Holidays Ahead-Don't Drink and Drive



0ver the past three years, motor vehicle fatalities have increased in 1982 174 from 210 in 1983 and 248 in 1984 to according to James C. Garriott, Ph.D., Chief Toxicologist with the

County Medical Examiners office. He also reports that in 1984, 70% of the drivers at fault for fatal accidents tested positively for alcohol and/or drugs compared to 25% of the not-at-fault drivers.

In an attempt to change these statistics, the San Antonio Council on Alcoholism in conjunction with the Texas Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse and the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, sponsors the Holidays Ahead Campaign, designed to promote greater awareness of the effect of alcohol on driving ability and a host's responsibility to make sure guests are able to drive home safely.

The kick-off event for the 1985 Holidays Ahead Campaign was held November 26 at the San Antonio Police Department Driving Course at Brooks Air Force Base. After the event a DESIGNATED DRIVER drove each Drinking Driver Media Event participant home. The principle of the DESIGNATED DRIVER Program is quite simple. In each group, one individual volunteers to refrain from drinking alcoholic beverages for the day and/or evening. In doing

so, the DESIGNATED DRIVER assures safe transportation home for other members of the group.

Restaurants. bars and businesses may request red, white and blue stickers with the logo "No Thanks, I'm A Designated from the San Antonio Council Driver" on Alcoholism by calling 225-4741. Klar, Jr., of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation who heads up the campaign committee stated. "We strongly encourage alcoholic beverage servers to support and promote this program by extending a courtesy, such as a free non-alcoholic beverage, DESIGNATED DRIVER in each group."

CARE CAB service is another Holidays Ahead Campaign effort to increase traffic safety and decrease vehicular fatalities due to alcohol consumption. "Block Distributing Company and Checker and Yellow Cab Companies join us for a third year of operation," remarked Debora Schmidt Orrick, Executive Director of the Council on Alcoholism. Beginning at 7:00 p.m. on New Year's Eve and continuing until 4:30 a.m. on New Year's Day, anyone in San Antonio who has had too much to drink and drive safely can call the Council offices for a free taxi ride home (to the address on the person's drivers license only).

Summary of Executive Committee Action

At the November meeting of the Executive Committee, AACOG recognized LTC. Donald Conkright of the 507th MAST Unit for his contribution to the MAST mission. In addition, Southwest Airlines was recognized for its Home for the Holidays Program.

Judge Sagebiel of Guadalupe County was appointed to respond to the Secretary of State's request for a session with county judges and commissioners on elections. The Committee approved the consent agenda of the MPO including the 1984-85 Unified Work Program Budget Amendments. 1985-86 Unified Work Program Amendments and the 1985-86 Transportation Improvement Program/1985-86 Annual Element Amendments.

Recommendations by the Budget and Workplan Committee were also approved. The 1986 Budget to include a 3% cost-ofliving increase was approved. The recommendation to delay a 1 cent dues increase until 1987 was also given approval. Insurance for equipment, furniture expenditures and four personnel changes were accepted were the recommendations by the Bexar Senior Advisory Committee to fund the St. Patrick's Parish, "St. Patrick's Senior Citizens Program," and the King William Adult Rehabilitation Day Care Center, "Transportation." The Committee also approved authorizing the Executive Director to contract for a one year audit of Project Free, not to exceed \$7500.

In addition, a Senior Community Services, Inc., "San Antonio Foster Grandparents Program," and a Benedictine Health Resources Center "Project for Training Caregivers of Older Persons," were given favorable review. The Bexar Senior Advisory also recommended the appointment of Dottie Fry as Chairperson of the Senior Advisory Committe and Albert Newton as Vice-Chairperson. Additional membership was also approved.

Continued membership in the Texas Association of Regional Councils was also approved.

The Committee approved a job description for a Youth Coordinating Council Administrator and a Memorandum of Agreement between YCC and AACOG and aggregated a statement that YCC will secure funding for the provision of the administrator.

The Executive Committee accepted the recommendation of the Alamo Senior Advisory Committee to appoint Leslie D. Thorne to the State Advisory Council of the Texas Department on Aging.

The AACOG Hazardous Materials Steering Committee is well underway with the implementation phase of the 1985-86 program.



