(Tuesday, January 8, 2013)

In accordance with the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas, the Senate of the Eighty-third Legislature met in the Senate Chamber of the State Capitol on Tuesday, the eighth day of January, 2013, at 12:00 noon.

SENATE RESOLUTION 1 (Caucus Report)

Senator Whitmire offered the following resolution:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

SECTION 1. CAUCUS REPORT. At a caucus held in the offices of the senate attended by 29 members of the senate, the caucus made the recommendations for the operation of the senate contained in this resolution.

SECTION 2. SENATE OFFICERS. (a) Senate officers for the 83rd Legislature are:

- (1) Secretary of the Senate-Patsy Spaw;
- (2) Calendar Clerk-Linda Tubbs;
- (3) Doorkeeper-Austin Osborn;
- (4) Enrolling Clerk-Patience Worrel;
- (5) Journal Clerk-Polly Emerson; and
- (6) Sergeant-at-arms-Rick DeLeon.
- (b) Officers named in this section serve at the will of the senate.

SECTION 3. PARLIAMENTARIAN. The parliamentarian, Karina Davis, is named by the lieutenant governor and serves at the will of the lieutenant governor. The parliamentarian is a senate officer.

SECTION 4. EMPLOYEES. (a) The lieutenant governor may employ staff for the office of the lieutenant governor at salaries set by the lieutenant governor.

- (b) Each senator may employ staff for the senator's office at salaries set by the senator.
- (c) The chairman of each committee may employ staff of the chair's selection as needed by the committee. A committee employee shall be compensated in amounts similar to the compensation paid to persons in similar senate positions.
- (d) The secretary of the senate may employ other staff necessary for the operation of the senate at salaries approved by the administration committee.
- (e) The lieutenant governor, the secretary of the senate, and each senator may use the assistance of any assistant sergeant-at-arms or other available senate employee for any and all services needed in and about the senate.
- (f) In this resolution, "senate employee" includes an employee of the lieutenant governor, the secretary of the senate, a senator, a senate committee, and any other person compensated from funds appropriated for the operation of the senate.

- SECTION 5. DUTIES OF ADMINISTRATION COMMITTEE. (a) In addition to the duties of the administration committee expressly imposed by this resolution, the committee shall take actions necessary to ensure that the administrative operations of the senate comply with applicable law and are conducted effectively and efficiently.
- (b) The committee shall establish appropriate and necessary controls over contracts, inventory, and property management.
- (c) The committee may delegate any of its responsibilities to the committee chair or to the secretary of the senate to be performed under the general supervision of the committee.
- (d) Policies adopted by the administration committee must be consistent with the provisions of this resolution. To the extent of a conflict between a policy and this resolution, this resolution prevails.
- (e) Policies adopted by the administration committee are subject to the will of the senate, and a majority of the senate may reject or modify any policy adopted by the committee.
- SECTION 6. EMPLOYMENT AND PERSONNEL POLICIES. (a) The administration committee may adopt and enforce personnel and employment policies governing senate employees.
- (b) The administration committee may not adopt a policy that limits the salary of an employee of the lieutenant governor, a senator, or a senate committee, except that the administration committee may require approval by that committee of any senate committee employee salary that is proposed to exceed \$5,000 a month.
- SECTION 7. MEMBER'S EMPLOYEE LEAVE POLICY. (a) An employee of a senator accrues vacation leave, compensatory leave, or sick leave in accordance with policies adopted by the senator consistent with the requirements of this section.
- (b) An employee may accrue vacation leave, compensatory leave, or sick leave only if the employee files a monthly time record with the senate human resources office. Time records are due not later than the 10th day of the following month.
- (c) Compensatory time must be used not later than the last day of the 12th month following the month in which the time was accrued.
- (d) An employee is not entitled to compensation for accrued but unused compensatory time.

SECTION 8. OUTSIDE EMPLOYMENT. An employee of the senate may not be employed by and receive compensation from any other person during the term of senate employment without the permission of the employee's senate employer.

SECTION 9. WORK HOURS. An employee shall report to work at the time, and work for the number of hours, set by the employee's senate employer.

SECTION 10. LIMIT ON MONTHLY STAFF SALARY AND TRAVEL EXPENSES. (a) The total amount of staff salaries and intrastate staff travel expenses for each senator may not exceed \$38,000 per month.

(b) This monthly amount accrues on the first day of the month and may not be expended prior to the month in which it accrues, but any unexpended portion for a month may be carried forward from one month to the next and expended until the end of the fiscal year.

(c) An unexpended amount remaining at the end of the fiscal year, not to exceed \$10,000, may be carried forward to the next fiscal year. The total balance of unexpended funds accumulated may not exceed \$20,000 at the end of any fiscal biennium.

SECTION 11. SENATORS' EXPENSE REIMBURSEMENT AND PER DIEM. (a) The secretary of the senate shall provide for the reimbursement of the expenses of each senator and the payment of each senator's per diem in accordance with law, this resolution, and the rules of the Texas Ethics Commission.

- (b) The per diem rate to be paid to each senator for the 83rd Legislature is \$150.
- SECTION 12. OTHER SENATE EXPENSES. (a) The lieutenant governor, the secretary of the senate, and each senator may incur expenses for carrying out official duties, including expenses for items such as subscriptions, stationery, postage, and telecommunications.
- (b) Expenses under this section shall be paid from the contingent expense fund of the senate.

SECTION 13. PAYMENT OF SALARIES AND EXPENSES. (a) Salaries and expenses authorized by this resolution shall be paid from the contingent expense fund as provided by this section.

- (b) Vouchers for payment of any expense, including salaries and travel expenses, must be signed by the chair of the administration committee and the secretary of the senate.
- (c) The administration committee shall adopt policies regarding the presentation of timely, properly completed, and signed vouchers.
- SECTION 14. DESIGNATION FOR ATTENDANCE AT MEETINGS AND FUNCTIONS. (a) The administration committee shall designate a senator or any employee to attend an official meeting of a national governmental organization during a session of the 83rd Legislature. The person designated is entitled to reimbursement for actual and necessary expenses.
- (b) The lieutenant governor may designate a senator to represent the senate at ceremonies and ceremonial functions. The necessary expenses of the senator and necessary staff for this purpose shall be paid pursuant to a budget adopted by the administration committee.

SECTION 15. ELECTRONIC RECORDING BY MEMBER PROHIBITED. No member of the senate may electronically record a private conversation held within the brass rail on the senate floor during a legislative session without the knowledge and consent of all participants to the conversation.

SECTION 16. JOURNAL. The secretary of the senate shall provide for the printing of not more than 250 copies of the daily journal. Of that number:

- (1) 140 shall be furnished to the house of representatives;
- (2) four shall be furnished to the Texas State Library and Archives Commission;
 - (3) four shall be furnished to the Legislative Reference Library; and
- (4) the remainder shall be apportioned among the senators and the lieutenant governor.
 - **SR 1** was read and was adopted by the following vote: Yeas 30, Nays 0.

ADDRESS BY GOVERNOR

Yesterday, we heard from the comptroller, and the news was good.

It confirmed much of what we've known over the past two years: that the Texas economy is healthy and growing, and thanks to the hard work and dedication of people working all across this state, the revenue forecast is up, and up significantly.

Again, all good news, and a complete change from the forecast we faced just two years ago.

At that time, we were still dealing with the effects of an ugly national recession, and much of the talk, both in the newspapers and around town, surrounded not whether we'd have to raise taxes, but how much we'd have to raise them to keep our state afloat.

As you all know, that's not the path we chose.

We chose the responsible path, the fiscally-conservative path, and that path has led us here today.

We sat down, separated our wants from our needs, prioritized, and tightened our belts, wherever necessary, and wherever possible.

Far from the catastrophe many predicted for us at the time, that approach helped our economy improve more quickly, and more profoundly, than many had expected.

The main lesson to draw from that story is simple, when people keep more of their own money it's better for them, it's better for their families, and it's better for the state.

That's a lesson we must take to heart as we begin the 83rd Legislature.

Trust me when I tell you that there are interests all across this state who view Monday's revenue estimate as the equivalent of ringing a dinner bell.

They all want more for their causes, they all figure we have money pouring out of our ears now, and they all have your address and phone number.

However, in the face of that kind of pressure, we have to remember that Monday's revenue estimate represents not a chance to spend freely, but an opportunity to rededicate ourselves to the very policies that have made Texas economically strong in the first place.

It's also a chance to put our fiscal house in order for the years to come.

That's why, over the past several months, I have called for major budgetary reforms that include reducing diversions, a stricter constitutional limit on spending, a renewed commitment to stopping any and all new taxes or tax increases, and stopping any attempt to raid the Rainy Day Fund for ongoing expenses.

For the sake of all Texas taxpayers, we must control the appetite for more spending.

We need to stop writing IOUs to the next budget, and delaying payments we know will come due.

We need to reduce the use of fees and dedicated accounts for anything other than the purpose for which the fees were collected, and if we're not going to use them in the way proposed, stop collecting them.

With a better budgetary picture, now is the time to set the books straight and improve the fiscal outlook for future legislatures.

It's also time to take a hard look at providing tax relief.

We need to ensure consumers and employers alike have more cash on hand to pay their bills, hire more people, and invest in new efforts.

We need to reduce the demands on our innovators so they're free to innovate, and able to turn their great ideas into great success.

We need to continue streamlining our government, do more with the resources we have available, and continue delivering needed services in an effective, and efficient, manner.

Of course, budgetary issues aren't all you will be tasked with.

We must deal with infrastructure needs in water, energy and transportation, both for now and stretching into the future.

We need to find the right ways to educate our workforce, whether that means a college degree or technical certification, so employers can continue to count on finding the best and brightest here in Texas.

We need to reform our laws to make it harder for people to abuse our public assistance and unemployment insurance systems, by authorizing drug screenings for those programs.

We also need to better protect our most vulnerable citizens, the unborn, by expanding the ban on abortion to any baby that can feel the pain of the procedure, and putting in place common-sense oversights on clinics and physicians involved.

These are just a few of the issues we'll address this session, and I look forward to working with Governor Dewhurst and each of you in doing the people's business over the next 140 days.

At the end of the day, I'm certain you'll work together in the best interest of our state, and merit the faith placed in you by the millions of Texans who put you here.

May God bless you and, through you, may He continue to bless the great State of Texas.

IN LEGISLATIVE SESSION

The President at 12:47 p.m. called the Senate to order as In Legislative Session.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES NOTIFIED

The Committee to Notify the House of Representatives that the Senate was organized and ready to transact business appeared at the Bar of the Senate and Senator Taylor notified the President and Members that the committee had performed its duty.

ELECTION OF PRESIDENT PRO TEMPORE EIGHTY-THIRD LEGISLATURE, REGULAR SESSION

The President announced that the time had arrived for the election of President Pro Tempore of the 83rd Legislature, Regular Session.

Senator Zaffirini placed in nomination the name of Senator Leticia Van de Putte for the office of President Pro Tempore of the 83rd Legislature, Regular Session.

On motion of Senator Eltife and by unanimous consent, the nominating speech by Senator Zaffirini and the remarks made to second the nomination were ordered reduced to writing and printed in the *Senate Journal* as follows:

Senator Zaffirini: Mr. President and Members, it is with great joy and love that I rise to nominate our beloved friend and colleague, Senator Leticia Van de Putte of San Antonio, to lead the Texas Senate as our President Pro Tempore. In this important capacity she will act as Governor of Texas whenever the Governor and Lieutenant Governor are out of state. On those days Texas will reflect its changing face under the administration of an Hispanic woman, Governor Leticia Van de Putte.

William Ward wrote so long ago, "The Lord wants us to grow, not to grovel; to soar, not to sink; to overcome, not to be overwhelmed; and to be victors, not victims." Senator Van de Putte personifies those words because she overcame obstacles, grew

into the acclaimed local, state, and national leader and beloved wife, mother, grandmother, daughter, sister, and friend whom Democrats and Republicans join hands to honor today.

As a child, Leticia Rosa San Miguel was nicknamed "Chillona Berrinche," which translates loosely into "Temper-tantrum-throwing crybaby" or, more simply, "Brat." Perhaps her frustration reflected the chauvinism and discrimination she endured at an early age. She was stunned in the third grade when she was sent home for speaking Spanish on the playground, which motivated her to master the language beautifully. When her ninth-grade boyfriend told her she couldn't run for Student Council President because "She was a girl," she ran and won. After some parents objected to her high school dance team's being led by a Mexican American, she excelled as their president.

And after her parents, a veteran and a teacher, could not buy a home in their preferred neighborhood because of deed restrictions that stated, "No Mexicans, No–I'm sorry to tell you, they used the N-Word with two g's, No Dogs," she was sensitized to the importance of fighting for social justice. One year before completing her pharmacy degree from UT-Austin, Leticia married Pete Van de Putte, who offered to share everything with her, including his favorite scripture, "Go forth and multiply." And multiply they did. In the first nine years of their marriage, they gave birth to six children: Nichole, Vanessa, Henry, Gregory, Isabella, and Paul. Today they also have six grandchildren: Julian, Jove, Marlo, Elliot, Asher, and Rex.

I'm not sure at what point the young Catholic became an advocate of Planned Parenthood, access to contraception, and sex education. As a working mother she excelled in multi-tasking and organizing, color-coding her children's personal, academic, and extracurricular activities, and lining them up while she was cooking so each one could tell her one thing and then go to the back of the line until they ran out of things to say. When her four-year-old daughter asked why mommy was running for State Representative, her seven-year-old sister answered, "Because there aren't enough mommies there." That cinched her decision to run and to prioritize issues that matter to families. Whenever she saw a wrong that needed to be righted, she wound up on advisory boards in areas as varied as airport, business, health, park, and social issues. Coupled with her work at her children's schools and in pharmacy circles, those organizations developed into her political network that culminated in her success in the Texas Senate.

As Chair of the Senate Committee on Veteran Affairs and Military Installations, she has brought statewide and national attention to veterans' issues and to ensuring that the Texas Legislature reflects our gratitude and respect to Texas veterans and their families.

As Chair of the Senate Democratic Caucus for eight years, she helped develop bipartisan consensus on countless occasions and led the Democratic minority effectively on issues such as voter ID, sanctuary cities, and redistricting.

In 2003 when Governor Dewhurst knelt by her side and asked her not to filibuster redistricting, she answered, "Governor Dewhurst, please, get up. The last time a man knelt by my side with a proposal, I got pregnant six times!"

Having passed almost 400 bills, largely while serving on the Senate committees on Business and Commerce, Education, and State Affairs, she is recognized as one of our hardest-working, most effective, and best-informed Members—and certainly as the one with the most children.

As a national leader, Senator Van de Putte is in a league of her own in the Texas Senate. She has interacted effectively not only with Texans, such as President George Bush, but also with President Barack Obama, President Bill Clinton, Secretary of State Hillary Clinton, Speaker Nancy Pelosi, and a host of others. She's served as President of the National Conference of State Legislatures; President of the National Hispanic Caucus of State Legislatures; Co-chair of the National Democratic Convention; member of the American Legacy Foundation Board (ALFB), which administers the \$1 billion budget of proceeds from the multi-state tobacco lawsuit settlement; and as a member of the National Assessments Governing Board (NAGB), which issues the "Nation's Report Card."

Her national and even international stature have garnered extensive media coverage, including profiles in statewide publications such as *Texas Monthly* and national publications such as the *Hispanic Journal*. She is the only Senator whose pathway to leadership is chronicled in a book, *Latina Legislator: Leticia Van de Putte and the Road to Leadership*, published by the A&M press.

It's no wonder that Senator Van de Putte has received countless awards for her public service and professional leadership. She's received, for example, the Hubert Humphrey Award, the highest award bestowed on pharmacists; the Charles Dick Award, the highest honor given only occasionally by the National Guard Association for leadership on behalf of the military in general and the National Guard in particular; the Edward R. Roybal Award for Outstanding Public Service, the highest award given by the National Association of Latino Elected Officials (NALEO) for leadership on Hispanic issues; and the first annual Irrepressible Spirit Award from Prosumers International. I believe this award best captures her personality, her energy, her charisma, her enthusiasm, and her contagious smile.

Senator Van de Putte begins her days with a simple prayer: O God, for another day, for another morning, for another hour, for another minute, for another chance to live and serve Thee, I am grateful. Clearly, the Lord has answered her prayers, affording her wonderful opportunities to be of service to Him and to others—and for this, all of us are grateful.

Truly, she has embodied William Ward's words by growing, not groveling; soaring, not sinking; overcoming, not being overwhelmed; and being a victor, not a victim.

To paraphrase Ralph Waldo Emerson, she has gone where there was no path and left a trail for others to follow.

Mr. President and Members, I proudly and happily nominate our friend and colleague, Senator Leticia Van de Putte, to lead, to serve, and to leave a trail as our President Pro Tempore for the 83rd Texas Legislature and to serve as our next acting Governor of Texas. Thank you.

Senator Carona: Mr. President, I am not quite sure how to follow Dr. Zaffirini. I think that was one of your finest speeches, but I am so pleased at this time to second the nomination of Leticia Van de Putte to the position of President Pro Tempore of the Texas Senate.

Leticia and I actually began our careers at the same time, both sworn into the Texas House in 1991. It has been an honor and a pleasure to serve alongside her all these years.

In her words, which I hope are not really an omen of things to come, "There are so few of us left." And, Leticia, it is true, there are so few of us left, although I know we both delight in all of the new Members that have followed through that time.

With a last name like Carona, in Texas I am often mistaken for a Latino, while my heritage is in fact Italian. Leticia has the opposite problem: She is a Latina mistaken for an Italian. However, she has so many Italian-like qualities and traits it's easy to understand why.

First, she has style—who else could walk into the Senate Chamber wearing a fedora? You know, I know I tried, but the Sergeant wouldn't let me in the door. The closest I came was entering the Senate Chamber with a horse's head, and I am saving that reappearance for the voucher debate.

Well, she is also like an Italian because she loves food and wine. She loves wine so much I put her in charge of our alcohol working group in the committee I chair, which is the Business and Commerce Committee, which I can assure you, as an Italian, was an assignment not lightly made. By the way, last time I checked in on this working group, Leticia, glass in hand, had promised statehood to France. Good job, Leticia.

Finally, she is Italian because she is passionate about the things and people she cares about and sometimes even crosses the line in order to make a point, something I really don't know anything about.

Professionally, Leticia has a quality so few elected officials are able to attain—she has managed to retain her political focus and ambition while still remaining gracious and respectful to all her colleagues. And in that, she is a true stateswoman.

