Straight Talk

History-making change

A new Texas Department of Transportation emerged in 2004 as the department began spreading the word about how things must change — and how they are already being transformed — as we continue moving forward to meet the state's growing transportation needs. Two of those changes occurred in December, representing major milestones in the department's history.

The commission announced the selection of Cintra-Zachry, an international engineering, construction and financial firm, as providing the best long-term value in developing the Oklahoma-to-Mexico portion of the Trans-Texas Corridor (TTC-35). Cintra-Zachry will invest \$6 billion of its own money in new roads that roughly parallel I-35 and will give the state \$1.2 billion for additional transportation improvements along TTC-35.

Another first occurred in December when the commission announced the largest single roadway-safety program in its history. More than \$600 million will be spent on 644 safety projects across the state, projects that could save 90 lives and prevent nearly 1,100 injuries each year. The program will focus on widening narrow roads, adding left-turn lanes, erecting barriers in the medians of divided highways, and building new overpasses. Money for the safety improvements will come from the sale of bonds.

Both those projects are possible because of legislation passed in 2003, giving TxDOT new tools to deliver transportation improvements faster than ever before through some fairly cutting-edge methods.

But one thing will never change at TxDOT, nor do we want it to. We have always relied on the professionalism, hard work and dedication of our employees as the foundation of everything that we do and how we do it.

TxDOT keeps Texas moving

Corridor advances with selection of 'best-value' proposal

Cintra-Zachry — an international group of engineering, construction and financial firms — has been selected by the Transportation Commission as the best value for the state in developing the Oklahoma-to-Mexico portion of the Trans-Texas Corridor (TTC-35).

"People will remember that what we did on the 16th of December 2004 was every bit as impactful as the interstate highway system was more than a half-century ago," Gov. Rick Perry said shortly after the commission vote. "I think we have just seen the future today, and it's stunning. Believe it. It's here."

Cintra-Zachry proposes to invest \$6 billion in a toll road between Dallas and San Antonio by 2010, to give the state \$1.2 billion for additional transportation improvements between Oklahoma and Mexico, and to extend the corridor into the Lower Rio Grande Valley to Mexico.

"This is an historic change in the way major transportation assets are built and paid for in Texas," said commission Chairman Ric Williamson. "Private investment, not taxpayer dollars, will be where we look first for funding."

To address the state's need for immediate congestion relief on Interstate 35, the first phase of Cintra-Zachry's proposal calls for developing \$6 billion in new roadways roughly paralleling the interstate by 2010. This includes building 316 miles of new four-lane divided highway from Dallas to San Antonio. According to the proposal, pending environmental clearance and the public-involvement process, construction could begin immediately after right of way has been acquired.

Cintra-Zachry's package also includes funding options for a route connecting southeast San Antonio to State Highway 130 and for relocating — to the east — the existing Union Pacific rail line between San Antonio and Austin.

Future projects envisioned by Cintra-Zachry include separate lanes for cars and trucks on SH 130, a relief route around the west side of Fort Worth, a TTC-35 route from San Antonio to the Rio Grande Valley, and rail between Dallas and San Antonio.

Cintra-Zachry is one of three groups to submit detailed proposals on how to develop the Oklahoma to Mexico element of the Trans-Texas Corridor. TxDOT had been studying the proposals since last August.

Principals of the Cintra-Zachry consortium include Cintra, a Spanish toll-road operator with worldwide operations, and Zachry Construction, based in San Antonio. TxDOT staff determined that the group's proposal provides the best long-term value to the state.

In return for building the new transportation corridor and giving

Meetings on environment slated for proposed routes

As part of the federal process for environmental review, a series of public meetings on one of the proposed routes of the Trans-Texas Corridor has been scheduled. Two environmental studies are currently in progress: the Oklahoma-to-Mexico/Gulf Coast (TTC-35) element and the Northeast Texas-to-Mexico

(I-69/TTC) element. The initial work in identifying potential corridor routes began in early 2004. The latest round of public meetings for TTC-35 is set for Feb. 7-March 31, with 48 meetings scheduled throughout the study area. More information is available at www.keeptexasmoving.org •

Safety projects gain with funding

Highway improvements to reduce traffic crashes and save lives

TxDOT gave Texans something to celebrate just before the start of the new year — the largest single roadway safety program it has ever undertaken. At just over \$600 million, it will include 644 safety projects all across the state.

Transportation planners say the highway improvements could save as many as 90 lives and prevent nearly 1,100 injuries every year.

Bonds authorized by voters last year will be used to pay for widening narrow two-lane roadways, installing barriers in the medians of divided highways, adding left-turn lanes at highway intersections, and building new overpasses around the state. Work on many of the projects is expected to be under way as early as next year.

"Thanks to the voters, we are about to make safety improvements to more than 2,300 miles of state highways," said Gov. Rick Perry. "That's more than the length of a road stretching all the way from Austin to New York City."

The bond program will pay for projects that safety experts say have the most potential for reducing the number of traffic crashes on statemaintained highways. TxDOT will spend \$295 million to widen narrow, two-lane roads in 90 Texas counties. This will cut the number of head-on collisions and crashes involving vehicles that run off the road. New concrete or cable barriers in the medians of heavily traveled divided highways also are expected to

decrease head-on collisions.

Ten new highway overpasses will improve traffic flow and reduce the number and severity of crashes. TxDOT will also install left-turn lanes at 171 sites to reduce the number of rear-end crashes.

In 2003, voters gave the Texas Transportation Commission authority to issue up to \$3 billion in bonds to pay for projects improving state highways. The safety projects announced in Austin in late December are the first to be funded under the new financing option.

