# Leave Grass Clippings on the Lawn

Leave your grass clippings on the yard after mowing; they can act as a slow-release fertilizer to your lawn while helping to retain moisture in the soil. This reduces the need for watering and can eliminate the need for fertilizer. Plus, it helps keep fertilizers out of storm drains and as a result, out of rivers, lakes, and bays.

Around the Office:

Pack a Waste-Free Lunch

Save fuel: pack your lunch. By not driving to your local eatery, you can help reduce Drought conditions are widespread across Texas and may worsen. Help protect our precious water resources by trying a few of the following ideas to conserve water indoors:

**Fix leaky faucets.** A leaky faucet can waste up to 3,000 gallons of water per year, and toilet leaks can waste up to 73,000 gallons a



Install water-efficient plumbing fixtures and faucet aerators. Water-efficient plumbing fixtures can reduce water use by 25 to 60 percent. Installing aerators will cut in half the amount of water used by each faucet.

**Wash full loads of laundry.** Washing only full loads of laundry can save up to 3,400 gallons of water each year. Need a new clothes washer? Invest in an Energy Star—qualified model, which typically uses 50 percent less water and 37 percent less energy per load.

**Use the dishwasher wisely.** Run automatic dishwashers with a full load, and scrape dishes clean rather than rinsing before washing.

#### **Clean Texas Members Conserve Water**



As the summer heats up and we try to cool down, we are reminded of how valuable our water is. Clean Texas members are doing their part to preserve this precious resource by aiming to reduce their water use. In fact, more than one-third of Clean Texas members set water-conservation goals this year, vowing to reduce their water use by 215 million gallons and to reclaim 3.7 billion gallons.

Joining conservation efforts, the Anheuser-Busch brewery in Houston is working to optimize its processes and reduce its water use by 50 million gallons—the highest water conservation goal from a Clean Texas member. On average, members set goals to reduce water use by 15 percent; however, Odessa PRS, a manufacturer of oil and gas equipment, and the NRG Cedar Bayou Electric Generation Station set reduction goals of 70 percent each!

Four members are reclaiming water for reuse for a total of 3.7 billion gallons in 2011, an increase of 250 million gallons from last year. The largest contributor is the Roberto R. Bustamante Wastewater Treatment Plant of El Paso, with 2.5 billion gallons of reclaimed water slated for reuse in 2011 (up 167 million from last year).

This summer, while you're cooling off at your local lake or swimming hole, keep in mind the 36 Clean Texas members doing their part to take care of Texas water.

## **Changes to Rules Affect Boat Owners**

If it has been awhile since you took the boat out, you may not know that Texas' rules for marine sanitation devices (MSD) have changed. As of Nov. 2010, owners of boats with a permanently installed toilet need an MSD certification to operate on any waterway in Texas.

The certification fee is \$15 for two years, and you can pay with ePay at <a href="https://www6.tceq.state.tx.us.epay/">https://www6.tceq.state.tx.us.epay/</a>. Find certification applications at <a href="https://www.tceq.texas.gov/goto/cleanwatercert">www.tceq.texas.gov/goto/cleanwatercert</a>.

Also, remember that it is illegal to discharge treated or untreated sewage into **any** freshwater body in Texas, as well as the coastal water body of Clear Lake.
