ADMINISTRATOR'S STATEMENT

The Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC) has been in existence for over 113 years. The agency serves Texans by ensuring the marketability and productivity of Texas livestock and poultry, both domestically and internationally; safeguarding the public health from animal-borne (zoonotic) diseases; protecting the state's animal agriculture economic stability by controlling and/or eradicating endemic diseases; and, preventing and controlling disease outbreaks. In the past three decades, Texas and US producers have worked with state and federal regulatory agencies toward eradication of diseases of significant economic, animal health, and regulatory importance. International trade standards, while enhancing marketing opportunities also increase the risk for introduction of foreign animal diseases and pests, newly emerging diseases, or reintroduction of previously eradicated diseases.

In recent years the responsibilities of TAHC have significantly expanded as animal disease surveillance, prevention, control and eradication strategies have been initiated, improved, or expanded. Some of these include: bovine tuberculosis (TB), scrapie, chronic wasting disease (CWD), swine brucellosis, avian disease surveillance and equine infectious anemia (EIA). Additionally, new disease control or surveillance programs have emerged, including bovine spongiform encephalopathy (BSE) and surveillance for foreign animal diseases such as foot and mouth disease (FMD), classical swine fever (CSF), and exotic pests (ticks). Add to these a voluntary Johne's disease program and national animal identification system. These challenges must be addressed while the agency continues efforts to complete the eradication of bovine brucellosis from the state.

Although significant progress has been made to improve animal health (and reduce the risk to public health), Texas is still:

• One of only three states that has not achieved cattle brucellosis free status;

• One of only four states not officially swine brucellosis free;

• One of only four states with known active Mycobacteria bovis infection (cattle tuberculosis);

• The state with the highest incidence of equine infectious anemia (EIA);

• The only state in the U.S. that must continually guard against reintroduction and spread of cattle fever ticks entering directly from Mexico;

• The state that imports the largest number of live cattle from a foreign country;

• The state at highest risk of invasion of a foreign animal disease or pest, with five land ports along a contiguous border with Mexico of 1,248 miles as well as multiple international sea ports and airports through which a significant volume of animals and products enter the U.S. through Texas;

• One of the few states with sporadic cases of vesicular stomatitis (VS) in horses and cattle, anthrax in domestic livestock and deer, and laryngotracheitis (LT) and avian influenza (AI) in poultry;

• The state with the largest population of feral swine (wild hogs) which serve as a very effective reservoir for swine brucellosis and pseudorabies, both diseases that the agency is working to control and eventually eradicate, and which would serve as efficient hosts for FMD and CSF, should either of these diseases be introduced into Texas; and,

• The state ranked first in the nation in numbers of cattle, sheep, goats, and exotic hoofstock. Texas cattle and calves are valued at \$10.9 billion, sheep and lambs at \$112 million, and goats at \$136 million.

For the 2006 – 2007 biennium TAHC has an authorized workforce of 189 full-time equivalent employees (FTEs), composed of laboratory personnel, field inspectors, veterinarians, epidemiologists, and support staff; riders in the Seventy-ninth Legislature General Appropriations Act permit an additional 11 FTEs above the 189 FTE cap for tuberculosis eradication and Exotic Newcastle Disease surveillance plus contingency authority for additional FTEs to the extent that federal funds are allocated for salary costs. The size of the TAHC workforce is relatively small compared to other state agencies, considering the immensity and importance of animal agriculture in Texas and the resulting workload and scope of duties. At the height of the cattle brucellosis eradication campaign, for instance, approximately 350 employees worked for the TAHC. Most of them were livestock health inspectors who tested cattle for brucellosis. In the past decade, as the incidence of bovine brucellosis was reduced, the TAHC has down-sized its full-time equivalent workforce in excess of 40 percent. While the agency has an effective and efficient infrastructure of cross-trained staff

capable of handling a variety of diseases and species of animals, the agency is struggling to accomplish all of the tasks mandated by law and rule with a continually shrinking budget and workforce. The agency continues to prioritize and intensify actions to bring closure to long term disease eradication and control programs, but also must address challenges associated with changes in global trade rules and regionalization, increased risk of accidental or intentional introduction of foreign animal disease programs, and emerging disease challenges. Several Exceptional Item requests are included in this document to meet these needs.

Commissioner Per Diem

Due to the addition of a thirteenth commissioner, the agency is requesting an increase to the cap on Per Diem of Board Members shown in the Schedule of Exempt Positions in the General Appropriation Act. The current cap is \$2,500 and TAHC requests that this be increased to \$3,000.

Exceptional Items

TAHC supports and agrees with The Sunset Staff report policy recommendations which are primarily geared towards clarifying the agency's statutory authority. In addition to those policy recommendations, TAHC should be added to the list of state agencies exempt from the inscription requirement for state-owned motor vehicles in Chapter 721 of the Transportation Code. In the past, TAHC had a rider provision permitting a horse allowance for personally owned horses used by agency staff in performing agency business, such as monitoring the tick quarantine zone; restoration of that rider provision would allow TAHC the discretion to perform tick surveillance along the Texas-Mexico border via horseback when doing so would be more effective than via vehicle. Another policy matter that TAHC will continue to explore is using TexasOnline as an automated mechanism for veterinary practitioners to order and pay for Certificates of Veterinary Inspection online.

Adequate funding of animal health programs is essential to provide critical prevention, surveillance, diagnostic capabilities, and disease control or eradication activities. In order for TAHC to perform these functions and fulfill its mission, included within this LAR are the following Exceptional Items:

• 10% GR RESTORATION – funding to restore the 10% mandated reduction in general revenue. TAHC cannot absorb another budget reduction without additional staff reductions, which would result in curtailment of disease control efforts. Failure to restore the 10% to general revenue would significantly and detrimentally impact the state's brucellosis First Point Testing program and the Tick surveillance program as well as other animal health programs required by state and federal regulations.

• LONGEVITY AND TRAVEL – funding to cover the unappropriated cost of increased longevity pay and the unappropriated increased cost of the minimum mileage reimbursement from state fiscal year 2005 to 2006. Because TAHC has approximately 100 field employees who cover all 254 counties in Texas, each field inspector or field veterinarian incurs a great deal of travel miles to perform his or her duties. Approximately 1.23 million miles are reimbursed during the course of a fiscal year to cover mileage for those employees who are not assigned a state vehicle. The agency is insufficiently funded to reimburse mileage at a rate higher than 40.5 cents per mile even though the Comptroller of Public Accounts permits reimbursement at a higher rate.

• ADDITIONAL EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT AND COMPLIANCE STAFF – TAHC has only one full-time staff position dedicated to emergency management activities; additional funding is needed for personal protective equipment, communication devices, and additional FTEs such as an emergency management veterinarian, a local emergency management planner, and administrative support to adequately support the agency's expanding emergency management role. The Agency cannot fulfill its responsibilities for planning, training, exercising, and response without additional dedicated emergency management staff. Likewise, TAHC has only one dedicated compliance officer/investigator. An additional FTE is needed to provide support for compliance and enforcement. These additional personnel resources will improve the ability of the agency to fulfill the recommendations related to issues one and four of the Sunset Staff Report.

