At Home:

Adjust the Setting on Your Refrigerator

Of all household appliances, refrigerators use the most electricity—9 percent of an average home's total energy tab. To save money and energy, and improve air quality, keep your refrigerator set between 37 and 40 degrees. And when buying a new refrigerator, make it an energy-efficient Energy Star model. Conserve Water This Summer

With drought conditions across Texas, water conservation is more important than ever. Since lawn and garden watering can make up to 40 percent of total household water use during the summer, try following a few tips to help you save water, keep your yard healthy, and save some money at the same time.

About 50 percent of water used outdoors is wasted due to improper installation, maintenance, and use of watering systems. Have your system inspected each year by a licensed irrigator to ensure proper operation. Find a licensed irrigator on our website at www.tceq.texas.gov/licensing/licenses/lilic.

Water early in the morning to save water from being evaporated by midday heat.



Landscape with native and droughttolerant plants, which require lesser amounts of water, pesticides, fertilizers, and maintenance.

Consider drip irrigation for plants and gardens to reduce water loss.

Don't overwater. A general rule is one inch, once a week, when needed.

Always remember to obey any local watering restrictions. Check with your city or local water supplier for requirements in your area.

BrassCraft-Lancaster Upgrades to Platinum-Level Clean Texas Membership



BrassCraft-Lancaster has upgraded its Clean Texas membership level from Bronze to Platinum. The plumbing-valve manufacturer joined in 2009 with the goal of moving forward to the highest membership level.

BrassCraft-Lancaster exhibits its environmental leadership by developing and using innovative products, packaging, and processes. For example, the company started a process that collects scrap metal in drainage traps for recycling.

As part of upgrading to Platinum level, BrassCraft-Lancaster put into place and certified its environmental management system with goals that include reducing nonhazardous waste by 70 percent—a total of 44 tons—through recycling. Also, BrassCraft-Lancaster will reduce its water use by 17 percent, saving more than 1 million gallons, and its energy use by 10 percent.

Carole Baker Honored with Gregg A. Cooke Memorial Award

Known at the Texas Capitol and around the state as the "Queen of Water Conservation," Carole D. Baker is this year's recipient of the Gregg A. Cooke Memorial Award for Exceptional Environmental Excellence. For more than 15 years, Carole has been persuading Texas leaders to make water conservation issues a priority when addressing the state's public policy issues. Her work has led to millions of dollars dedicated to water conservation projects across the state.

The Gregg A. Cooke Award was established in May 2007 in honor of the late former EPA Region 6 Administrator Gregg Cooke and his commitment to giving Texans a better place to live. Each year, the award honors a single individual's outstanding efforts to preserve and protect the environment in Texas.