Each year, more than 3,500 people are killed and more than 340,000 are injured in motor-vehicle crashes in Texas. The Texas Transportation Institute's Center for Transportation Safety estimates the annual economic cost of crashes in the state exceeds \$19.7 billion.

it to the state — plus paying the state \$1.2 billion to invest in the corridor — Cintra-Zachry proposes to negotiate for a 50-year contract to maintain and operate the new highway as a toll road. Those talks were ongoing during January.

"The private sector is willing and able to invest in transportation improvements to reduce congestion, improve safety, provide economic development, and protect our quality of life," said Williamson. "There are many details to be worked out and

separate environmental studies must be completed. Without a doubt, the private sector is knocking at our door with a nearly incredible opportunity for Texas."

"In Texas, we're breaking new ground," Commissioner Robert Nichols said. "By far, this will be one of the largest private-sector investments in transportation in U.S. history."

Commissioner Hope Andrade pointed to the proposal's economic impact. "This is an enormously important crossroad for Texas,"

she said. "This project will mean jobs and opportunities for the people of this state for generations to come."

Commissioner John W. Johnson sees the proposal as a major steppingstone toward the development of I-69 as well. "It amounts to a blueprint for building I-69," he said.

"All of us on the commission appreciate the vision of Gov. Perry in proposing the Trans-Texas Corridor, which has now become a reality," Commissioner Ted Houghton said.

Progress seen in timeline for TTC

January 2002: Gov. Rick Perry outlines his vision for the Trans-Texas Corridor and asks TxDOT to develop an action plan.

June 2002: TxDOT outlines action steps to implement the Trans-Texas Corridor in the report, "The Crossroads of the Americas."

November 2002: TxDOT receives unsolicited proposal for TTC-35 from Fluor Enterprises Inc.

July 25, 2003: TXDOT issues a request for competing proposals and qualifications for the element of the Trans-Texas Corridor stretching from Oklahoma to Mexico and the Gulf Coast.

Sept. 9, 2003: Competing proposals are received from two groups: Cintra-Zachry and Trans Texas Express LLC. With the Fluor proposal, three conceptual proposals are submitted to TxDOT.

Oct. 29, 2003: TxDOT decides to invite all three groups to submit detailed proposals.

April 29, 2004: All three groups submit detailed proposals. **Fall 2004**: TxDOT evaluates proposals.

Dec. 16, 2004: The Texas Transportation Commission announces selection of a long-term strategic partner (Cintra-Zachry) to develop the Oklahoma-Mexico/Gulf Coast element of the Trans-Texas Corridor.


Winter 2005: TxDOT negotiates a comprehensive development agreement with Cintra. The agreement, limited to \$3.5 million, is for development of a master plan for financing and implementation of the Trans-Texas Corridor.

Carol T. Rawson, P.E., deputy director of the Traffic Operations Division, is known for strong management expertise, extensive engineering knowledge, and a proven record of accomplishments.



Career highlights include important roles in development of intelligent transportation systems in Texas, particularly the Freeway Traffic Management System and the High-Occupancy Vehicle System. Selected by Commissioner Johnson to participate in the Texas Transportation Partnership project, Rawson served on two of the project's working groups and made significant contributions to the final report. That document set the department's goals regarding reliable mobility, improved safety, system preservation, accelerated project delivery, and economic vitality.

Rawson is deeply involved with crash-record reporting in Texas as a way to enhance safety across the state. This project — called the Crash Records Information System (CRIS for short) — will use computers and the Internet to help the Department of Public Safety process data on highway crashes with minimum delay. It also will reduce a backlog of reports waiting to be processed. The faster that data can be analyzed, the faster improvements can be made in the design and construction of highway projects.

Rawson was hailed at the presentation as "the person whose work assures that transportation in Texas today is safer than yesterday — and will be even safer for tomorrow's travelers."



The most prestigious transportation-related awards in Texas were presented during the 2004 Transportation Short Course in mid-October at Texas A&M University. These awards, sponsored through the Texas Transportation Institute, recognize the best within TxDOT and its public supporters.

Gilchrist Award

San Antonio-native Clay R. Smith, P.E., is the director of transportation planning and development in the San Antonio District. He is seen as a leader who has made significant contributions in the areas of transportation planning, design, construction and maintenance.


With a public-sector career spanning 25 years and many different jobs for TxDOT, he helped put Texas at the leading edge of transportation innovation. Having earned a bachelor's degree in civil engineering from Texas A&M University, Smith has come a long way since his first job with TxDOT as an engineering assistant back in 1978. Known for taking a long-range view in planning, Smith has emphasized the importance of actively involving local elected officials in transportation issues. He has spearheaded a planning process that incorporates public outreach, especially to those affected by projects in rural counties.

Smith also played a key role in developing the

district's Rural Mobility Plan, again focusing on the long-range needs of the district by establishing priority transportation corridors. He is known for applying access-management principles as a way to squeeze every bit of mobility from existing roadways. Taking advantage of the new tools provided by the legislature to accelerate transportation improvements, he has been instrumental in establishing one of the state's earliest regional-mobility authorities. He used the tools to advance a major interchange project in the district — decreasing the project's cost by \$9 million — while minimizing the impact on motorists during construction. He also played a key role in the district's letting a record \$260 million in fiscal year 2004. ■

DeBerry Award

Behrooz Badiozzamani, P.E., deputy district engineer of the Pharr District, has a well-deserved reputation as a quick and eager learner driven by a strong work ethic and a commitment to solve challenges.

civil engineering, he has attained nearly 25 years of professional experience with TxDOT, beginning as an engineering assistant in 1980. Other job titles have included district design engineer and area engineer. He has been a deputy district engineer for more than a decade.

