In the wake of Hurricane Ike, the Office of the Attorney General's Consumer Complaint Hotline has received hundreds of price gouging complaints from across the state. Most complaints allege price gouging on gas and lodging; others report price hikes involving food, water and power generators. The Office of the Attorney General (OAG) is investigating some consumers' claims that they were unlawfully charged inflated prices for necessities including fuel, hotel lodging and other items.

Although Hurricane Ike has left the state, the governor's disaster declarations are still active, so the OAG continues to have enforcement authority to pursue price gouging complaints in 99 Texas counties. Under Texas law, vendors are prohibited from charging exorbitant prices for necessities such as groceries, clothing, medical supplies, lodging, repair work and fuel during and after declared disasters.

The emergency Consumer Complaint Hotline continues to have staff available between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m. to receive price gouging complaints. Texans who encounter (Continued on page 7)

Dallas ISD Facing \$64 Million Budget Deficit

District will utilize \$120 million fund balance to

allas- Superintendent of Schools Michael Hinojosa announced last week that the Dallas Independent School District has an estimated \$64 million shortfall for the 2007-2008 fiscal year.

The district will utilize its \$120 million fund balance to cover the deficit.

"The majority of the deficit was caused by inadequate budgeting," said Hinojosa. "More money was allocated to campuses to hire additional staff last school year and we saw impressive student gains as a result. The cost of the additional staff, however, was not properly reflected in the budget."

A major reorganization of the district's finance and business services departments is being implemented.

"The lack of adequate systemic financial controls and the District's inability to reconcile accounts, input budget data, and control staff allocations created this deficit," said Hinojosa. 'This is totally unacceptable.

The finance department will now report directly to Chief of Staff Arnold Viramontes. Viramontes has been directed to create a plan and make recommendations to the board to begin reducing cost for the 2008-09 school year. All options are on the table.

"Importantly, when the 2007-2008 books were closed, the District non-payroll related budgets were almost even and balanced," said Hinojosa. "It was the unbudgeted payroll costs that produced the lion's share of the current defi-



Music Row's Country Breakout Artist of the Year & SeagoFest Headliner!

hen Bailey Grey stepped up to accept her Music Row award as Country Breakout Artist of the Year, she didn't realize that she was also stepping toward a coveted contract with Lofton Creek Records. That was a year ago, but Lofton Creek president Mike Borchetta recalls the moment vividly. "I told my wife, Martha, 'That girl is going to be a star," he says.



Bailey has been singing—with great skill and earnestness since she was a toddler. She grew up in a home filled with musicians and music lovers, a situation that gave her a yen to perform and a wide repertoire to draw from. As she matured, she graduated from living room performances to singing at school functions, talent shows, weddings and local festivals.

At the age of 12, Bailey bowed to the urgings of fans and family and recorded her first album at Rosewood Studios in Tyler, Texas, under the guidance of producers Greg Hunt and Gary Leach. Choosing a mixture of her own compositions and personal favorites, Bailey presciently named her album Exit. As it turned out, the album did mark her exit from gifted amateur to determined professional.

Exit not only earned Bailey the opening spot for Mark Wills and other country headliners, it was also picked up for sale by Wal-Mart and Barnes & Noble. In the fall of 2006, Bailey established her own record label—Bailey Entertainment Group (BEG) Records, for which she cut her second album, Don't Look Down. With that album, she released her records to radio for the first time and wound up having cuts played on 105 radio stations around the

Since the creation of BEG Records Bailey has scored three Top 15 hits on the Texas Music Chart, three Top 5 hits on the National Independent Country Music Chart and, in 2007 alone, 28,000 radio spins for the Music Row Chart. It was this last accomplishment that won her the Breakout Artist prize.

Now Bailey has moved into the big time. Lofton Creek has just released "Beach Weekend" her latest single to radio stations that report to the Billboard Chart, the music industry's standard of

"We believe Bailey is going to be one of those artists that will be around for a long time," Borchetta asserts. "She's a spellbinding singer and a great songwriter, as well." The hundreds who saw Bailey perform at Nashville's Hard Rock Café during the 2008 CMA Music Festival agree that she's something special.

Washington Update

From Congressman Jeb Hensarling

The Fourth of July may have come and gone, but there is still an opportunity to celebrate America's independence this fall. On October 1, the current prohibitions on oil and gas exploration of our deep sea resources and in the oil-shale fields of the West will expire. This will give Americans the freedom to access their own energy and provide them with relief from sky-high prices at the pump.

For the foreseeable future, we have plenty of energy to produce in America. Unfortunately, Congress has made it illegal to produce much of it. Washington has taken 75 percent of our onshore energy resources off the table, making it off limits to energy exploration and production. We have even greater energy offshore in our deep sea resources, but 85 percent of that area Congress has made off limits as well.