• CAPITAL BUDGET FOR IR REFRESH AND VEHICLE REFRESH – provide necessary capital authority and funding for Information Resources as well as a replacement strategy for the aging agency Vehicle Fleet. If TAHC's Earned Federal Funds (EFF) cap were increased and if the Legislature would grant to the agency capital authority for the incremental increase, EFF collected above the current cap of \$106,313 per fiscal year could be used to fund replacement strategies for agency

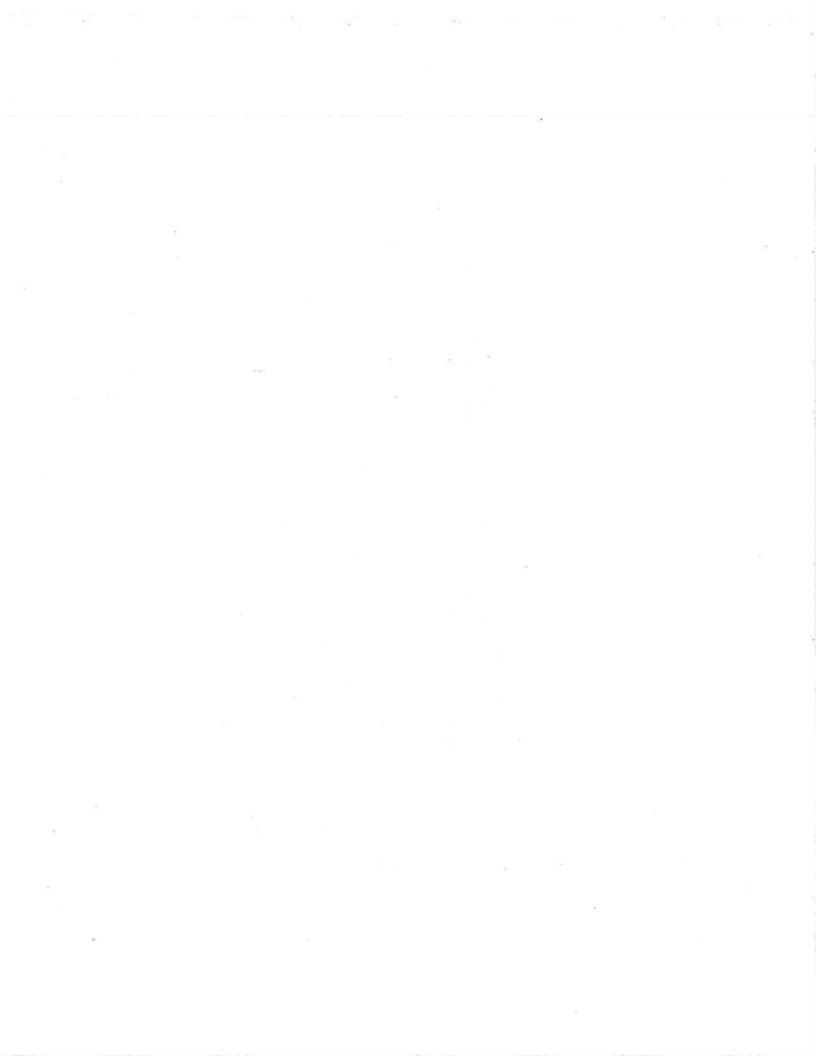
information technology and aging agency vehicles. Based on current information and anticipated federal cooperative agreements during the next two years, the agency may have an opportunity to collect additional EFF above the existing cap; however, because federal funds and USDA cooperative funding is not uniform and fluctuates, the ability to collect EFF above the current EFF cap is expected to decrease or to end by the end of state fiscal year 2009.

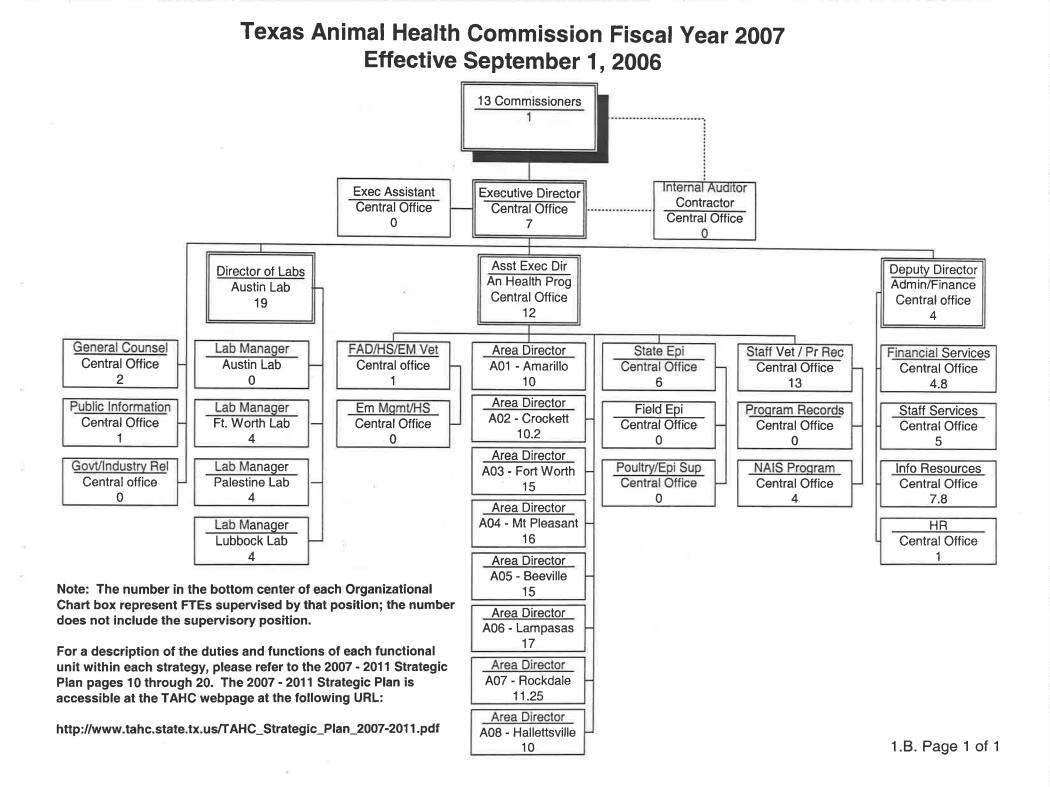
COMMISSIONERS' STATEMENT

The Texas Animal Health Commission requests a change to the Schedule of Exempt Positions to increase the maximum annual salary for the Executive Director position from the current limit of \$95,000 to a new maximum of \$125,000. This individual is the State Veterinarian for Texas, whose primary responsibility is to lead the TAHC in its mission to protect and enhance the health and, therefore, the marketability of our state's animal populations. In addition, the Executive Director's management responsibilities include overall administration of the agency's operations and budget; provision of leadership to staff; and, acting as primary liaison to industry groups and state, federal, and international government agencies. House Bill 426 as enacted by the 76th Legislature specifically recognized the critical role of this position in Texas, stipulating that the Executive Director must have a degree in Veterinary Medicine. The intent of that legislation was to require that the Executive Director have a doctorate in the field of Veterinary Medicine which is needed in order to fulfill the responsibilities associated with the role of State Veterinarian.

