Recorded Texas Historic Landmark markers definition: Recorded Texas Historic Landmark (RTHL) markers are awarded to structures deemed worthy of preservation for their historical associations and architectural significance. RTHL is a legal designation and comes with a measure of protection; it is the highest honor the state can bestow on a historic structure, and the designation is required for this type of marker. The RTHL designation becomes effective upon approval by the THC. Official Texas Historical Markers signify the RTHL designation, which comes only through application to and approval by the THC and must include public display of an Official Texas Historical Marker. Owners of RTHL-designated structures must give the THC 60 days written notice before any alterations are made to the exterior of the structure. RTHL status is a permanent designation and is not to be removed from the property in the event of a transfer of ownership. Only the THC can remove the designation or recall the marker. The marker must remain with the structure and may not be removed or displayed elsewhere until or unless the THC gives express approval in writing for such action. Once designated as RTHL, properties are subject to provisions of Texas Government Code, Section 442.006(f).

Criteria:

- 1. **Age:** Structures eligible for the RTHL designation and marker must be at least 50 years old.
- 2. **Historical significance:** Architectural significance alone is not enough to qualify a structure for the RTHL designation. It must have an equally significant historical association, and that association can come from an event that occurred at the site; through individuals who owned or lived on the property; or, in the case of bridges, industrial plants, schoolhouses and other non-residential properties, through documented significance to the larger community.
- 3. **Architectural significance:** Structures deemed architecturally significant are outstanding examples of architectural history through design, materials, structural type or construction methods. In all cases, eligible architectural properties must display integrity; that is, the structure should be in a good state of repair, maintain its appearance from its period of significance and be considered an exemplary model of preservation. Architectural significance is often best determined by the relevance of the property to broader contexts, including geography. Any changes over the years should be compatible with original design and reflect compliance with accepted preservation practices, e.g., the *Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Rehabilitation*.
- 4. **Good state of repair:** Structures not considered by the THC to be in a good state of repair are ineligible for RTHL designation. The THC reserves the sole right to make that determination relative to eligibility for RTHL markers.

Special National Register considerations for RTHL marker applications: If a structure has been individually listed in the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) under either Criterion A or B **and** Criterion C (Architecture), the historical text compiled as part of the National Register nomination process may be submitted as part of the marker process, provided it includes the required reference notes and other documentation. - Upon notification of the successful preliminary review of required elements by the THC, a non-refundable application fee of \$100 is required. The fee shall be submitted to the THC within ten working days of application receipt notification.

CONTEXT

Post World War II Rockport was a busy place with returning veterans and local businesses picking up day to day activities. The waterfront took on a new look with bulkhead added to the Rockport harbor and a Fulton harbor breakwater by Aransas County and Aransas County Navigation District. The seafood industry, primarily shrimping, was growing as was tourism. The Sea-Gun resort was added to the list of tourist facilities and the era of "Winter Texans" and retirement living began. (Allen, 337) The boat building trade also picked up when the Rockport Yacht and Supply Company (RYSCO) thrived in the 1960 with steel-hulled boats. (Shukalo, Alice)

In this environment, the need to develop a civic group "to sponsor and promote worthy Charitable, Literary and Educational undertakings and projects in Aransas County" was recognized.

(Charter for the Woman's Club) The charter further states "particularly to solicit gifts, contributions and donations for a Community Building." (Charter)

With this mandate, the women of Aransas County began to organize - first, the club; then the building.

OVERVIEW

In March of 1948, Mrs. Fred B. Hunt issued a call to organize the Woman's Civic Club with its first meeting in the Fireman's Hall. The first officers were Mrs. Fred B. Hunt, president; Mrs. C.C. Fowler, first vice-president; Mrs. Roy Rogero, second vice president; Mrs. Bryan Baker, secretary; Mrs. Charles A. Roe, treasurer; and Mrs. Fred Booth, parliamentarian. The Club met once a month at various locations. A frequent topic on the agenda was finding a permanent home for the club. The women began a series of fund-raising events to finance a building. First was a cake auction; next a barbecue; followed by a fish fry, turkey shoot, and antique show. ("Aransas County Woman's Club," *The Rockport Pilot*, Centennial Edition, March 27, 1969, page 2)

In 1949 the name of the club was changed to the Woman's Club of Aransas County, a board of directors was elected and the club incorporated and obtained a charter. (Charter)

Late in 1948 the Recreation Building for Humble Oil Company employees at Ingleside was going to be put on auction. Mr. Emory Spencer offered to underwrite the price. Mrs. Hunt and Mrs. Fowler were delegated to submit a bid. They were the successful bidders. Bill of Sale was recorded for the "brick veneer building approximately 75' x 40' situate on the old refinery site in Ingleside, Texas, and being known as the Community Building. Buyer agrees to remove said building from refinery site not later than May 15, 1949. The actual consideration paid is \$5,000, the original consideration having been \$6,000 and the seller herein having made a donation to the purchaser herein of \$1,000." (Bill of Sale). The building was brought to Rockport by barge in three sections.