She has been instrumental in the passage of an amazing number of reforms. Let me just name a few of her accomplishments: the fair billing and pricing reform act on your phone bill and the creating of regional poison control centers. She passed a homestead exemption for disabled veterans and surviving spouses. She created the Burned Veteran Energy Discount in San Antonio, the Patient's Bill of Rights, the Texas Treasure Award, the Better Jobs Act, the Human Trafficking Task Force, and the Cybersecurity, Education, and Economic Development Council, and with that I am naming just a few.

She has also served as a Member of the committee I chair, which is the Business and Commerce Committee, and the committee's stepchild, if you will, the Windstorm Insurance Legislative Oversight Board-that's a mouthful-where, God bless her, she has been active in the legislative efforts to reform TWIA.

On the committee, not only has she been the only woman during my tenure, but she is the only woman serving among characters like our former colleagues Chris Harris and John Whitmire. Making—candidly, you wonder at times why she doesn't impulsively shout, curse, or involuntarily pace across the dais. Those of you that have served with those gentleman are well familiar.

She always comes well-prepared, though. Her questions are smart and her points are always well-articulated. She is a leading voice on the committee. And she really is truly a rose among many, many thorns, a nod to her middle name, Rose.

Leticia, herself, chairs the Committee on Veterans and Military Affairs, and I can think of no one more fitting. She is one of the most patriotic people that I have had the pleasure to know. She considers it an honor to work for the betterment of those that have faithfully served our country in uniform.

And if that weren't enough, and as mentioned earlier, she is a registered pharmacist, she has been a business owner, and she is a businesswoman today as she and her husband own a manufacturing firm, appropriately enough, making flags that have literally draped our nation.

I really hoped to punch up this speech with a few good stories about the Senator, but the truth is in my own experience and, frankly, in the experience of everyone I have asked about this, stories about Leticia generally fall in either one of two categories: either glowing reviews, talking of her kindness, her work ethic, her rhetorical skills, her patriotism, et cetera, or stories that are mostly inappropriate for a session like this. But I do have one. Back in 1991, Leticia, you may remember these days well, back in 1991, we sat as new House Members next to our classmate, Representative Will Hartnett, and Will has now just retired after 23 good years of service in the Texas House. Well, back in those days, Will was single, and, candidly, he was a bit shy, I guess by today's description, a bit of a dork. Well, Leticia was a mother and a wife. Well, let's just say she was worldly, or at least Will seemed to think so at the time. Well, by the time Leticia finished extolling the virtues of marriage and, well, let's just say, romance daily, Will didn't know whether to go out and find a girlfriend or a mail-order bride, but he did marry shortly thereafter.

I suspect Leticia's openness stems from the fact that she has raised a large family as you have heard a moment ago. On further reflection, I believe it is this experience that has probably best prepared her for her work in the Legislature. There are so many parallels when you begin to think about that, Leticia.

As the mother of six children, she sees very little that shocks her or surprises her. She has a sense of humor in just about any circumstance, and those of you that know her and love her, as many in this Chamber do, know this to be the case. She is willing to say the things no one wants to hear, though they need to, and she always fights the battles only a mother would fight.

Leticia treats us all like family, *la familia*, and for this the Senate is today a better body. Leticia, I was so honored when you asked me to speak on your behalf, and it is an honor to be here today as a part of this very special celebration. We love you.

Senator Birdwell: Thank you. Mr. President and Members, I am honored today in three capacities, as my capacity as a colleague, as a redshirt sophomore in this body, and Leticia knows what I am describing there, but most of all I rise in my capacity as a professional soldier to second the nomination of Senator Van de Putte to serve as

our President Pro Tempore of the 83rd Regular Session. In my slightly less than three years of service beside Senator Van de Putte as her Vice-chair, as she chaired the Veteran Affairs and Military Installations Committee, I've had the privilege to see her commitment to those who wear our nation's uniform. In fact, the very first bill I was offered the opportunity to joint author came from her in dealing with how the remains of our fallen soldiers will be treated in Texas courts. And it was a real treat to have this be the very first bill that I put my name on in this building. During my tenure as her Vice-chair, I've seen her support a number of things very passionately. She supported the property tax exemption for 100 percent disabled veterans and their surviving spouses. She supported the Texas Veterans Commission, adding a women's member coordinator on staff to ensure that the special needs of our lady veterans were being addressed by the Texas Veterans Commission. She supported college credit for heroes, ensuring military experiences of our veterans were translated into academic credits toward degree programs at our community, two-year, and four-year institutions, and state tuition for our servicemen and women at our higher institutions for all active military members that had been sent to Texas on permanent change of station orders to be assigned to Texas installations. And one that is pretty personal to me that I was very privileged to sign onto, she championed discounted utility payments for our indigent veterans who had suffered severe burns and are no longer able to regulate their body temperature. Governor Dewhurst, I certainly appreciate you keeping it really cold in here for me. Most of all, what is most impressive, is while she has never worn the uniform of our nation's warriors, she certainly has the heart of a warrior. While Senator Van de Putte and I have had our battles, and there will surely be more to come, I, and I know my other colleagues would agree, that Senator Van de Putte is not only a most respected foe when we disagree, but there is no more higher-valued ally that you want to bring her combat power to the table when we agree. President and Members, it is indeed my honor to second the nomination of Senator Leticia Van de Putte as President Pro Tempore of the 83rd Regular Session.

Senator Lucio: Members and Mr. President, it is an honor for me to second the nomination of my very dear friend, Senator Leticia Van de Putte.

We've already heard some of my colleagues speak about Leticia's great accomplishments as a stateswoman and as a tireless advocate for our state's most vulnerable populations—especially Texas' children, women, and working poor.

I'd like to now reflect, however, on those qualities of Leticia's I respect and admire most: Leticia is a woman who is deeply devoted to her family, to her mother, to her husband, and to her children and grandchildren. Leticia is also a person who commits every day to put her religious faith into action while serving the people of Texas. You see, I think it is these characteristics of Senator Van de Putte that make her the effective and influential lawmaker we know today.

Each day, Leticia approaches her work here in the Capitol with a mother's heart. The same love and compassion she shares with her family each day, she also carries with her to Austin. She shares it with her staff, with her constituents, and with her fellow Members in the Senate. In fact, I think I can safely say that Leticia Van de Putte has become a "mother figure" here in the Senate.

I have had the great pleasure to meet Senator Van de Putte's family over the years.

Now, before I get into singing Leticia's praises as a mother figure here in our Chamber, I have to briefly pause and give credit to Leticia's own mother, Ms. Belle Ortiz, and her father, Daniel San Miguel. I know both served as tremendous inspirations for Leticia.

I understand that every time her father, Daniel, would introduce her to people and they'd say, "Oh, what a pretty girl," he'd answer, "She's the smartest girl in her class." I know Senator Van de Putte would tell you today that she probably wasn't the smartest—Senator Van de Putte remains too modest—but her father made her believe it and gave her the confidence she needed to excel.

Senator Van de Putte's mother, Belle, also reinforced education, so that she could be self-reliant and wouldn't need a man to be successful. I understand that Belle would tell young Leticia, "Your generation of women will be the first that will not be defined by their daddy or their husband." Belle led by example and started the first high school mariachi program in Texas—a program that has been emulated throughout the state. Today, I know Belle and Leticia are like sisters, and not so long ago, the two traveled to Rome together to witness the beatification of an American nun.

Leticia's mother also gets credit for introducing Leticia to her husband, Pete. Leticia and Pete have celebrated 35 years of marriage together. In that time, they celebrated the birth of six children–Nichole, Vanessa, Henry, Gregory, Isabella, and Paul–and six grandchildren–Julian, Jove, Marlo, Elliot, Asher, and Rex.

Just like her parents did, Senator Van de Putte has stressed the importance of self-reliance through education to her children. Today, seldom a day goes by that she's not showing me pictures of her family on her iPhone or iPad, or proudly sharing stories about their success.

Leticia's daughter Vanessa is a graduate of Columbia College and today works as the Director of Events and Marketing at her father's business, Dixie Flag Company. Her son Henry graduated from Saint Mary's University and prior to becoming a production manager at Dixie Flag, worked at ESPN in New York City. He is married to Rena Van de Putte. Gregory went to the University of Dayton. He now owns a business, Storage Lifts Unlimited, and lives in Lakeway with his wife, Samantha, and three beautiful children. Isabella graduated from Texas A&M University—San Antonio and is a manager at Dixie Flag.

Leticia's youngest son, Paul, recently celebrated his graduation from Texas A&M University with a degree in Environmental Studies. Finally, Senator Van de Putte's daughter Nichole is a physician, OB/GYN. A quick story about Nichole: Not so long ago, she was a houseguest of mine down in the Rio Grande Valley. At the time, Nichole was completing her graduate medical education at the UT Health Science Center at San Antonio's Regional Academic Health Center in Harlingen. Although I was very proud to open my home to Nichole and her family, I do have one complaint about the experience: I didn't get her to stay in the Valley to practice! I am, of course, only kidding. I wish Nichole, her husband, Jason, and their three children all the best. She has become like a second daughter to me and my wife, Minnie.

Today, I am confident Senator Van de Putte's family must be as proud of her as she is proud of them every day.

I met Senator Van de Putte back in 1990, when she was first elected to the Texas House. Since 1999, I have had the privilege of serving with her here in the Texas Senate, as well as on two committees, State Affairs and Business and Commerce.

Since the first day I met Leticia, I have been impressed with her drive, her work ethic, and her determination to meticulously understand every single piece of legislation she encounters. In committee, she never votes on a bill until she has a full understanding of its impact on the lives of everyday Texans.

When Senator Van de Putte is advancing her own legislative agenda, she is undeterred by any roadblocks. She speaks out passionately in any committee on bills that interest her, especially those supporting state services that are important to the well-being and livelihoods of the people of South Texas.

Despite what some may think, being an elected official is a full-time job. Outside of session, there are interim hearings and reports, and demands on legislators' time only increases, even while staff and budgets shrink. Nevertheless, Senator Van de Putte always rises to the occasion and can be counted on to be a responsive representative to her constituents. She truly is a great legislator.

Now all this hard work doesn't come without a lot of personal sacrifice. Over the years, Senator Van de Putte and I have bonded over how difficult it is to be away from family while in Austin. Still, I know it is her family that motivates her to work so hard. In truth, she works to build a better Texas for them. She works to ensure that the quality of life she wants for her own children and grandchildren is passed on to all Texas children.

The people of Senator Van de Putte's district are blessed to have a legislator that understands the importance of motherhood. They're blessed to have a legislator that understands the importance of getting an education, living in a secure community, and having economic development that provides the jobs necessary to lift themselves up and create a successful life.

I began these remarks by saying that Leticia Van de Putte has become a "mother figure" here in the Senate, and I think that's true.

I, for one, have found great strength in the spiritual fellowship I share with Senator Van de Putte. Every time I have been in need, I knew I could count on Leticia to be at my side providing support and guidance. She has joined me in deep prayer for those that are ill, including most recently our dearly departed colleague, Senator Mario Gallegos.

As my colleagues here know, often during past sessions, we Members have joined together for fellowship meetings where we've shared our life's obstacles and prayed for one another. We have weekly holy rosaries which she attends frequently. Senator Van de Putte would always inspire those in attendance with her remarks and prayers. She is always generous with her time and full of compassion for everyone she encounters.

Today's speeches by my colleagues make clear that Texas is a better place because of Senator Leticia Van de Putte.

I believe Senator Van de Putte exemplifies an adage made popular by Mother Teresa. I'll paraphrase: If we are to find peace, we need to remember that we belong to each other, that every man, woman, and child is our brother and sister. Senator Van de Putte never forgets this message. She wants to make a difference in people's lives, regardless of party or creed.

I feel so privileged to call her a friend.

With that, I now gladly second the nomination of Senator Leticia Van de Putte for the position of President Pro Tempore of the Texas Senate.

Thank you, Mr. President and Members.

Senator Ellis: Thank you, Mr. President. I, too, rise to second the nomination of Senator Van de Putte to be President Pro Tempore of the Senate. I am sure you all can tell from all of the great things we have said about her, we think pretty highly of Leticia Van de Putte. I do want you to know that I think I am the last person who will nominate her because we want to give her as much time as possible to be President Pro Tempore of the Senate. Senator Zaffirini made the point early on when she spoke how important this is. Sometimes when we do this the opening day of session, people don't really realize it's a big deal. Trust me, it's a big deal. You know we have a presidential inauguration coming up in a couple of weeks, and I can remember some years ago when Bill Clinton became President, a Governor of a southern state. He went up to be inaugurated, his Lieutenant Governor had become acting Governor, and the Lieutenant Governor, I think his name was Jim Guy Tucker, went to Washington, D.C., as well, and they had a Member of the State Senate who was President Pro Tempore pardon a few people. They still are trying to figure out how to put those people back in jail. So, it truly is a big deal.

Some years ago you all may recall, I had the privilege of being the President Pro Tem when the Governor of Texas was running for President. Then-Lieutenant Governor Rick Perry was known to travel a bit; I can say that because I am known to travel a bit as well. My staff speculated that it was not coincidence, Leticia, whenever we would get a letter saying that such and such pursuant to the Constitution, Rodney Ellis, Governor Bush will be out of the state on this date, if the Lieutenant Governor is not in town, you will be acting Governor of Texas. Then about two, three days later, I would get a letter from Governor Perry's office, Lieutenant Governor's office saying, pursuant to the Constitution such and such, you will be acting Governor if the Lieutenant Governor is out of the state. Now, they could have put it in one letter, but I assume they wanted to make sure if I need to take another trip to Africa, I could go on about my way and go to Africa so somebody else would be acting Governor of Texas. But she will have all the powers and all of the privileges that the Governor of Texas has on those days when Governor Perry and Lieutenant Governor Dewhurst are out of the state.

You know we are a big family here. We are a bipartisan family here. We agree on a lot of issues, we disagree on some issues, but we are family. Now, I don't know about you, but present company excluded, but there are some people in my family, I like them, I love them, but I don't want to be with them all of the time, and sometimes I have to limit my interaction. Leticia is one of those people in this body that helps bring us together, helps us figure out how to disagree without being disagreeable. No disrespect to the men in this body, but to be honest with you, I think all of the women that I have served with in this body do a much better job of sometimes toning it down when it really could get ugly. And that is a special trait to have. Leticia will be the second Latina in the history of Texas to be President Pro Tem of the Texas Senate. Leticia Van de Putte will be in a small club. I think only six women, including two of us on this floor today, have served as President Pro Tempore of the Senate.

Most of the things I want to talk about today somebody has said, I might just mention a couple. I am so proud of the work she did on creating veterans courts. Every time we pass by a veteran, many of them suffer from post-traumatic stress syndrome and many of them are homeless. You ought to think about the work she and her colleagues have done on the veterans committee to really make life better for people who have fought to give us freedom in this country. And, Senator, we are all very appreciative of that.

I am very proud of the work that Leticia Van de Putte has done on anti-trafficking. It really is the modern slavery of our lifetime. It exists today and Texas is a major gateway for modern-day slavery, for trafficking, many of them coming from south of our border. Leticia really put a face on that problem. For the doctors on this floor and in this audience, she really got involved in this issue, as I recall it, because she got a call from a doctor in her district. It shows how everyday people can really have an impact on what we do. They picked the right person because when they called you, Leticia Van de Putte, because you have really become a nationally recognized leader on anti-trafficking issues.

The last issue that I want to comment on that I am really proud of you for leading the way on is our version of the Dream Act. Senator Santorum, I know that Governor Perry got a lot of heat for that on the presidential trail. Leticia Van de Putte carried that bill, was a leader on that bill in Texas. It is real straightforward if some person, regardless of legal status, graduates from a high school in this state, we give them the privilege of paying in-state tuition to go to one of our universities. It was tough when you did it. I think you had to do a great job of reaching across the aisle and bringing all of us along on that issue. And, Senator, we are very appreciative for your leadership on that.

Lastly, as I close on seconding this nomination, I again want to thank your family, you know, for all of us on this special day, you just think about the sacrifices that we make to be here. In a lot of ways, it is a little selfish. All of the soccer games, all of the recitals, all of the illnesses that you won't be around for, some husband or some wife will have to fill in that heavy load because we are here doing what we enjoy doing because it satisfies us to have an impact on the quality of life for the 26 million people in this state. But I know we are all very grateful to your family, Senator Van de Putte, and to all of our families for tolerating us and giving us the privilege to do the public business while they take care of our business back home.

So, I close by proudly seconding the motion, the nomination that Senator Zaffirini started with, in the name of all of those great members of the Van de Putte family that gave you, my sister, the privilege of being here for 13 years so you could earn this privilege today. Thank you, Mr. President.

On motion of Senator Zaffirini, Senator Van de Putte was elected President Pro Tempore by a rising vote of the Senate.

The President declared that the Honorable Leticia Van de Putte had been duly elected President Pro Tempore of the 83rd Legislature by acclamation.

The President appointed the following Committee to Escort Senator Van de Putte and her family to the President's Rostrum: Senators Davis, Eltife, West, Whitmire, and Williams.

Senator Van de Putte and her party were then escorted to the President's Rostrum by the committee.

OATH OF OFFICE ADMINISTERED

The President administered the Constitutional Oath of Office to Senator Van de Putte as follows:

I, Leticia Van de Putte, do solemnly swear, that I will faithfully execute the duties of the office of President Pro Tempore of the Senate of the State of Texas, and will to the best of my ability preserve, protect, and defend the Constitution and laws of the United States and of this state, so help me God.

ADDRESS BY PRESIDENT PRO TEMPORE

President Pro Tempore Van de Putte addressed the Senate as follows:

Lieutenant Governor Dewhurst, General Abbott, state officials, my dear colleagues, family, friends, and Senate staff: Thank you for this tremendous honor.

The first day of any legislative session is always an exciting one. Even when we anticipate a session might be tough, it's still a time when everything is new. A time when possibilities still abound. It's a time when we can be optimistic.

It's a time for vision. We look forward to what can be. We look at the issues that matter most to us and how we can make a positive change.

I've been extremely blessed to have experienced this moment of hope 11 times, and today for a 12th. The hope doesn't always turn out like we'd want it. Bills die. The legislative process takes a wrong direction. Sometimes laws don't have the effect you intended.

But we keep plugging away at this lawmaking business because of those moments when it does go right—those moments when we push our magnificent state in the right direction are exceedingly rewarding.

After more than two decades under the pink dome, I think people know what my passions are. I'm so fortunate to have played a part in making Texas a better place for veterans, including my father, Daniel San Miguel.

Could all of our brave veterans in attendance today please rise so that we may recognize them?

I'm also fortunate to have been in a position to help working families and parents.

This past session, I was happy to actually make life harder for some people—working with my colleagues and the Attorney General and Governor, we made things more difficult for human traffickers, giving prosecutors more power to crack down on this modern-day form of slavery.