The animal agriculture industries regulated and protected by the TAHC represent a significant portion of the Texas economy. The Legislative Budget Board, in the 2006 Texas Fact Book, reports 2003 farm income from livestock was approximately \$10.3 billion. As reported in the U.S. Department of Agriculture's 2004 Texas Agricultural Statistics, Texas leads the nation in number of cattle operations (150,000), head of cattle (13,800,000), value of cattle (\$10.8 billion), head of sheep and lambs (1,070,000), and goats (1,250,000). In addition, Texas is sixth in the nation in broilers produced (621 million), seventh in hens and pullets of laying age (18,539,000), and thirteenth in hogs and pigs (990,000).

The average annual salary of all Exempt, Group 5 classified positions during state fiscal year 2007 is approximately \$121,733 with a high of \$136,191 and a low of \$95,000. During the same period, for state agencies authorized to staff between 200 and 499 FTEs, the average annual salary of all Exempt positions regardless of Group number is approximately \$142,035 with a high of \$286,200 and a low of \$88,500. The increase requested for the TAHC Executive Director's salary would bring that salary to a comparable level with those of other state agency heads whose agencies have similar budget amounts or similar FTE caps. Additionally, the requested salary is comparable to the federal veterinarian in charge of the USDA's activities in Texas. This request for a change to the Schedule of Exempt Positions was approved at the 360th Commission meeting held August 1, 2006.

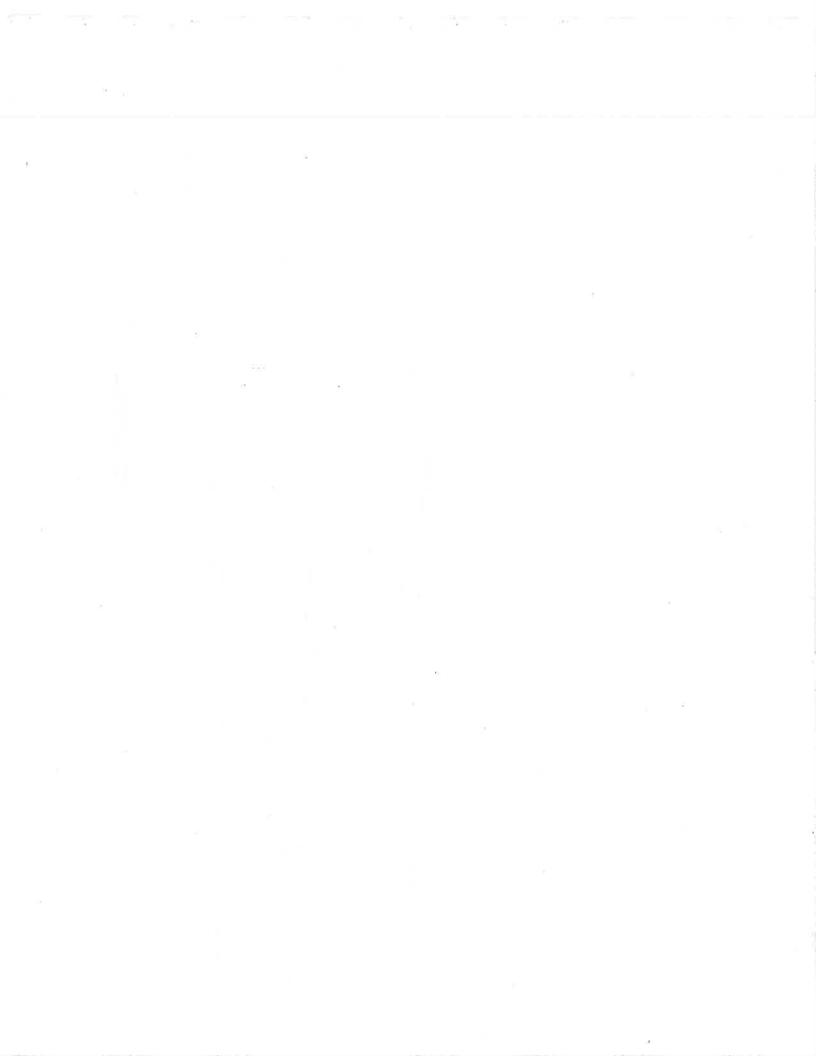

TAHC is vested with the responsibility of protecting all livestock, domestic animals/fowl from diseases stated in Chapters 161 through 168 of the Texas Agriculture Code, or recognized as maladies by the veterinary profession.

Veterinarians, field inspectors, and support staff strategically located across the state provide:

ANIMAL HEALTH ASSURANCE: Diagnose, control and eradicate domestic animal diseases; ensure effective disease surveillance; respond to animal health emergencies; provide public information/education services; monitor health certification; perform inspections at markets, slaughter facilities, livestock or poultry assemblies, and at other concentration points.

ANIMAL HEALTH MANAGEMENT: Conduct animal disease surveillance, testing, inspections, exams, and control activities; diagnose, report and respond to foreign or emerging diseases; prescribe health requirements for interstate and international movement; enforce Texas entry requirements and movement restrictions of at-risk animal populations; manage infected, exposed, or high risk animals, herds, or flocks; conduct surveillance for ectoparasites and manage infestations; record animal health data into national and agency level databases

ANIMAL HEALTH EMERGENCY RESPONSE: Lead agency for livestock emergencies; first responder for Foreign and Emerging Diseases; member of State Emergency Management Council, and Homeland Security Council; facilitator of County Animal Issue Committees, Local Disaster Planning Committees, and Texas Emergency Response Team; maintains Evacuation Holding Facility Database.

EXTERNAL/INTERNAL FACTORS IMPACTING STRATEGY:

This strategy depends on the support and cooperation of: private veterinary practitioners, industry associations and groups, governmental entities, academic institutions, and individual producers. Continued funding by the USDA-APHIS-VS, marketing strategies by producers, and identification of livestock for accurate sampling and testing while in market channels influence the success of the strategy. Texas' large geographical area, large number of livestock being imported from other states and Mexico, and extensive international border challenge the agency's efforts to protect and perpetuate a constantly improving health status for the livestock and poultry industry. In the context of widening global markets, the importance of an internationally accepted animal health infrastructure and disease-free status has materially increased, thus making the mission of TAHC an integral part of improving the state's economy.

IMPACT OF 10% GR REDUCTION:

RIF of 18.2 FTEs; reduce frequency of essential inspections; reduce all nonessential inspections and involvement in non-eradication programs; stop support of TB accredited free program and non-eradication certification programs; reduce surveillance and enforcement of fowl registration program and of non-commercial poultry operations; stop data entry of all negative brucellosis tests and health certificates; limit human interaction with out-of-state producers requesting permits; reduce technical support and customer service. Such reductions would adversely impair the ability to trace animals sold from identified herds/flocks.

