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TEXAS TOASTS

Huzza for Texas! Huzza for Liberty and the rights of man!
-William Barret Travis, 1835

The practice of toasting has been around for many centuries, and is common throughout many cultures. The term "toasting" originated from the Roman practice of putting a piece of burnt toast into the goblet to mellow the flavor of the wine.

FII Drink To That!

In England, a piece of toast was placed in the bottom of a glass and a person would drink until they got to it. Ancient Greeks offered a toast as a gesture of good faith, since their punch was often spiked with poison. Clinking glasses together with a toast was thought by some as a way to drive the evil out of the spirits, making them safe to drink.

Early Texans were serious drinkers, partially due to the fact that little fresh water was available. Drinking etiquette was clearly defined.

According to Francis Sheridan, an Englishman who visited Texas in 1839, new friends were invited to "take a drink," because "it is held indispensable to wet every commission of friendship as soon as it can be conveniently done." It was also considered bad manners for one who was about to partake not to invite all within a reasonable distance to join in. Licensed retailers were required to keep a respectable and orderly house that prohibited gaming, quarrelling and other misconduct.

Frequent Texas toasts were to "God and Liberty!" or "Texas and Liberty!" After visiting a tavern in Galveston, Sheridan commented that many cordial toasts were offered, including "May England soon be able to recognize our independence." Others were offered to "the President of Texas" and to "the Queen of England" with some complimentary remarks.

Stephen F. Austin ended his speech on September 8, 1835 with a toast to Texas at a public dinner in Brazoria given in honor of his return from Mexico. He said, "With these explanatory remarks I will give a toast—The constitutional rights and the security and peace of Texas—they ought to be maintained; and jeopardized as they now are, they demand a general consultation of the people."

BRAZOS VALLEY REGIONAL HISTORY FAIR

Plans are underway for the eighth annual Brazos Valley Regional History Fair, hosted by the Star of the Republic Museum on February 8, 2013. The regional fair is one step on the road to National History Day, a year-long, non-profit education program dedicated to improving the teaching and learning of history. Students in grades 6-12 choose their own topics of study related to an annual theme, conduct extensive research, and choose the best method for displaying their findings. The theme for 2013 is "Turning Points in History: People, Ideas, Events." Students can choose to enter historical papers, documentaries, exhibits, performances or websites. Projects can be done individually or as a group with up to five members. Students compete to advance to the state competition and for special monetary prizes from our sponsors. The top two winners in each category at the state contest advance to National History Day.
