Increased certification standards for fire inspectors are being proposed by the Commission on Fire Protection Personnel Standards and Education. The commission is revising existing standards to add 138 hours to courses required for certification of full-time fire inspectors. Training costs, estimated to reach \$84,525 per year for the next five years, are to be incurred by local governments. On the average, a city will train one inspector every three years.

The Texas Youth Council has adopted procedures for returning children determined mentally retarded to the committing court for disposition. The rules provide that the finding be based on results of a standardized intelligence test appropriate for the age, cultural background, language, and ethnic origin of the child.



An agency may adopt emergency rules after determining what it considers to be an imminent peril to the public health, safety, or welfare. These rules may be effective immediately on filing with the secretary of state for no more than 120 days, renewable once for no more than 60 days. An agency must submit written reasons, published in the *Register*, for the emergency adoption of rules.

Numbering System—Each rule is designated by a unique 10-digit number which is divided into four units by decimal points. The first unit (three digits) indicates the agency which promulgates the rule. The second unit (two digits) indicates the chapter of rules to which the rule belongs. The third unit (two digits) indicates the subchapter of rules, if any, within the chapter. The fourth unit (three digits) indicates the individual rule.

The Comptroller of Public Accounts has adopted Rule 026.02.20.048 on an emergency basis in order to reflect the tax rate adopted by the Houston Metropolitan Transit Authority. If during any reporting period the retailer's records fail to establish the facts necessary to exclude sales of nine cents or less, the tax for such periods must be reported and paid on the basis of one percent of all receipts from sales of taxable items, including sales of eight cents or less. 

Commission on Fire Protection Personnel Standards and Education

Standards Manual

Minimum Standards for Fire Prevention Personnel 211.02.06.001-.007

The Commission on Fire Protection Personnel Standards and Education is proposing the repeal of Rule 211.02.06.600 and the adoption of Rules 211.02.06.001-.007. The standards have been incorporated in the new rules, with substantive changes in Rule .004. Rules .001-.003 and .005-.007 are proposed to reorganize and clarify existing standards. Substantive changes now included in Rule .004 specify subjects necessary for basic certification and increase required hours from 82 to 220 to increase the proficiency of the fully paid fire inspector. At the present time, the Volunteer Certification Board requires 82 hours for certification of a volunteer fireman. The fully paid person should be more highly trained in specialized courses for full-time duty.

The promulgation of proposed Rules 211.02.06.001.007 will have no known fiscal implications on the state; however, the adoption of the rules will have fiscal implications on local

governments, since the individual municipalities will bear the cost of the increased training. A survey of 22 cities employing fire prevention personnel was made to ascertain the cost on a local basis. Since the proposed rules reflect an increase of 138 hours, it is anticipated the cost of such training will be raised to \$84,525 per year over the next five years, to be incurred by cities throughout the state, and none by the State of Texas. On the average, cities will train one inspector every three years.

Public comment is invited and may be sent to Garland W. Fulbright, executive director, Commission on Fire Protection Personnel Standards and Education, 8330 Burnet Road, Suite 122, Austin, Texas 78758, within 30 days of publication.

These rules are proposed under the authority of Article 4413(35) Vernon's Civil Statutes.

- .001. Eligibility. Personnel, whether in a fire department, state agency, educational institution, political subdivision, or in private industry, who are either full-time fire prevention inspectors, or who are employed full time in a combined position as a fire prevention inspector and fire and arson investigator,* and who comply with the following minimum requirements for the various levels of inspector, shall be eligible for certification by the commission.
- *Must be certified as provided in Subchapter 211.02.07.
- .002. Completion of Requirements. Municipal fire prevention inspection personnel shall complete certification requirements, as certified inspector, within two years of initial appointment to such position.
- .003. Service Requirement. In order to obtain any of the following inspector certificates, the applicant must have completed one year of service in fire prevagtion activities prior to issuance of the certificate in this discipline. Previous departmental accredited training is acceptable where applicable.
- .004. Courses. An applicant must complete the following courses to be certified as an inspector.
- (1) Public Relations—10 hours (clock). This covers public opinion, the image projected, and the importance to the inspector, techniques in meeting people and gaining confidence of the public, and the importance of personal appearance, punctuality, and courtesy.
- (2) Public Speaking—20 hours (clock). This course should include the organization of subject material and preparation of an adequate outline, thorough knowledge of subject to be presented, the proper attitudes and image to the audience, voice control and enunciation, ability to convey thoughts to others, and clarity of discussion.
- (3) Loss of Life by Fire—12 hours (clock). Death and injuries; trends of fire casualties; international fire deaths and injuries per million population; indirect causes of fire injuries; who are the fire victims; firefighter deaths; life safety and fire protection; fire deaths and alcohol; fire casualties in private residences; factors responsible for the failure of persons to escape from fires; factors responsible for the spread of smoke and fire resulting in loss of life; fires causing large loss of life; the Cocoanut Grove Night Club fire, Boston, Massachusetts; the Ringling Brothers Circus fire, Hartford, Connecticut; Indianapolis State Fairgrounds Coliseum fire, Indianapolis, Indiana; Dale's Penthouse Restaurant fire, Montgomery, Alabama; Our Lady of the Angels Grade School