This is a battle I'm proud to wage. To quote the great Abraham Lincoln, "Those who deny freedom to others, deserve it not for themselves; and, under a just God, cannot long retain it."

This session, I hope to make life easier for the survivors of trafficking, who badly need support services to recover from the horrible trauma they've endured.

This is, indeed, a time to be looking ahead. As we learned after the Census, this is a time of great change in Texas. Our state grew faster than any other state in the nation. And overwhelmingly, most of that growth came from minorities, and most of that from Hispanics. The face of our state is transforming, and that transformation brings with it new needs and new challenges.

Last spring, I was present at the dedication of the new Tejano monument on the Capitol grounds. It was a wonderful ceremony and an unforgettable tribute to our heritage. If you haven't yet visited the monument, just east of the south gate, I encourage you to head out there and see it before you leave today.

At the festivities, I stared out into a sea of faces reflecting the beautiful diversity of our state. As I did, I reflected on the journey Texas has made just in the two decades since I first took office. Go back to similar ceremonies at the beginning of my tenure in the Legislature, and the makeup of the crowd would have been much different.

Many of those faces that day were of Latino heritage, of course, but people of all colors and backgrounds assembled to celebrate the many different stories that meld to form the greatest state in the nation.

We were there to honor the past, but in reality we were looking at the future.

My fature is here today. I thank our six beautiful children: Nichole, Vanessa, Henry, Gregory, Isabella, and Paul. If there were ever a glimpse at the future of our state, it is in our family portraits. Some of my six children are just as brown as you'd expect from a family named San Miguel, my maiden name. But my other children's appearances reflect the Belgian and French genes of my husband, Pete Van de Putte.

The majority of my grandchildren, despite their Latino heritage, have blue eyes. They are 75 percent Anglo, and they will someday be a minority in this state.

This is something to be embraced, not feared. Great things have emerged from the blending of our cultures.

Look at the great *conjunto* music that sprang up in San Antonio and South Texas. Tejanos heard the accordion music of their German-American neighbors, incorporated it into their traditions, and created a sound that is uniquely Texan. It is living proof that diversity is a strength.

Look at our food. Every December I distribute San Antonio tamales around the Capitol and they end up on plates at the Senate holiday party right next to the turkey and dressing.

Look at our celebrations. People from all corners of San Antonio and Texas come together to honor the heroes of the Alamo and the Battle of San Jacinto every April at a magnificent 10-day celebration called Fiesta.

As we move forward into this new Texas, let these examples be our guide. Instead of separating into groups, let us say to the world, "Bienvenidos, y'all!"

We must embrace these changes. But they are changes that will present us with challenges. If we meet these challenges head-on, Texas can reach the great heights to which we aspire. We can make that next great blend.

If we do not, history will remember us harshly as the generation that squandered an opportunity to build something grand.

We cannot miss this opportunity.

It will be a collective imperative to realize our duty, a duty reinforced by the oath we have just taken. A duty to invest in our future.

An investment in the human capital of Texas. We must invest in the education of Texans, all of them. Education is the pathway away from poverty. Education is the pathway to good jobs. Education provides the toolkit for self-sufficiency. Education is the fuel of our economic engine.

Two years ago, we did the people of Texas a disservice. The 82nd Legislature cut \$5.4 billion from public education. Our students and teachers need that investment.

I know we were going through tough times. Our national economy was in a recession. Our state's tax revenues were down, and we are required in this state to balance our budget.

But let this session be different. Let's begin with our goals. And then let's figure out how we accomplish them. Yes, we need to have fiscal discipline. But we cannot arbitrarily decide that some tools cannot be used from the toolbox, no matter what. Shortchanging public education may save money over the short term, but it will cost us dearly in the future.

I am a Tejana and I herald from an education family. My great-great-grandmother, Rita Alderete San Miguel, started the first public school system in Maverick County. My mom, Belle Ortiz, worked for 32 years in public education. My husband was a band director and administrator before moving into the business world. My sister, Annabelle Garcia, has taught kindergarten for more than 30 years! Who does that? She should be a candidate for sainthood.

Over the long term, cutting back on our schools cannot be sustained.

We must invest in our students.

If we invest, Donna, they can become great emergency room doctors.

If we invest, Carlos, they can become great attorneys.

If we invest, Craig, they can become great business leaders.

If we invest, David, they can become great Lieutenant Governors.

And we especially must invest in them if they've served our country by preserving the Hazlewood benefits that our veterans and their families have earned. Too many of our brave warriors fight for freedom, only to come home and then have to fight for a job. If we invest, they can take the invaluable knowledge they gained in the military and translate that to civilian success.

Let's remember that education made our nation and our state great.

This session will be difficult. We all come here with our own priorities. I've just told you mine. Some overlap with yours. Some do not.

But just like those Texans in the past, I know we can blend. Our diversity can be a strength.

That music I mentioned earlier, *conjunto*, there's a lot of ways to translate that word. It usually translates as "group." Basically it means different elements, like those German accordions and Mexican bajo sextos, coming together to form a whole.

Troy, I know we can come together and find a solution to water infrastructure issues. Robert, I know we can move forward together on transportation issues. Jane, I know we can figure out how to improve women's access to healthcare together. Dan, I know you and I have different visions for how to make education great in this state, but we do have that common goal to make it great.

We are 31 individuals here in the Senate. And we need the strength of individuals. This state was built on that spirit of rugged individualism. But we also need to remember that Texans have also come together with a spirit of neighbor helping neighbor. We recognize that we have shared responsibilities.

I am here because of the support of the people of District 26. But I could not have been here today without a supportive family with unconditional love. I was given deep roots and strong wings from my grandmother, Lupita, or "Memo."

I worked hard, but I didn't do it on my own. I was motivated to get my pharmacy degree, to be like my grandfather, Don Daniel San Miguel, who owned La Botica Guadalupana, a Mexican pharmacy in San Antonio.

I had many fine teachers who pushed me through that public education system, and taxpayers made that system possible.

Let's remember that public spirit as we do the public's business this session. Let's remember that our actions as a community can help unleash the potential of the individual.

Let's come together, from our different backgrounds and different cultures, and let's seize this opportunity. Let's meet the challenge of this moment, this crossroads in Texas history. We are Texans. We can build something great. And let's build it together.

REASON FOR VOTE

Senator Birdwell submitted the following reason for vote on SR 4:

Even with the new makeup of the body, support for removing the "two-thirds rule" in the Texas Senate remains insufficient for passage. Thus, as in the 82nd legislative session, I wish to state on the record that I cast a "Yes" vote on the rules package so that the Senate may continue to address the people's business. I do, however, have great reservations about the "two-thirds rule," which requires the consent of 21 of 31 Members to allow a bill to be considered on the floor by the entire body. This rule provides a minority of Members to direct or preclude the actions of the majority, an example of what founding father James Madison feared in *Federalist 58*: "It would no longer be the majority that would rule; the power would be transferred to the minority." The fundamental character of our republic is that the will of the majority shall prevail.

BIRDWELL

REASON FOR VOTE

Senator Patrick submitted the following reason for vote on SR 4:

Traditions of the Senate are a necessity and should be granted a level of respect. They maintain civility amongst the Members and uphold decorum and continuity. From time to time, it is important to examine our traditions and ensure they best serve the body and the people of the State of Texas. Maintaining tradition, when doing so counters the public's best interest, is a dereliction of our duty as Texas Senators. Let the record reflect that I object to the Two-thirds Rule that requires a supermajority of two-thirds of the Members present in order to bring legislation to the Senate floor. This rule allows a minority of the Members to have veto power over the will of the majority. The Two-thirds Rule can prevent the majority from voting on legislation that is favored by their constituents. This rule also undermines the basic principle of the U.S. Constitution of majority rule. "The fundamental principle of our Constitution requires that the will of the majority shall prevail," President George Washington. The founders considered requiring a two-thirds majority to pass legislation in Congress but rejected the idea. James Madison explained in Federalist 58 that a two-thirds approval margin had been rejected because power would be transferred to the rule of the minority. Thomas Jefferson also said, "The will of the majority is the natural law of every society and is the only sure guardian of the rights of man." I will continue to fight to change the Two-thirds Rule in the Senate, known as the blocker bill, until the Senate one day reflects the basic principle of our Constitution.

I will never forget, on the floor of this Senate, at a time when Senator Gallegos may have been vulnerable to a challenger, John Whitmire stood here and said, if you take on Mario Gallegos, you take on me. Members, there is no more a loyal friendship than that. We should all be so lucky as to have a friend like John Whitmire. I'm honored today to present this resolution, and I'm grateful to call John Whitmire my friend. Thank you, Mr. President.

Senator Nelson: Thank you, Mr. President and Members. I was going to talk about the power corner, actually. Thank you, Mr. President, I rise in support of this resolution and to congratulate Senator Whitmire on your 40 years of service to your constituents, to our state, and as Dean, to Members of this Texas Senate. When John Whitmire was sworn in as a State Representative, Nixon was President, gasoline was 43 cents a gallon, and I was a sixth-grade teacher who never ever imagined serving in this body. When I joined the Senate, Senator Whitmire had already served exactly the number of years that I have served in the Texas Senate, and I'm the longest-serving Republican in this body. Now, he's the longest-serving Democrat, as you know. The Dean, sometimes, Mr. President, does call this his power corner, but, Dean, I thought that I should explain to everybody the real reason that I'm seated back here. When we chose where we were going to sit, it was believed that my background as a mother and as a teacher might help keep Senator Whitmire in line. It didn't work, although sometimes when he grabs the mic and he's very passionate, I still find myself reminding him to use appropriate language. Instead, it was Senator Whitmire who became a teacher to me. And this seating assignment would lead to a friendship so treasured that the entire Nelson clan considers Senator Whitmire a part of our family. Some of you had an opportunity to meet my dad when he was alive. He was a World War II veteran, and he loved to come down here and watch the Legislature. In one of my early years, I was really stressing over how to vote on an issue, and my dad said, You need to go ask Whitmire, he's got a good head on his shoulders. Now, coming from Dad that was the highest compliment that one could give. And most of you know that my house was broken into over the holidays. My grandson found out about it, and first thing he said to me, Senator, was, Did you call Senator Whitmire, because my grandson knows that nobody in this state knows more about criminal justice than Senator Whitmire. I get to listen to the conversations when Senator Whitmire comes on the floor with the pages back here. And he always makes it a point to ask them their name. He asks them where they went to school. He helps them appreciate the magnificence of this building and takes the time to really interact with them and make them feel welcomed. I've seen how wonderful he is with his smart, beautiful daughters, Whitney and Sarah. There is no prouder papa than Senator Whitmire. Now, sitting back here in the Dean's power corner, I have learned a lot about John Whitmire. I have certainly come to appreciate his sharp sense of humor, which is, it provides much-needed laugh therapy sometimes when things get real tough on those tough days. I've also had a close-up seat to some of the best and most passionate speeches I've ever heard on the floor of this Senate. He is a champion for those who don't have a lot of champions in their lives, for troubled youth and victims of crime and even members of the chain gang, Senator Whitmire. Now, from time to time, Senator Whitmire and I disagree. And when that happens, I often hear him utter my most favorite Whitmire-isms, and he'll lean over and he'll say, Senator, if you and I agree on everything, that means one of us is not representing our district. That's what makes John Whitmire the perfect Dean. He's a Democrat; I'm a Republican, He recognizes that we both love Texas and, like everyone on this floor, are here to make a difference. When Senator Whitmire speaks as the Dean, he speaks for this entire body. He loves this institution, and that's not just the Senators but all the staff who support us. And he knows, he respects our Senate's traditions. He knows that when we come

together and put our collective resolve into something, there is nothing we can't accomplish on behalf of the people of this state. Senator Whitmire, thank you for your service in this body. Thank you for your friendship, and thank you for your leadership as Dean of our Texas Senate.

Senator Hinojosa: Thank you, Mr. President and Members. I, too, rise to support this resolution recognizing the Dean of the Texas Senate. And I've known Dean Whitmire since the early '80s when I was in the House, and we both had hair at that time, Senator. And let me tell you, as Chairman of the Committee of Criminal Jurisprudence when I was on the House side, I relied and depended a lot on Senator Whitmire on many pieces of legislation to improve the criminal justice system. But I always admired Dean Whitmire because he was fearless, never afraid to speak his mind and take on, if necessary, those in charge. I will also tell you, Dean, that used to be Dean Carlos Truan, whom I replaced, they made you the Dean of the Senate. And I appreciate your leadership. Many times when we have issues among ourselves, it's really amazing to see Dean Whitmire work his magic in the Senate caucus in a bipartisan way to protect us, to protect this institution that we all love so much, and for that, I want to tell you, I'm very happy for you. I'm very honored to call you my friend, and they told me since I'm your personal lawyer, attorney-client privilege, I shouldn't say any more. Dean, congratulations.

Senator Patrick: Thank you, Mr. President. Thank you, Members, I'm looking at this photo in here, Senator, that top one. It looks like a young Chevy Chase or Johnny Carson, one of the two. I would never know it's the same person. I was thinking, 1972, you began, I graduated from college in 1972, and that's been a long time, 40 years ago. Quite a record, third longest-serving legislator in the history of this great state. I did an unofficial count, 45 Senators have come and gone since you first came to the Senate. Forty-five Senators, and they say life begins at 40, if that's true for a Senator, then you still have another 20 or 30 to go, and then you'll break the all-time record. I wanted to share a couple of quick things with you, Members. Those of you who were here in 2007, my first session, remember that John and I had some pretty feisty debates on the floor, in the spirit of good debate, never disrespectful, but feisty debates. And sometimes afterwards, I'd call him or he'd call me and we'd just say, Hey, it wasn't personal, protecting your point of view, protecting my point of view, bringing an issue forward. And slowly but surely, John and I began a friendship. Because as Senator Eltife said, he's our friend and not just our Dean and a fellow legislator. But to really have a friend, what's required is trust. You don't become a friend of someone until you trust them. And so, it takes time to develop that. And over time, we developed a trust. And in 2010, John, the summer of 2010, Grover Norwood, who's here with us, he came up to honor you with his wife. I got a call from a friend of mine, Grover Norwood, and many of you are familiar with Grover; you've seen the movie, The Heart of Texas, and Grover had discovered this incredible seminary program at a prison in Angola, a seminary that over 16 years had changed the character of the men behind those walls, where it went from the most dangerous federal, I mean, state prison in the United States, to the least dangerous. Crime had dropped dramatically and the common denominator was the seminary program, in the mind of the warden. So, Grover wanted me to do something about it. And I said, I'm just a Senator, what we need is the Chair of Criminal Justice. And I'm on that

committee, but he's the Chairman. So, I called John that day on the way home, and I said, Senator, there's this program, and I started telling him about the plan, and before I could finish the plan, I'll never forget your words, because I asked him if he would go there with me, over to Angola, and he said, Anything that will help the men and women behind bars and to help protect our employees behind bars, anything that will make our prisons better, I'm all in. And I didn't know John. I mean, it's a big commitment to go with me over to Louisiana, and we went over, Members, and spent two nights in prison. I won't tell the whole story, John, when he was short a toothbrush. We were sharing a cabin together, but we spent two, can you imagine John and I in the same cabin, in prison-headline: Whitmire and Patrick go to prison together-and without saying, we were both really impacted by what we saw. And we were there for the graduation of those lifers who were becoming pastors. And they asked John to speak, and he wasn't prepared. He didn't know they were going to ask him to speak, and, John, you got up on that stage and spoke to about 400 inmates and their families. It's the best speech I've ever heard you give because it was from the heart. And I can remember pretty much what you said word for word, you thought you had seen it all. And you said, I'm going to take this back to Texas. And there were no public tax dollars involved. We raised the money and within less than a year. which is lightning speed in the Legislature and in government, we opened through his leadership and his guidance and his commitment, we opened the first seminary in the history of Texas in a prison, and only the second in the United States. We've already had the first class of 40. We have another class of 40. And I sent John a newspaper article the other day, already this is having an impact on that prison, that crime against inmates is already down in that prison, in the first year. And I think, John, of all the things that you have done to represent the people in your district, as Senator Eltife said, and the people in this state, that your legacy will be that you were tough on crime. And your friends from the law enforcement are up in the gallery to honor you today, as well as many friends around the floor, if you haven't noticed. But it's the men and women behind bars, and there's no question we have some really bad people behind bars that shouldn't get out, and you know that, as well as all of us, but we also know that they're human beings behind bars who have made a mistake, and at some point in life, are going to get a second chance. And if we don't do something to change the character and the hearts of those men and women, when they get out they'll return to a life of crime. And so, you are just as committed to keeping the bad actors behind bars as you are to making sure that those behind bars who have paid the price get a second opportunity in life to be productive citizens. And that will change lives. I'll close with this. We did a banquet about five months ago to raise money for our seminary, and two people came up to me afterward, and they said, Senator, I want to thank you because my son is in that prison and my son is in that seminary program and for the first time in my life as a mother, I feel like my son has a chance at life. And that's the kind of thing that John Whitmire works on this floor. As Jefferson said, a difference of opinion is not necessarily a difference of principle. We all want the best for our state. We can disagree from time to time on politics, but we all want the best for our state. And it's an honor to serve with you, John, it's an honor to be your friend, it's an honor to have that trust that builds long-term friendships. So, it's a great honor to serve with you. Thank you.

Senator Uresti: Mr. President, Members, good afternoon. I proudly rise today in honor of my colleague and my friend, John Whitmire. And as has been said, for 40 years he has ably represented his Houston constituents in the Legislature, and in doing so has rendered great service for all the people of Texas. Now, it's no secret that when I first came over to the Senate, the Dean took me under his wing. The jury's still out as to whether or not that was a good thing or not, but the Dean is smart, he's articulate, he's hardworking, he's-John, I can't read your writing-is good looking. But seriously, as the longest-serving Member of this body, Dean Whitmire has emerged as the conscience and the soul of the Senate. He exhorts us to follow our hearts as he does, to pursue the best interest of those we serve as he does, and to be honest and forthright in all our endeavors as he is. And as Senator Eltife mentioned. what I appreciate the most about Dean Whitmire is how he reminds us to put a face on it. You know, it was 40 years ago this month that John first took his seat in the Texas House. I was 10 years old, and my good friend Senator Hegar was three years old and still in diapers, I think. Well, 40 years ago, Elvis Presley performed a concert in Hawaii that was watched by more people than the Apollo moon landings, and, apparently, Elvis influenced the Dean's love of dancing, hence his name, Boogie. In addition to that, the Miami Dolphins beat the Washington Redskins in Super Bowl VII, becoming the first and only team to complete an undefeated season. Perhaps that inspired the Dean to the pursuit of legislative perfection. But there was another event in January of 1973, that I believe had the greatest influence on his political plans. Ferdinand Marcos became president for life of the Philippines, and, as I understand it. he wants to be Dean for life of the Texas Senate. Now, keep in mind, back then there was no Facebook, there were no cellphones, and I don't think there was air conditioning when the Dean first took over. But, Dean, I want to congratulate you on a milestone, and, Whitney, I want to tell you that the thing that I admire the most about your dad is that in the most serious, the most difficult, and the most delicate matters that this Senate has dealt with, at least over the six years that I've been here, I've seen your father cut through all of that and bring a balance to that issue and make it seem like everything is going to be okay. Dean, congratulations. Thank you for being my mentor, and thank you for being my friend.

