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Texas Small Public Water System Training Program to Expire August 31

Ending on Aug. 31, the Texas Small Public Water System Training Program (TSPWSTP), an EPA-funded program that operates through the TCEQ, offers FREE water operator training throughout Texas. Eligible participants include community or nontransient/noncommunity public water systems serving 3,300 persons or fewer. The training program also covers water operator exam and

licensing fees, including Customer Service Inspection and Backflow Prevention Assembly Tester training and licensing costs.

The TSPWSTP will continue to enroll eligible systems and operators through the end of the program or until funds run out. Systems and operators currently enrolled in the program should use the vouchers already issued to them. If an operator redeems all of his or her vouchers and would like to continue training, the TSPWSTP will issue additional vouchers by request, one at a time.

TCEQ Offers Help for Struggling Water Utilities

Many small water and wastewater systems in Texas are in danger of receiving a violation notice from the TCEQ or even in danger of failing completely. In an effort to improve the viability of public drinking water and wastewater systems, the TCEQ offers statewide, contracted assistance at no charge for those systems that need help to solve financial, managerial, or technical (FMT) operational problems.

Over 80 tasks can be performed by the FMT contractors, including tasks related to billing and accounting, loans and grants, customer service agreements, easement compliance, analytical techniques, and many more. Keep in mind that if the TCEQ has already taken enforcement action against the utility, or the utility is in the process of being referred to enforcement, the utility will not be eligible for FMT assistance except with the prior approval of the TCEQ's enforcement division. Prevention of problems is easier and less expensive than trying to solve them after the fact.

Expiring Water Quality Permits Can Leave Your Facility All Washed Up

When was the last time you checked the expiration date and time for your facility's Water Quality Permit? Did you know that you are required to submit a renewal application for the permit 180 days before it expires (see 30 TAC 305.63)? If you fail to do so, you may be assessed substantial penalties. In addition, if your renewal application is not received prior to the permit expiration date, you will need to apply for a *new* permit.

It's easy to lose track of your permit's expiration date during the effective period of several years. At least once a year, check the first page of the permit just above the "Issued Date" for a statement similar to this: "This permit shall expire at midnight, September 1, 2020." Note the time of expiration, as well as the date, and mark your calendar well before the 180-day deadline for submitting a renewal application.

Here are a few tips for renewing your facility's Water Quality Permit:

 Review the application forms and instructions a year prior to permit expiration.

- Allow ample time for sampling and analysis. Analytical data for multiple parameters must be submitted in the renewal application.
- Start preparing the application several months or more *prior* to the 180-day due date. The more complex your permit and sampling requirements, the more lead time you will require.
- Factor in time to obtain and label the required maps and diagrams, including the location map (complete, original USGS 7.5 quadrangle map or maps).

Your timely submittal of the permit renewal application package demonstrates to the TCEQ that renewal procedures have been properly initiated. As a result, your permit remains in full force and effect and will not expire until the Commission acts on your application for renewal.

New Dry Cleaner Guidance Available

Has your dry cleaning facility completed its annual TCEQ dry cleaner registration, paid quarterly fees, complied with solvent-specific air rules, determined if any waste is hazardous, and properly disposed of its wastewater? Along with managing the day-to-day operations of a dry cleaner business, ensuring you comply with all environmental regulations can seem daunting. However, the TCEQ has tools to help you comply with environmental rules. For instance, the Small Business and Local Government Assistance section of TCEQ recently developed, Compliance Guide for Dry Cleaners, RG-479. This publication can help small, retail dry cleaners that use petroleum or perchloroethylene (perc) solvents.

Compliance Guide for Dry Cleaners provides an overview of state and federal environmental rules that affect dry cleaners, including information about annual registration, fee payments, and performance standards. Performance standards may require your facility to install secondary containment depending on the type of solvent, the facility's gross sales, and when the machine was installed. The guide also includes the following:

- An easy-to-read chart to help you determine if secondary containment is required around your machines and solvent storage area.
- A description of state and federal air rules for petroleum and perc solvents. Depending on the type and quantity of solvent used, you may be required to notify the TCEQ and Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) that you are compliant with these air rules.

 Information on waste and wastewater management to ensure you properly dispose of these wastes and maintain appropriate documentation.

New Federal Air Regulation Enacted

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As the federal government's environmental regulatory agency, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) enacted a rule, which became effective Jan. 1, 2010, that requires certain businesses to calculate and report to the EPA the amount of greenhouse gases (GHGs) they emit each year. The rule may affect your business. You can find the full text of the Mandatory Greenhouse Gas Reporting rule in Title 40, Code of Federal Regulations (CFR), Part 98, available online at <www.epa.gov/lawsregs/search/40cfr.html>.
