defined in Part I, Superintendent's Annual Report, and in the Daily Register of Pupil Attendance.

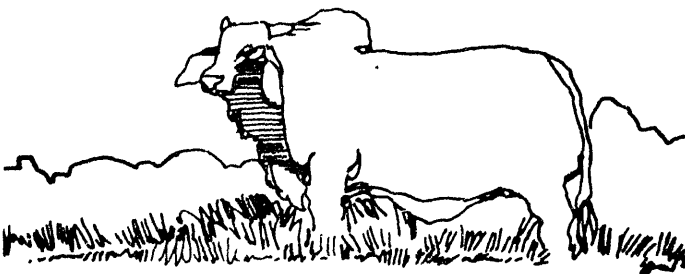
(4) *The attendance of exceptional students in vocational education programs shall be considered vocational education rather than special education.*

## Public Education-- Personnel

### Personnel Accounting 226.45.01

#### .010. Requirement of Personnel Accounting for State Funding Purposes.

##### Administrative Procedure

(a) Definitions. The definitions of terms for personnel accounting for state funding purposes are:

(1) Professional personnel are personnel employed by a local education agency in positions requiring state certification.

(2) Teacher aides are personnel who assist professional personnel and whose duties require no certification at the present time.

(3) *Employed: the contractual arrangement under which the staff member serves the school system whereby responsibility for an activity or group of activities is assigned to the staff member.*

(4) [(3)] Percentage of employment per day means the percentage of the school day a person is employed.

(5) *Fulltime equivalency (teaching staff): the amount of employed time required of a staff member to perform a less than fulltime assignment divided by the amount of time required in performing a corresponding fulltime assignment. Fulltime equivalency of assignment usually is expressed as a decimal fraction to the nearest tenth.*

(6) [(4)] Authorized leave is the time a teacher is entitled to be absent from duty based on individual school district policies. These policies may go beyond leave authorized under the State Sick Leave Statute.

(7) [(5)] Service record is the form approved by the Texas Education Agency to record teachers' and aides' annual experience increments and sick leave data for professional personnel.

(8) [(6)] Scholastic year shall commence on September 1 of each year and end on August 31 thereafter.

(9) [(7)] School term is that period of time a school district is scheduled to be in operation including inservice training and classroom instruction. The period begins with the first day of scheduled inservice of the subsequent school term.

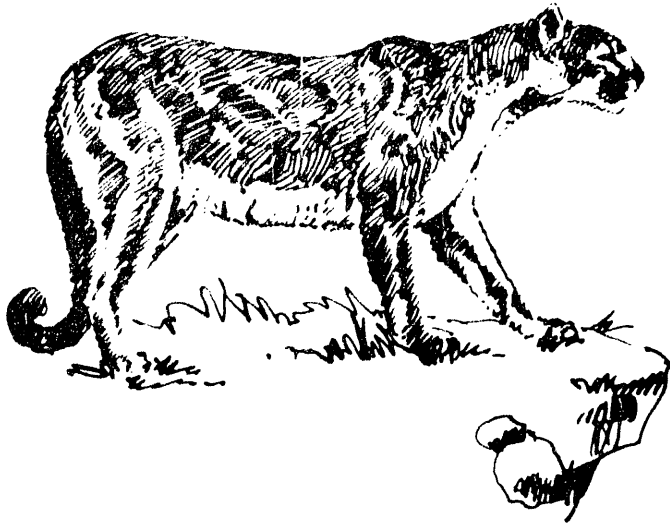
(10) [(8)] Contractual year is that period a person is employed under contract with a school district during the period July 1 through the following June 30.

(B) to hear appeals of applicants; and to hear appeals of employees who have been suspended, dismissed, or demoted. *The council may, if it deems necessary, appoint one or more impartial hearing examiners who may be authorized to conduct hearings on such appeals and to report their findings and recommendations to the council, in accordance with the requirements of Article XIII of this regulation.*

[(D)] [(E)] he has used or attempted to use political pressure or bribery to secure an advantage in the examination or appointment;

[(E)] [(F)] he has directly or indirectly obtained information regarding examinations to which he, as an applicant, is not entitled;

[(F)] [(G)] he has failed to submit his application correctly or within the prescribed time limits;

[(G)] [(H)] he has taken part in the compilation, administration, or scoring of the examinations;

[(H)] [(I)] he has otherwise violated provisions of the regulation; or

[(I)] [(J)] such appointment would be contrary to the laws of the state relative to residence, nepotism, etc.

## Texas State Board of Public Accountancy

### Interpretations of Rules of Professional Conduct

#### Advertising 401.25.09

The Texas State Board of Public Accountancy is proposing to adopt Rule 401.25.09.005 permitting licensed accountants to mail copies of their firms' publications to clients and individuals such as lawyers and bankers with whom they maintain professional contact under controlled conditions. This rule, if adopted, will allow our licensees to mail their clients and others informative publications in which they have an interest.

This rule is proposed under the authority of Section 5 of Article 41-A of Vernon's Annotated Civil Statutes.

**.005. Firm Publications: Outside Distribution.** The distribution outside of the firm of newsletters, bulletins, house organs, recruiting brochures, and similar literature must be properly controlled and should be restricted to clients and individuals such as lawyers and bankers with whom professional contacts are maintained. "Professional contacts" refers to actual ongoing business relationships with specific mutual clients. Copies may be also supplied to job applicants, students considering employment interviews, non-clients who specifically request them, and educators.

A public accountancy firm may include all members of a corporate client's board of directors, including outside directors, on its mailing list to receive its firm publications; however, the distribution and nature of the publication must be consistent with the spirit of Rule 6 of the Rules of Professional Conduct. In the case of a client charitable or eleemosynary corporation, firm publications may not be distributed to its board of directors if the board is large and membership is primarily honorary.