Ensuring that TxDOT has qualified individuals to lead it for generations to come is a priority for him. He makes it part of everyday business to ensure that fellow employees are familiar with all aspects of the department's business. He has overseen a multi-million dollar construction and design program and three maintenance sections. He has developed project-tracking systems to ensure that all aspects of project development are followed in a timely manner. He has modified the department's standard right-of-way agreements to fit project needs and he has helped create the first bridge section in the district. Through his efforts, the district has gone from a letting volume

of \$27.8 million a decade ago to present-day projects under contract valued at \$600 million. He has led the district's efforts coordinating and expediting projects throughout several areas with the Economically Disadvantaged County Program. Further, he had a key role in negotiating and developing contract and design documents to expedite reconstruction of the Queen Isabella Memorial Causeway at South Padre Island. He is among those credited with the restoration of traffic to South Padre Island in record time.

Perry Award

Livingston resident and Polk County Judge John P. Thompson knows the importance of transportation — past, present and future. He understands the importance of transportation in building a community's prosperity and advancing its economic future. This understanding of the


power of transportation is longstanding. For decades, he has advocated good roads in Texas. He was recognized in 2000 by TxDOT with the department's Road Hand Award.

He is distinguished in every aspect of a professional life that has included leadership roles in business and government, as well as in organizations promoting civic and economic growth. Whether before a community group in his home county, or in testimony to a legislative or congressional committee, he speaks to the issues of transportation needs and how those needs can best be met.

Thompson's voice is as strong for rural counties and their need for improved transportation to preserve their economies as it is in pointing to the positive impact of Interstate 69 connecting Canada and Mexico with the United States. He has embraced the Trans-Texas Corridor, making many public presentations in its support. His many friends see him as a visionary who grasps the present and future needs of transportation in Texas.

Stotzer Award

Carl B. Bertrand Jr. is an engineering specialist in the Materials and Pavements Section of the Construction Division. He has a reputation for drive, dedication and inventiveness. He has a history of collaboration and involvement, serving on a

multitude of committees to ensure achievement of technical standards and longevity for system infrastructure.

Among his peers, he is recognized as expert in the use of lasers and computers used to collect data "where the rubber meets the road." The result is enhanced reliability of highways. His expertise has led to several ways to save TxDOT and the state's taxpayers millions of dollars each year. He would be first to say that saving \$200,000 here, and \$219,000 there, and more than \$1.6 million over there adds up to real money.

Employees around the state know him as their best source of information when they have a technical question dealing with collecting data about pavement. Using laser and digital technology, he designed an automated pavement-measurement vehicle that replaced subjective ratings with repeatable, objective measurements. Based on information he provided, the Federal Communications Commission granted TxDOT a waiver to continue the use of ground-penetrating radar, a practice halted in the wake of the Sept. 11 terror attacks. Holding a degree in industrial technology from Southwest Texas State University, he started as an engineering specialist. \odot

Greats in Texas transportation are names behind top awards

The Texas Transportation Institute presents five awards during the annual Transportation Short Course at Texas A&M University:

■ Dewitt C. Greer

The Greer Award recognizes and encourages the skill, dedication, civic-mindedness, innovation, and performance excellence of TxDOT engineers. It is named for one of the legends of the department, a man whose career spanned from 1927 to 1981.

■ Gibb Gilchrist

The Gilchrist Award honors the performance of an outstanding TxDOT engineer and is named for the man who served two terms as state highway engineer in the 1920s and 1930s. He left the department to become dean of engineering at Texas A&M and later served as president of the university. In 1944, he became the first chancellor of the Texas A&M System.

■ Luther DeBerry

The DeBerry Award is presented for outstanding contributions to the state of Texas in the field of transportation. It is named for the man who served as the department's state highway engineer from 1973 to 1980.

■ Russell H. Perry

The Perry Award recognizes leadership in creating public awareness of the need for adequate transportation facilities in the state. It is named for the Dallas attorney, businessman and philanthropist.

■ Raymond E. Stotzer Jr.

The Stotzer Award is presented to a non-engineer who displays outstanding leadership, dedication and service to the department. It is named for the man who served as TxDOT's engineer-director from 1986 to 1989.

TxDOT's heroes go 'Extra Mile'

ABILENE DISTRICT

■ Rescued two-year-old boy missing from home for hours and safely found on wild ranch land in Shackelford County, Jan. 13, 2004.

Anyone who has raised a child knows the second year of life is not called the "Terrible Twos" for nothing. Two-year-olds, new to life and to walking, like to strike out on their own, usually to the dismay of their parents. But sometimes, a child's instinctive quest to explore his or her world can turn tragic, especially when a youngster wanders off in rugged country.

When Shackelford County maintenance supervisor Tommy Brown heard on his radio that the sheriff's

office needed help in searching for a lost child, he dispatched maintenance technicians Jesse Camacho and Ray Ramos to a staging area set up on the 64,000-acre Nail Ranch.

The two TxDOT workers learned that little J.W. Eppler had disappeared from the family's ranch house several hours before. In one direction from the ranch house was a deep stock tank. In the other direction lay a rugged canyon. Soon, both maintenance workers set out on foot to join other searchers. An hour later, the two men were just about to head back to the ranch house. They had not found any tracks, items of clothing, nor any other sign of the missing toddler. Then, walking along a brush-filled draw that fed into a creek, the two TxDOT men heard noises coming from a clump of brush. Moving in to investigate, they saw a couple of kittens. Then they saw a

flash of blond hair. Under a canopy of mesquite, invisible to the airplane circling above, J.W. sat happily playing in the dirt. Camacho ran to scoop up the boy while Ramos waved his hat to signal the airplane. J.W. had a few thorns in his clothes, but otherwise proved no worse for wear. Camacho and Ramos, on the other hand, each got a pretty good walk in that afternoon. They not only went the Extra Mile, they went several miles.

