To Hon R. E. Burke Judge in Probate of Said Court  
T. C. Freeman Shows that M. L. Keenan  
his wife died on the 23<sup>rd</sup> day of May  
A.D. 1880 at her residence in the residence  
of her said husband in Dallas County  
leaving real and personal property  
of the Estimated Value of Seven  
hundred Dollars in real Estate and in  
personal property of estimated value  
of Seven hundred Dollars

That said M. L. Keenan at the time  
of her death resided in the County first  
aforesaid; that on the 20<sup>th</sup> day of May  
A.D. 1880 the said M. L. Keenan at her  
usual habitation in said County, then  
being over 21 years of age and of sound  
mind, but languishing under dangerous  
illness, made her last will in the man-  
ner and form of a Nonrepatriate will, and  
by uttering certain testamentary words  
in the presence of ~~said wife~~ <sup>two</sup> witnesses there in  
attestation ~~that~~ I devise and bequeath to my  
my real and personal estate as follows  
all her interest in & to all the real estate in  
the County of Dallas as shown by certain deeds  
of record in Dallas County & in a certain  
Nonrepatriate will filed in this Court also  
that I give wife <sup>and</sup> bequeath unto my said  
husband T. C. Freeman my Master branch


That two children was born during the marriage with her said husband now living & are of less than & more than  
Twenty One & a half Years old & named Mary & George  
that they are now in the care & custody of their father & whom  
the property was willed.

to all the stock whatever, or of what  
ever character I may own by virtue  
of said wife & brand, said wife  
& brand being an undivided interest  
in said branched thus R

Petitioner further shows, that at <sup>was</sup> before  
the time of uttering the said testamentary  
words, the said testator called upon the  
L. ~~Jesus~~ George Robertson present <sup>on</sup> at  
the 20<sup>th</sup> day of May, A.D. 1880 then present  
to take notice <sup>to</sup> bear testimony that  
what she was about to say was her will;  
and that said testator did then <sup>as</sup> there  
was in the presence of H. Allen & others  
then present, utter the very testamentary  
words above recited. That on the  
same day to-wit, - the 20<sup>th</sup> day of May  
A.D. 1880 the said George Robertson  
reduced the said testamentary words  
to writing, <sup>as</sup> that said testator  
afterwards on the 23<sup>rd</sup> day of May  
A.D. 1880 <sup>as</sup> during said illness, died  
without revoking or altering said non  
capacitive will. Petitioner further shows