fire, Chicago, Illinois; Hartford Hospital fire, Hartford, Connecticut; the Winecoff Hotel fire, Atlanta, Georgia; Roosevelt Hotel fire, Jackson, Florida; Cocktail Lounge, New Orleans, Louisiana; Pioneer Hotel fire, Tucson, Arizona.

- (4) Property Loss by Fire and Explosion—2 hours (clock). Direct property losses; indirect property losses; fire losses in international countries as per capita in terms of U.S. dollars; fires by occupancies; losses to fire-damaged businesses.
- (5) Analysis of Fire Losses—1 hour (clock). Structural deferes of influencing fire spread; contents; fixtures influencing fire spread; private fire protection weakness; time of occurrence; factors responsible for fire spread in buildings; fire losses by fire ignition sequence and their estimated losses; fire losses by occupancy; fire ignition sequence factors for fire losses; type of material ignited; act of omission; area of origin; conflagrations and their prime contributing factors; conflagrations 1969-1974.
- (6) Products of Combustion and Their Effect on Life Safety—1 hour (clock). Toxicity of gases; carbon monoxide; carbon dioxide; hydrogen sulfide; other gases; fire tests conducted by Southwest Research Institute in three-room dwellings; heat; smoke; insufficient oxygen.
- (7) Flammable and Combustible Liquids—12 hours Hazards of flammable and combustible liquids; classification; Underwriters Laboratories, Inc., classification; physical properties of liquids such as specific gravity, vapor density evaporation rate; flash points; ignition temperatures; boiling points; flammable (explosive) limits; burning characteristics of liquids; boiling over; slop over; frothing over; fire prevention methods; tank storage of flammable and combustible liquids; emergency venting; underground storage tanks, foundations and supports; drainage in ditches; fire protection systems; underground storage tanks, tanks inside of buildings; gauging and cleaning of tanks; removal of flammable vapors by displacement; containers in storage in buildings; loading and unloading of flammable and combustible liquids; disposition and handling methods; tank vehicles, their construction and design; review of Pamphlet 30 of the National Fire Protection Association.
- (8) Storage and Handling of Flammable and Combustible Gases—4 hours (clock). Gases defined; classification of gases; flammable gases; nonflammable gases; reactive gases; toxic gases; classification by physical properties; liquid gases; cryogenic gases; classification by usage of gases such as fuel; industrial; mechanical; hazards of confinement; under pressure relief devices; maximum permitted filling density; combustion within containers; gas containers such as tanks, pipelines; properties of specific gases such as acetylene, ammonia, natural gas, hydrogen, ethylene, etc., carbon dioxide, chlorine; liquified natural gas.
- (9) Dust and Dust Explosions—2 hours (clock). Factors influencing the explosability of dust; hazards of dust; particle size; concentration of explosives or characteristics of various dusts; dust cloud ignition sources; major dust explosion in buildings and properties.
- (10) Hazardous Chemicals.—12 hours (clock). Toxicity of chemicals; oxidizing chemicals; nitrates; sodium nitrates; potassium nitrate; ammonium nitrate; cellulose nitrate, nitrites; inorganic peroxides; sodium, potassium, and strontium peroxide; barium peroxide; hydrogen peroxide; chlorates; chlorites; perchlorates; perchloric acid; permanganates; storage of oxidizing chemicals; fire protection for oxidizing chemicals; combustible chemicals; carbon black; lamp black;