Senator Huffman: Thank you, Mr. President, thank you, and, Members. Dean, it's with great honor that I get to stand up here today and talk to you. And I really don't have any notes so I'm just going to talk from the heart here. When I was thinking about what I would say, I was thinking about what all the different Members might have been doing in 1973. And I had the same jokes, you know, Schwertner and Glenn were actually in diapers the first time you came. And I was the age that my son is now. I was in high school. So, I think about, as I look around at all the Members, and I think about all the experiences and all the life that we've all lived while you were here in the Capitol doing work for your constituents. So, we've all been to college, we've raised kids, and y'all have grandkids and gone to medical school and saved lives, Dr. Campbell, you know, we've done all kinds of things. But you were here taking care of the people's business. That puts you in such a unique position, and to me, it makes you part of the fabric of Texas. And you are really part of Texas lore now, and I'm convinced that you will be the longest-serving legislator someday. So, you'll always be in Texas history. And I would be willing to bet that someday, if we live long

enough and we come back to this Capitol, that there's a picture of you in this Chamber, because I think that you have made such an impact on all of us that you will need to be forever remembered in this Chamber, and I mean that. You have a way of connecting with people, and everyone in here, I bet, feels like you are their friend. And that's a very special gift to have. We all feel like you are so special to us. Now, Dr. Campbell, you will probably know him least than anyone in here, because everyone else new was House Members. But I promise you, I'd be willing to bet you that when this session is over, that you're going to look over at that Dean and you're going to look at him with great fondness. And you would've had your differences. I'm pretty much looking at the two of you, sure that there's going to be some disagreements in this coming session, but I guarantee you, when you leave this session, you will have respect for him and you will love him. And that's a special gift, Dean. I am so honored and privileged to serve with you as your Vice-chair in Criminal Justice. I publicly thank you for letting me serve because I suspect I probably wouldn't be there if you didn't want me there. And I think it says a lot about you that you were willing to let me serve as your Vice-chair with my background and being a woman. But you took me in and I learned a lot from you. And hopefully, I've helped you see a few things my way, I think so. And I think we make a great team. So, I honor you today. You're my friend, and you're just such a wonderful Dean, and we couldn't do any better. Thank you so much.

Senator Ellis: Thank you, Mr. President and Members. I, too, rise to speak in favor of this resolution. I think that I have the distinction of having served with you the longest, being from the Harris County area. To the new Members of the Senate, Dean Whitmire gave me some advice when I came here almost 23 years ago. He said, Freshmen ought to be seen and not heard. I have watched him over the years. I don't think John Whitmire was ever not heard. It is interesting to note how he came here. In 1972 I was coming out of high school. John was only a few years older because he was 22 years old when he came. But prior to that year, we elected people under the old at-large system. So, if you were running for a State Senate seat, it was somewhere in the neighborhood of the size of a congressional district at that time. And prior to them running in 1972, if you ran for a State Rep seat, it was pretty close to what a congressional seat would be as well. Because of the Voting Rights Act, John Whitmire and a whole crew of people who never would have had an opportunity to serve in this building on either side had a chance to come. Because that legislation really created the system that broke away from that old at-large system of electing people. And although in a lot of ways it was intended to help the minorities in particular to be in power, John, you have never forgotten that it was that process that brought you here. I can remember your first time running for the State Senate. It was a tough race. I can't remember his name, but you had a very wealthy businessperson who self-funded that campaign. But you put shoe leather into that campaign. When I look at the pictures in the brochure, I notice Craig Washington there, and you all looked pretty good back then. I must say, you look better now than you did back when the picture was taken, but you and Craig were very close allies. And that was really how I started a relationship with you when I came here. The bio talks about all of the stuff you've done in the criminal justice area, and you have done a lot. Dan pointed out that you've been very tough on crime, but you've also been smart on crime. Everybody knows

that we incarcerate a higher percentage of people than most of the states in the country here in Texas. You've done a lot to make us much smarter on what we do in our criminal justice system. Couple of things had really struck me watching you over the years. I had a bill some years ago that essentially would've made it a bit more difficult to lock people up as opposed to giving them a second chance with certain conditions and giving them treatment. There was a young woman that testified before that committee. You singled her out. You saw something in her testimony. You saw something in her heart, and you offered that young woman a job, and she still works for you today. In the last session of the Legislature, we had a guy out of Dallas, Cornelius Dupree, who spent a record of maybe 27, 29 years in prison for a crime he didn't commit. I had him here testifying on a bill to increase the compensation for people who were wrongfully convicted and clear up some issues, a bill that Senator Duncan was the lead sponsor on. You found out this young man was still having to report to his probation officer, waiting for the paperwork to be completed so he would truly be exonerated. And while we were making points on the bill, you picked up the telephone quietly, called the probation department, I'm sure, said a few things that were in a certain vernacular that they could understand how sensitive the issue was to you, and by the end of that hearing, they testified, and that young man was off his papers. You made a difference in this body. Somebody said they wouldn't be surprised if at some point there's a picture up of you in this building 50 years from now. I wouldn't be surprised if you're still here 50 years from now. You've been a friend to all of us, and I'm glad that over the years you didn't opt to go somewhere else. Obviously, there were opportunities where you could've run for Congress. From looking at the war chest that I go through every once in a while, there are a lot of opportunities that you could've had and still have to run for the office. But, you choose to be here in the Texas Senate because you love this body and you love the work that you do. And for that, my friend, we're all very appreciative that you opted to stay here all 40 years and wish you God's grace to serve for many more. Thank you.

Senator Deuell: President, Members, I want to iterate what my colleagues have talked about, and that is the friendship that you've shown all of us. I came in 10 years ago and nobody knew me very well. I think you had even said you expected horns, but you extended a friendship and a respect to me and to my office, and I deeply appreciate that. I remember the first caucus meeting that we had and you used the term, protect the body. I really didn't know what that meant at the time, being new to the process, and I've come to deep appreciation for the fact that you want the Texas Senate to function in a dignified and honorable way so that we can do the people's business, and that's irrespective of the philosophical differences that we might have. You know that it's important that this body function in a way that honors the people of Texas that put us here, and that's something that perhaps is not appreciated by all Members, or certainly the people that work here, and perhaps not knowing very much of other people throughout the state. There's talk about term limits, and some people advocate them Personally, you would be one that maybe comes to mind, but I can't imagine what this state would be like without your guidance in criminal justice issues. I think you had testimony here today about that and the effect, and I think the people make that decision about how long somebody serves. I think the people in your

district that continue to make a wise decision, and none of us really know how much longer we'll be here, but I look forward to serving with you in the years to come, and working with the issues that are important to you and your district, to me and my district, and all the people of Texas. Thank you for your service. Thank you for your friendship. Let's go get 'em. Thank you, Mr. President.

Senator Seliger: Members, ladies and gentlemen, with a nickname like the Dean's, I know people are thinking that sometime this afternoon comes the 10 minutes of humor. But that's not what this afternoon is about. In fact, this afternoon is not about what the publication says because it's not about 40 years of tenure. It's about 40 years of service, 40 years of conscience, 40 years of serving the people of the district and the State of Texas. In one of the publications that recognized Dean Whitmire as one of the best, there are qualities I think you'll agree that don't just describe the best performance during a Legislature, but a best performance in the tradition of the Texas Senate. It was said about Dean Whitmire that he is the reliable anchor that kept the Senate from drifting off into partisan storms. As he has often pointed out, there is a time for partisanship, but it is never, never justification not to work together and to respect one another. In another quote it said that the Dean at some point cautioned the Members about legislation that would harm solidarity in the body later. Our disagreements today must not keep us from working together and for the people of the State of Texas in the future. And finally, he argued one day against practices that would harm decorum, because at the end of the day, we must justify the respect the people of Texas should have for their legislative bodies. In 2004, when I first came into the Senate, my first committee assignment was to be the Vice-chairman of the Criminal Justice Committee. And I argued with the President then, I said, You don't remember, I think, that I'm the new guy, that I am thirty-first in seniority out of 31 and the Chairman of our committee will be our senior Member, surely that's too much of a labor for him. I will be the junior Republican in the party, and he is the senior Democrat, is that really what's best? I was so persuasive in fact, I spent the next six years as a Vice-chairman of the Criminal Justice Committee. And from the very first day I sat to the left of John Whitmire, my legislative priorities were important to him. my contribution was important to him. It was the very example of mentorship, leadership, and friendship. It means a lot and it's a tremendous example. Senator Huffman talked about the portraits around this room, and if you will look at them and think for a moment, none of them served in the Legislature as long as John Whitmire. While it's subjective judgment, I suspect that we would say, nobody cared more in this room and nobody was more committed to serving the people of the State of Texas than John Whitmire. It is my fondest hope that someday my grandchildren will be in this room with their children and there will be a portrait of John Whitmire. Unlike all of these poses here, there must be in that portrait the wry smile that describes John Whitmire. And I hope what my grandchildren tell their children is our grandfather served with John Whitmire, and he was a friend of John Whitmire, and that's a good thing in this body and in the State of Texas. About the same time that John Whitmire was elected to the Legislature, Aristotle said this: Dignity does not consist in possessing honors but in deserving them. I hope that I, and we, deserve the honor to serve here during the tenure of John Whitmire. Thank you for your service and your friendship.

Senator Fraser: John, I'm honored to rise on this great occasion, but somebody's made a terrible mistake here. Every year, you and I celebrate our birthday together. It's well-known that you were born three days after me. They're trying to recognize you for 40 years of service, and you and I are only 40 years old. How could that possibly be? I am extremely honored to be able to talk about one of my extremely good friends in the Senate and maybe my best friend in the Senate. We've got a lot of history. I'm sitting here listening to the conversations everyone are making. When I started this adventure back in 1988, even though that was 25 years ago, John had already been here 15 years then. Pretty amazing. I think about my time in the Senate. I get to thinking, I've been here awhile, but then I think about how long John's been here, that's almost twice as long as that, and the things he's done, he's achieved. John and I have had the good fortune of being friends for a long time. We didn't start out that way. We were, actually battled pretty good the first few days we were, in the first couple of years in the Senate. But as we started to spending time together, not only here, back having lunch, late nights discussing things, traveling together, golf games, we actually realized that it was amazing the common things that had happened in our lives growing up and the common background, the things that we had in common. And I've been very honored to be able to call him my friend. Back in 2001, John was getting a lot of seniority, and he had moved over in the corner of the building, and he allowed me to move in next to him as a suitemate. But you had to get his blessing, and I got the blessing, and he allowed me to move in on the first floor in the top corner of the building. Everything went well for a while, but after I had been there for a matter of months, he realized that I had a habit that really bothered him a lot, that I liked to have fajitas delivered to my office for lunch at least once a week. After it happened several times. John came up to me and he said, Fraser, the office stinks. It's terrible. Every time I walk in there, all I smell is onions in the office. So, we went back and forth, and it wasn't but a few days later, I came to my desk and opened up the drawer of my desk, and there was a bag of onions in my desk. Little did he know, by the time he got back to his office, there was a five-pound bag of onions in his desk. And we started a war going back and forth called the Fraser-Whitmire onion war. And that war continues today. I moved out of that corner of the Capitol. I didn't move, my staff moved. They moved me to the other corner. And it's really bothered me because I'm not sure how Whitmire is going to be able to live with not being able to smell onions over in that corner of the Capitol. And unfortunately, we're transferring that to Senator Zaffirini, and she's already warned me not to do that, but we'll discuss that one further. But, John, I wanted to make sure that you didn't forget me and the onion wars, and if you will open up your desk, the middle desk, there's a little present there to make sure you remember me. That's been there for a while, so that you will make sure you don't miss me from being your suitemate. John, I appreciated your comments, and I think the freshmen probably right now are not realizing how much they're going to appreciate the Dean by the end of the session. John Whitmire is, you know, we all have to vote our district, there are some partisan votes, but there's amazingly few partisan votes, and you're going to find out the tradition of the Senate and the fact that he's making sure he's covering you and taking care of you as a Senator. I think a lot of these freshmen, you don't realize yet how much you're going to appreciate the way that John runs the Senate and how he takes care of you as a Senator. And I can almost bet by the end of the session, you'll walk over to him and you'll say, thank you for what you do for me. He's done a fabulous job, done a great job for his constituents. He's done a wonderful job for criminal justice. John, I'm honored to be your friend, and I'm assuming both of us are going to be around for a while longer and we will fight not only the battles on the floor but also on the golf course, and I'm honored to be your friend. Thank you.

Senator Hegar: Thank you, Mr. President, Members. The first thing I would have to mention is, I do stand to support this resolution that Senator Eltife, as you walk away, you made a mistake. I would agree the Dean listens to all sides, but I have a strong case of ADD, all y'all can youch to that. My attention span is only so long. His is not long at all. So, you need to put in there, he listens to all sides, but only for a short while, because his attention span is not long enough to get the whole conversation. You got to get in about five words or less. And if you can say it in that, he's listening to you. But with all seriousness, Senator Whitmire is someone who does listen to all sides as long as you can say it in just a few words or less. And I'm glad to know, Senator Fraser, I've always wondered why his desk stinks so bad. I do not like onions and now I know. We'll know to get the Sergeants to clean your desk. Senator Whitmire, as I was sitting here earlier listening to our colleagues talk about different things about yourself and their appreciation for your friendship, for your love for this body, for your desire to do what is in the importance of your constituents and the people of the State of Texas, I was thinking about how today, in part, the difference between the two bodies. And, Members, many of you've served in the House, some of us haven't, the fact is, is we do things different in the House and the Senate. As I talk to new Members coming in, when they say, Can you tell me about the differences between the two Chambers? And I always like to say, Let me tell you about the similarities. Well, what are those? We both get \$600 a month and that's about it. They're different in everything else. But as I stand here thinking, the House debated for how long today on your rules? Yet, we took a whole couple of minutes on the Senate floor, and our rules are just as important as theirs. But in part of that why, that comes from leadership and that comes from the body learning to work together to understand that we're here to do the people's business, and in part, I think that's because of your leadership as Dean. And I say thank you for that. John, if nothing else, I didn't come here planning to talk, but I figured I had to stand up because I know it's just got to be eating you, listening to all of us talking and you have no rebuttal whatsoever. So, if nothing else, I hope every Member stands up and talks because that's driving him just a little nuts, having to sit there in that chair. But I would say, Dean, I did notice this picture that Senator Patrick pointed out. And you do look good at that top picture. And to tell you how much things have changed, it's amazing. Is that actually an ashtray that's right there on the front mic? That's amazing what things have changed over the course of the years that you've been here. But I would say nothing else, thank you for time and dedication in support of the Members in this body, the integrity, and making sure that we do the people's business, and I would also share all of our colleagues' comments that you are somebody that I would consider an absolute friend. And I know, number one, I appreciate when all of our colleagues, when my wife or three little kids are around here, everybody treats them with grace and respect. And you've been the utmost of that. My wife and I drove up

here today for, she drove with me, and we were in part, talking about that, how, as she passed you the other day and took a second, double look and said, Oh, you don't have the three ducklings with you, so I didn't recognize you at first. But you always do when you take that time, because it's about family. And I appreciate that. So, thank you for your service, thank you for your friendship. And wow, 40 more years, that would be amazing. I can't do it for 40 years. It's amazing that you could stay here that long. Congratulations, Dean.

Senator Watson: Thank you, Mr. President. Dean, I'm going to keep this short and sweet. I can't say it better than so many of our colleagues have already said it. I will point out, when I listen to Senator Nelson talk about the power corner, Senator Campbell, my first session, I sat where you sit, and one of the things I learned about the power corner is that it never quiets. It's always talking. It's almost like going to a baseball game and listening to the chatter when they're trying to strike out the batter and they just keep talking. It's just a constant commentary about, well, sometimes it even has something to do with what we're doing on the Senate floor, but rarely. And apparently, Senator Whitmire first joined the Senate, I don't know the exact facts, but he apparently first joined the Senate before we had electricity because he has no need for the microphone. In my first session, I'll never forget sitting there, and anytime that he wanted my attention, he would just bark out, Watson, and expect me to turn around and show back up. And I thought, I need to move. And you will notice, I moved about as far away as I could move. And yet, last session, I was sitting at my desk reading, minding my own business, and I hear, Kirk, Kirk. And I think, is he really yelling at me all the way from his chair? And I look, and sure enough, he was standing on his tiptoes, looking over at me, wanting my attention. It's constant. The chatter is constant. Dean, I just want to say this. Among all the things that's been said, I want to reiterate, you are perhaps one of the most instinctive political figures I've ever had the pleasure of being around. You're smart, you care deeply, and I think that instinct comes from that deep care about people. When you stop and think about 40 years, and you try to put, as you say, a face on it, and you try to think about the number of faces, the number of people that you've touched or that you've helped or you've made their lives a little better, there's not a person in public service today that shouldn't aspire to that sort of record. You, as it's been indicated by your colleagues, you help make this place special. You help make service here more meaningful. And I want to stand and share the thought with those who have said that it's an honor to serve with you because, indeed, it's a great honor. Thank you, Dean, for all you do.