STRATEGY DESCRIPTION AND JUSTIFICATION:

TAHC is vested with the responsibility of protecting all livestock, domestic animals/fowl from diseases stated in Chapters 161 through 168 of the Texas Agriculture Code, or recognized as maladies by the veterinary profession.

Staff in this strategy includes veterinary epidemiologists and laboratory staff who are strategically located across the state. Staff are involved in activities such as: accomplishing the testing of more than 2.7 million samples (blood, tissue, and milk) submitted to the labs for disease diagnosis; identification of parasite specimens submitted; assisting and consulting with veterinarians in interpretation of tests and making disease diagnoses, developing disease control and eradication plans for herds/flocks, and advising management on disease trends, potential threats, and mitigation strategies; and serving as liaison with other state and federal agencies with respect to disease control programs.

TAHC collaborates with the Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS) in the protection of the general public against zoonotic diseases, and the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) in the diagnosis and control of diseases in wildlife. The commission is authorized to act to eradicate or control any disease or agent of transmission for diseases of regulatory and economic importance that affects livestock, exotic livestock, domestic animals, domestic fowl, exotic fowl, or canids, regardless of whether or not the disease is communicable or infectious.

The availability of efficient, economical, and reliable serological and microbiological assays, with relatively short turnaround timeframes, is essential to disease diagnosis. The reduction in the incidence of a program disease adversely affects the availability of commercial test reagents and impacts in-house diagnostic protocol to continue the required level of testing. As states with smaller livestock numbers begin to look for alternatives for regulatory disease laboratory testing, the TAHC state-federal cooperative laboratory system will explore the feasibility of offering brucellosis diagnostic services to other states, utilizing either fees or federal funding. Whenever new diseases of regulatory importance are identified, it is imperative that reliable live animal tests be developed and adopted. Diseases without live animal diagnostic tests will require close herd monitoring programs to look for clinical disease and account for death losses.

IMPACT OF 10% GR REDUCTION:

RIF of 2 FTEs – 1 lab manager, 1 epidemiologist; closure of one regional lab would shift 500,000 samples to other TAHC labs and could jeopardize federal funds from USDA for lack of infrastructure for regionalization; delivery delays will result in increased numbers of degraded samples, increased hemolysis, and false positives; a reduction in epidemiology would increase the probability that diseased herds are missed which could lead to re-emergence of diseases or failure to completely eradicate a disease.

STRATEGY DESCRIPTION AND JUSTIFICATION:

TAHC is vested with the responsibility of protecting all livestock, domestic animals/fowl from diseases stated in Chapters 161 through 168 of the Texas Agriculture Code, or recognized as maladies by the veterinary profession. The commission is authorized to act to eradicate or control any disease or agent of transmission for any disease that affects livestock, exotic livestock, domestic animals, domestic fowl, exotic fowl, or canids, regardless of whether or not the disease is communicable.

Staff in this strategy includes an attorney, investigator, legal assistant, public information staff, and the portion of time spent by Field Operations staff in Texas Rural Awareness, Compliance, and Education (TRACE) activities. TRACE is a program initiated by the agency and supported cooperatively by USDA-APHIS-VS involving staff members making and maintaining contact in each of the 254 Texas counties with local livestock, exotic animal, and poultry producers; local county extension personnel, animal associations and clubs; veterinarians; schools and educators; local government; and, state and federal agencies with representation in the county. These efforts also foster voluntary compliance with state regulations. The attorney and investigator become involved when voluntary compliance is not forthcoming. The attorney provides legal counsel and representation to the Commissioners and Executive Director and the agency regarding all aspects of TAHC internal operations, state and federal programs, agency personnel matters, agency operations, contracts, and rulemaking.

EXTERNAL/INTERNAL FACTORS IMPACTING STRATEGY:

Our legal and compliance and public information staffing level has been a limiting factor in reaching the livestock industry in the rural areas of a state the size of Texas. Methods of delivering public information and educational information have changed markedly during the last decade. Electronic distribution lists and the internet provide a vast opportunity for identifying new contacts. Opportunities for greater and more timely coverage are seemingly unlimited. Capitalizing on these opportunities requires new and different public information skills, technology, and equipment.

IMPACT OF 10% GR REDUCTION:

RIF of 0.5 FTEs which is a reduction of approximately 12% of staff in this strategy; a reduction in staff will significantly impair the support provided to the General Counsel, the single TAHC investigator, and the Public Information Officer; specifically, this reduction would result in insufficient resources to address the Sunset Staff Report recommendation relevant to consistency of compliance procedures.

STRATEGY DESCRIPTION AND JUSTIFICATION:

TAHC is vested with the responsibility of protecting all livestock, domestic animals/fowl from diseases stated in Chapters 161 through 168 of the Texas Agriculture Code, or recognized as maladies by the veterinary profession.

Thirteen Commissioners appointed by the Governor, representing all segments of the livestock industry and the public, oversee and guide the agency's activities, including approving agency rules. The Commissioners appoint an Executive Director who oversees all key functions performed by the Texas Animal Health Commission in carrying out its core mission for all direct strategies as well as for all indirect strategies. Staff in this strategy includes the Executive Director, and executive assistant, Deputy Director for Administration and Finance, Financial Services, and Human Resources. Central administration staff is responsible for all financial management functions, including budget, accounting, and other agency operating functions – including the leadership and support for all human resources activities for the agency.

EXTERNAL/INTERNAL FACTORS IMPACTING STRATEGY:

IMPACT OF 10% GR REDUCTION: TAHC currently outsources its internal audit functions to a private professional services contractor; that contract would be reduced by \$15,000 per year from \$35,000 to \$20,000. This would result in the ability to perform fewer internal audit functions which would reduce the effectiveness of internal audits as a tool to identify opportunities for improvement as well as a tool to validate the effectiveness of existing policies and procedures. The remainder of the GR Reduction for the indirect strategies is a RIF of 0.8 FTEs in Information Resources staff, which has its own indirect strategy. Any further reduction to Central Administration would require additional reduction to FTEs via RIF. As the Executive Director and assistant could not absorb a reduction nor could the Human Resources Director with a single assistant, such a reduction would adversely impact the financial services department and its ability to maintain segregation of duties if current staffing levels were reduced. Loss of such staff would result in reduced oversight due to lack of staff which could result in errors which might then result in audit findings by TBPC, the SAO, or the Comptroller. To date, all audits of TAHC fiscal matters conducted by state and federal oversight entities echo the SAO finding that, "the agency accurately manages, monitors, and reports on its financial resources" quoted from Chapter 2, SAO Audit Report No. 05-039.

IMPACT OF 10% GR REDUCTION: RIF of 0.8 FTEs resulting in reduced system support and application development capability. Any loss to technical development staff will reduce the agency's ability to implement the SAO suggestions in SAO Audit Report No. 05-039 to improve the agency's information technology systems. A number of computer applications in production are beyond their useful life and need to be replaced. Loss of an FTE that provides the programming skills or technical ability to develop replacement applications will prevent TAHC from retiring and replacing a number of applications. Such a reduction would slow response time for desktop and system administration issues which would delay resolution of issues for field staff which would negatively impact field staff productivity.

