

FAQ ABOUT HIV

How does someone get HIV?

Most people get HIV through unprotected sex or sharing needles. HIV can be passed through blood, semen, vaginal fluid, and breast milk.

What are the symptoms?

Some people have flu-like symptoms soon after getting infected, but many show no signs for years – another reason to get tested regularly.

How can I protect myself and my loved ones?

- 1. Make sure you and your partner know where you stand:
 - Do you both know your status?
 - Is it just the two of you?
 - If it's not, do you use condoms?

Condoms can greatly reduce the risk of passing HIV when used correctly.

- 2. If you use needles, use a new, sterile needle for every injection. Never share needles.
- Pregnant women should always be tested for HIV. If a woman is HIV-positive, her doctor can treat her and her baby to keep the baby from being infected.

HIV TESTING & TREATMENT

How often do I get tested?

It depends. Everyone between ages 13 and 64 should be tested for HIV at least once. Think of it as a normal part of health care. If your doctor doesn't offer the test – ask.

Persons at higher risk for HIV need to be tested more often. Sexually active gay and bisexual men should test every 3 to 6 months.

You should test at least once a year if you:

- Share needles
 - Have sex with someone whose HIV status you don't know
 - Have sex with more than one partner since your last HIV test
 - Have sex with a partner who has had other sex partners since your last test
 - Have had a sexually transmitted disease (STD)

What if I'm HIV-positive?

There is no cure for HIV, but treatment and support are available – and it may even be free. If you find out you have HIV, see your doctor right away.