BRYAN DISTRICT

Walter Luckett

■ Saved the life of a co-worker who had fallen into a collapsing hole on the embankment along FM 39 in Leon County on May 13, 2004.



When Bryan District maintenance tech Walter Luckett and crew chief Chad Clossin got out of their state truck on FM 39 in Anderson County, they had a problem to solve. They soon faced another problem, one entirely unexpected. It had rained hard the day before, and the rain had been

continuing off and on that morning of May 13. A corrugated metal pipe used to extend an old concrete arch bridge on the farm-to-market road had collapsed, causing water to back up against the bridge. That was the first problem. Worried that the ponding would send water into some mobile homes in the area, Luckett and Clossin hoped to do something to prevent the mobile homes from flooding. Unknown to these two maintenance workers, the situation had become even more serious. Surging storm runoff had undermined the roadway near the bridge.

As the two men walked toward the bridge, Clossin fell through a soft spot in the pavement caused by the rapidly eroding base. With the hole continuing to widen, Clossin began sinking as if he had stepped into quicksand. In a matter of seconds, only Clossin's head, chest and arms remained free as the water-saturated road base continued to give way. Thinking quickly and without regard for his safety, Luckett grabbed his boss's arm and managed to pull him back onto the pavement. Then, as both men looked on, the 35-foot embankment collapsed. The incident left Clossin with a hurting back, but a medical exam revealed no serious injury. Had Luckett not pulled him out when he did, Clossin could have been buried under an avalanche of fill material.

DALLAS DISTRICT

Sandra R. Williams

■ Aided a disabled driver involved in a collision in Dallas along Interstate 30 and alerted emergency responders on Sept. 10, 2003.






For many commuters, the daily drive to work is a routine, if sometimes frustrating, part of life. But not always. Dallas District legal assistant Sandra R. Williams was on her way to her office when she saw a vehicle moving erratically through rush hour traffic on I-30. It seemed way too early for a drunk driver to be out, but something was clearly wrong.

As she continued to watch, the vehicle left the roadway, ran over several signs, crashed into a larger, lighted sign and spun around. Williams immediately pulled onto the shoulder and ran to the smoking vehicle, afraid it might burst into flames any second. She saw that the driver had suffered an epileptic seizure. Disoriented, the man was trying to get his car started. When he couldn't do that, he tried to leave the vehicle. Williams succeeded in calming him and preventing him from staggering out in traffic. She ran back to her vehicle, used her cell phone to call 911, and then went back to continue comforting the man until help arrived.

DALLAS DISTRICT

Checking a job on I-35 East, nine miles south of Waxahachie in Ellis County, the two came close to dying when an auto-transport truck accidentally entered a closed lane in the work zone and barreled straight toward them. Both men jumped over a guardrail to avoid being struck by the fastmoving 18-wheeler. Neither TxDOT employee suffered injuries, but others at the job site were not so fortunate. Four contract workers were hurt, two seriously. Gipson and Songer immediately made sure help was on the way, and then began helping the injured workers. Using first-aid kits retrieved from the TxDOT vehicles, the two inspectors teamed up with a nurse who had stopped and volunteered her services to help the two men injured most seriously. After paramedics arrived, Gipson and Songer helped control traffic.

Later in the day, as if they had not already done enough, these two pitched in and assisted the contract workers in completing the day's task so the lanes could be reopened on schedule.

EL PASO DISTRICT

■ Rescued a mother and child from a vehicle washed off RM 170 in Presidio County during a flood on July 28, 2004.

Ranch Road 170, which hugs the Rio Grande from Candelaria to Lajitas out in Big Bend country, is one of the prettiest stretches of pavement in Texas. But for a New Mexico woman and her daughter, the drive turned into a nightmare.

About midnight on July 27, Angel Trillo drove down 170 in her pickup with her daughter Akalia. It had been raining that night, but Trillo gave that little thought. She and her daughters were on their way to visit relatives in Mexico.

About seven miles from Presidio, Trillo came to a creek crossing. Her headlights showed an inch or two of water running over the road, but she did not think it would be any trouble to drive through. "I looked at my daughter to ask her something," Trillo later recalled, "and I could see a huge wall of water like you see in the movies. I punched the gas as hard as I could but the water caught our back end and spun us."

A flash-flood crest carried the pickup 50 feet downstream, lodging it in a sandbar. Surrounded by swirling water, mother and daughter wisely stayed in the vehicle.

Desperately trying to get help, Trillo honked her horn until her vehicle's battery died. Then she and her daughter began praying.

When the cab of the truck began filling with water, she opened the pickup's doors, hoping that would keep the vehicle stable. The truck stayed put, but the water continued to rise. Eventually, the woman and her daughter had to crawl out of the cab and stand in the bed of the pickup. At 4:30 a.m., a passerby saw the truck in the water. The Border Patrol and Presidio County sheriff's deputies soon arrived, but the water ran too fast and deep for officers to reach the stranded woman and her terrified daughter. Until a helicopter could reach the scene, the best the officers could do was position agents downstream to make a last-ditch effort to get to the pair if the floodwaters swept them away from their truck.

By now, her legs braced against the submerged pickup's cab, Trillo stood holding her daughter. Their heads were barely above water. That's when Raul Melendez got involved. A TxDOT worker who is a volunteer firefighter and Presidio city council member, he did not think the floodwater was strong enough to move a big bulldozer. With help from Hector R. Granado and Mario A. Pando, Melendez got the heavy equipment trucked in from a nearby maintenance project. Soon, Rolando Hernandez, Auden Natividad and Eduardo Martin went out into the water on the bulldozer. The three men managed to get mother and daughter safely aboard and carried them to safety. The rescued pair were cold and wet, but uninjured.