An appeal for a final drive for funds itemized the costs associated with the building itself as follows: "the building was purchased for \$5,000, moved to Rockport at a cost of \$3,500 and set up on a foundation costing \$1,500. Another \$2,000 was spent on finishing the inside of the building. To finish the outside of the building in Austin Stone costing \$3,000 ten local businessmen underwrote the sum,

and it is that sum which we are now attempting to raise. In other words we owe \$3,000 on an overall project that has cost us \$16,000 and which has been appraised at \$60,000." (Undated letter in files at ACHS)

In the early fifties the club's indebtedness was paid off and the women turned their time and attention to cultural pursuits. The first yearbook was presented to the membership in 1951-52. (Aransas County Woman's Club yearbooks, on file in ACHS files) At each meeting a program was presented featuring speakers, musical programs and book reviews. ("Aransas County Woman's Club," *The Rockport Pilot*, Centennial Edition, March 27, 1969, page 2) Past presidents of the Club are noted in the current yearbooks and articles. ("Aransas County Woman's Club Celebrating Anniversary, " *The Rockport Pilot*, July 13, 1978, p.B 4)

SIGNIFICANCE

The Woman's Club of Aransas County sponsors numerous worthwhile projects that positively impacted the county. In addition to outreach by the Club through good works, the building serves as a community center.

The Club sponsored the Girl Scouts on a local and district level. The Cub Scout pack meetings and banquet were held at the Club for several years as well as Parent-Teacher Association receptions honoring the school faculty. It was the meeting place of the "kick-off" drives for charities such as the March of Dimes, the Blood Bank and the Cancer Drive. The Chamber of Commerce held its annual banquet in the building and art shows were also hosted. Teen-age dances and winter games parties for tourists were also held there.

One of the most significant projects of the Woman's Club was to establish an official county library. In the mid-1930s, Judy Sorenson Collier had started a private library in the building next to the

Sorenson Chandlery. Local children "rented" Big Little Books for a few cents a day. (Allen, 375)

According to Gibson, early in 1956, it was brought to the attention of the Woman's Club of Aransas

County by Mrs. Everal L. West that Aransas was one of the few counties having no public library. The

Bracht's offered a room in their store building in Fulton as a temporary location. Apple crates were set

up to serve as bookshelves. The citizens of the community donated two thousand books. The library

was open to the public and at the end of the year sixty-four borrower cards had been issued. In January

of 1957 the County Commissions Court agreed to provide a small room in the Courthouse. The library

was open for three hours twice a week. By the end of 1957 there were 3,500 books and 451 borrower

cards. In December of 1958, Mrs. C.C. Atchley was hired to be the first paid librarian. During its first

four years, the library was supported by the United Fund and donations, in addition to the county funds.

(Gibson) The library was moved in 1964. The present building was constructed in 1988. The Woman's

Club is justly proud of its part in the creation of the library. Memorial donations to the library continue

to be made to this date.

The Club's service to the community was noted in an article in 1981 as follows: "The Aransas County Woman's Club has built a reputation for community service by offering the use of their club building to any other organization needing the facility. The club conducted its traditional seasonal activities this year as always. During the winter, group members hosted card parties to entertain many of the winter Texans in the area...with proceeds going toward club activities and club charities."

("Woman's Club Serves," *The Rockport Pilot*, Aug. 29, 1981) In 2005 a Men's Auxiliary was formed to include those who wanted to join as well as play cards.

Many worthwhile organizations appreciate the support given them by the Woman's Club of Aransas County. Certificates of appreciation that document those contributions include the Boy Scouts of America (1956), AARP Chapter, the USO (1974 and 1975), Aransas County Medical Services, Inc. (1998) and the National Naval Medical Center for Marines and Sailors.

Since 2000 The Women's Club has donated regularly to three local fire departments (Rockport, Fulton and Lamar), Aim Hospice, A.C.M.S.I., Project Graduation, the Aransas County Public Library and scholarship to college for several Rockport High School graduates.

The Woman's Club has been a landmark in the community from the time it was formed and the building was moved to its present site. This institution deserves to be commemorated by a historical marker for all to view.



HISTORY

The Woman's Club was formed June 15, 1948 for the purpose of educational, literary and charitable work. They had a vision of making the community a better place while having fun. Their goal was: "Friendship, Fellowship, and Service to the Community". The meeting was held in the old firehouse on St. Mary's Street in Rockport.

In the Fall of 1948, the recreational building of the Humble Oil Company at Ingleside, Texas, was bought by Mrs. Fred B. Hunt and Mrs. C.C. Fowler as representatives of the club. Mr. Emory M. Spencer underwrote this purchase. The building was moved by barge in three sections to the present location.

A charter was issued in April 1949 for 50 years and the name became "The Woman's Club of Aransas County". The first yearbook was published in 1951.

The first major endeavor of the club was to form a library. The project was organized by Mrs. Julia West. The Aransas County Library was started in Arthur Bracht's old warehouse in Fulton with apple and orange crates for shelves. Mrs. Joe H. Slocum (Dollie) was president in 1956 when the first project was commenced.