sulfides; sulfur; storage and fire protection for combustible chemicals; unstable chemicals; acetaldehyde; ethylene oxide; hydrogen cyanide; organic peroxides; storage and fire protection of unstable chemicals; styrene; vinyl chloride; water and air-reactive chemicals; carbides; charcoal; coal; hydrides; oxides; phosphorus; white (or yellow) phosphorus; red phosphorus; storage and fire protection for water and airreactive chemicals; coal; corrosive chemicals; hydrochloric acid; hydrofluoric acid; nitric acid; perchloric acid; the halogens; storage and fire protection for corrosive chemicals; radioactive materials; storage and fire protection for radioactive materials; handling radioactive materials; transportation of chemicals; waste chemical disposal; presentation of information; hazard levels; dangerous materials; nuisance hazards; definitions; flammability; toxicity; instability (selfreactivity) and chemical reactivity; the NFPA No. 704 System of Hazard Identification; health hazards; flammability hazards; reactivity (stability) hazards; assigning degrees of hazard; advantages of the NFPA 704 system; disadvantages of the NFPA 704 System; Department of Transportation (DOT) placards; present DOT requirements; over-the-road equipment; railway equipment; transportation emergencies-identification problems; Department of Transportation (DOT) labels; warning labels on immediate containers; shipping papers and chem-cards; DOT hazard information (HI) system; hazard emergency teams; use of tables and charts.

(11) Fire Hazard Properties of Metals—2 hours (clock). Problems encountered with metals; melting; boiling; and ignition temperature of pure metals in solid form; magnesium and its properties; storage and handling of magnesium; process hazards of magnesium; fighting magnesium fires; titanium and its properties; storage and handling of titanium; process hazards of titanium; fighting titanium fires; sodium and lithium, NaK and potassium; their properties and storage and handling; fighting fires in sodium, lithium, NaK and potassium; zirconium and hafnium and their properties; the storage and handling of zirconium and hafnium and their process hazards; fighting fires in hafnium and zirconium; calcium and zinc; their properties; storage, processing, and fighting fires in such metals; radioactive materials and friction sparks and problems related thereto; commercially available approved combustible metal extinguishing agents such as G-1, metal guard, and Met-L-X powder; other commercially available combustible metal extinguishing agents such as foundry flux, lith-X powder, TMB liquid and its use as an extinguishing agent; talc (powder); graphite powder; sand; soda ash, water, and other extinguishing agents for combustible metals.

(12) Interior Finishes—2 hours (clock). Definition of interior finishes; types of interior finishes; the role of interior finishes in fires; method of application; fire test for interior finishes; the Steiner Tunnel test; application of tennel test results; life safety code requirements for interior finishes; the Corner test; smoke-scale tests; special test for floor coverings; full-scale testing; discussion of fire case histories; dance hall, St. Laurent, France; Tae-Yon-Cak Hotel fire, Seoul, Korea; office building, Sao Paulo, Brazil, February 1, 1974; apartment house fire, Minneapolis Minnesota, August 5, 1970; nursing home fire, Wayne, Pennsylvania, December 4, 1973; department store/office building fire, Sao Paulo, Brazil, February 24, 1972.

(13) Finishing and Cleaning Process—2 hours (clock). Spray finishing; spray booths; finishing; spontaneous heat-

ing; residues in spray booths; sprinkler protection; dip tank operations; ventilation; tank covers; overflow pipes; drain boards; special finishing processes such as hand painting; silk screen process painting; drycleaning textiles and standards relating thereto; parts and materials cleaning.

(14) Housekeeping Practices—1 hour (clock). Principles of good housekeeping; building care and maintenance; cleaning and treatment of floors; sweeping compounds; floor oils; flammable cleaning solvents; dust and lint removal; kitchen exhaust ducts and equipment; occupancy housekeeping; housekeeping hazards such as drip pans; flammable liquid spills; flammable liquid waste disposal; clean waste and rags; oily waste; packing materials; refuse chutes; combustible metal waste; lockers and cupboards; outdoor housekeeping and week and grass control; refuse and rubbish disposal.

(15) Stair Exits and Occupant Loads—4 hours (clock). Number of exits required; total width of exits required; distances to exits; exits through adjoining or accessory areas; types of locks or latches; available square foot per occupant and egress facilities in various occupancies; corridors and exits; stairways; rise and run; circular stairways and landings; hand rails; smoke proof enclosures; enclosure protection and construction of stairways; smoke proof enclosures by mechanical means; exit signs and illumination; distances to the nearest exit.

(16) Concepts of Egress Design—2 hours (clock). Fundamentals of design; human factors; factors affecting the movement of people; methods of calculating exit width; signs and means of egress; the Life Safety Code as related to exits; hazards of contents; influences of building construction and design; influences of interior finishes; furnishings and decorations; influences of psychological and physicological factors; influences of fire protection equipment; discharge of an exit; capacity of unit of exit width; computing required exit widths; exit facilities and areas; exit door hardware; horizontal exits—stairs; exit maintenance.