Utilizing our American energy resources is needed to lower gas prices and to reduce our terrible dependence on foreign oil. Americans must understand this, because approximately 75 percent of Americans favor exploration and production of our deep sea resources in any poll that you see. That is why I have been fighting and demanding that the House leadership make any effort to allow this drilling to take place and not to renew the prohibitions that prevent greater American energy exploration. It is my hope that on October 1, these deep-sea resources

and oil-shale resources will become available, and we can together celebrate American Energy Freedom Day. And I can assure you that I will oppose any legislation that aims to do otherwise

Catfish Patterns Changing With Cool Weather

By Luke Clayton, Outdoor Editor

East Tawakoni- The way in which Mother Nature subtly changes patterns that affect the daily lives of fish and wildlife from one season to the next has always been awe inspiring for me. In truth, it's all quiet logical; they're only reacting to stimuli such as cooling water and air temperatures, decreasing amounts of sunlight and changing food sources in efforts to most effectively find food and insure the survival of their respective species.

If you're a fisherman or hunter, learning to decipher these predictable changes through the seasons is key to being success-

I just got off the water at Lake Tawakoni, situated about an hour east of Dallas, with my friend guide George Rule, and learned first hand how catfish react to cooling Fall tempera-

"Luke, we've seen a shift in the pattern of catfish the past few days. Tawakoni is full of both blue and channel catfish and the channels are still stacking up around holes baited with soured grain, hitting punch bait fished near bottom. This is a pattern that began back in May and will continue until sometime in November when the water cools and the fish's metabolism slows. We've entered an 'inbetween' pattern for blue cats. In a few weeks, when the water cools to around sixty degrees, the trophy blue catfish bite will begin. We'll begin drift fishing with big pieces of cut bait for them and regularly put fish weighing between 25-60 pounds in the boat. We've just entered the early stages of this bite. The big boys haven't started biting but we're

enjoy good action drift fishing for smaller blues.' said Rule before the trip.

Regular readers of this column might remember the mention of an older gentleman that I encountered at Tawakoni a couple

weeks ago that had a cooler full of smaller blues, all landed while drift fished from his float tube. This was a good indicator that the early stages of the Fall blue catfish bite is underway.

"When driftfishing for

these smaller blues, we use bass tackle instead of the heavy rod and reels we'll put to use in a few weeks when the trophy blue season begins." says Rule as we motored out from Anchor Inn Marina. "I have some smaller shad for bait while we're drift fishing. Of course, there's plenty of Magic Baits 'Stick It' punch bait to use on the channel catfish later. We'll rig the shad on 4ought circle hooks. When we target the big boys in a few weeks, we use 9 or 10-ought hooks and pieces of cut bait as big as your hand.

Wind speed is key to successful drift fishing and conditions were less than ideal. Even with the use of a drift sock to slow our drift, our baits were covering the lakes bottom at a clip that Rule deemed a bit too fast. Rule uses a 'Santee Rig' for drift fishing (note picture) which is a basic Carolina rig with a small float situated about six inches up from the bait and a 'worm' weight that consists of

several double ought buckshots inside nylon boot lace. "This type weight really helps avoiding hang ups and the small float keeps the bait/hook up off bottom. It's a deadly rig for drift fishing."

After making a long drift that covered some prime blue catfish waters, we managed to connect with a couple of smallish blues. Altering plans is what successful fishing is all about and Rule and I were thinking the same thing. "Ready for some fast paced catfishing?" he said as he pulled in the drift sock. "We'll come back and drift for blues on a day when the wind isn't quiet so strong. Let's head to one of my holes baited with soured grain and hammer a cooler full of channel catfish. What do you think?" I simply love to catch fish and have been fishing long enough to know altering plans is what successful fishing is all about. If one pattern doesn't produce, change to one that does!

Rule eased the big pontoon boat up to a big tree situated in water 21 feet deep. I tied the bow rope snug and we tossed out a coffee can full of soured maize. "We've been baiting this spot for several days," says Rule. The catfish should already be here but





price gouging should call the hotline at (800) 252-8011. Information collected is relayed directly to agency investigators.

A disaster declaration triggers heightened enforcement authority for the Office of the Attorney General under the Texas Deceptive Trade Practices Act. This authority protects Texans by prohibiting exorbitant prices for necessities, such as drinking water, food, batteries and generators.

Texans should keep written records and receipts of any transaction they believe constitutes price gouging. If speaking directly with the service provider does not resolve the dispute, Texans should call the toll-free complaint line or, if Internet service is available, file a complaint online at www.texasattorneygeneral.gov.

Although the law prohibits vendors from illegally raising prices to reap exorbitant profits during a disaster, it does allow retailers to pass along wholesale price increases to customers. Thus, in some cases, increased prices may not necessarily signal illegal price gouging.

this fresh grain will turn them on quickly." Fishing a hole that has been baited is a sure fire method of getting into channel catfish action quickly but we could have also baited several spots with grain and returned to fish each with success. For those lucky enough to live on the water, keeping a few 'baited holes' makes locating and catching catfish much easier.

I love to use light spinning tackle for channel catfishing, it's much easier to feel the often subtle bite when they are 'mouthing' the baits. We rigged the lighter tackle with #6 treble hooks and clamped a small split shot about six inches above and punched the hooks into the buckets of punch bait. In just over an hour, Rule and I landed limits of channel catfish weighing between 1.5 and 3 pounds. To my way of thinking, there is no better eating fish in fresh water.

Drift fishing for Tawakoni's trophy blues is only weeks away but right now, I see absolutely nothing wrong with the fast paced action for channel catfish. I see a big fish fry in the very near future!






