
Take Care of Texas Tips

At Home:

Recycle Used Motor Oil

Two gallons of recycled motor oil can produce enough energy to power the average Texas home for one day, cook 48 meals in a microwave oven, blow-dry your hair at least 215 times, vacuum a house for 15 months, or watch television for 7 1/2 days straight! Whenever you change your oil or other vehicle fluids at home, make sure you recycle them. And NEVER pour used motor oil down storm drains, because the drains will carry the oil directly to Texas waterways. The used oil from one oil change can contaminate 1 million gallons of fresh water-a year's supply for 50 people. Find a recycling center near you by visiting <www.cleanup.org>.

Around the Office: Turn Off the Lights

Lighting accounts for 29 percent of an office's energy consumption. By turning off lights when not needed, performing regular maintenance, and installing upgrades, you can save significant energy and lower your electric bill. Replacing older lights with energy-efficient ones can save up to 30 percent off your lighting cost and up to 5 percent off your overall energy cost.

- an independently owned company with a company-wide total of 100 or fewer employees;
- a small local government (a county with a population of 100,000 or fewer people; a city with a population of 50,000 or fewer people);
- an independent school district serving a student population of 100,000 or fewer students.

Drive Clean Across Texas encourages all Texans to make easy changes in their driving and vehicle-maintenance behaviors to reduce vehicle emissions.

Try the following tips to keep your car running properly while improving air quality:

- Change your car's air and fuel filters regularly.
- Keep tires properly inflated.
- Drive the speed limit.
- Combine errands into a single trip.
- Avoid idling at drive-throughs

New Legislation Affects Installation of Landscape Irrigation Systems

The 82nd Legislature passed House Bill 2507, which, with a few exceptions, will make the installation of a landscape irrigation system without a license a Class C misdemeanor. This new penalty encourages installers to become licensed and helps stop unlicensed installers from operating.

Effective Sept. 1, the new legislation will offer municipalities and water districts another tool to use in keeping unlicensed businesses or individuals from installing irrigation systems. The TCEQ will continue assessing its current penalties against unlicensed irrigators.