Senator Van de Putte: Thank you, Mr. President and Members. My apologies for not rising to speak on this resolution, but I greatly appreciate the opportunity to add my voice. Dean, you have heard the comments of so many colleagues and how much they cherish you and they respect you. What I'd like to comment today is something maybe that has not been touched upon. And that is your ability to cherish and choose your friends. I've known you for 22 years. At the time that I was first in the House, and you may not remember that over the probably hundreds and hundreds of bills that you have authored and sponsored, but as a little bitty, itty House freshman in 1991, I had a very important bill, at least, we all think our bills are important, and it had to do with the ability of us to prevent childhood poisonings and the poison control bill. When that bill came over, it wasn't necessarily in your committee, but you had an

interest, and you may not remember it at the time because of the thousands and thousands of constituents that have called your office over the course of your service, but there was a young mother who had lost her 18-month-old because she didn't understand and didn't know who to call about when her child ingested something. And you were such a champion on that, not just because of what the statistics showed or because we had a method of finance, but because it touched a child in your district and one of your constituents. The number of measures that you have done in this body because someone called your office, you pick up the phone, you try to find a remedy, and, if it is systemic, you bring it to the Capitol. That takes an uncanny ability. Your ability not only to choose your friends, as you see here, but, Dean, all of us in the Capitol respect the way that you have the wonderful ability to choose great staff. Over the years, your office has been the center of some of the brightest and best and hardworking staff people. At your district office and, certainly, in this pink dome, and that is that the 22 years I have known you, that your staff has been known to know the issues, they develop it, and I know partly that it is how you like to surround yourself with people who are sometimes smarter than you are. But you treasure that. On a personal note, the only time I've ever seen you in agony isn't exactly when this Chamber was going to be in a meltdown or when a piece of legislation that you really cared for wasn't going through or your inability to stop a piece of legislation or policy that you thought hurt this state. The time I saw you in complete agony was at the bedside of your dearest friend, Mario Gallegos. I saw a man who knew that the end was near, and as you comforted Mario's family and those of us there, I know that it was difficult for you because you were losing your best friend. Thank you for giving our friend Mario the opportunity to correct his life and to bring him to sobriety and to bring him to be able to have that first transplant for another five and a half years so that he could serve in the State of Texas. It takes a great friend to help another friend confront their demons, and I watched you do so with grace. I know that if Mario were here today, he'd be the loudest one in thanking you. And I want to thank you today on his behalf. Tomorrow we will be able to honor him, but I could not let this day go without realizing your greatest asset, and that's to never give up on someone even when they've given up on themselves. I know that you love this body, and partly, I think you and I have shared that love of sports and the competition. You like the rules to be fair and you like a good game. Even if your team doesn't win, you like a good game, and you and I have watched football games, baseball games, and basketball games. I'll close with this, and that is that you and I were sitting at one of the many Rockets-Spurs battles, I think it was playoff series, and, yes, we probably snuck away from the Capitol to either go to Houston or San Antonio to watch that. And as we were sitting together, I commented that the Spurs were given a call, but it was a makeup call, and the Dean turned to me and he said, Leticia, you really know basketball, you know your sports. And I said, I love sports, but that makeup call was like you voting for my bill yesterday, after you told me you were not going to vote for it, but you did because you fought me on a matter earlier in the day. Thank you for recognizing that, that you can help people in this body with what they believe is important. Maybe that your love of sports and competition is just the perfect simile for this Senate Chamber except that we're not compensated very well. You love the challenge. You love a good fight, but you like it to be fair. And you do your darndest

to make sure that all of our fights or disagreements are fair. Thank you for putting out the fires sometimes, and thank you for your diligence on preventing this body from going into meltdown. So, maybe I should call you the Ice Man, like the great legendary Spurs player, because under pressure you keep cool, and you're always on track. Thank you, and may God bless you and your family for many more years of health and success. Thank you, Dean.

Senator Lucio: Thank you, Mr. President. Dean, you and I have been colleagues for 26 years now, four years in the House that I served, and 22 years here. Many incredible things have happened over those years, and looking back, you've been right in the middle of all of those great things that have happened to our great state. I do have to look back, though, and I have to share a moment in time, a time where, 1993 when Senator West and Senator Shapiro and a few others came on board. We were at the Clements building, and they were redoing the State Capitol here, Wendy, and Governor Bullock saw fit to make sure people sat where he wanted them to sit. And the unfortunate thing for me and the late Frank Madla, he sat us right in front of John Whitmire, I mean, smack in front. Now I know why Kirk Watson sits completely the furthest away from him. But for a whole session, we heard loud things, constant things. Frank and I took off our hearing aids thinking it would be a better way of life for us, and it got worse because he just raised the level of his voice. It was a tough session having to sit there in front of the Dean, and, quite frankly, Frank and I were really never in our chairs, we tried to stay away and talk to the Members away from our chairs because he talked so much. But we got things done and, quite frankly, at that point, the Dean served as someone that we could turn to and ask support from. I got a little uptight a little while ago when I heard Senator Fraser talk a little bit about golf. I thought he was going to say that John was the biggest cheater we ever played golf with, but he didn't. Thank God he didn't, but I'll say it. I've questioned a few of the things he's done, but anyway, he's the only one that was able to beat Buster Brown without warming up when we went out to play golf once in a while, in the old days when we had time for golf. We don't anymore. I think in looking back over the last 22 years in the Senate especially, I think most meaningful for me, Dean, has been the fellowship meetings that we've been able to sit down and come together. Democrats, Republicans, sitting down and sharing with one another and trying to find a way of making sure that this body functions the way it was intended to function: one for all and all for one in behalf of the people of this great state. I want to congratulate you, and I know there's so many other things that we could probably say. You're just a very lucky guy that all those Senators that have come before you are gone and they're not here to, they would've reflect back on their experiences with you as well. But the new ones will soon find out what you're all about, John, and I'm looking forward to a great session with each and every one of you. Thank you, Mr. President.

Senator West: Thank you very much, Mr. President. And, John, I'm not going to be long, but I can recall back in 1993, as Senator Lucio was talking, I'd heard of John Whitmire but had never met him. And the first time I saw you, you were walking down the halls of Clements with a toothpick in your mouth. I said, He's a good guy. And you haven't changed much either. When you start thinking about John Whitmire, I could go and pretty much say some of the same things everyone else has said. Here's

the summation of the argument in terms of John Whitmire. You are a good man. Now, just think about that. Everyone on this floor has said that John Whitmire is a good man. Well, what have they said? They've said that we, each of us have been able to come to you in different moments within our legislative careers and talk to you, confide in you, even though it may very well get out a couple of days later, but we confided in you anyway. Think about this. You remember years, several sessions ago when we got ready, Mr. President, to give seconding speeches to our Senate Pro Tempore and we decided and said, well, you know, let's cut down the speeches and let's give a few. On this day, most of the Members of this body are talking about their relationship with you as a good man. You think about the institutional knowledge that you continue to share with us. You think about your demeanor, yep, all of it. Now check this out, for the new Members, you watch and see when he gets ready to get up and debate, okay. You'll see what we're talking about. When we get ready to debate with you all, we start off in a very civil tone, then all of a sudden John Whitmire does all that. But it shows the passion that you bring. You are a good father, says a lot. You're a good parent. And that's, the testament of it is that your daughter's sitting right there with you. That's incredible. You are a great statesman, as evident by your tenure in this body, and the respect that each and every one of us has for you. When we don't always agree, and that's fine, but the reality is that you want to make certain that this body is respected and that whatever political, partisan issues that we have, it's okay to have those things, but we've got to put the best interests of this body above all of that. You are a friend to Patsy Spaw, the Secretary of the Senate, Lieutenant Governor, and many of the staff persons that are around here. You've been serving in this body, when did the Vietnam War, was it 1973 when the Vietnam War was over with? You've been serving ever since that happened. Secretariat. You've been serving a long time. Boogie, boogie fever. Many of us even call you Boogie. Boogie night. It just goes to show you exactly how we feel about you. And here's the other piece that many of you that are just coming to the body, or on the outside, don't know. Even when we leave our work here at the Senate, you would think that most of us don't want to be associated with another outside after we leave work, but that's not the case with this Senate. You will find us down at the Austin Club watching basketball games together. You will find us in different spots together in this city. You will have John Whitmire, Craig, calling us at 10:00 or 10:30, and say, Where are you? Come on down here and join us. And people will get out of their beds and come and join Senator John Whitmire. So, my friend, yes, I said friend, he's a good friend also, you're a great statesman. You're a good man. I consider you a friend. You're a good parent. What more could we ask of a Member of this body?

Senator Nichols: Thank you, Mr. President. I also rise in support of this resolution. The, in the spirit of some of us, something Senator Hegar said, I promised to keep my comments short, because I know you will appreciate that. Related to one of the things Senator Watson said, I agree with him, this is a pretty noisy corner back here. I cannot tell all of you in the audience how many most interesting stories I have heard over the last six years in this corner. Mr. President, I know you try to keep order, or you do keep order in the house, but I recognize, we all recognize you've kind of given up on this corner a long time ago, I think, as far as the noise level. But, and also something else Senator Eltife said a while ago, one of the things about putting, your

comments always put a face on things. I also remember one of the things I think about often on the floor when we get into some issue, when you stand up and say, Members. you really need to stop and think about this. I remember numerous times in my six years you've said, stood up and said that, and I can tell you from this desk that's like a big yellow flag rising high. And what you're thinking about is not only the impact of what happens here in this Chamber but the impact of the people of this state. I have really first met you almost 16 years ago in a different capacity. I served for eight years. I've worked some with you. For the past six years, I've worked closer with you. Every time I've ever asked you, would you give me the time to talk about something, in every case you always did. For that I thank you. I will also say in the last two years, particularly, last 18 months working on Sunset, I've probably had more time to work closely with you on a lot of serious issues that we deal with at Sunset, and in every case I think it's very important for the people of this state to know that every decision you made that I heard, even in confidence, was always what is best for the State of Texas. For that I thank you. For being a friend, I thank you. And for your 40 years of service of the State of Texas, I also thank you.

Senator Davis: Thank you, Mr. Chair. I proudly rise to speak today on behalf of our friend, Dean Whitmire. Dean, I want to tell you that you exemplify a lesson, my favorite lesson that I learned when I was in law school. I took a class called the Warren Court, and for those of us who became lawyers, via law school we know that most of our classes are our precedent-building lessons. You learn how the law shapes and develops over time, but you hardly ever ask about the people who were behind it, who shaped it. One particular class that I took was called the Warren Court and our professor had one message for us to consider throughout that semester in that class, and that was to think about the nine Anglo men who made a decision to desegregate our public school system in the United States. And he asked us to read biographies or autobiographies on every one of the Justices of the Supreme Court and to consider what it was about each of them, their unique experiences in their lives that made them able to consider and to represent the perspective of people whose shoes they'd never walked in. When I think about you and your leadership on the Senate floor, I'm reminded of that lesson. Many might look at you and think you aren't capable of considering what it might be like to walk in other people's shoes. But somehow, when you started here at only 22 years of age, you brought with you the ability to do that. I hope one day you will write a book about your 40 years here, but I also hope that you'll talk about what it is in your life experiences that brought you to be able to talk on behalf of people whose experiences you've never shared. I've only been here for two sessions, and I've heard you give some of the most inspiring speeches on this floor, and always, your most inspirational speeches revolve around talking on behalf of people whose life experiences you personally do not know. Whether it was in voter ID debate or sanctuary city but, very particularly, I want you to know how much I appreciate the way you've spoken on behalf of women. We all like to tease about your love of women, but I know that you truly do love women because of the representation that you've given, not only to women in your district but women throughout the State of Texas. In the last few sessions, you helped us to pass some very important pieces of legislation, and I want you to know how much I personally appreciate your assistance on the women's shackling bill, on the rape kit bill. And

most importantly of all, I want you to know how much I appreciated the speech that you gave on this floor on behalf of a woman's perspective from your office when we debated the sonogram bill. It was powerful. You have clearly demonstrated that you hear women's voices, Senator Fraser. And I want you to know how much I appreciate working with you and how much I've learned from watching you and hope to learn for many more years to come with you on the Senate floor. Thank you, Dean.

Senator Rodríguez: Thank you, Mr. President and Members. I rise in support of the resolution. I want to tell my freshmen colleagues here, see, I'm still talking like a freshman here, my first session about John Whitmire. When I first ran for this position, I had been elected in the primary, but I still had an opponent in November. And I happened to be in Austin in one of those many receptions that we all know about, and Senator Whitmire, afterwards, surprised me by inviting me to go out to dinner with him and some other folks, and of course, I was in awe of the fact that this is the Dean of a Senate. I hardly know the man and he's invited me to join him and some of his friends at one of our local watering holes here, good restaurant, watering hole. And I'll never forget that because it made me feel that I was a person that would be welcomed if I would be elected in November here in the Senate. So, I want to thank you for that, I've never forgotten that. And I also want to thank you for relentlessly grilling me on the legal services bill, as I recall. That was one grilling that I still haven't gotten over, as a matter of fact. And especially since you had let me know, kind of like what, I think, Senator Van de Putte or somebody said, you had indicated you were against the measure, but you ended up, despite all that relentless grilling, voting for it. And so, I thank you for that. I learned something from you in that regard. And I also want to thank you for, as a freshman, I guess after listening to some folks here, allowing me to be heard and not to be seen, because just last week you were reminding me that freshmen, he was telling me this, colleagues, that freshmen should be heard and not seen. But he didn't say that to me, as I recall, during my freshman session. And consequently, I think I overdid it, if I'm not mistaken, my colleagues here would agree, in speaking out. And I have to tell you that, as Senator Davis said, I have the utmost respect for your ability to convey sentiments and feelings and the message on public policy issues that we deal with here, especially to be able to do that when you've been out in one of your famous or infamous all-nighters. I'm going to call it an all-nighter because there was not one time that you and some of your colleagues invited me to one of those, and I remember being out late and the first place, the next morning, realizing that I can't keep doing this. I just am not up to it. But in the second place, realizing when you were here making that speech on the sonogram bill that despite your being out with us all that time, that you could get on the floor and deliver the kind of speech that Senator Davis was referring to, just was amazing to me. And I recall, distinctly, telling my wife of how tremendously impressed I was in your ability to speak so forcefully, knowing that you had been out all night, and probably not that much preparation for it. So, thank you for all of that, Dean. I want to thank you for your service to the State of Texas. As county attorney, I handled a lot of juvenile cases over 17 years, and you taking a very strong lead in those issues, and I believe a lot of young people in this state, and the

public at large, the taxpayers, have a debt of gratitude to you because of, as somebody put it, your smart approach to crime and trying to actually change people's lives in the process. So, thank you for your service, Dean, and I appreciate your friendship.

Senator Duncan: Thank you, Mr. President and Members. I didn't intend to be last, just changed my mind a couple of times about when I was going to talk. But, well, John, you're the master of the metaphor, and I think this Senate knows it. You are probably one of the most effective persons in debating a bill and also controlling the flow of what goes on on this floor. I served with you on Finance for, I guess, 10, 12 years now, and he's formidable on Finance, so formidable that I've had to change the names of some of my good programs just so that he won't recognize them. You don't want him to put a face on the boll weevil bill. So, we changed the boll weevil bill to integrated pest management. And I got so tired of hearing John gripe about the brush control program that we changed that to urban stream flow enhancement, and we never hear about it anymore. But, John, I think from what you've heard today, you've set the standard for the Dean of the Senate. And those that follow you will have very big shoes to fill, but I believe, as we've heard today, the standard has been set. So, thank you for doing that, and thank you for being our leader from the position you sit over there.

Senator Whitmire: I say to, certainly, the new Members, knowing when to speak and when not to speak is real key to be an effective Member. And I'm going to violate that because I probably should say thank you and sit down, but I'm not going to because I thought I generally knew what goes on on this Senate floor, and I'm totally taken back. When's the last time I wore a sport jacket and sports pants? I must say something, though. First of all, Senator Campbell, I could not have done what I've done the last 40 years without divine intervention. To knock on doors, as a 22-year-old college student, be elected with George McGovern on the ballot in 1972 took something spiritual. And I haven't forgotten that because I go about my work knowing that I'm placed here for a special purpose. And simply put, if you treat people like you want to be treated, it will work. And I'm also reminded, my mother said, You're known by the company you keep, and she'd be very proud of me today with the company that I'm keeping. I must thank my parents who gave me my values, gave me an opportunity, even though they divorced when I was seven. One took me to Hill County and I lived in a rural setting, so I had rural values, Senator Nichols. And then crying, against their wishes, we went back to Houston as a ninth-grader, so I got big city opportunities. So, I honestly have to thank my parents. And another thing I also remember as I go about my work, that I would hope that you would remember, is that you don't get anywhere without the help of others. Didn't have a lot of help in that first campaign, but I did have help, and I've had help every step of the way. My daughters, honestly, have been my strength, my staff, and I've been very blessed. But what I really stood up for today is to talk about this institution and the people that sit here with me, those before me but, most importantly, those that are going to share responsibilities this spring. Yes, I've had some accomplishments, and, John, I listened to you. While I was doing this, y'all were going to school. I had one Senator one time, Senator Shapleigh was kind of fussing at me about something. I said, Shapleigh, don't try to explain that to me, you were in the eighth grade when I was taking care of that community. But also, know that while I was here, you were busy preparing yourself

and also fulfilling other obligations. And I stand here to let people know, as has been enumerated in my life, most of what we do, people don't even read about, don't even know about, scores of accomplishments where you have made people's difference in your communities. And, Senator Birdwell, I heard what they said about me, but let me just salute you. What you've done for our country and your suffering and your pain and your strength and to be a survivor, I could never compare with your accomplishment. And I would actually honor this gentleman, as I stand here before you, you're a miracle, and divine intervention is present with you there. I can look at my good friend, Juan Hinojosa, Vietnam survivor. Many folks, fifty-some-odd thousand, Senator Hinojosa, did not return. And I could go further and talk about you being deported with your migrant undocumented mother. I could never compare to your standards of survival. And I can go through this floor and talk about the success stories and the heroes, our Lieutenant Governor having served his country in our service. So, let me just say, thank you. I think I'm here for a reason. I hope the best is yet to come. I want to thank everyone, Lara Wendler and others that chose to do this, I would've voted against it. In fact, I'm going to take a new view of the resolutions that we bring to the floor. I have fussed on many occasions that we spend too much time on resolutions, but, you know, you have to be flexible in this business and be willing to compromise. In closing, thank you for allowing this special day. I'm committed to you, this body. And I will close by saying, the way you can really honor me on this day is to commit ourselves to the very, very best session that we can have and leave the politics and the partisanship at the hall. I understand we have to get elected. We have to be members of a party to get elected, but certainly, we all, and we got off to such a great start last week, to pass the rules 27 to nothing. I told the Lieutenant Governor after that meeting, I said, Governor, there's some really good chemistry in our caucus, people are really ready to deal with the people's business. We'll disagree, but we can do it without being disagreeable. Thank you for allowing this very special day for me and my family. Mr. President, thank you for allowing us to do this. Thank you, Members.