(17) Highrise Buildings and Related Problems—4 hours (clock). Definition of a highrise building; problems encountered in firefighting; the stack effect; evacuation and time required; Canadian research on evacuation; areas of refuge; detection and alarm; exits and distances traveled thereto; highrise building fires: One New York Plaza; Rault Center, New Orleans, Louisiana; Baptist Towers Fire, Atlanta, Georgia; compartmentalization versus automatic sprinklers in highrise buildings; provisions of Uniform and Standard Building Codes relative to highrise buildings; Sears Tower of Chicago; life safety and fire systems.

System types and operation; location of equipment; fresh-air intakes; air cooling and heating equipment; air filters and cleaners; fibrous media unit filters; renewable media filters; electric air cleaners; special industrial filters and air cleaners; protection for air filters and cleaners; ducts; duct construction; duct installation; fire dampers; smoke detectors; smoke fundamentals of air moving systems; basic design considerations; duct construction and installation; design and selection of fans; fire extinguishing systems; manual extinguishing equipment; explosion venting; explosion prevention; static electricity; flammable vapors; ventilating of kitchen cooking equipment; corrosive vapors and fumes; dust collecting and stock and refuse conveying systems; separating and collecting equipment.

(20) Special Fire Protection Systems—8 hours (clock).

- (A) Standpipes and hose systems. System classification; water supplies; types of systems; system components; nozzles, hose and hose cabinets, valves, fire department connections; gages; system design; number and location of outlets; zoning, completely sprinklered highrise buildings; inspections; outside hose systems; hose and hydrant houses and equipment; amount of hose; accessories; hose carriers; monitor nozzles.
- (B) Water spray protection. Purpose of water spray protection; application of water spray protection; fixed water spray systems; application of systems; design of systems; size of water spray systems; water supplies; water demand rate; pipe sizes; selection and use of spray nozzles; drainage; maintenance; fixed spray system nozzles; ultra·high-speed water spray systems.

(29) Fire Alarm Systems and Devices—4 hours (clock). Principles of protective signaling; electrical power supplies; complete and partial systems; supervision of signaling systems; testing and maintenance procedures; signaling system standards; household fire warning systems; notification for evacuation; summoning organized assistance; supervision of extinguishing systems; supervision of processes; manual systems; automatic systems; heat detectors; smoke detectors; flame detectors; central station system; local

system; fixed-temperature detectors; rate-of-rise detectors; combined rate-of-rise and fixed-temperature detectors; rate compensation (anticipation and differentiation) devices; photoelectric detectors; ionization detectors; types of flame detectors; spacing of detection devices.

- (30) Emergency Evacuation—1 hour (clock). This lecture is to be devoted to the planning and executing of fire drills in public schools, hospitals, institutions, as well as other structures where people congregate for business, recreation or pleasure; the lecture should include the evaluation of each drill after such has been conducted so that fire drills in the future can avoid any problems encountered. Particular emphasis should be given to suggestions for school officials in the planning and conducting of fire drills in public schools.
- Blue Print Reading and Plan Checking-4 hours (clock). This lecture is to include all of the details of inspections, surveying and mapping of structures; symbols relative to fire protection, height and roof covering; roof types; types of construction and walls; floor and wall openings; wall construction and all other symbols and details relative to structural features involving fire protection, life safety, and the prevention of the spread of fire and smoke through buildings; color code denoting construction materials for walls, etc. The lecture is to be such as to provide such data and information that the firefighter can review a set of plans for a particular occupancy to see that there are no complications with legal codes and regulations as well as other applicable standards such as the Texas Department of Public Health insofar as life safety and other fire prevention and fire protection codes are concerned.
- (32) Railroad Tank Cars and Tank Trucks and Other Hazardous Cargo Carriers—4 hours (clock). Texas Youth Council Reception and Receiving Centers

The Texas Youth Council has adopted Rule 203.10.03.006, relating to the procedure for returning mentally retarded children to the committing court for disposition, pursuant to Section 55.03 of the Texas Family Code; the Mentally Retarded Persons Act of 1977, Article 5547-300, Vernon's Annotated Civil Statutes; and Article 5143d, Section 30, Vernon's Annotated Civil Statutes.

The purpose of the rule is to provide a simple, uniform, and efficient procedure for the notification of committing courts and the return of mentally retarded children to the committing counties. Copies of the proposed rule were sent to all juvenile judges in Texas for their comments and criticisms.

Comments were received from seven juvenile probation departments, six juvenile courts, TEA, MH/MR, and Advocacy, Inc. Advocacy, Inc., requested that the Youth Council issue a statement of the principal reasons for and against the adoption of the proposed rule. Advocacy, Inc., as well as TEA, expressed concern that the proposed rule did not address the potential for racial or cultural discrimination posed by reliance on standardized intelligence tests. In recognition of the legitimacy of this concern, Sections (b) and (d) of the adopted rule require the use of culture-free test instruments as well as diagnostic evaluations of adaptive behavior. Procedural questions raised by MH/MR and several courts and probation departments have been addressed by clarifying the nature of the waiver to be executed on behalf of TYC, and by allowing notice to the judge or his designee. The majority of comments received were supportive of the rule as a workable procedure for the implementation of the Mentally Retarded Persons Act.