Any firm publication which is intended for outside distribution, or to which non-clients or the general public may have access, may not include aggrandizing statements. No firm publication should include information derogatory to other firms.

If requests for multiple copies of publications are received and granted, the permit holder and his firm are responsible for the distribution by the party to whom they are issued.

## Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation

### Rules of the Commissioner of MH/MR Affecting Other Agencies and the Public

#### Rules Governing Community Mental Health and Mental Retardation Centers 302.03.01

The Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation has amended Rule 302.03.01.003. Notice of the proposed amendment was published in the *Texas Register* on March 19, 1976, in Volume 1, Number 22, pages 661-662. Three changes have been made in the proposed text.

The first change is in the mathematical statement expressing the formula for awarding grants-in-aid to boards of trustees of community mental health-mental retardation centers. The mathematical statement expressing the formula now reads: "X+(X+Y+Z)A+S+B(P)."

The second change is in the definition of what the element "X" means in the mathematical statement expressing the formula for awarding grants-in-aid. The language, "adjusted to include the annual amount for

special project funding," has been deleted. The language, "minus the amount of state grant-in-aid for special projects, as of September 1, 1975," has been added in place of the deleted language.

The third change is the addition of a definition for the new element "S" in the revised mathematical statement expressing the formula for awarding grants-in-aid. "S" is defined as "FY 1976 state grant-in-aid budgeted for special projects as of September 1, 1975, projected on an annual basis (less non-recurring costs) for FY 1977 multiplied by 112 percent." Although the formula is to be promulgated by the Commissioner of the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation, the rule will become effective upon the approval of the rule by the Texas Board of Mental Health and Mental Retardation and upon the expiration of 20 days from the date the amendment is filed.

Under the authority of Section 4.01 of Article 5547-204, Texas Civil Statutes, the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation has amended Rule 302.03.01.003 to read as follows:

#### .003. *Awarding of Grants-in-Aid.*

(a) A board of trustees may be awarded a grant-in-aid after the state mental health authority has declared a board of trustees eligible to receive a grant-in-aid on the basis of the plan, the application and budget required by these rules, and a site visit by personnel for the department. For community centers already receiving grants-in-aid, evaluation visits may be made at the discretion of the department instead of a site visit.

(b) No grant-in-aid shall be made without approval of the board.

(c) Grants-in-aid for Fiscal Year 1977 shall be allocated to a board of trustees in accordance with the following formula: the amount resulting from the total funds budgeted by a board of trustees as of the beginning of FY 1976 for state grant-in-aid, other state funds, and federal funds multiplied by 12 percent plus 53 cents times the total population of the area plus the amount of state grant-in-aid approved as of the beginning of FY 1976 adjusted to include an annual amount for special project funding.

The above formula is expressed mathematically in the following terms:  $X + (X+Y+Z)A + S + B(P)$ , where "X" means the amount of state grant-in-aid for FY 1976 budgeted by a board of trustees minus the amount of state grant-in-aid for special projects, as of September 1, 1975; "Y" means the total funds budgeted by a board of trustees as of the beginning of FY 1976 for other state funds; "Z" means the total funds budgeted by a board of trustees as of the beginning of FY 1976 for federal funds; "A" means 12 percent; "S" means FY

1976 state grant-in-aid budgeted for special projects as of September 1, 1975, projected on an annual basis (less non-recurring costs) for FY 1977 multiplied by 112 percent; "B" means 53 cents; "P" means total population of the area.

(d) Grants-in-aid allocated to boards of trustees shall be matched by local support in an amount determined by the department which shall in no case be less than 10 percent nor more than 30 percent of the amount of grant-in-aid. The amount and kinds of services and facilities which may be credited to local support shall be within the discretion of the state mental health authority.

(e) The department shall determine the matching ratio within the limits specified in .003(d) by using economic indices available which are generally relied upon to indicate the financial ability of a local community to support public services to its citizens.

## Texas Board of Licensure for Nursing Home Administrators

### Application 391.02.00

The Texas Board of Licensure for Nursing Home Administrators has adopted Rule 391.02.00.003, by the authority of Article 4442d, Vernon's Annotated Civil Statutes.

.003. *Preceptorial Qualifications.* Effective July 1, 1976, preceptor certificates shall be issued by the board to any nursing home administrator meeting the requirements set forth below:

a. An administrator desiring to obtain a preceptor certificate must have at least three years experience as a nursing home administrator in the State of Texas; however, such experience may include one year of experience as an administrator-in-training prior to the issuance of his administrator's license.

b. Applicants shall attend a two-day seminar consisting of seven and one-half hours each day. One day shall deal with practicals and one day with theories.

c. Enrollment at such seminar shall be limited to 100 administrators per seminar.

d. An examination consisting of 50 multiple choice questions shall be administered at such seminar.

e. Preceptor certificates shall be awarded upon successful completion of the seminar and upon passing the examination.

f. Preceptor certificates shall be issued for a two year period concurrent with the applicant's administrator's license and shall expire simultaneously with the applicant's administrator's license.

g. Preceptors shall administer training in a nursing home licensed by the Texas Department of Health Resources, which nursing home shall participate as an Intermediate Care Facility (ICF) III or skilled or a combination of each and shall have a minimum bed capacity of 60 beds.

h. The board shall have the discretion to waive strict compliance with these requirements for good cause and shall otherwise have discretion in approving applications.

Under the authority of Article 4442d, Vernon's Annotated Civil Statutes, the Texas Board of Licensure for Nursing Home Administrators has amended Rule 391.04.00.002(d) to read as follows:

.002. *Continuing Education Programs of Study.*

(d) Credit of 15 hours continuing education will be given to administrators who attend preceptor seminars.