REMARKS ORDERED PRINTED

On motion of Senator Whitmire and by unanimous consent, the remarks by Senators Whitmire, Deuell, Lucio, and Van de Putte regarding **SR 11** were ordered reduced to writing and printed in the *Senate Journal* as follows:

Senator Whitmire: Thank you, Mr. President and Members, I guess, first let me say. I wish Mario was hanging with me. We all had a lot of fun last night and Mario was missed. Mario is definitely, as you know, a soulmate of mine. But let everyone that can hear my voice know that the entire Senate membership is a family. We meet, we consult, we live, we laugh, we cry together, so we have, literally, lost a family member. Theresa, you're in his chair. The fine Dr. Deuell, representing this body when we were sworn in last week, chose to not take the seat that now, by his seniority. allows him to take. What a testimony to this recognition that Mario is still present on the Senate floor. I know I speak for each of the Senators in this body, also, Armando Walle, State Representative, one of Mario's State Reps, Ana Hernandez Luna. Carol Alvarado, which is so well documented, State Representative, was so close to Mario. and he has high hopes for her. You know, I decided this morning when I was traveling to the Capitol, Theresa, I'm not going to shed any more tears for Mario. Let me just set the tone right now. We had great services for Mario, one of the most beautiful memorial services here in Houston. In the burial service, the young priest made an impact on my life through Mario's service. He said, our life is a book and the final chapter is not written until they have a service for us. Really made an impact, Theresa, that young priest let us all know that life is so uncertain and short. So, Mario continues to impact all of us. And let me just stop and recognize, because Mario would want me to do it, there's 90 seniors from his district present here, from Representative Hernandez's district and Mario's constituents. Y'all please honor Mario by standing and letting him know that, of your presence today. The seniors from his district, would you please rise? Thank you. I know how often Mario, y'all rise, rise and let us honor you. Thank y'all. And you honor Mario by your presence and you honor us. Like I said, I'm not shedding any more tears. At the graveside, I couldn't stand to hear the fire bells that were sounded to let other firefighters know that one of their colleagues had been lost. But this is definitely a celebration. And let me spend a couple of moments and tell you why we're celebrating. What a unique and special person, and everyone is unique and special in this body, but Mario takes first prize. He could make you laugh so hard, Jane, and he could also make you so mad.

because none of us are perfect, and Mario was the first to say that he wasn't perfect. But I can't tell you how proud he was when he went back to U of H in the mid-nineties as a Senator and got his degree. He wore that Cougar ring so proud. I could just go on and on and talk about what a special person he was, and I will emphasize, and I still need some help. Theresa, you be the deciding vote. I would love to know if Mario, if the Lord said, Mario, you can be a firefighter. Now, let me give you his background why he was so proud to be a firefighter. Can you imagine being the son of Houston's, one of the very first Hispanic firefighters? He grew up to be a firefighter, joined straight out of high school at 18. And you ought to hear some of his stories when he was on an ambulance run and who they would pick up and take back to the station, and I won't divulge, but once or twice, our confidential conversations, but they had fun. He wanted to be a firefighter because he grew up to be a firefighter whose father later went to Brownsville, Eddie Lucio, and was your first Hispanic chief in Brownsville. So, Mario wanted to be a firefighter. Then he gets an opportunity to go to the Legislature and then to the Senate. If the Lord said, Mario, you can either be a firefighter or you can be a Senator, but you can't be both. I would love to know. The good news is, the Lord is good and allowed Mario to do both. How many times, he just wouldn't tell you once when he was speaking on behalf of firefighters' pension, civil service, that he was a firefighter. He told you several times. He was so proud. He loved his family. We all love our family, but Mario was family number one, and they were so special. His sisters are here. His children are here, his grandchildren, and, I guess, where are all of the little ones this morning, Theresa? They're in the corner over there. He was so proud of them. But, anyway, it is what it is. Mario was taken too soon, but let me just assure each and every one of you, he got all there was to get out of every day on Earth. And the good news is, he's not in pain anymore. He's watching us. He's going to be judging our session. He has high expectations for us. I won't get political, Dan, but we know how strongly he feels about issues and representing his district. So, Mr. President, on behalf of this entire body we want to recognize, Theresa, Mario's public service, the contributions he's made, the difference he's made in our lives. We're better people, we're better Senators because Mario came through these halls, but we also want you to know we feel like he is still present with us. We have decided to honor Mario by having several Senators speak. All 31 would be more than proud and anxious to stand and speak. The fact that we have divided that responsibility among four of our colleagues is representative that we want to speak as one voice. We have four outstanding Senators close to Mario that would like to speak on behalf of this body today. If we can ever do anything for the Gallegos family, anything that you can think, these children's education, any red tape, any response that you need from this body, we are your family and always be available in your lives. With that said, Members, I am proud to present this resolution to someone that we're celebrating his life today because he is a very special colleague. And I guess, the thing that stands out is, Harris County's first Hispanic State Senator. You would have to be a member of that community to know how for generations the community has felt underrepresented. Mario never forgot where he came from and would want to be recognized, probably more than a firefighter and a State Senator, as Houston's first Hispanic State Senator. Thank you, Members.

Senator Deuell: Thank you, Mr. President, Members, and I really rise to support the memorial on behalf of all of us in this body. I go back to my first day here in January 14th in 2003, and I'm sitting there where Senator Uresti is sitting now. And Mario was sitting where Senator Nichols is. And my mother had come down from West Virginia and family. And Mother was just sitting there, and she was kind of listening to Mario, who I barely knew. And she said, This guy's going to be a good friend of yours because he's got a great sense of humor and that you both have a warped sense of humor and you'll get along just fine. And that was absolutely true. And really come to appreciate the interaction between Mario and his friend. Dean Whitmire, and it is kind of an interesting corner back there. But we talked, we compared notes, I grew up some in South Oak Cliff part of Dallas and West Virginia, and both of us, under somewhat not ideal circumstances. And I think that helped us get along and understand each other but from different worlds, but we were friends, we were close friends. And what I came to gather about Mario is that he cared, he really cared about his constituents. He cared about his family. Sometimes Mario would not be in a particularly good mood, and the way that, I don't know if he realized what I was doing, but all I had to do was come over and ask him about one of his grandchildren or his family and immediately his mood would change. And that's a testimony to how much he loved you. He could go from being very angry about an issue, not angry, he's not an angry man. But all I could do, we'd start talking about a grandbaby, he'd have a grandbaby up there on the screen, and it would just immediately change him. But I appreciate his service as a firefighter and the risk that came with that. And we talked about he was an EMT and talked about medical issues and, certainly, appreciated his service in the Senate. He had demons, as we all do. Teddy Roosevelt wrote a friend once that said, there's not one of us that at some time does not come under the influence of the dark clouds, but he said that it's not having been in the dark house that counts, but having left it, and he certainly left it, came to terms with his own health and his mortality and came to terms with the Lord and his friends. And I think, you know, he passed away knowing that Texas was a better place because of his service as a firefighter, EMT, House Member, and Senator, And some people, I see this as a physician, they really pass away not really knowing if they made a difference. not really even knowing if they're loved. And I think this body and his family made sure that when Mario joined the Lord that he knew he was loved on this Earth. And as I mentioned at the memorial service here, John Kennedy mentioned in his inauguration that we should go forth and serve this land that we love, asking His help and His blessing and knowing that, surely, God's work on Earth is our own. Mario knew that, and I hope that this body will continue that legacy, Thank you, Mr. President.

Senator Lucio: Thank you, Mr. President and Members. It is with a very heavy heart that I rise today to remember my dear friend, Senator Mario Gallegos, and I, too, speak in behalf of the body here today. Throughout his life, Mario did so much and meant so much to so many people that he met. As a young man, he was an all-city basketball star at Milby High School in Houston, and he spoke to me about his great days. And I loved to hear him because I was a former basketball coach back in the '60s myself. He was a decorated firefighter following in a proud family tradition that continues today, as was mentioned by Dean Whitmire. He was a very devoted

husband, father, and grandpa. And I'm so honored to say, I was able to meet several of his family members present here today out in the hall and, obviously, over the years. Finally, he was a very generous, compassionate, and dedicated public servant. He spoke from the heart, always spoke from the heart. So, Texas has surely lost one of its greatest sons. In terms of a legacy, it's enormous. He served with distinction in the Legislature for 22 years, first serving in the House since 1991. I think he came in Leticia's class in the House. When he joined the Senate in 1995, he was the first Hispanic, that was mentioned, State Senator elected to represent Harris County. Throughout his career Mario fought hard for the interest of his community. Senate District 6 could not have asked for a more engaged and zealous advocate. Few people knew Houston as well as Mario. He gave me a few tours, and no one could mistake the passion and sense of duty he had for the city. Mario also tirelessly fought for communities across Texas. We traveled to West Texas and other parts of this state during our years together serving in committees, meeting a lot of wonderful people along the way. He was always greeted so warmly because of his character. He worked to end historic discrimination across the state. He tirelessly advocated for teachers. policemen, and firefighters. He championed efforts to improve the quality of life for senior citizens and the disabled. He loved some of the bills that I was carrying so much, he wanted to make sure his name was on them. He worked to ensure that Texas kept a strong, working middle class, and he fought each session to ensure that all Texas children had access to a quality education and to health care. Certainly, all of us here in the Senate know of Mario's health and his issues with it, his health. As some of my colleagues have already mentioned, in the last year or two, especially when we talked about Mario, Mario never let his health stop him from serving. Most famously, of course, Mario defying doctor's orders and set up a hospital bed, right in there, in the Sergeant's office. And so that he could, during the 2007 voter ID debate, be there close by. He shouldn't have been here. We know it, he knew it, but he was. He was recovering from a liver transplant. Still, according to the Texas Tribune, Mario said, quote, My constituents feel strongly about this; as long as I can stand, I need to be here. That is the mark of a great legislator. Though I am saddened that Mario was taken from us so early. I am comforted to know that he was surrounded by close friends when he passed away. Mario's sister Cindy said that during the last days Mario might have had as many as 50 visitors at a time crammed into his Houston hospital suite to say goodbye. The room was never empty during the days that I was there. I was privileged to visit Mario in Houston and say goodbye. I know that several of my current and former Capitol colleagues were able to visit or speak with Mario before he passed away, including former State Representative Al Luna, former State Representative Gerard Torres, former State Representative Diana Davila, former State Representative Roman Martinez, and former State Representative Rick Noriega. Also, former State Representative, now Congressman Pete Gallego, Representative Jessie Farrar, Representative Garnet Coleman, Representative Carol Alvarado, who was constantly there, Representative Ana Hernandez Luna, Representative Armando Walle, Representative Senfronia Thompson, Representative Sylvester Turner, Representative Mary Ann Perez, Representative Joe Moody, Representative Borris Miles, also former State Senator Gonzalo Barrientos. Former State Senator Eliot Shapleigh flew in from El Paso. Senator Kirk Watson. Senator Judy Zaffirini, who flew in and visited Mario several days. Senator Glenn Hegar. Senator Joan Huffman. Senator Robert Deuell. Senator Juan "Chuy" Hinojosa. And I want to say something about Senator Rodney Ellis. I understand, Rodney, that when Mario could not attend an annual senior picnic in District 6 because he was in the hospital. Senator Ellis here. Members, went in his place to give attendees Mario's love and his best wishes. And I'm sure that those of us that know Senator Ellis, who is never short of words, did a good job. Senator John Whitmire. Mario's sister Cindy said that Senator Whitmire was like Mario's guard dog during his visits, and I know Mario's family is extremely grateful. I personally, in many of my conversations. Mario made it quite clear that John, our Dean, was his best friend. Lieutenant Governor David Dewhurst. You know Mario's sister Cindy said that Governor Dewhurst came to Mario's side two days in a row and personally consoled his family while Mario was going through terrible pain. He was by his bedside for a long time. Cindy told me. Senator Leticia Van de Putte. Leticia and I visited Mario together as soon as we heard that he'd been moved into hospice. I know that Mario's family feel forever in Leticia's debt. She became the rock during those days. And I was privileged, extremely honored, to lead a memorial Holy Rosary at the University of Houston campus, a campus that meant so much to Mario. He never quit talking about The University of Texas, the University of Houston Cougars. Senator Gallegos, as I mentioned, was very devoted to his family and were, of course, by his side when he passed. He is survived by his wife, Theresa, his daughters. Ali and Melissa, and his son, Mario, who was on this floor many times and in the House as a young boy, his five grandchildren, Jake, Hollis, Jesse, Teresa, and Christina, and his mother, Olga, very special lady that I got to know while they lived in Brownsville and served in the Houston school board, also was there. And she was something very special, especially when we talked about the family, who I know wanted to be here. But she's unfortunately not, but she's here in spirit. His sisters, Maria, Olga, Lillian, and Cynthia, his brothers, Joel and Michael Gallegos. Finally, I want to say that I had the pleasure of meeting several of the Gallegos families, as I mentioned, over the years. When Mario's father died in 1990, Mario called me because he knew I was close to his dad. He had served as Brownsville's police, fire chief, excuse me, fire chief in the 1970s. And I was honored because Mario had asked me at that time to give the eulogy at his father's funeral. I want to give just a very quick story about Mario's father. Mario's father was a firefighter and later suffered complications related to emphysema. Now, Mario, who won election to the House in 1990, the family feared at the time because the father was ill that the father wouldn't see Mario be sworn in in January. So, they wanted to share the experience with his father somehow. So, they came to the Capitol months before the swearing in to take pictures and to show their father the Capitol. He was so proud of Mario's accomplishments. And after his father's death, I told Mario, I told him like a father figure to his large extended family that, that's what he was going to become now. He was going to be the father figure. And, of course, the family quickly learned that you have to share someone in politics with the rest of the state, not only the district but the entire state that you represent. But I hope the family today sees how much Texas really truly loved him. I want to thank them for sharing him with us. And as I mentioned, just like his father, Mario was a firefighter long before he joined us here at the Capitol. He worked for 22 years in the Houston Fire Department and retired as a senior captain. But he kept his life with him, in fact, at his funeral, Mario's brother-in-law arranged to have the fire department graciously lend two fire trucks. They sat at opposite sides of the road, extended their ladders and suspended an incredible, beautiful, large Texas flag. Mario's fellow firefighters, many of them family, others dear friends, were like family, sat on the trucks as Mario's funeral motorcade rolled underneath the flag. It was a touching, most touching sendoff. Should it come as no surprise that Mario, a man who spent half of his life racing into burning buildings to save lives, would spend the latter years of his life sacrificing so much to confront important issues here in Austin? Closing, I want to say I'm so proud, extremely proud to have called Mario my friend, *mi amigo*. I miss him dearly. I take comfort, however, in knowing that Mario Gallegos, Jr., touched the lives of so many gathered here today and that our State of Texas is a better place because of his courage. Thank you, Mr. President.

Senator Van de Putte: Thank you, Mr. President. Mr. President and Members and the dear Gallegos family. I am honored to have been asked by our colleagues to speak todav. as we celebrate the life of Mario Gallegos. For those of you who have known Mario your entire life, his brothers and sisters, I know that you share stories of the childhood, of the wonderful times, of his ability to find fun in everyday, simple activities. For Theresa and for the kids, you must know how much he treasured you, and that his laptop, right here on this desk, that screensaver was full of pictures that rotated, and I saw that the pictures changed. They were pictures of Theresa and the kids, but you very quickly got bumped from the main screensaver by all of the grandchildren. He was an incredible person. He embodied the very spirit of Texas, the ability to find the good in every situation, the ability to find a path forward against all odds. I mean, that's what Texas is and that's what your husband, your brother, and your father, and your grandfather did every day. He found a path forward. He didn't let obstacles get in the way, and to our surprise, Members, you know he could not be silenced even when he was being opposed by the giants of this state. He didn't care if he was ruffling the feathers of well-renowned organizations. And I remember his legendary fight even against the most magnificent Houston Livestock and Rodeo. Why? Because he wanted to make sure that they honored Tejano music and used scholarships that were raised by that organization to all inclusive types of students in the Houston, greater Houston area. Mario was one of a kind, and I knew it the day I met him as we were running for election in 1990. He had already been selected by his primary and pretty much a given that he would serve in the Texas House in 1991. I joined him in that class along with Senator Carona and Senator Ogden. There's not many of us left from that class. And if Mario's health had not been an issue, I think his service in the State of Texas might've rivaled the longevity of our Dean because Mario loved it here. We sat next to each other as we took that oath of office in January of 1991, and that was the beginning of a really, two decades of friendship. He met my father on that day, and he said he would've given anything for his father to witness that swearing in. Our mothers met and then became traveling companions with Mario and I as we attended our first NALEO conventions and other NCSL meetings. What you don't know is this big, imposing, giant of a man who was a firefighter was actually a mama's boy. But when I let him know that he was mama's boy, he reminded me that all great men are mama's boys. He asked that first legislative

meeting that we went and represented our districts, went out of town, we took our mothers with us. He loved being with his family and his friends. And as he invited many of us to join him in his district in Houston, it would become an all-day affair. Although we had plans to visit several, he would get stopped at every little place, and people would generally come up to him to thank him for intervening, for the help. People who most people might overlook thought Mario was the hero. He was the hero because he was the symbol for them that if you graduate from high school, that if you do your job, that this is a Texas and a United States where even the most humblest of persons can be elected to the Texas Senate. And oh, how he loved his seniors. He planned their picnics, their parties, always making sure that there was enough Thanksgiving and holiday turkeys and hams to go around. And he honored them because he honored the generation before him. He was in awe of the soldiers and those who fought in World War II and Korea. He gave such respect to the veterans in this state and the veterans on this Senate floor, because he held them in the highest of esteem. And he loved the people who took care of his seniors. He regularly voted with all of the health care professionals legislation because he admired those doctors and nurses and dentists and ophthalmologists and optometrists and anybody who was in the health care field. Mario had the greatest of respect for them. That respect grew as his health deteriorated. And he loved those health care providers because they took care of his seniors in their homes and in skilled facilities. Mario was amazing in his ability to make lifelong friendships. And in those final days in Houston at that hospital room, I saw friend after friend come by. They had been with him in elementary school. They had been with Mario and were his running buds in high school. They were classmates that he made as an adult attending the University of Houston-Downtown. And they were his extended cousins and family. They were his compadres. Many could say that Mario was a man's man. He loved hunting, he loved fishing, he loved being a sportsman. He loved sports, and he liked to hang out with the guys, whether that was his childhood friends or his best friend, John Whitmire. He spoke about you, his family, so much. Theresa, he believed that you had such strength to stand by him through his most difficult of times, and he says when you make that vow for better or worse, he says my wife lived it and meant it. He was so proud of all of you. He talked about Ali and her strength and her faith and, of course, her beautiful child, and we talked about how wonderful it is for our children to find their life's passion. And he commented how that was important, but that what was really important is when our kids find their life's love. And so, when you found your life partner, your husband, he was so proud of him. He said, like, in our families, we don't have in-laws, we just have sons and daughters. He loved and spoke about the spunkiness and attitude of Melissa. He admired the way that she could master technology and could communicate with hundreds of people with a click of her computer. He most loved how she was just the most protective and out-there mom. And he loved your kids so very much. For a younger Mario, you know your dad thought you were movie-star handsome. Of course he said that you looked like him. And he was so proud of the man that you've become. It's not easy growing up as Capitol kids. And the many times that our families, our children were together as you were growing up, right in this Capitol, you know every nook and cranny and, yes, you even got lost once where we had to send the DPS out after you. We didn't know