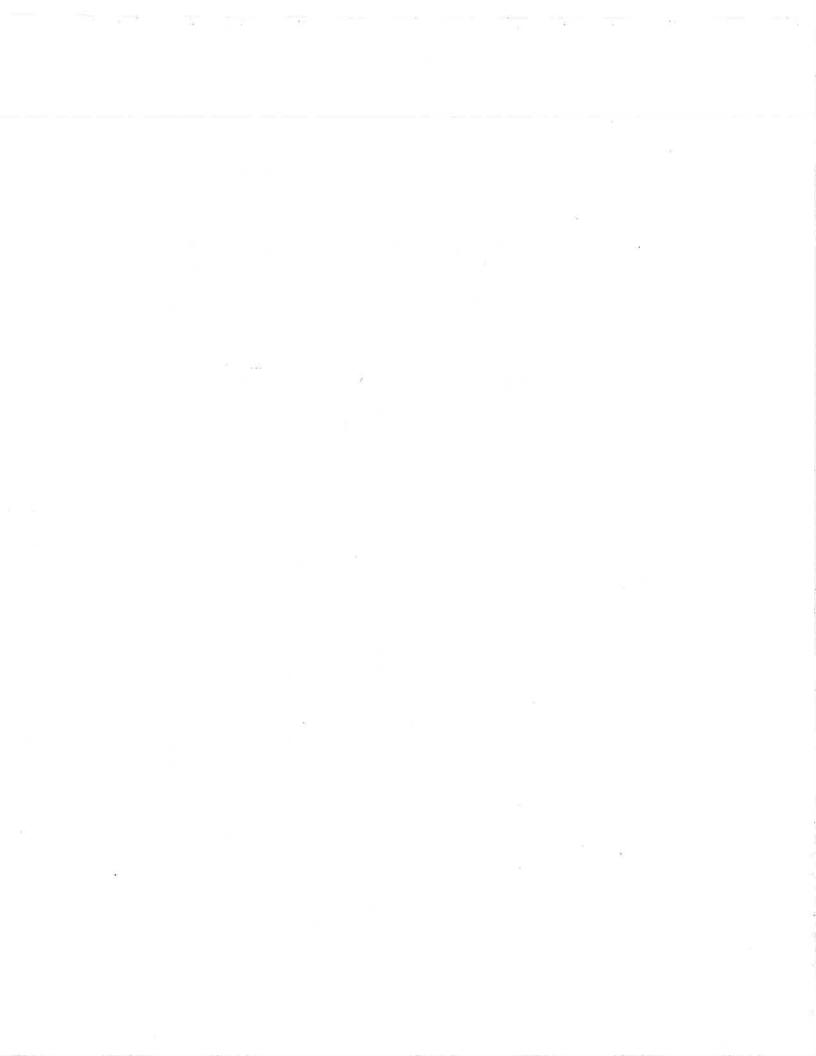

Other Support Services provides leadership and support for internal customer service, procurement and contracts, and infrastructure management and performs the following functions: procurement and contracting; inventory management of the central office warehouse, supplies, tagged assets; inventory review and audits of area offices; surplus property management; recycling program leadership; vehicle fleet management per TBPC, state, and federal regulations; statewide facilities support and space management; mailroom management, including receipt of revenue for certificates of veterinary inspection; management of the production and distribution of agency certificates of veterinary inspection; printing, reproducing, and assembling agency documents and publications; records retention and coordination of agency forms; ensuring the safety and security of agency staff and designation of an agency Safety Officer; issuing employee identification cards; managing the central office receptionist duties, USPS time-keeping, and workers compensation claims; and, maintaining and updating the agency veterinarian database.

EXTERNAL/INTERNAL FACTORS IMPACTING STRATEGY:

IMPACT OF 10% GR REDUCTION: The GR reduction attributed to the indirect strategies is comprised of a reduction to the Internal Auditor outsourced contract and a reduction of 0.8 FTEs in the Information Resources strategy. Any reduction to Other Support Services would require a RIF which would significantly impair staff's ability to perform their procurement, inventory, vehicle management, mailroom, infrastructure, time-keeping and USPS data entry, and printing and distribution functions that support all of the other direct and indirect strategies. Such a reduction would negatively impact support and service provided to field staff, administrative staff, and executive management.

DESCRIPTION / JUSTIFICATION:

In accordance with the policy letter issued jointly by the LBB and the Governor's Office of Budget, Planning and Policy, the Texas Animal Health Commission has prepared a baseline request for general revenue related funds that are limited to 90 percent of the GR amounts expended in fiscal year 2006 and budgeted for fiscal year 2007. The baseline budget includes a reduction of \$798,959 for each fiscal year of the 2008 - 2009 biennium which can only be obtained through a Reduction-In-Force of 21.50 FTEs comprised of field inspectors, administrative support, data entry staff, legal support staff, computer programming and support staff, a lab manager, and an epidemiologist; such a reduction would also necessitate closing one field laboratory and reducing the outsourced internal auditor contract. The impact to TAHC operations would be severe and adversely impact all three facets of animal health field operations: 1) Animal Health Assurance, 2) Animal Health Management, 3) Animal Health Emergency Response.

For nearly ten years preceding fiscal year 2003, TAHC received general revenue funding of approximately \$9 million annually. During fiscal year 2003 general revenue was reduced by seven percent (7%) and during fiscal year 2004 general revenue was reduced by an additional thirteen percent (13%) to a current general revenue funding level of just

over \$8 million annually. The current trend of decreasing general revenue from a budget, that not only fails to keep up with inflation but actually decreases, is compromising animal health service delivery programs. Past reductions to general revenue combined with this mandated reduction to general revenue are making it difficult to complete current disease control programs and address emerging disease issues effectively. Reductions to general revenue funding are detrimental to successful and effective response to incursions of foreign animal diseases.

Restoration of this amount would provide a minimally adequate budget.

EXTERNAL/INTERNAL FACTORS:

IMPACT OF 10% GR REDUCTION:

RIF of 21.5 FTEs; reduce frequency of essential inspections; reduce all nonessential inspections and involvement in non-eradication programs; stop support of TB accredited free program and non-eradication certification programs; reduce surveillance and enforcement of fowl registration program and of non-commercial poultry operations; stop data entry of all negative brucellosis tests and health certificates; limit human interaction with out-of-state producers requesting permits; reduce technical support and customer service. Such reductions would adversely impair the ability to rapidly identify some disease incidents and to effectively locate and trace animals sold from identified herds or flocks.

Closure of one regional lab would shift 500,000 samples to other TAHC labs and could jeopardize federal funds from USDA for lack of infrastructure for regionalization; delivery delays will result in increased numbers of degraded samples, increased hemolysis, and false positives; a reduction in epidemiology would increase the probability that diseased herds are missed which could lead to re-emergence of diseases or failure to completely eradicate a disease.