EL PASO DISTRICT

Art Gutierrez

■ Pulled a motorist from a burning vehicle and cared for the stranger in need along Interstate 10 in Hudspeth County on July 6, 2004.



The young man from Mesa, Ariz., must have been having a bad day. But if it hadn't been for El Paso District lab inspector Art Gutierrez, it might have been the man's last day, bad or good. On his way from El Paso to Sierra Blanca for a

meeting, at mile marker 68 on I-10 Gutierrez saw dust coming up off the right shoulder. On the other side of the dust, Gutierrez could see a rental truck had crashed into the brush off the side of the roadway. The TxDOT employee stopped to see what had happened.

Approaching the vehicle, he saw a young man sitting in the truck, still holding the steering wheel. That seemed strange, because the man did not look injured.

Then Gutierrez saw smoke and realized the vehicle had caught fire.

Gutierrez yelled for the man to get out of the truck, but he did not respond. Running around to the passenger side, he jerked the door open and said, "Get out of there or you'll burn." At that, the man said, "Oh, just leave me alone."

"Do you want to die out here?" Gutierrez asked. Yes, the man said, he wanted to die.

But Gutierrez didn't think that was his choice to make. Seeing a wad of money stuck between the seats of the truck and empty beer cans scattered on the floor, Gutierrez had an idea. "Hey, get your money and I'll give you a ride to the store so you can buy more beer."

"Sure," the man replied, "let's get out of here." He grabbed the money and a carton of cigarettes and followed Gutierrez to his state truck.

Just as Gutierrez was about to leave, a concrete truck pulled up. Gutierrez asked the driver to call for help and told him he was taking the driver of the now-blazing rental truck to Fort Hancock, about three miles away.

Gutierrez tried to talk to the young man, but about all he would say was that he was from Mesa, Ariz., and headed "east." Dropping the man off at a motel and suggesting that he get some rest, Gutierrez returned to the scene where he briefed a sheriff's deputy and a DPS trooper.

The trooper went to Fort Hancock to question the man about all the money and the beer.

The young man who had been driving the rented vehicle may have ended up with some legal issues to resolve, but in going the extra mile, Gutierrez gave him a chance for a fresh start on life.



HOUSTON DISTRICT

Charles W. Neuman

■ Pulled an injured driver from an overturned tandem-trailer truck that crashed on FM 363 in Waller County on Aug. 27, 2004

As a Houston District maintenance worker since 1993, Charles W. Neuman has seen his share of roadway crashes, but nothing like what he witnessed on Aug. 27. Driving his state vehicle on FM 362 in Waller County, Neuman saw a tandem trailer truck about 300 yards in front of him. The driver of the truck signaled a left turn. Seconds later, Neuman saw dust fly as the massive truck became airborne. In what seemed like slow motion, the truck twisted in mid-air and began breaking apart. Neuman drove up to the crash as the dust continued to settle, fully expecting to find the driver dead. To his astonishment, the man not only was still alive, but not even seriously injured. However, the driver was pinned in the wreckage. Using his pocketknife, Neuman cut a tangle of wiring from around the man and pulled him from the cab of the truck. "This was one lucky dude," Neuman said of the driver, who suffered a broken leg.

HOUSTON DISTRICT

Gary W. Skolaut

■ Pulled a trapped motorist from a vehicle overturned into a ditch of rising water during a rainy downpour along Interstate 45 in Montgomery County on May 13, 2004.



Gary Skolaut, by his own account, happened to be in the right place at the right time — but TxDOT only accidentally found out about it. Kathy Baker, area engineer in Conroe, sat checking her e-mail one day last spring when she heard several maintenance workers talking outside her office. Nothing's out of the ordinary about

TxDOT employees visiting with each other when they pass in the hall, but this conversation soon got Baker's undivided attention. Houston District maintenance technician Gary W. Skolaut, a TxDOT

employee since 1993, was saying something about an upside-down SUV in rising floodwater with a woman trapped inside. Having heard enough to pique her interest, Baker got up from her desk to learn more. But that wasn't easy. "I had to drag the details out," Baker recalls.

Skolaut said something about an upside-down SUV with a woman trapped inside.

Skolaut didn't think he had done anything extraordinary. "He's not boastful," Baker said. "He's just a hard worker." This is the story Baker and others finally put together:

As periodically happens in Southeast Texas, the skies opened up over Montgomery County on May 13. Before the deluge ended, 17 inches of rain had fallen. When it rains that hard, maintenance workers routinely hit the roadways to start checking for ponding. Skolaut and all other available maintenance personnel headed out into the storm.

Finding an area where water had begun to build up, Skolaut parked his TxDOT vehicle on the side of I-45 North and turned on his overhead lights to slow traffic.

About 2 p.m., as he sat in his truck watching traffic, he saw a silver SUV skid out of control and crash into the concrete barrier separating the north and southbound lanes of the interstate.

The vehicle rolled on impact, landing upside down in the water-filled median. Skolaut jumped from his truck and ran to the SUV. He could see the driver hanging from her safety belt, her head barely above the water.

If the water rose any higher, Skolaut realized, the woman could drown. Acting quickly, he smashed out the back window of the SUV and crawled inside. He slashed the woman's safety belt and pulled her from the vehicle to safety.

SAN ANGELO DISTRICT

Frank Munsinger

Rescued a mother and child from a vehicle washed into the Frio river in Real County during a flood on April 6, 2004.