which Member's office the kids were in. Mario had his struggles, but he was larger than life. And we celebrate his life today because each of us on this Senate floor lived a little vicariously through Mario because for him it was about this day, this moment, and what he could do with that title of Senator. I'd like to speak to my Senate colleagues because in those last few days, Mario shared how much he adored being a Senator and how lucky that we all are. He said, Tell them that I love them. Many of you he was able to see, and he was able to talk to by phone. And many of you, I held up that phone to his ear and he could hear you, but he couldn't respond anymore. But before he really became, or he would lose consciousness, he said, Tell them I love them and how blessed they are to serve in the best legislative body in this country, and to do their job, to do it for our people. In those last few days, Mario asked very little of us, but he asked me first of all, he said, Take care of my family. And we assured him that the love of the Senate would be with you through that difficult time and then each and every day. And he knew you were a strong group, from you and his sisters and from the kids and from his cousin, General Joe Ramirez, who was there most of the time. He was so proud. And I told him, the family's going to be fine. You've got great strength, and they've got their faith. The second thing he asked, Members, he said, Take care of my staff. He said, Make sure they're all right, make sure they land okay. And each of us, as we depend on our staff, they become our families. And he was so very proud of his staff. He wanted to make sure his staff was going to be okay. He said, as I asked him, Okay, Mario, what else do you need? And he said, Take care of my district. And he shared his love and his confidence in Carol Alvarado. And then I said. Is there anything else? And as you know, he said, because many of you were in the room, he said, Baby, don't leave me till I go. And I promised him I wouldn't leave him, and I didn't until I could get Senator Judith Zaffirini and Senator Eddie Lucio to come on that Sunday because, to tell you the truth, I had run out of clothes. And those were the Members, and Senator Ellis and, of course, his best friend, John Whitmire. And then I asked Mario, What else do you want me to do? And he said, The session. At one point when Lieutenant Governor was in the room and Mario came to, Mario asked the Lieutenant Governor, What time is session, when do we need to go in? And as you took his hand, Governor Dewhurst, you said, That's okay, Mario, I think you'll get a pass this time. He again regained consciousness and looked up at the Lieutenant Governor and said, You look good, like in your commercials. And then he left us a little instructions about what we should do about education. He chose, Members, how to live each and every day. He reminded us that each day is a gift, and he used each minute of each day to try to serve the people whom he loved, and that was his district and his family. And he loved us. We are so fortunate to have had Mario Gallegos in our lives. The State of Texas has been blessed because Mario, the son of a firefighter who became a firefighter, kept wanting to fight blazes and put out fires all over the State of Texas. As I close today, I wonder why some people are taken so young, and I know that it is not in our purview to question God's plan for each of our lives, so maybe our Lord took him early because he needed a firefighter to fend off the flames of the underworld when they get too close, or maybe our Lord took Mario a little early because he needed an archangel like George and Michael to help fight the battles in the battle for souls. Or maybe our Lord took Mario because he really needed someone to make him laugh every single day because every day Mario was on this Senate floor,

each of us in any encounter would end up with a laugh. And maybe he took him a little early so he could show the rest of the angels and the rest of the world the real meaning of true redemption. All I know is that he won't be sitting behind me this legislative session, but his proud and dear friend will take that chair. Thank you to the Gallegos family for allowing us to see the work, the wit, the wisdom, and the genuineness of Mario Gallegos. We will never forget him. His picture will be constantly in this Capitol along with the Members of the different Senates and, of course, the different House sessions. And let's, on this day, build that story of history so that his grandchildren know what a truly great man served Senate District 6 for so many years. For our wonderful, sweet Mario, and I say sweet, Members, because he never said an ill word about any other Member. Mario never spoke ill of anyone. He may have not enjoyed or agreed with your positions, but he always respected each Senator. Let it be known that our sweet prince has gone, but that we celebrate every day his mark on this state and on this body. Muchisimas gracias por la vida, por todo que hizo el Senador gran del Condado de Harris, el bombero, el luchero Mario Gallegos. May God bless all of you as you hold out the traditions of that proud family and his service to our state.

Senate Resolution 11

WHEREAS, The Senate of the State of Texas joins Texans across the state in grieving the untimely loss of Senator Mario V. Gallegos, Jr., who died October 16. 2012, at the age of 62; and

WHEREAS, Born September 8, 1950, Mario Gallegos was a lifelong Houstonian; he grew up in the Magnolia Park community in the East End and graduated from Milby High School; he later returned to school and earned a degree from the University of Houston in 2001; and

WHEREAS, He joined the Houston Fire Department at the age of 18 and served the people of Houston with distinction for 22 years as a firefighter, rising to the rank of senior captain; during those years, he developed an abiding interest in politics and played an important role in articulating and promoting the needs of the state's firefighters and other emergency responders through his union work at the State Capitol; and

WHEREAS, He began his legislative career as a member of the Texas House of Representatives after a landslide election victory in 1990; during his two terms in the House, he began the work that would make him a longtime champion for the working class citizens of Texas, concentrating on such issues as health care and public education; and

WHEREAS, In 1994, he became the first Hispanic elected to the Texas Senate from Harris County; over the course of his tenure of nearly two decades in the Senate, he played a vital role in fighting for teacher pay raises and increased funding for public schools, putting into action his belief that "making a solid investment in our children is one of the smartest things we can do, one which will reap long-term benefits for our state"; and

WHEREAS, Senator Gallegos was a staunch advocate for senior citizens and defended Medicaid funding for residents in long-term care facilities; he was also responsive to the need for economic opportunities in his district and led the way in the creation of the municipal management districts that revitalized communities in Houston and served as a model for other Texas cities; and

WHEREAS, In 2007, Senator Gallegos again displayed the courage and principled determination that were the hallmarks of his legislative career; only weeks after undergoing a liver transplant, and against the orders of his doctor, he returned to the Senate so that he would be able to cast his vote against voter identification legislation; his was the deciding vote in preventing the passage of the bill; and

WHEREAS, Senator Gallegos received numerous awards over the course of his illustrious career, including the Distinguished Legislative Service Award from the Texas Municipal League, the Good Guy Award from the Texas Women's Political Caucus, and Legislator of the Year from the Mexican American Bar Association; he was recognized by the Texas State Association of Firefighters and the Combined Law Enforcement Associations of Texas for his passage of public safety legislation; and

WHEREAS, In recognition of his legacy of public service, Senator Gallegos lay in state in the Senate chamber so that citizens could pay their respects to the man who had dedicated himself to making Texas a more generous, just, and honorable state; and

WHEREAS, A man of wisdom, strength, and integrity, Senator Gallegos gave voice to the aspirations and dreams of countless Texans, and his hard work and diligence served as a constant inspiration to his fellow legislators; and

WHEREAS, He was a devoted husband, father, and grandfather, and although his presence will be deeply missed by all those who were privileged to share in his life, his legacy of service and dedication will continue to have a profound impact for generations to come; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Senate of the State of Texas, 83rd Legislature, hereby extend sincere condolences to the bereaved family of Senator Mario V. Gallegos, Jr.; and, be it further

SENATE RESOLUTION 36

Senator Whitmire offered the following resolution:

WHEREAS, Under the provisions of Article III, Section 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, the Senators elected after each apportionment shall be divided into two classes, the seats of the Senators of the first class to be vacated at the expiration of the first two years, and the seats of those of the second class to be vacated at the expiration of four years; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED by the Senate of the 83rd Texas Legislature, That the Senate shall draw lots as provided by this resolution; and, be it further

RESOLVED, That the drawing of lots shall be conducted as follows:

- (1) The Lieutenant Governor shall appoint a committee of five Senators to supervise, direct, and verify all matters relating to the preparation of the slips and envelopes and the drawing of the envelopes as provided by this resolution;
- (2) The Secretary of the Senate shall prepare 31 slips of paper of uniform size and appearance and number the slips of paper sequentially from 1 to 31;
- (3) The Secretary of the Senate, under the supervision of the committee, shall place each of the slips of paper in a separate capsule, each of the capsules to be of uniform size and appearance, and shall then place each of the capsules in a separate envelope and seal the envelope, each of the envelopes to be of uniform size and appearance, and then place the 31 envelopes, each containing one of the capsules and slips of paper, in a suitable receptacle;
- (4) At a time and on a day determined by the President in open session of the Senate, the drawing of the envelopes shall be conducted under the supervision of the committee in the following manner:
- (A) The receptacle containing the sealed envelopes shall be placed on a suitable table or desk at the front of the Senate Chamber; and

- (B) The Secretary of the Senate shall call the names of the Senators in alphabetical order, and as the name of each Senator is called, that Senator shall withdraw from the receptacle one envelope, which shall then be immediately opened and the number appearing on the slip of paper in the envelope recorded after that Senator's name on a suitable register prepared by the secretary;
- (5) Any Senator who is unable to attend the drawing shall designate in writing another Senator to draw an envelope in the place of the absent Senator; in the event any Member of the Senate is absent and has failed to designate another Senator to act for the absent Senator in the drawing, the Secretary of the Senate shall draw an envelope for the absent Senator;
- (6) The Secretary of the Senate shall, after all of the Senators have drawn their respective envelopes, draw an envelope for each Senate district for which a vacancy exists at the time of the drawing; and the number drawn for each such district shall determine the expiration of the term of office for that district in the same manner as if a Senator were representing the district; and
- (7) The 15 Senate districts for which slips with even numbers were drawn shall constitute the first class and the term of Senators representing those districts shall terminate at the expiration of two years; and the 16 Senate districts for which slips with odd numbers were drawn shall constitute the second class, and those terms of office shall terminate at the expiration of four years.

SR 36 was read and was adopted by the following vote: Yeas 30, Nays 0.

Since the last session, we lost two important Members of the Legislature, Senator Mario Gallegos and Representative Ken Legler.

Or they can be as elaborate as launching a new business, harnessing creativity and new technology to create something the world has never seen before.

Big and small, dreams become reality in Texas.

As real as the success Texans are building, you in this Chamber have built the framework that makes it possible for them to succeed.

Texans have succeeded to the tune of more than half a million private sector jobs added over the last two years alone, a total of nearly 1.4 million created in the private sector over the last 10 years.

Now, there are those who insist our job creation stat doesn't mean much because they say we are only creating entry-level, low-paying jobs.

The truth is, we are creating all kinds of jobs-low paying, medium paying, and high paying.

We've created jobs in all three categories faster than the national rate over the last 10 years.

We need jobs of all sorts, full-time and part-time, long-term and temporary, for people of all backgrounds, career stages, and skill levels.

With rare exceptions, no one gets hired out of college as the CEO, but if you want to be a CEO someday, Texas is the right place to start.

Our job numbers are more than statistics; they're real stories about hard-working people.

Just three years ago, Lisa Pounds of Houston saw a need for healthier food choices for children and families, so she left her job as a corporate insurance broker and started her own business.

Today, Green Plate Kitchen is a thriving and growing company, employing nine people and supporting numerous contractors and customers.

Even companies that are well established see the value in choosing Texas.

Pactiv is a global leader in food packaging and has employed more than 1,000 Texans at three different locations, including 122 in Corsicana.

When it was time for the company to build a new, state-of-the-art facility, our state's economic climate, along with the famous Texan work ethic, made the decision a lot easier.

Today, they're building that facility in Corsicana, which means 200 more jobs, and Chairman Cook knows that means 200 more opportunities for people to better their lives and the lives of their families.

And just last June, Texas took another giant leap into commercial space as XCOR Aerospace, a leader in the privatized space race, brought its research and development center to Midland.

They're part of a growing Texas presence in this important market, which includes businesses like SpaceX and Blue Origin.

XCOR, Pactiv, and Green Plate Kitchen are reaching for the stars in their own way right here in Texas, and representatives with those companies are with us today.

Please join me as they stand to thank them for their contributions.

Multiply their stories by thousands and you understand why what we're doing in Texas is working and why it's so vitally important we stay on an upward trajectory.

You have realized a simple truth: Bureaucracy doesn't stimulate the economy, it gets in the way.

Texans succeed not because of bureaucracy, but because you, Dr. Allen, have ensured we have accountable, rigorous public schools.

Texans succeed because you, Chairwoman Zaffirini, have helped create a system of affordable, accessible higher education.

Texans succeed because you, Chairman Seliger, have given them the freedom to do more with the money they earn, and when private employers have more to spend, both the private and public sector benefit.

Texans succeed because you, Representative Lozano, have given employers the freedom to innovate and expand with consistent, predictable, and sensible regulation.

And Texans succeed because you, Representative Creighton and Senator Huffman, have let job creators know they won't be frivolously dragged into court and held hostage by individuals seeking to make a quick buck.

You have all opened the door and Texans have responded and thousands more are getting here as fast as they can.

For eight years in a row, Allied Van Lines has named Texas the nation's top moving destination.

We've made inroads in almost every industry sector from biotech and computer science to energy and finance.

Visionary companies like Facebook, Apple, and Electronic Arts have expanded here.

When these companies come to Texas, to your districts, they make a positive impact on your communities.

And even with a mass influx of job seekers realizing their dreams in Texas, our unemployment rate has consistently remained below the national rate.

Even with that growth in industry and population, we've maintained a strong commitment to the environment.

We lowered ozone levels by 23 percent between 2000-2011 and cut industrial NOx gas emissions by 60 percent over that span.

The tough decisions we faced last session tested our resolve and our dedication to the principles that brought us here.

In the end, we remained dedicated to those principles, holding the line on taxes, spending within our means, and making the tough decisions separating wants from needs.

The revenue estimate we got earlier this month confirms we made the right decisions at that time.

Our bank balance is healthy, our economy is growing, our future is limitless.

The people running some other states are actually pretty smart, and they see what we've been doing.

If imitation is the sincerest form of flattery, you all should be flattered.

In Florida, Governor Rick Scott has enacted very similar policies and is promoting many of the higher education reforms that are yielding promising results here.

In Louisiana, Governor Bobby Jindal has proposed doing away with his state's income tax, part of a move to make his state even more attractive to employers and those chasing their dreams.

And late last year, the State of Michigan became a right-to-work state.

Other states are following our lead and embracing the concept of vigorous competition.

They're aggressively courting major employers, fostering their high-tech sectors, and investing in their workforce.

In short, they want to beat us at our own game.

So here in Texas, we can't just maintain the status quo, we have to improve upon it.

We're in a position today to put our financial house in order, and it's time to do so.

We have an opportunity this session, an opportunity to true up our budget and move away from the budgetary techniques we've come to depend on all too often.

We need to pay now what is due now.

We should put in place a stronger constitutional limit on spending growth, ensuring it never grows more than the combined rate of inflation and population.

We need to make the franchise tax exemption for small businesses permanent.

We should continue to scrub the budget for any waste and redundancies, streamlining wherever possible.

We also need to do away with the practice of using dedicated funds and specific fees for anything other than the purpose for which they were intended.

If we don't need taxpayer money for that purpose, let's not collect it at all.

We've never bought into the notion that if you collect more, you need to spend more.

Today, I'm calling for a mechanism to be put in place so when we do bring in more than we need, we'll have the option of returning tax money directly to the people who paid it.

Currently, that's not something our constitution allows.

We need to fix that.

Also, while Texas is a low-tax state, let's make the burden on Texans even lower.

I know that's a goal Chairman Hilderbran has always worked towards.

In a legislative session where we can see billions still on the table after we've funded our services and met the needs of our ever-expanding population, I think providing tax relief of at least \$1.8 billion over this biennium is a good place to start.

As to how we provide that relief, there are plenty of good ideas, and that promises to be a very valuable conversation for us to engage in.

We want to hear more from the taxpayers themselves about how we run things in Austin.

My office, in fact, has built a website to get your feedback on tax cuts.

You can find it at my main site, gov.texas.gov.

While Washington, D.C., can sometimes seem entirely non-responsive and is increasing the tax burden on Americans, and other states are scrambling to grab every tax dollar they can, I'm proud that in Texas we're talking about the best way to give money back.

Our approach is even more important as Washington raises taxes and the costs of the Affordable Care Act begin to pile up.

We have made it clear Texas will not expand Medicaid under the ACA, as Chairweman Kolkhorst can tell you.

We won't set up a state exchange, as Chairwoman Nelson can attest.

Texas will not drive millions more into an unsustainable system, and that stance has not changed an iota.

However, the costs of ACA will still fall on the backs of individuals and employers across the country, and it falls to us on the state level to do what we can to alleviate the federal burden as much as we can.

Time and again, we've seen that when people keep their money, they invest it wisely and selflessly in things important to them.

That's why Texas' cultural arts community, for example, is thriving even without unlimited amounts of federal and state money.

The Dallas Arts District and the Museum of Fine Arts Houston, Bass Performance Hall in Fort Worth, just to name a few, have each brought in major tourism dollars and enriched countless lives.

Our surging arts communities are yet another reason so many people and employers are choosing to come to Texas.

As our population expands and industries grow across our state, the demand is increasing upon the fundamental building blocks of our communities.

This session, we need to deal with our state's infrastructure needs.

We must particularly address our growing needs in water and transportation.

Doing that without breaking the budget will require creativity and some outside-the-box thinking.

I believe one answer lies within our Rainy Day Fund.

The Rainy Day Fund was created to ensure we had a sufficient amount in reserve in case of disaster and to ensure Texas maintains its strong credit rating.

Due to our economic success, the fund will soon hold nearly \$12 billion, significantly more than the amount we need to meet those obligations.

We need to maintain a strong Rainy Day Fund.

While we cannot, and will not, raid the fund to meet ongoing expenses, we also shouldn't accumulate billions more than necessary.

That's why I support a move to utilize \$3.7 billion from the Rainy Day Fund for a one-time investment in infrastructure programs.

In addition to the Rainy Day Fund investment, we should also end the diversion of State Highway Fund appropriations, which will mean another \$1.3 billion every biennium for road maintenance and construction.

What I am proposing will support critical water and transportation systems across our state, addresses our needs both short- and long-term, and ensures both water and traffic will continue to flow in Texas for generations to come.

None of us can deny the need for these improvements.

Water and roads add to the quality of life for all Texans—anyone stuck in traffic at rush hour in our cities can speak to that.

It also plays a major role in our continued economic development.

Whenever we're recruiting a business seeking to relocate or expand, a chief concern of theirs is ensuring there are adequate water, power, and transportation systems for their needs.