A reduction in support for legal and compliance and public information would result in insufficient resources to address the Sunset recommendation relevant to consistency of compliance procedures.

Any loss to IR staff will reduce the agency's ability to implement the suggestions in SAO Audit Report No. 05-039 to improve the agency's information technology systems. Loss of an FTE that provides the programming skills or technical ability to develop replacement computer applications will prevent TAHC from retiring and replacing a number of applications that are obsolete and need to be replaced. Such a reduction would also slow response time for desktop and system administration issues which would negatively impact staff productivity while their equipment or applications are repaired.

DESCRIPTION / JUSTIFICATION:

TAHC acknowledges and appreciates the efforts of the 79th Legislature in providing salary increases to state employees and targeted increases to TAHC veterinary positions as well as increases in longevity pay. However, the unappropriated increase for longevity pay and the unappropriated increase in the mileage reimbursement rate permitted by the State Comptroller significantly impacted TAHC during fiscal year 2006.

LONGEVITY PAY: TAHC employs a mature workforce with an average age of nearly 50; with that average is a longer than average state service and a higher than average longevity liability. The difference between longevity pay of \$20 for every 3 years of state service and longevity pay of \$20 for every 2 years of service is approximately \$119,520 for FY 2006, \$128,640 for FY 2007, \$136,560 for FY 2008, and \$141,840 for FY 2009. TAHC requests \$135,560 for FY 2008 and \$141,840 for FY 2009.

MILEAGE REIMBURSEMENT: Because TAHC has approximately 100 field employees who cover all 254 counties in the state, each field inspector or field veterinarian incurs a great deal of travel miles to perform his or her duties. Approximately 1.23 million miles are reimbursed during the course of a fiscal year to cover employee mileage for those employees who are not assigned a state vehicle. Unfortunately, the TAHC travel budget is based upon a mileage reimbursement rate of 35 cents per mile. The TAHC reimbursement rate was 40.5 cents per mile for FY 2006. Although the Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts permits a reimbursement rate higher than 40.5 cents per mile for state fiscal year 2006, TAHC has an insufficient budget to reimburse at the rate permitted by the Comptroller. In order to reimburse at the current rate of 44.5 cents per mile, TAHC requests an appropriation of \$116,716 per fiscal year (1,228,584 miles X 9.5 cents). TAHC respectfully requests this increase to GR particularly in light of the escalating

price of gasoline during the past two years.

EXTERNAL/INTERNAL FACTORS:

During FY 2006, due to weather conditions and prolonged drought conditions, the number of cattle going to market spiked significantly and was much higher than the average of the previous six years. As a result, the 2 million budgeted for First Point Testing was short of the actual cost of 2.5 - 2.6 million for fiscal year 2006. In order to cover the projected short-fall, TAHC implemented various cost cutting techniques to shift funding within its budget to cover the anomalous spike in the first-point testing. When the Comptroller authorized mileage reimbursement at a rate of 48.5 cents per mile for October through December 2005 and then lowered the rate to 44.5 cents per mile for the remainder of fiscal year 2006 – because of the unappropriated additional costs of travel and longevity, TAHC was unable to reimburse at those rates due to the projected short-fall in the First Point Testing Program.

Additionally, the nature of the work performed by field inspectors and field veterinarians requires a vehicle capable of pulling a cattle trailer, chute, or to haul equipment. This requirement typically means that such staff drive trucks or vehicles requiring sufficient towing and hauling power that a smaller, more fuel-efficient vehicle cannot perform. If the price of fuel continues to increase, this will continue to be a significant concern for TAHC field staff whose duties require them to use their personal vehicle for state business.

In light of the Sunset recommendations related to Emergency Management, TAHC requests additional funding for 3 Emergency Management FTEs: a veterinarian (\$5,941/mth), a local planner (\$4,467/mth), and administrative support (\$2,482/mth).

In order to address the Sunset Staff report, issue number 4, TAHC requests 1 additional FTE for an investigator (\$3,563/mth), which would double the agency's investigative staff available to cover all 254 counties in Texas.

Included in the total of 4 FTEs is salary, 10% of salaries for longevity and workers compensation contributions, and start-up costs of: cell phone equipment, chairs, desks, digital camera, laptop and software, portable printer, office phone, and supplies. Recurring costs include: cell phone service, travel costs (estimated at the rate of a field veterinarian of 1,405 miles/month), training, and licensure/certification costs.

The estimated requirements for emergency management are \$227,152 in FY 2008 and \$214,927 in FY 2009. Budget requirements for the additional investigator are \$69,937 in FY 2008 and \$65,862 in FY 2009.

Many of the animal disease control programs entrusted to TAHC are cooperative disease control programs with USDA. TAHC and USDA have jointly conducted these programs with a combination of state and federal staff. In recent years USDA has experienced similar budget and staff reductions as the states. All indicators suggest that we will continue to see incursion of foreign and emerging diseases. We will also see expanded demands for additional disease surveillance and certification processes from trading partners who buy our animals and animal products.

Although the Commission has one employee specifically designated to work on emergency management, almost all agency staff statewide are involved in emergency management in some fashion. For example, Commission employees have been assigned to assist cities, counties, regional planning jurisdictions, and industry groups with emergency management planning, as well as helping individual producers establish biosecurity measures on farms and ranches. During FY 2006, TAHC staff were involved in emergency management activities due to the hurricanes and to the fires in the Texas panhandle. The Governor's Division of Emergency Management designated TAHC as the lead agency for emergencies involving animals; TAHC needs the additional human resources to adequately support these expanding responsibilities.

We must daily face the threat of the intentional introduction of a disease or agent. Texas is number one in the nation for cattle production, and for sheep and goat production. The state ranks high in swine production, poultry production and has a very large and diverse exotic wildlife population. These factors make Texas a target for intentional disease introduction. Additionally, we also have a very long international land border and coast line that has traditionally not been a deterrent to illegal entry of animals or people which could easily be a portal for accidental or intentional disease introduction.

DESCRIPTION / JUSTIFICATION:

Capital funding for investment in automation must continue to be a priority to get the agency technologically current. Recent emergency response activities have demonstrated the need for a more robust geographic information system (GIS) to aid the agency with its disease surveillance, control, and eradication work. As desktops, laptops, and hand-held devices age and technology advances, the agency needs adequate capital authority, and funding, to plan information resources refresh, replacement, and upgrade strategies consistent with recent SAO recommendations. Restoration of capital authority and funding is requested to reestablish the agency's four year cycle of replacing computer equipment; this would enable the agency to incrementally replace equipment over time and eliminate the need for large outlays in any given year.

By leveraging federal funds, TAHC has developed a fleet of 19 vehicles, 6 of which are at the end of their life-cycle per TBPC guidelines (6 years or 100,000 miles). Although TAHC has 19 vehicles in its fleet, approximately 85 field employees are not assigned such a vehicle and drive their personal vehicles to conduct agency business; in state fiscal year 2005, approximately 1.23 million miles were driven by agency staff in personal vehicles in order to perform their regulatory functions and duties across all 254 counties in the state. Historically, agency vehicles cost approximately ten to fifteen cents less per mile to operate than reimbursement for personal vehicles used in state service. However, the cost efficiency is based on the life of the vehicle and the agency acknowledges that vehicle acquisition requires significant upfront costs, and typically requires capital authority. TAHC needs capital authority and funding to facilitate a replacement strategy for retiring and replacing aging vehicles and to increase the TAHC fleet size.