When heavy rain began falling in Real County last April 5, San Angelo District maintenance mechanic Frank Munsinger and his colleagues went to work closing roads and low-water crossings in anticipation of the high water they knew would come. About 4 a.m. on April 6, watching a crossing on the west fork of the Frio River, Munsinger saw a van bypass a barricade and enter the crossing. Seeing that the rising water had already reached the twofoot mark on the crossing's flood gauge, Munsinger flipped the switch on his truck's flashing lights to warn the driver. Seeing the lights, the driver of the van began backing up, but by then it was too late. The vehicle began floating in the fast-moving water.

Without regard to his safety, Munsinger drove his truck into the water in an attempt to get to the van before it swept downstream. Reaching the still-buoyant van, Munsinger got out of the state truck, and climbed up on the vehicle's fuel tank as the water continued to rise. From there, he succeeded in pulling Shawna Romo and her 13-year-old daughter from their bobbing van and getting them inside the cab of his truck. Just as the front of his truck started to float, Munsinger backed out of the water. Two days later, the woman's van was found well down stream, still partly under water.

Munsinger is the department's second two-time winner of the Extra Mile Award, having received the recognition the first time in 1998 for a similar incident.

SAN ANTONIO DISTRICT

David Lozano

Rescued an unconscious motorist and attended to traffic safety on Interstate 10 in San Antonio on July 23, 2004.



Thirty-year TxDOT maintenance tech David Lozano was on his way to the San Antonio district office to pick up mail on July 23 when he noticed the woman driving ahead of him on I-10 waving frantically to get his attention.

Once she realized he had seen her, she began pointing to the vehicle in front of her. Lozano sped up to get a better view, seeing that the vehicle was swerving from lane to lane. Clearly, something was wrong.

Realizing he had to do something to prevent a high-speed accident on a busy freeway, he managed to pass the errant vehicle and get in front of it. Then he slowed down until his rear bumper practically touched the front of the vehicle. Carefully, he rode his brakes, slowing and finally stopping the car behind him.

Lozano got out of his car and ran to the driver's side. The woman behind the wheel did not respond when he asked her what was wrong. Still getting no reply, he hurried back to his truck and radioed his office to call 911.

When EMS arrived, paramedics determined that the woman had suffered a diabetic reaction and passed out behind the wheel.

In stopping the car, Lozano likely prevented a serious traffic crash and possibly saved the woman's life. While emergency personnel treated the driver, Lozano began directing traffic around the two vehicles.

Project awards laud TxDOT

TxDOT recognized department projects whose participants demonstrated exceptional cooperation in completing a complex task. Project awards, presented at an Austin luncheon sponsored by Associated General Contractors in September, singled out those who have excelled in project construction and design.

Design Awards recognize those key people who have designed a major project with only minor construction problems.

Construction Awards single out those who have gone "above and beyond" in terms of cooperation and partnership to do a quality job.

DESIGN AWARDS

BRYAN DISTRICT

On Dec. 12, 2003, the district saw completion of a \$4.7 million project — the Highway Star Bridge — to reconstruct an interchange overpass in the middle of downtown Huntsville. The new bridge spans a four-lane, divided interstate highway. Gridlock at the old bridge was common. Nowadays, the project at the city's busiest intersection is known locally for its beauty, for reducing traffic congestion, and for re-connecting a divided community. TxDOT's Paul Warden, design project coordinator, and Maurice Jacob, landscape architect, each had roles bringing the project to completion.

SAN ANGELO DISTRICT

This project called for repair to a flood-damaged low-water crossing on FM 1120 in Real County. It presented more than a few design challenges, although on a scale smaller than seen on many TxDOT projects. While the scale was small at \$1.3 million, successful completion of the project was very important to nearby businesses and residents along the Frio River. Income from vacationers who come to enjoy the river is vital to the county's economy. Through effective design, fewer trees than normal were removed and seven cypress trees at the site were saved. Soon after the crossing was completed, the area experienced heavy rains; then came a flood. However, the new crossing held. The sod remained in place, no soil eroded in the construction area, and sediment was properly filtered. Darren Crenwelge, assistant area engineer for TxDOT, oversaw this project.

CONSTRUCTION AWARDS

AMARILLO DISTRICT

Work began in July 2001 to upgrade the concrete roadway along 12.6 miles of Interstate 40 in Carson County. The \$16 million project saw several change orders, some owing to special conditions created by winter weather and heavy loads carried by truck traffic. Even so, work was completed five months ahead of schedule. Further, the project used recycled materials in many ways. Chief among them was old concrete that was crushed and used for 30 percent of the coarse aggregate. Recycled asphalt pavement from the overlay was used in the bondbreaker. TxDOT representative: Gerald Britten.

ATLANTA DISTRICT

This is a \$54 million project in Bowie County to construct a South Loop around Texarkana. The work began in October 1999 and encountered problems from the start. But the problems didn't stay problems for long. That's because of the willingness of the contractor and TxDOT to fix problems when and where they found them. There were at least 60 change orders on this project. Were it not for the diligence and hard work of everyone involved, the number and costs of these change orders would have been much greater. TxDOT representative:

Jere Williams.

AUSTIN DISTRICT

Work on the \$57 million project for three miles of freeway on U.S. 183 in Williamson County began in November 1999. Much of the work was performed at night. Nearly one million cubic yards of embankment were hauled and placed at night. This minimized interference with day traffic on this main commuter route on the northwest side of Austin. Because this route needs to be ready for the future State Highway 45 project, nearly \$7 million worth of changes and inclusions were added to the project. These changes were designed to yield even greater savings in the future. TxDOT representative: Michael Miller.

