- 19 <u>academic_teaching institution is required to report to the board</u>
- 20 under another provision of law, including board rule.
- 21 (f) Each general academic teaching institution shall
- 22 provide to the board the information to be provided under
- 23 Subsection (c) not later than October 1, or a date determined by the
- 24 board, of each year. The board shall update the comparison tool as
- 25 soon as practicable after receiving information from each
- 26 <u>institution</u>.
- 27 SECTION 10. Section 51.9745, Education Code, as added by

- 2 SECTION 11. The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board