Block Numbering Areas Established for 1990 Census

The nine rural counties of the AACOG region, Atascosa, Bandera, Frio, Gillespie, Karnes, Kendall, Kerr, Medina and Wilson, will participate in the Block Numbering Areas (BNA) Program for the 1990 Census. This program will replace the present Enumeration District Program.

The BNA Program will make it possible to suggest geographic areas within rural counties for which a breakdown of census information below county level would be logical and useful, i.e., towns, school districts, transportation zones and other geographies for which population informa-

tion is regularly needed. Local participation in this project should provide for a more successful reporting format than the existing program for enumeration districts.

The maps for the program will be provided by the Census Bureau to each County Clerk. The Counties are then asked to identify the BNA using guidelines for delineation established by the Bureau. The final maps must be submitted to the Census Bureau by June 30, 1986.

Assistance to local governments will be provided by AACOG staff.

ICAN Specialist on Board

BILLIE SMITHSON has recently joined AACOG as the Interagency Child Abuse Network Specialist, and will serve as staff support for the Network.

Ms. Smithson holds an M.A. in psychology from Trinity University, is a certified We Help Ourselves trainer and has been a Parent's Anonymous Volunteer. Among her duties with the Network will be to assist member agencies in the development of interagency agreements and statistical reporting formats which will facilitate data gathering.

The RESOURCES SUBCOMMITTEE of ICAN is attempting to develop standardized guidelines for the evaluation of sex offenders and recommendations for the judiciary on which categories of offenders should be evaluated. As a part of this project, staff is contacting other states and programs which may already have available educational materials.

Weatherization Tips for Colder Months

During the day, set the thermosat to establish room temperature no higher than 68-70 degrees.

At night and before retiring, turn the thermostat down about 5 degrees. During the day, open shades and curtains to let in the warmth of the sun. Remember to close them when the sun goes down or doesn't shine.

Only heat those rooms in use. Keep all doors and windows closed when heating these rooms. Close all doors and heating registers of rooms that are seldom used. Use door sweeps, towels or cloth snakes at the base of drafty doors to keep out cold air.

Remember that for saving energy fuel dollars and safety purposes be sure gas heating equipment has a blue flame. Do not use an oven or the gas burners of your stove to heat a room.

Arrange seating away from windows and doors. Wrap all hot water pipes with insulating pipe wrap. Set the hot water heater thermostat to 120 degrees.

Replace furnance and central heat filters monthly. Have a warm and safe winter.

Mr. O.P. (Bob) Bobbitt was appointed the Executive Director of the Texas Department on Aging in February, 1984.

Bobbitt has over 35 years experience in the broadcasting field and spent five years as the first director of volunteerism working for then Governor Dolph Briscoe.

In 1974, Bobbitt was appointed to head the newly formed Texas Center for

Volunteer Action. He was instrumental in the development of a state network of 24 regional volunteer coordinators and 201 county chairpersons. He was elected president of the National Assembly of Volunteerism for three terms during this time.

In his responsibilities as executive director of the Texas Department on Aging, Bobbitt's priorities center on making Texas a showcase for aging services and programs. Bobbitt is constantly searching for new and innovative answers to the problems facing older Texans and is presently involved in expanding the types of programs available for them.



The remaining McGruff project was the MC GRUFF FRIEND program which originated in Hondo, Texas. HONDO POLICE OFFICER RICK TAYLOR explained that the McGruff Friend project calls for municipalities, counties and school districts to place a McGruff decal on special vehicles announcing to children in need of protection that this is a safe place to go for help.

McGruff on school campus


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All McGruff programs are designed for the safety and well being of a community's young people. Although many organizations and programs exist throughout the city, state and nation on protecting children, it is anticipated that a nationally known and recognized symbol such as McGruff, the Crime Fighting Dog, appearing with these newly developed projects will allow children who are in need of help to immediately recognize a safe place.

In addition, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company DISTRICT MANAGER OF COMMUNITY RELATIONS, DORA SALINAS, introduced SWB's TELE-PAL PROJECT developed jointly by the telephone company and the Alamo Area Crime Prevention Association. The project introduces designated SWB trucks as a safe place for children to seek assistance should they be in trouble. Each designated SWB truck is marked with a distintive Tele-Pal decal and each crew is radio equipped and trained in basic crime prevention and first aid.
