Re: Whether the county is required to reimburse its elected judges for payment of annual dues assessed by the State Bar (ID# 17347)

Dear Mr. Guarino:

You have requested our opinion regarding a dispute between the Galveston County Commissioners Court and a Galveston County probate judge as to whether the county is required to reimburse its elected judges for payment of annual dues assessed by the State Bar of Texas.

As you indicate, subsection (h) of section 25.0862, Government Code, provides for the payment of the salaries of the statutory county court judges of Galveston County, including the probate judge. The minimum salary for such judges is detailed in Government Code section 25.0005. The commissioners court is also directed to furnish its judges with "the physical facilities necessary to operate" the particular statutory county court. Gov't. Code § 25.0030. In addition, Local Government Code section 152.011 authorizes a commissioners court to "set the amount of the compensation, office and travel expenses, and all other allowances" for county officials. Although this latter provision may permit the commissioners court to compensate a statutory county judge for payment of bar dues, it does not require that body to do so. Neither does any other statute impose such a requirement.

Accordingly, we are obliged to conclude that the Galveston County Commissioners Court is not compelled to reimburse the probate judge of Galveston County for payment of annual dues assessed to him by the State Bar of Texas.

SUMMARY

The Galveston County Commissioners Court is not required to reimburse its elected judges for payment of annual dues assessed by the State Bar of Texas.