The agency currently has no capital authority. In order to better plan for infrastructure needs, TAHC has recommended and continues to recommend to the Legislative Budget Board that capital authority be authorized for the agency. TAHC's Earned Federal Funds (EFF) appropriation is currently capped at \$106,313 for each fiscal year of the 2006-2007 biennium. If TAHC's annual EFF cap were increased and if the legislature would grant to the agency capital authority for the incremental increase, EFF collected above the current cap could be used to help fund replacement strategies for agency information technology and aging agency vehicles. Based on current information and anticipated federal cooperative agreements during the next two years, the agency may have an opportunity to collect additional EFF above the existing cap; however, because federal funds and USDA cooperative funding is not uniform and fluctuates, the ability to collect EFF may diminish over time.

Agency desktop and laptop computers are beginning to reach the end of their useful lives. TAHC has not refreshed its server and development environment for more than four years. The aging TAHC Macintosh servers are slow, underpowered, and some servers, or components, are beginning to fail. Most of the software applications used by TAHC's core animal health programs were custom applications developed several years ago, which although maintained, cannot be upgraded to better utilize current technology and tools; many of these custom applications are beyond their life cycle and should be redeveloped. There are eleven 256K Frame Relay connections from the Central Office to Area Offices and laboratories.

Due to TAHC's expanding role in emergency management, particularly its role in hurricane disaster response, DIR has indicated that assisting TAHC improve its GIS system is included among its priorities.

General Information

Each fiscal year, TAHC requests funding and capital authority to replace 3 full-sized pickup trucks in its fleet. (3 X \$24,500/ea = \$73,500 requested for each fiscal year)

By leveraging federal funds, TAHC has developed a fleet of 19 vehicles, 6 of which are at the end of their life-cycle per TBPC guidelines (6 years or 100,000 miles). Although TAHC has 19 vehicles in its fleet, approximately 85 field employees are not assigned such a vehicle and drive their personal vehicles to conduct agency business; in state fiscal year 2005, approximately 1.3 million miles were driven by agency staff in personal vehicles in order to perform their regulatory functions and duties across all 254 counties in the state. Historically, agency vehicles cost approximately ten to fifteen cents less per mile to operate than reimbursement for personal vehicles used in state service. However, the cost efficiency is based on the life of the vehicle and the agency acknowledges that vehicle acquisition requires significant upfront costs, and typically requires capital authority. TAHC needs capital authority and funding to facilitate a replacement strategy for retiring and replacing aging vehicles or to increase the TAHC fleet size.

TAHC's Earned Federal Funds (EFF) appropriation is currently capped at \$106,313 for each fiscal year of the 2006-2007 biennium. If TAHC's annual EFF cap were increased and if the legislature would grant to the agency capital authority for the incremental increase, EFF collected above the current cap could be used to fund replacement strategies for agency information technology and aging agency vehicles.

B. Assessment of Fiscal Year 2004 - 2005 Efforts to Meet HUB Procurement Goals

Attainment:

The agency attained two of three, or 67%, of the applicable statewide HUB procurement goals in FY 2004. The agency attained one of three, or 33%, of the applicable statewide HUB procurement goals in FY 2005.

Applicability:

The Heavy Construction and Building Construction categories are not applicable to this agency. By outsourcing its internal audit function, the agency was successful in attracting a HUB contractor, therefore achieved 100% in the Professional Services category. The Special Trade category is seldom applicable to this agency. The agency utilizes two (2) of the thirty-five (35) sub-categories available under the Other Services category. The two (2) subcategories utilized do not typically involve large expenditures as the purchases are made by or for our area offices, many of which are located in small rural cities; where HUB vendors are in short supply.

Factors Affecting Attainment:

We continue to experience difficulties in identifying HUB vendors who provide farm and ranch and veterinary equipment and supplies which make up a significant part of the items purchased by this agency due to the nature of our work. We are mandated to buy from Texas term contracts and to purchase recycled products whenever possible. We are committed to these mandates, however, they also sometimes limit our ability to add to our HUB purchase credit. We have experienced a poor number of responses from HUB vendors on sealed solicitations.

"Good-Faith" Efforts:

The agency has reaffirmed the importance of compliance with applicable HUB rules and strictly adheres to the bid guidelines as published by the Texas Building and Procurement Commission for inclusion of HUB vendors on all bid opportunities regardless of the dollar value and continues to emphasize our committment to giving HUB preferences when awarding bids. Our HUB coordinator participates in the HUB coordinator meetings regularly scheduled by the Texas Building and Procurement Commission. We also participate in HUB forums, which gives us an opportunity to network with and identify HUB vendors who may be able to supply our needs. We have made some progress in identifying HUB vendors who may be able to provide farm and ranch and veterinary equipment and supplies. We continue to establish new vendor relationships with HUB vendors who supply other items necessary for us to achieve our mission

Assumptions and Methodology:

The majority of TAHC's federal funding is provided by the United States Department of Agriculture - Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service - Veterinary Services (USDA-APHIS-VS) under cooperative agreements. These agreements define the interagency activities included in the programs to be performed by the two agencies, and the amount of federal participation in the costs incurred by TAHC. USDA-APHIS-VS also provides indirect support to the programs through federal staff and the provision of supplies and laboratory equipment. Traditionally the majority of the federal funding has been for the brucellosis program. In 2004 and 2005 TAHC received \$4 million in funding for tuberculosis. Approximately \$3.2 million of that funding was for payments to private veterinary practitioners for testing of dairy and pure bred beef herds; continued funding at this level is unlikely. In 2005 and 2006 TAHC received over \$2 million in funding for National Animal Identification. The continued availability of this funding at this level is uncertain at this time. In addition, TAHC has received funding through several smaller cooperative agreements for which we have received no indication that there would be funding for continuation beyond the current award.

Potential Loss:

The funding from USDA-APHIS-VS is generally provided for disease eradication programs and is generally program specific, so the funds cannot be used for other purposes. As the incidence of disease is reduced, this funding also tends to shrink. We continue to work with our partners at USDA-APHIS-VS to maintain funding at appropriate levels during the final stages of eradication programs. Several of the cooperative agreements awarded during 2006 are for 12 months from date of signature and do not match the state fiscal year. As described in the Assumptions and Methodology, we expect a significant portion of the current funding to decline or end with the current award. Total federal funding is projected to decrease from an all time high of \$9.6 million in 2004, to \$4.7 million in 2007, and to \$4.5 million in 2007 and 2008.