When the club began, most women did not work outside the home and there were many women wanting to be with friends and to make a difference in the community. But times changed and as more women took jobs outside the home, the membership aged. Presently most of the members are retired and many of them worked outside the home when they were younger. But the focus has stayed the same. Another change occurred when Rockport and the county began to emerge as a large retirement community and tourist destination. The membership became close to one hundred women.

Also, at this time, men started to come to the building after seeing the sign and asking to play cards. At first they were met with a little bit of a "chill". This was, after all, a "woman's club". The men continued to come and to help as needed (cooking, cleaning, repairing, and making themselves very useful). They also added a new dimension to the atmosphere. In 2005 they men asked if they could join and be members of the club. It was decided to form a Men's Auxiliary and there are presently fourteen members. So, again, the club has changed and in addition to covered dish and salad luncheons we have barbecues and fish fries.

The largest fund-raisers for the club are the twice weekly card games and the bridge and canasta tournaments. The club is a non-profit organization and at the end of each fiscal year (May) we have donated to local charities including the three volunteer fire departments, Aim Hospice, A.C.M.S.I., Project Graduation, the Aransas County Public Library. In 2006, the club decided that, in addition, we would also give a scholarship each May to a graduate of Rockport-Fulton High School. Last May we were able to award a \$1300 scholarship to two deserving students.

Times have changed and so has the club. We no longer wear hats and gloves to the meetings. We no longer drink our coffee from china cups and eat our snacks on china plates. Dress is more casual and we use Styrofoam cups and paper plates. But we have always tried to stay true to the spirit and vision of the original members and the goal is still:

"Friendship, Fellowship, and Service to the Community."

PAST PRESIDENTS



Aransas County Woman's Club



Mrs. S.F. Jackson recently gave a talk on the history of the Aransas County Women's Club in speaking to members of the Rotary Club. Following is the text of her address:

Realizing the need for a Woman's Club in the community, Mrs. Fred B. Hunt, after contracting a number of women, issued a call to organize such a group, which met at the Fireman's Hall in March of 1948, and the Woman's Civic Club was born.

The following officers were elected: Mrs. Fred B. Hunt, president; Mrs. C.C. Fowler, first vice president; Mrs. Roy Rogero, second vice president; Mrs. Byron Baker, secretary; Mrs. Charles A. Roe, treasurer; and Mrs. Fred Booth, parliamentarian.

The president appointed a committee to draft a constitution and by-laws, composed of Mrs. S.F. Jackson, Mrs. Weldon Cabaniss, and Mrs. Joe Johnson.

The club met once a month, sometimes at the fireman's hall, sometimes at Arthur Bracht's warehouse in Fulton, and at other times at the homes of members. At each meeting a permanent home for

and placing it on a foundation \$1,522.75.

The building was brought to Rockport in three sections and located on a tract of land in the larger triangle to the northwest of the water basin, the tract, measuring 200 by 200 by 168 feet, having been leased from the City of Rockport for a 25 year term at a total rental of \$1.00, this lease was accepted by the Aransas County Navigation District upon whose land the building was located.

During the second year of Mrs. Hunt's administration, the name of the club was changed to the Woman's Club of Aransas County, for the purpose of serving the community from a literary, benevolent, and cultural standpoint.

A Board of Directors was elected, so that the club could obtain a charter and incorporate. Named to this board were Mrs. Hunt, Mrs. Fowler, Mrs. Weldon Cabaniss, Mrs. R.R. Rice, Mrs. Emory Spencer, Mrs. Fred Booth, Mrs. Joe Johnson, Mrs. Fred Christilles, Mrs. James A. Jarboe, Mrs. Arthur Bracht, Mrs. J.H. Mills, and Mrs. C.F. Rozzell. Roberts Rules of Order was named the

and each meeting a program was presented featuring speakers from our own, community and from neighboring towns, alternating with musical programs and book reviews. Each succeeding year the programs have been planned in advance, and the meetings made colorful and interesting in a variety of programs.

Over the years, as worthwhile projects, the club has sponsored the Girl Scouts, both on a local and district level, by means of financial backing and moral support.

Several spectacular meetings at the Woman's Club building, with other Girl Scout Troops and district officers present, climaxed the Girl Scout year.

The Boy Scouts were not neglected, either. For several years they held their monthly Cub Pack Meetings in the building, rent free, as well as their annual Blue and Gold Banquet, the highlight of the Cub Scout year.

For several years the Parent-Teacher Association held receptions honoring the school faculty, through the courtesy of the Woman's Club. It was the meeting place for the "kick-off" for numerous drives

a spirit of unity at this holy season.

Books, magazines and cookies were sent to the patients at the Naval Air Station Hospital in Corpus Christi over a long period.

All during the life of the club, Mrs. Paul Reese had been urging the club to sponsor the establishment of a public library, but until things were on a more substantial basis, the members felt that it was too great an undertaking for a relatively small group of women to handle.

But finally, after becoming more experienced in attacking big projects, a member of the State Library Extension Board was invited to meet with the club members, along with representatives of the City Council, County Commissioner's Court, school officials, and other interested citizens.