BRYAN DISTRICT

Widening U.S. 79 in Milam County presented many challenges. Several obstacles included utility interferences for this \$9.5 million project. But these were handled with diligence and care, and with great teamwork. More urgent, though, were the two 200-year storms that hit the city of Rockdale in two days over May 6-7, 2001. The first storm dropped

four inches of rain in 30 minutes and flooded businesses and homes near the project. Because of their quick thinking overnight, and swift action the next day, the contractor and TxDOT saw to it that businesses and homes were not flooded a second time. TxDOT representative: Connie Flickinger.

EL PASO DISTRICT

Success in construction projects is founded on communication, communication, communication. The contractor and TxDOT did a lot of communicating with all stakeholders affected by the \$13.7 million project. The first step was to demolish the existing Cotton Street Bridge in El Paso, then replace it by building a new bridge. At the center of the new bridge, a new "bridge on-ramp" was built to provide access to Interstate 10, improving the flow of traffic. The bridge was in service five months ahead of schedule in January 2003. TxDOT representative: Daniel Avila, P.E.

ODESSA DISTRICT

Folks in Odessa still talk about the newly built roadway that was almost washed away in the summer of 2003. It happened on a street said to carry more daily traffic than any stretch of roadway in the Permian Basin. Back then two of the city's 50-year-old water mains burst right from under the final two miles of an eight-mile project on State Highway 191 through Odessa. Scrambling to make the required repairs, and working together and with the community to overcome this final obstacle, the contractor and TxDOT still brought this \$3.3 million project to completion 10 days ahead of schedule. TxDOT representative: Agustin Aguirre.

PHARR DISTRICT

Sept. 15, 2001, was a day of disaster in Texas just four days after the terror attacks of 9/11. No terrorist caused the collapse of the Queen Isabella Causeway on that day. It was a four-barge towboat, veering off course, which did the damage. The span, now called the Queen Isabella Memorial Bridge, was quickly rebuilt to the relief of everyone with a stake in the local economy near the bridge. The project is a \$5.9 million effort to protect the new bridge from any future collisions.

Work crews fought shifting tides and currents, amid continual vehicle traffic on the very busy bridge and below it on the Intracoastal Waterway. Their job: install a much-needed pier-protection system of concrete barriers called "dolphins" on either side of the bridge's supports. These "dolphins" keep vessels from again ramming the supports. TxDOT representative: **Agustin Ramirez**.

SAN ANTONIO DISTRICT

When things go right on a construction project, big savings and high value result. This \$10.9 million project in southwest San Antonio widened nearly three miles of Pearsall Road (FM 2536) from a two-lane undivided road (with shoulders) to a four-lane divided urban roadway with medians and bike lanes.

Project supervisors faced the usual mix of challenges and they eliminated or minimized them before they had a chance to cause any possible conflicts or delays. This project, starting in July 2001, was completed 10 months ahead of schedule in October 2003.

Time saved is value delivered to everyone who uses the roadway today. TxDOT representative: Rolando Escamilla.

SAN ANTONIO DISTRICT

To achieve completion in February 2004, this project took about 42 months, almost \$19 million, and expertise in highway construction of the highest order. It involved a 1.4-mile segment of Interstate 410 in northwest San Antonio where the average daily traffic count was 225,000 — that's 2.6 cars every second, and it's more today. Workers removed and replaced the Babcock Road overpass, widened the Callaghan Road Bridge, and reconstructed 1.1 miles of roadway, all while dealing with split grades of nearly three feet between eastbound and westbound lanes, and while handling the complexities of traffic control where exit ramps and entrance ramps were proximate. TxDOT representative: Annie Dadien-Williams.

WICHITA FALLS DISTRICT

Several ways exist to measure success in highway construction or rehabilitation. One measure is the level of satisfaction expressed by the people who use the roads. Another measure is the International Roughness Index. It's a key number used to describe the quality of ride that users experience. The lower the number, the smoother the ride. The people who use this project's 13.4 miles of U.S. 287 feel the \$3.3 million was an "overwhelming success." One section measured for roughness of ride was rated 150. After rehab, the number had dropped to 40 which qualified the project for a bonus. On this project, the contractor and TxDOT faced several adjustments but showed it's possible to improve ride quality through building a quality road. TxDOT representative: Michael Clements.

AASHTO honors TxDOT

The American Association of State Highway and Transportation Organizations (AASHTO) honored TxDOT with several awards over the summer:

■ President's Award

Aviation category: for the Routine Airport Maintenance Program (RAMP) that leverages state money with grant money for improvements to eligible general aviation airports in Texas. The program began in 1996; communities benefit economically and it supports the statewide system of airports in Texas.

Traffic Safety category: for the Traffic Safety Section's "Don't Drink and Drive" campaign, an effort to reduce teenage drinking and driving crashes by increasing public awareness. The campaign, which includes TV and radio spots, posters, and a Web site, tells the story of Jacqui Saburido who was burned beyond recognition in an alcohol-related crash. The team expanded the project to include an educational package for high school junior and seniors across the country.

Research category: for TxDOT's Ride Team which improved the way ride quality in Texas is measured. The team was involved in the research and development of pavement ride-quality standards at both the state and national level, and helped design the Ride Certification Center at the Texas Transportation Institute, which uses a test track to evaluate and certify road-profiling equipment and operators in the department.

Water category: for the Port Aransas ferry system connecting Mustang Island and the city of Port Aransas with the mainland; it provides transportation service seven days a week, 24 hours a day. The system experienced delays and required extensive maintenance. TxDOT joined with the Texas Department of Public Safety, the city, and the U.S. Coast Guard to improve the ferry service through better maintenance, a park-and-ride initiative, and improved crew training. Also, the wait time for the ferry has decreased by 50 percent, and it is safer too, with accident claims down 99 percent.