Explanation of Impact to Programs and Revenue Collections

A.1.1. Field Operations

SIGNIFICANT ADVERSE IMPACT TO ANIMAL HEALTH PROGRAMS SERVICE DELIVERY: RIF of 18.2 FTEs; reduce all nonessential inspections and involvement in non-eradication programs; stop support of TB accredited free program and non-eradication certification programs; reduce surveillance and enforcement of fowl registration program and of non-commercial poultry operations; stop data entry of all negative brucellosis tests and health certificates; limit human interaction with out-of-state producers requesting permits; reduce technical support and customer service. Such reductions would adversely impair the ability to trace animals sold from identified herds or flocks. Even without a reduction in GR related to this LAR exercise, staffing levels are insufficient to adequately support the myriad animal health programs for which TAHC is responsible, particularly with respect to the agency's growing Emergency Management responsibilities.

TAHC is engaged in many animal health programs beyond surveillance, control, and eradication of Bovine Brucellosis, Bovine Tuberculosis, and other bovine diseases such as Johne's Disease and Bovine Spongiform Encephalopathy (BSE); but, we are charged to continue many other surveillance, control, and eradication programs, including but not limited to:

• Avian Diseases (e.g., Avian Influenza (AI), Exotic Newcastle Disease (END), Pullorum-Typhoid (PT), Laryngotracheitis (LT)) and Programs (e.g. the Fowl Registration Program)

• Swine Diseases (e.g., Brucellosis, Aujeszky's Disease (Pseudorabies), Classical Swine Fever (CSF)) and Programs (e.g. the Waste Food Feeder Permit Program and the Feral Swine Holding Facility Permit Program)

• Equine Diseases (e.g., Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA), Vesicular Stomatitis (VS), and West Nile Virus (WNV))

Sheep and Goat Diseases (e.g., Scrapie, Brucellosis, and Tuberculosis)

· Exotic Livestock Diseases (e.g., Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD), Brucellosis, and Tuberculosis)

Texas Fever Ticks and naturally occurring Anthrax

Animal Disease Surveillance and Reporting of Emerging Diseases and Zoonotic Diseases

Emergency Management (e.g., Animal Disease Preparedness and Response, Natural Disaster Preparedness and Response, and Agroterrorism)

Laboratory, Epidemiology, and Diagnostics National Animal Identification System

A reduction in GR adversely impacts all of the above mentioned animal health programs. With fewer resources to provide service for eradication and non-eradication programs, there is an increased risk of economic damage to the state in the event of an occurrence or re-emergence of a foreign or emerging animal disease.

Strategy Code / Name Explanation of Impact to Programs and Revenue Collections A.1.2. Diagnostic/Epidemiology

SIGNIFICANT ADVERSE IMPACT TO EPIDEMIOLOGY AND THE STATE-FEDERAL LABORATORY STRUCTURE: RIF of 2 FTEs - 1 lab manager by closing one lab, plus 1 epidemiologist; closure of one regional lab would shift 500,000 samples to other labs and risk losing federal funds for lack of infrastructure for regionalization with USDA; delays would result in degraded samples, increased hemolysis, and false positives; a reduction in epidemiology would negatively impact state and federal eradication programs; and, delays in epidemiology evaluation could lead to re-emergence of diseases.

TAHC's state-federal laboratory network collaborates closely with USDA adding significant value to the state of Texas, especially with respect to federal funds that support laboratory activities that do not flow through the TAHC operating budget. In order to maintain strategic coverage of testing laboratory facilities across the state, TAHC staff have leveraged the state's capabilities to obtain federal funding to support diagnostic testing of Texas samples by also performing testing of non-Texas samples. An opportunity presently exists in which expanded regionalization might allow TAHC to receive additional federal funding provided the state-federal laboratories test out-of-state samples along with Texas samples; if a laboratory is closed down in order to reduce the agency's GR appropriation, TAHC will lack the infrastructure to perform tests at the closed location which would mean the federal funds which would have supported testing efforts of Texas and non-Texas samples would be lost.

As noted above in Strategy A.1.1., Field Operations, TAHC's limited resources are significantly stretched to address an expanding list of animal health programs. The loss of an epidemiologist places at risk TAHC's ability to respond in a timely fashion in the event of simultaneous issues requiring epidemiological investigation and evaluation. Delays in an epidemiologist's evaluation could potentially jeopardize valuable interstate and international markets; similarly, such delays would likely result in significantly increased costs to the state to regain control, or might delay eradication of a disease, because of insufficient resources to complete timely epidemiological evaluations. If a highly pathogenic avian influenza virus finds its way to Texas, immediate control and eradication efforts, including cleaning and disinfection efforts would be required to prevent tremendous financial losses to the poultry industry and to prevent a possible human influenza pandemic. One single epidemiologist could be quickly overwhelmed in highly pathogenic disease outbreaks.

A.1.3. Compliance/Education

SIGNIFICANT ADVERSE IMPACT TO COMPLIANCE AND EDUCATION ACTIVITIES: RIF of 0.5 FTEs which is a reduction of approximately 12% of staff in this strategy; a reduction in staff will significantly impair the support provided to the General Counsel, the single TAHC investigator, and the Public Information Officer; specifically, this reduction would result in insufficient resources to address the Sunset Staff Report recommendation relevant to consistency of compliance procedures.

B.1.1. Central Administration

TAHC currently outsources its internal audit functions to a private professional services contractor; that contract would be reduced by \$15,000 per year from \$35,000 to \$20,000. This would result in the ability to perform fewer internal audit functions which would reduce the effectiveness of internal audits as a tool to identify opportunities for improvement as well as a tool to validate the effectiveness of existing policies and procedures. The remainder of the GR Reduction for the indirect strategies is a RIF of 0.8 FTEs in Information resources staff, which has its own indirect strategy. Any further reduction to Central Administration would require additional reduction to FTEs via RIF. As the Executive Director and assistant could not absorb a reduction nor could the Human Resources Director with a single assistant, such a reduction would adversely impact the financial services department and its ability to maintain segregation of duties if current staffing levels were reduced. Loss of such staff would result in reduced oversight possibly resulting in errors and audit findings by TBPC, the SAO, or the Comptroller. To date, all audits of TAHC fiscal matters conducted by state and federal oversight entities echo the SAO finding that, "the agency accurately manages, monitors, and reports on its financial resources" quoted from Chapter 2, SAO Audit Report No. 05-039.

Any reduction to Other Support Services, strategy B.1.3., would require a RIF which would significantly impair staff's ability to perform their procurement, inventory, vehicle management, mailroom, infrastructure, time-keeping and USPS data entry, and printing and distribution functions that support all of the other direct and indirect strategies. Such a reduction would negatively impact support and service provided to field staff, administrative staff, and executive management.

B.1.2. Information Resources

RIF of 0.8 FTEs resulting in reduced system support and application development capability. Any loss to technical development staff will inhibit or prevent the agency's ability to implement the SAO suggestions in SAO Audit Report No. 05-039 to improve the agency's information technology systems. A number of computer applications in production are beyond their useful life and need to be replaced. Loss of an FTE that provides the programming skills or technical ability to develop replacement applications will prevent TAHC from retiring and replacing a number of applications. This staffing reduction would slow response time for desktop and system administration issues which would delay resolution of issues for field staff resulting in reduced field staff productivity.
