James Ripley Cook came from Tennessee in search of fertile land to develop new cotton plantations. J. Rip's second wife, Mary Pearl, bore him four children. In 1933, daughter Annie Pearl and her husband, Homer Leland Colley acquired 162 acres of J. Rip's ranch. Their only son, John Ripley, acquired the property in 1980. He stocked the ranch with the first Charolais brought to Anderson County.

James Monroe Stafford and his wife, Fannie Leonard (Kinabrew), started Rockbrook Farms in 1884 with the purchase of 250 acres. Before the turn of the century, the land was passed to Fannie and the couple's children when James was killed. In the 1930s, son John Horace reestablished the original ranch. With his wife, Alma Ellen, he raised two sons, James Horace and Charles Wayne. In 1968 after the death of his father, James acquired ownership of the original acreage that dated back to 1884.

Anna Bednar and her husband, Joseph, came to America from their Austrian homeland in 1873. Ten years later Anna bought 195 acres of land in Austin County, originally granted to Stephen F. Austin by the Mexican government. In 1892, Anna deeded part of the property to her two oldest sons, Peter and Cyril. In 1950, the soil had been depleted through continuous row crop farming. With technical assistance of the Austin County Soil and Water Conservation Service, the land was returned to pasture.

In 1935, son Edwin and his wife, Clara, acquired the 149 acre property and operated a dairy. Their son Ervin acquired the ranch in 1963 and expanded it to 260 acres. Today, he lives on the ranch with his wife, Ann, his children, a daughter-in-law, and a granddaughter.

August Wolf Jr. purchased 119-1/2 acres of farmland in 1886. Cotton was his chief crop, along with corn and grain. Eventually he added 102-1/2 acres. August had a blacksmith's skills and used his talent for making many of his own farm tools. In 1930, son Henry acquired 141 acres of his father's farm and grew cotton and peanuts for truck farming. He also planted a pecan grove. Daughter, Ernestine, became owner of 61 acres of the family's land in 1985 and lives on the land with her husband, Lawrence A. Schulz.

Alexander Murchison arrived in Texas in 1839. He purchased a 370-acre ranch in 1851 and raised hogs and cattle. Son Alexander Daniel acquired the ranch in 1885 and grew cotton and corn in addition to hogs and cattle. Granddaughter, Merle, acquired the spread in 1943. Her son, James, became the owner in 1965 and expanded the farm's crops to include Coastal Bermuda grass, oats, hay and pecans.

A native Texan, Henry Bruemmer Jr. purchased 265-1/2 acres of land in 1881. He eventually added 867 more acres and cleared the land to raise cattle, grain and cotton. Son Albert acquired 253 acres in 1909 and added 1,597.6 more. He operated the ranch with an eye for modern machinery, similar to his father. In 1975, Udo, the oldest of Henry's seven children, acquired the original 265-1/2 acres cultivated by Udo's grandfather. Today, Udo and his wife live on the ranch with their son and daughter.

The eldest son, August, acquired his father's property in 1890 and expanded the ranch to include poultry. The youngest of August and wife Martha's seven children, August Jr. and his wife, Irene, live in the house August Sr. built in 1888.

Born in Germany, Hermann Koch came to America as a child with his family. In 1866, he acquired land to raise crops and livestock. Their son, Edward, and his wife, Emma, acquired the farm in 1895 and added 120 acres. Max, son of Edward, married Nelda Bartels and in 1954 acquired 313-1/2 acres. The family lives in the same rock house Hermann Koch built in 1867 and still uses a log smoke house. Part of the barn, which was built during the farm's first year, still stands.

Fritz Prochnow came to Texas from Germany. In 1873, the state of Texas sold him 160 acres to which he later added 151-3/4 acres. Along with raising crops and livestock, Prochnow also operated a flour mill in Blanco. Arthur, one of four sons, acquired the farm in 1917. Daughter Rosa Nell inherited 156 acres in 1966 and added 48.67 acres. Today Rosa Nell and her husband, John Henry Winn Jr., live on the farm with their daughter, Jo Nell, and her husband, William J. Haas Jr.

The search for farmland brought W.J. Gardner to Texas from Tennessee. In 1886, he purchased land partly bordering on Raymond Creek. He and his wife, Madge, were parents to seven children. In 1943, their son, Guy, acquired 81 acres of the farm. He raised cattle, cotton and corn and maintained an active community life. In 1962, William acquired the property which today produces oats, wheat and hay. He is active in the Veterans of Foreign Wars and other community organizations.

One of the sons, Felix, and his sister, Martha, received 144 acres from their father in 1894 and bought 224 acres more from family members. Clemon acquired 135 acres of the property in 1968 and continued to grow cotton. Today, the farm is owned by Clemon's wife, Ruby, and her two children, Barbara and Joseph. Joseph operates the farm and raises cattle.