■ AASHTO's Standing Committee on Quality recognized outstanding team efforts in state and federal transportation organizations. All teams applying for recognition receive feedback to assist them in improving their performance in future years. Recognitions: **Exemplary Partner Award** to the Odessa District Designer Core Group, **Pathfinder Award** to TxDOT's Facilities Management Section, Trailblazer Award to TxDOT's Video Network Project Team, and Honorable Mention to TxDOT's Question/Answer Database Process

■ TxDOT and Robert Hollingsworth, of the Amarillo District maintenance office, received the Francis B. Francois Award for Innovation for development of the motor grader lay-down blade and skid box to aid roadway maintenance.

Road deaths decline

Improvement Team.

Fewer people died in Texas traffic crashes in 2003, the latest year for which records are available. The U.S. Department of Transportation (USDOT) said Texas reported 3,675 persons killed in motor-vehicle traffi crashes, second only to California with 4,215 fatalities last. California, Texas and Florida had the most

highway fatalities. Of the three, only Texas showed a decline — 3.9 percent.

Compared to figures from 2002, Texas saw 148 fewer highway fatalities, the largest decrease among all states.

Nationwide, 42,643 people died, and 2.89 million were injured in highway crashes during 2003.

Texas sets building pace

Transportation commissioners in August awarded contracts totaling \$650 million for 125 projects, bringing the fiscal year 2004 total to \$4 billion in transportation construction contracts. That's more than any other state. Texas invested almost a billion more in transportation projects than California and \$2.9 billion more than New York for fiscal year 2004. This construction pace was made possible with new financing tools the legislature gave TxDOT and that voters approved in constitutional amendments in 2001 and 2003.

Plans spur mobility gains

Construction of 88 percent of the mobility projects planned for the next 12 years in the state's eight largest metropolitan areas can begin in half the time, based on plans submitted by local officials to TxDOT. Requested by Gov. Rick Perry in March 2003, the Texas Metropolitan Mobility Plan summarizes how each of the state's metropolitan areas intends to take advantage of innovative financing tools provided by the legislature. Putting the plan into action accelerates mobility improvements and adds \$12 billion to the anticipated \$68 billion in funding available for the next 25 years to reduce congestion of urban traffic.

Commission boosts aid to colonias

Colonia residents near the Texas-Mexico border will continue to see roadway improvements come their way with the approval in late December by the Texas Transportation Commission for projects in the region.

The commission approved \$50 million to fund projects that will improve roadways in these areas.

The action follows Gov. Rick Perry's request in July to the Texas Public

Finance Authority to issue bonds that will fund the construction projects. TxDOT began accepting project proposals immediately after that. "We will continue to fulfill our role in helping to improve transportation for those living in areas where better roadways are desperately needed," said Jim Randall, TxDOT's director of transportation planning and programming.

Unpaved and deteriorated roads in many of the state's colonias cause transportation and drainage problems. In 2001, Texas voters approved a \$175 million bond package to support the road improvement program.

The Texas Transportation Commission approved the first \$50 million round of projects in 2002. To date, 274 projects have been funded in 21 counties.

Accomplishments multiply in 2004

A review of activities and outcomes occurring in 2004 shows that TxDOT accomplished much for the state and its people. Here's a brief survey, taken from the department's annual summary, of some of TxDOT's high points in the past year:

SAFETY — By identifying the most crucial needs statewide, TxDOT began a \$600 million program set up through State Highway Fund revenue bonds to improve safety on Texas roadways.

CONSTRUCTION — Let a record \$4.1 billion in highway construction contracts for the second consecutive year, adding congestion-reducing capacity and improving safety to the state's transportation system.

MAINTENANCE — Resurfaced 13 percent of the more than 79,000-mile state highway system, investing in improvements to lengthen the life of Texas roads.

FUNDING — Approved \$9 billion in funds over the next four years to preserve the state's existing transportation system and \$21.5 billion to improve mobility statewide.

AUTHORITIES — Bringing to five the number of areas in Texas empowered to determine their own transportation priorities through regional mobility authorities (RMAs), the commission approved three RMAs in Gregg/Smith counties, Grayson and Cameron counties.

NEW TOOLS — Authorized negotiations for the state's first three pass-through toll agreements, which give communities tools to accelerate projects, with Montgomery and Grayson counties and the city of Weatherford.

CITIZENS — Continued to solicit the public's views on the Trans-Texas Corridor in all 254 Texas counties, assuring citizen input on the location of this multi-modal transportation corridor.

INPUT — Began environmental studies on the I-69 and TTC-35 elements of the Trans-Texas Corridor and held 70 public meetings to get citizen input.

CONSORTIUM — Selected the consortium (Cintra-Zachry) that will plan, design, build and operate the Oklahoma-Mexico element of the Trans-Texas Corridor.

SH 45 — Authorized the state's second comprehensive development agreement for SH 45SE in Travis County

EFFICIENCY — Assumed the duties of the Medical Transportation Program from the Department of Health and Human Services, to reduce overlapping service, cut costs, increase efficient service to 130,000 clients.

LANDOWNERS — Began new right-of-way program that pays willing landowners to delay development of any of their land that is identified as a possible future road route, saving time and taxpayer money.

PURCHASE — Purchased the department's first toll road, the Camino Columbia in Laredo, providing a critical link to the only international bridge to the Mexican state of Nuevo Leon.

STICKERS — Made vehicle registration stickers available for distribution at the point of sale, reducing the risk of sticker fraud, theft.

CONVENIENCE — Installed wireless Internet (WiFi) among seven safety-rest areas and travel-info centers for the traveling public, with plans to offer WiFi at all 102 sites in 2005.

COMMISSION — Welcomed two new members to the transportation commission as the result of legislation increasing the commission from three to five members.