The agency has determined that adoption of the rule will have no financial implications for the state.

This rule is adopted under authority of Articles 5547-300 and 5143d, Vernon's Annotated Civil Statutes.

.006. Return of Mentally Retarded Child.

- (a) When a child's psychological evaluation conducted pursuant to Rule 203.10.03.001 results in a finding that the child is mentally retarded, such retarded child shall be returned to the court of original jurisdiction for appropriate disposition pursuant to Section 55.03, Texas Family Code, and the Mentally Retarded Persons Act of 1977, Article 5547-300, Vernon's Annotated Civil Statutes.
- (b) A child shall be returned to the committing court as a retarded child if the results of a standardized intelligence test appropriate for the child's age and adapted to the cultural background, language, and ethnic origin of the child demonstrate significantly subaverage general intellectual function of 2.5 or more standard deviations below the agegroup mean for the test used, existing concurrently with deficits in adaptive behavior of levels I-IV.
- (c) When a child is found to be mentally retarded, the superintendent of the reception center or his designee shall attempt to notify the judge of the committing court or his designee by telephone of such finding within two working days. Upon notifying the judge of the committing court or his designee of such finding, or, if unable to notify the judge or his designee within two working days of the date of such finding, the superintendent or his designee shall notify the juvenile probation department or officer of the committing county by telephone. The superintendent or his designee shall arrange for the return of the child to a place designated by the probation department or officer or by the court, at a time suitable to both parties. However, in no event shall the superintendent fail to return to the committing county a child found to be mentally retarded within 14 days from the date of such finding.

- (d) Upon a finding that a child is mentally retarded, the superintendent shall complete two copies of a Suggestion of Mental Retardation and Motion for Hearing; Waiver of Notice, Citation, and Appearance on behalf of the Texas Youth Council; and a suggested Order for Comprehensive Diagnosis and Evaluation. Certified copies of the intelligence test used and diagnostic evaluations of adaptive behavior shall be attached to the Suggestion of Mental Retardation and Motion for Hearing. Within two working days from the date on which a child a found to be mentally retarded, the superintendent shall send by registered or certified mail, return receipt requested, one copy of each document to the judge of the committing court and one copy to the court's designee, and one copy of each document to the committing court for filing.
- (e) The reception center shall be responsible for transporting the child to the committing county.
- (f) If the committing court finds that the child is mentally retarded and places the child in a facility of the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation, the Texas Youth Council shall formally discharge the child.
- (g) If the court finds that the child is not mentally retarded, the Texas Youth Council shall accept the child pursuant to the original order of commitment. The child's committing county shall be responsible for the child's transportation to the Texas Youth Council's Statewide Reception Center.



State Occupational Information Coordinating Committee

Special Purpose Research Program

The Education Amendments of 1976 (Public Law 94-482) established the National Occupational Information Coordinating Committee (NOICC). Its primary mission is to develop and implement an occupational information system (OIS) and to improve communication, coordination, and cooperation in the use of that system. The OIS is to be designed to meet the data needs of users of occupational information at national, state, and local levels.

The act also required the establishment of state occupational information coordinating committees (SOICCs), and it specified the statutory members of these committees. In Texas, the statutory members are: Texas Employment Commission, Texas Education Agency, Texas Rehabilitation Commission, and State Manpower Services Council/Governor's Budget and Planning Office. The Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, has been added as a fifth member of the Texas SOICC.

To carry out the mandate of the legislation cited above, NOICC will make funds available to the SOICCs for special purpose research. Grants for this research will be awarded to SOICCs on a competitive basis, for areas of emphasis specified by NOICC. These areas of emphasis are:

- (1) the development and implementation of an occupational information system (OIS);
- (2) improvement of communication and coordination to create an awareness and fuller utilization of existing sources of occupational data;
- (3) provision of special attention to unemployed youth and improving delivery of career information;
- (4) improvement of coordination and cooperation between data developers and data users.

Grant applications may be for research, development, and implementation activities, but each must be concerned with furthering the objectives of the legislation under which the NOICC and the SOICCs were created.

Grant applications for these special projects will be considered by NOICC early in 1979. (No specific data has been set.) Interested individuals and/or research facilities should submit a special purpose project application in accordance with the guidelines established by NOICC.