George Henry Cook, a sympathizer with the Confederacy, came to Texas, and in 1886 bought 160 acres of land. He grew cotton, corn and grain in addition to raising cattle and horses. When the oldest son acquired the farm, he expanded the livestock to include hogs, sheep and poultry. In 1948, George Henry Cook's grandson added vegetables, peanuts, corn, milo, hay, castor beans and melons.

Born in Christian County, Kentucky, John Bledsoe Dabney settled with his family in Austin County in 1853. In 1880, he moved to Comanche County where he purchased land in 1884 and farmed grain crops, cotton and vegetables. Soil conservation was very important to his son, Creath, and he participated in grass preservation project and an agricultural soil conservation program to build earthen water tanks.

In 1852, Thomas S. Westbrook came from Georgia to Texas, where he planned to acquire land and pursue better opportunities. Four years later he bought 848 acres on Flat Creek, about 26 miles from Jefferson. In 1871, Thomas deeded his property to his children. John Henry Westbrook and his brothers and sisters were cotton farmers. In 1972, at the age of 79, Edgar died and his wife, Minnie Ola, and children inherited the property, where they live today.



James Taylor White came to Texas from Louisiana to expand his cattle business. During the War for Independence, he supplied beef to the Texas Army. Between 1873 and 1881, he acquired the property now known as Finch Ranch. James Taylor White II ran the first barbed wire in Southeast Texas and attempted to establish the English Devon breed on his ranch, but they didn't survive. Rice farming was started on the ranch in 1945 by George Way Sr.

William Martin came to Alto, Texas in 1846. He served in the Confederate Army and took a leading role in the community's social and business activities. In 1890 and 1901, a tomato packing shed was operated on the farm by daughter, Helena, and her husband. In 1933, a grocery was added to the tomato packing shed along with growing cotton, corn, sorghum, hegari, tomatoes and watermelons. Today, the land is planted with hay, pecan trees and pine trees.

In 1855, Mathew Tennison bought approximately 373 acres and built a house, as well as barns, corrals, wells and ponds. After Mathew's death, 106-1/2 acres were added to the land and the house enlarged. W. R. also owned and operated a store. Later, Reba added 134-1/10 more acres. Black Brangus bulls are used and land has been cleared to accommodate large herds. The soil has been limed and fertilized, and the use of insecticides has been checked and certified by the state.

David Felps purchased 320 acres in 1853. With assistance of a slave and his eldest son, he built a double-log, two story house on the farm and started a cotton and corn commercial enterprise. Family members occupied the house until the early 1930s, when the building was dismantled. The turn of the century brought several changes to the farm. Rail fences finally gave way to steel wire fences and the first barbed wire fence was stretched across the property's north boundary line. Elberta peaches were also introduced to the region.

D.T. "Troit" Dotson came to Texas during the final stages of Cherokee County's recovery from the Civil War. On 115 acres, he raised livestock and vegetables and operated a cotton gin and gristmill for local farmers. He and his wife had five children, and when the parents became old and feeble, daughter Annie and her family moved into the home to care for them. The farm was deeded to each of the children. Over the years, Marjory Dotson (Farley) and her husband acquired 78 acres of the original homestead from other kin.

Wiley Travis Caraway came to Texas in 1847. In the early 1880s he and his wife moved to Coke County and in 1885 purchased land for grazing cattle, as well as sheep and horses. Wiley established the first school in Coke County and its first pupils were the Caraway children. Daughter Amelia's husband, H.C., was the sheriff of Coke County and for many years served as a director of the Federal Land Bank Association of San Angelo. The present owners are active in ranching and in church, civic and community affairs.

Col. Thomas Allen Burns came to America from Ireland in search of a better life in the New World. He served as a member of the county board of education for 11 years and in 1917 was appointed enrolling officer of the U.S. Army. William T., who was a Texas Ranger and a school trustee, acquired the farm in 1906 and added 439 acres to raise cattle and grain. Charley Clayton added to the acreage and continued to produce grain and cattle. Under the operation of Wanda Jean and her husband, Byron J. McAnally, the business has prospered.

William acquired 128 acres and continued to produce the same crops and livestock as his father. Burle and his wife, Nora, have terraced the land and built roads, ponds, barns and fences. Burle is a former member of the Farm Bureau.

In 1848, John and Charlotte Collins arrived in Texas from Missouri. In 1855, they received a land grant signed by the governor and raised corn, grain, sorghum, and later cotton. After the death of John, Charlotte, with the help of her five children, maintained the homestead. Eventually, the youngest daughter and her husband acquired the farm and added 279 acres to operate a cotton plantation. In 1927, Henry expanded the farm to a total of 1,052 acres.