We've been the nation's top exporting state for 10 years now, and for us to continue that dominance requires a clear way to move goods from one place to another.

Our success also relies upon the continued excellence of the Texas workforce, and it falls to us to better prepare the next generation for the jobs available to them.

We've worked hard to improve our public education system over the past decade, and the results are encouraging.

According to the U.S. Department of Education, our graduation rates are at an all-time high, the third highest in the nation, which represents a significant turnaround from just a few short years ago.

Of course, we can't let up now.

I believe that the best way forward is the way that will provide the most opportunities for each child, something I know Senator Patrick supports.

Not every child learns for the same purpose, not every child thrives in the same settings and schools.

Limiting a child to just one opportunity does nothing more than limit that child's future.

The way forward must involve more public charter schools, which offer parents a tuition-free alternative to their neighborhood school.

These innovative public schools already serve more than 150,000 students across Texas, with more than 100,000 students on waiting lists.

It's also time to introduce scholarship programs that give students a choice, especially those who are locked into low-performing schools.

Of course, all that has to be done in a fashion that continues to encourage teachers and administrators in traditional schools to produce excellent students.

In addition to a choice of schools, we should also give students more flexibility in the courses they take in high school to prepare them for whatever their goals may be, without sacrificing our rigorous academic standards

Anytime we talk about education, we have to remember that the focus has to be squarely on one specific special interest group: our students.

We cannot stop thinking of new ways to teach and inspire our children.

They're ready to learn and eager to use that education to improve their lives.

Over the last five years, the number of Texas students participating in college preparation tests has increased, a clear sign the young people in Texas understand the importance of a college education.

Most encouraging of all, those figures indicate a significant increase in participation among minority students.

Forty-two percent more African American students are now taking the SAT than were participating five years ago, and 65 percent more Hispanic students.

Along the same time frame, the rate of Hispanic students taking the ACT has doubled.

A short time ago, those same students might have felt like a college education wasn't for them and felt discouraged from trying.

These students are realizing their potential, and they're going to use that potential to change Texas and the world for that matter.

Of course, this means that we have to make sure that college is accessible and affordable.

Two years ago, I stood here and called upon our institutions of higher learning to develop plans for degrees that cost no more than \$10,000.

There were plenty of detractors at that time who insisted it couldn't be done.

However, that call inspired educators at colleges and universities across our state to step up to the plate.

Today, I'm proud to tell you that 13 Texas universities have announced plans for a \$10,000 degree.

Some of those innovators and educators are with us in this Chamber. Again, please join me in recognizing them as they stand.

The idea is spreading, too.

As I mentioned earlier, Florida is developing its own \$10,000 degree program, and even California—yes, that California—is taking a stab at making these programs commonplace.

These are promising developments, but we must do everything we can to continue making higher education an achievable dream for all Texans.

To that end, I've called for a four-year tuition freeze for incoming freshmen, and I know Chairman Branch has been working hard on this issue.

This will provide students and families cost certainty, as their tuition will be locked in at the rate they pay their first semester for the next four years.

This will also encourage them to graduate on time, which is a problem we simply can't ignore anymore.

Currently less than 30 percent of full-time students at our four-year institutions graduate in four years, and only 58 percent have their degree in six.

That's why we should tie at least a portion of state funding-I'm suggesting a minimum of 10 percent-based on the number of graduates.

We need to encourage these schools to get their students educated and ready to work as quickly as possible.

Texas employers need additional, qualified workers.

Of course, not all these jobs require a college degree.

Many require a technical certification, and those jobs are among those most in demand in our state.

Last fall, I announced an initiative that will bring industries and our technical and community colleges together to create a statewide model that will enable students to swiftly earn their technical certifications at an affordable cost.

Chairman Davis and Senator Birdwell will help lead the charge with legislation that will encourage and incentivize more fast track programs.

Under this framework, an individual will be able to attain certain certification in a high-demand industry, utilizing competency-based learning to allow students to gain credit for skills they have already mastered.

It's an innovative solution, the kind we need more of in the years to come.

It's the decisions made here that will determine what Texas will look like for the next 50 years.

As an example of what I mean, let's take a look at how dramatically and how quickly things are changing in South Texas.

We've committed to expanding and building roads, so businesses are finding it easier to transport goods.

We've helped nurture and grow a major Regional Academic Health Center in Harlingen, as well as the Irma Rangel College of Pharmacy in Kingsville.

Today, the students of South Texas are able to stay closer to home to earn their college degrees.

This area of the state is critical to our state's future, and our investment in the children of South Texas will be returned a thousand-fold.

That's why I'm calling for the Legislature to pass by a two-thirds vote a bill necessary to give South Texas access to the Permanent University Fund.

The changes in South Texas—in fact, the changes across our state—remind us that we're living in a fast-moving world and that we'll need the contributions of everyone to keep up.

I'm proud that Texas is a place where anyone can make a difference, regardless of where you're from or how you might spell your last name.

During his second inaugural address, President Obama called on us all to work together and do our part to secure a brighter future for America.

Mr. President, Texas stands ready to do our part!

From our origins pioneering a rugged frontier, Texans have a long, proud tradition of working together–South Texas ranchers and DFW teachers, Bay Area shrimpers and West Texas farmers.

We are a diverse tapestry of cultures, faiths, and bloodlines, but we are bound by a common spirit and a common lineage that's remarkable for a state so big.

Not only will we all work together for the remaining 119 days of this session, we will work together every day in companies and in agencies across our state.

We will work together at places like TxDOT, led by El Paso's Ted Houghton, who oversees a team focused on building and maintaining our roads.

We will work together at the Department of Public Safety, led by Cindy Leon of Mission, with well-trained professionals who spend every day working to make Texans safer.

We will work together at the Texas Education Agency, led by Arlington's Michael Williams, who has one of the most important jobs in Texas, educating our children for the challenges of the future.

From these great Chambers to the Governor's office, to local offices in small towns across our state, we are all privileged to do our part to make a better Texas for all.

Texas is not merely strong but exceptional.

We are a testament to the power of freedom, to the entrepreneurial spirit unleashed from government interference.

We believe these ideals are sturdy enough and strong enough to advance any and all Texans, regardless of race, color, or creed.

We embrace a "can-do culture" for every citizen willing to work hard and pursue a dream.

Those ideals propel us forward as we stand as a national example that hard work can breed success regardless of one's station in life, that freedom is the best antidote to poverty, and that each individual deserves to inherit a state of equality and opportunity.

May the work we do in these hallowed halls preserve opportunity for every Texan.

Thank you, God bless you and, through you, may He continue to bless the Great State of Texas.

WHEREAS, Today we honor wounded warriors from across the nation, including Specialist Cody Miller, Sergeant Paul Roberts, Chief Warrant Officer 4 Jerry Hamilton, Lance Corporal Ivan Sears, Staff Sergeant Mark Juarez, and Staff Sergeant Tracie M. Harris; without their willingness to serve and the contributions made by them and by their families, we could not enjoy many of the freedoms that make this nation great; and

WHEREAS, These veterans have bravely and selflessly served in defense of our nation and its democratic ideals; with silent dedication and unmatched grit, they ensure our safety and security, and it is indeed fitting that all Texans recognize, honor, and reaffirm their gratitude to these true American heroes; and

WHEREAS, Although these veterans represent many different hometowns and backgrounds, what unites them is greater than what divides them—a deep and abiding love of their country; it is for America and all Americans that they leave their homes and their family and friends in order to guarantee the continuation of those freedoms etched into the Declaration of Independence and ensured by our Constitution; and

WHEREAS, It is for our service members' willingness to serve to protect these freedoms that we honor them; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Senate of the State of Texas, 83rd Legislature, hereby commend the wounded warriors of our nation for their sacrifice, dedication, and patriotism, recognizing them, honoring them, and reaffirming the gratitude of all Texans to these true American heroes; and, be it further

RESOLVED, That a copy of this Resolution be prepared in honor of the dedication and sacrifice of the men and women of the United States armed services and their families.

SR 68 was read.

Senator Van de Putte was recognized and introduced to the Senate a delegation of wounded warriors, accompanied by Specialist Cody Miller, Army; Sergeant Paul Roberts, Army Reserve; Chief Warrant Officer 4 Jerry Hamilton, Army; Lance Corporal Ivan Sears, Marine Corps; Staff Sergeant Mark Juarez, Marine Corps; Staff Sergeant Tracie M. Harris, Air Force; and Kenneth Howard, Army, Operation Iraqi Freedom.

The Senate welcomed its guests.

REMARKS ORDERED PRINTED

On motion of Senator Hinojosa and by unanimous consent, the remarks regarding **SR 68** were ordered reduced to writing and printed in the *Senate Journal* as follows:

Senator Van de Putte: Thank you, Mr. President. Mr. President and Members, today is a very, very special day at the Texas Capitol. We have honored groups on this floor who play an integral part of our state through services for abused children, through services dedicated to the health of our state, and business groups, but today we honor a very special group of Texans. Today we say thank you, and we say thank you because we have a unique chance today to look at heroism, at bravery, at selfless sacrifice directly in the eye. Today is our Wounded Warrior Day here in the Senate. We've all heard the expression that freedom is not free. Well, today everyone in this gallery and in this Chamber can see the price tag firsthand. We get to see what our heroes have done for us, the sacrifice that they have made so that you and I can meet freely and debate freely under this dome. We can enjoy the political, the religious, and the personal freedom because of the very few men and women who are willing to swear to an oath and to take up arms to defend the United States of America, when called upon, from its enemies. Today, no matter how we as Americans and Texans feel about the wars or the conflicts in Iraq or Afghanistan, there is no way that you can look at our guests on the Senate floor today and be anything but humbled, feel anything except a deep, deep appreciation for them and for their families. It is a lesson that as a nation we forgot, we forgot when our servicemembers returned home from Vietnam. Let us not make those same mistakes. Members, only one percent of Americans have served on active duty since September 11, 2001. And during Operation Iraqi Freedom, Operation Enduring Freedom, Operation New Dawn, we have had 6,522 total deaths. Of those, 5,224 were killed in action and of those, 588 were Texans. A total of over 50,000 wounded have been in these conflicts. Advances in our protective gear and medical medicine, rapid extraction from the battlefield, and medical advances have given our wounded warriors, these soldiers, these airmen, these sailors, these Marines, a greater than 90 percent chance at survival. And what that means is that we need to make every effort in a society that makes sure that the one percent who serve us are appreciated and respected, and we honor their sacrifices.

as we fulfill our commitments to you. Members, with us today we have several of our warriors. And I'd like to tell you just a little bit about them. We have Lance Corporal Ivan Sears, a Marine originally from San Antonio, Lance Corporal Sears deployed to Marjah Helmand Province in Afghanistan with the First Marine Division out of Camp Leieune. He sustained his injuries due to an IED during dismounted security operations in 2010. We have with us from the Army Reserve, Sergeant Paul Roberts. Senator Watson. Originally from Austin, Texas, Sergeant Roberts joined the Army in 1989 and served for four years on active duty and was honorably discharged. He missed that military lifestyle, and he joined back the Army Reserve 17 years later and volunteered to deploy to Afghanistan in 2011 with Bravo Company, Aviation Chinook Unit out of Kansas. Crewing as the left door gunner, his helicopter was shot down on Thanksgiving Day in 2011. Sergeant Roberts is now in the Warrior Transition Battalion. Staff Sergeant Mark Juarez, Marine Corps, from Floresville. Texas, Sergeant Juarez was deployed to Sangin City, Afghanistan. He was shot in the head while on patrol, foot patrol in 2010. He's married to Amy, and he has three daughters. Members, it's their families as well, We have Staff Sergeant Tracie Harris. Air Force. Tracie joined the Air Force in January of 1998, and she started her first four years of service as a security forces police officer, and when it came time to reenlist, Tracie cross-trained as a military working dog handler, then reenlisted for another six years. During Tracie's almost 11 years, she was stationed at Travis Air Force Base in California, Ramstein in Germany. She was deployed six times, twice to Kuwait, once to Saudi Arabia, Bulgaria, Bahrain, and Iraq. Tracie is the example of our women warriors who proudly serve our country. She has the Air Force Achievement Medal, four times outstanding unit medal, and the enduring freedom medal, and Iraq Campaign Medal. Chief Warrant Officer Jerry Hamilton, Army, originally from Lane, South Dakota, Chief Warrant Officer Hamilton enlisted in 1995 as a Chinook crew member. Korea for one year, Germany for three, he's had three deployments as flight engineer. In 1999, he was accepted to flight school, graduated at the top of his class. and he chose to fly those Chinooks. Stationed at Fort Bragg after flight school, he deployed to Afghanistan twice and once to Iraq. He served as a flight instructor for five years following his two assignments before moving to Fort Campbell. Within two months of arriving at Fort Campbell, Chief Warrant Officer Hamilton deployed to Afghanistan for the third time. He was hit by shrapnel from a rocket within two weeks of arriving. Specialist Cody Miller, Army, originally from Golden, Mississippi, Specialist Miller enlisted in June 2010 and was stationed to the 173rd Airborne Brigade in Vicenza, Italy. He served in a heavy weapons platoon for five months and then moved to the scout platoon. Deployed to Iraq in May of 2012, and while on a route, over watch, for a nearby, he and his fellow soldiers received fire from the mountain behind them. And, Members, we cannot leave out our own wounded warrior, one of our own. Lieutenant Colonel Brian Birdwell, Senator Birdwell, will you approach the front and please join your comrades as we ask Mel, your wife, to take your place at your desk. Lieutenant Colonel Brian Birdwell, a distinguished military graduate of Lamar Army ROTC program in 1984. Retired now, Brian Birdwell was commissioned as an officer in the U.S. Army and served in numerous training deployments and two operational deployments. In 1990, he was deployed to Operation Desert Shield, Desert Storm, where he was awarded the Bronze Star for

exceptional meritorious achievement. In 1998, he deployed to Central America as the Joint Operations Officer for Joint Task Force Aguila. In 2001, Brian was serving on the Department of Army staff as a military aide to the Deputy Assistant Chief of Staff for Installation Management. Members, our own wounded warrior, on September 11, 2001, when American Airlines Flight 77 was crashed just yards away from his second-floor Pentagon office, Brian was critically wounded and severely burned. Of the burns that covered more than 60 percent of his body, nearly half were third degree in severity. And, Brian, pardon me if I share something with our Members. Today, following 39 operations, months of hospitalization, and numerous skin grafts, Brian has been blessed with a miraculous recovery, and despite physical limitations, he testifies not only to the physical healing but the ultimate miracle of grace through Christ. He was awarded the Purple Heart through wounds he received that day, and upon his retirement in July of 2004, he was awarded the Legion of Merit. Members, today is a special day as we remember those who make it possible for us to debate so freely. We thank them and their families and the guests that we have. Mr. President, I yield to my fellow colleagues today, and then at the end, would like to be able to recognize our special guests. I would like to particularly recognize and be followed by Senator Paxton, who'd like to say a little bit more about our very own wounded warrior in this Senate Chamber.

Senator Paxton: As a new Member of the Senate, I want to thank you, Mr. President, the Members of the Senate, and particularly you, Senator Van de Putte, for creating a time during our session to honor the men and women who give so much of their life to protect ours. Any amount of time we take and words we share cannot possibly be enough to adequately convey the debt of gratitude and thanks that we owe. It is my honor today to speak about our own wounded warrior, our friend and colleague. Senator Brian Birdwell. Since we only have a brief time, and since I know he would rip this microphone out of my hand if I talked too long, let me briefly focus on a few aspects of Senator Birdwell that make him the really incredible person that he really is. First of all, we all know him as a man driven by his faith, most of us have not had to face mortality like he has. It's my understanding that he was actually the closest survivor to the impact of that plane. And that as he was laying there, that he was fairly certain that his time had come and he would be crossing into eternity and, thank God, that didn't happen. Since that time, he's established a ministry called Face the Fire Ministries in which he's helped wounded warriors and individuals who have been burned. We also know him as a family man and committed to his wife for 26 years. I can't imagine going through what they went through in their marriage with all the difficulty, the pain and suffering, but he's a model of a great family man, and we appreciate Mel going through that with him. And who can doubt his patriotism? Love of country and his state, 20 years in the Army, finishing as a Lieutenant Colonel, near loss of his life, burned 60 percent of his body, and now serving in the Texas Senate, he's a true patriot. And in character, I could go on and on about attributes that I see in him and his character, bravery, valor, integrity, honesty, a true man of character. He's somebody that I know if I were fighting and I were in a foxhole, he's one of those people I'd want in there with me, and I think that says it all. I consider it an honor to know you, to serve with you, and I truly appreciate your sacrifice for this country and for this state. We are all better off because you are part of our lives and because of your service to this country and state. God bless, Brian Birdwell.

Senator Rodríguez: Thank you, Mr. President. I want to also recognize our very own Senator Birdwell, with whom I came into the Senate last year, who kept me in line throughout the whole year and is keeping me in line even today, this morning, and thank him for his sacrifice and for the family sacrifice and for our wounded warriors. I serve proudly on the Senate Veteran and Military Installations Committee along with Senator Birdwell and, of course, with our great Chair, Senator Van de Putte, and wanted to express my appreciation to all the members that are here representing our wounded warriors. And I wanted to make a special statement about all of the wounded warriors that we have back in El Paso, whom we invited but could not be here and who are still connected in some ways to Fort Bliss, whether they're retired or not. And thank you all for what you've done for us in this country. We appreciate it.

Senator Davis: Thank you, Mr. President, and thank you, Senator Van de Putte, Madam Chair of our veterans committee. We thank you so much for the effort that you undertake every session to assure that we stop and take a moment to recognize the commitment, the sacrifice that our men and women of the armed services and their families have made on our behalf. It is an honor to share in recognizing our Senate colleague, Senator Birdwell, this morning and to be able to thank him publicly for all that he has done for us. I want to recognize another person who's standing on the floor with us today, who is from the district that I represent, Kenneth Howard, who's here from Tarrant County. He's on the far left of the group that is assembled here today, and his are the injuries that are not visible, but that so many of the men and women who are returning from tours in Iraq and Afghanistan endure. Mr. Howard served as a combat engineer in the United States Army from 2005 to 2010. He is a veteran of Operation Iraqi Freedom. His primary duty was training Iraqi soldiers and clearing routes of explosive devices. During his service, Mr. Howard was exposed to several very high pressure engagements, and as a result of those experiences, Kenneth has suffered from Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder and depression. As a consequence of that, he's undergone some difficulties on his return to the United States, and I'm proud to say that he is a successful graduate of Judge Brent Carr's veterans' diversion program that was made possible, Senator Van de Putte, by your leadership and the vote and work of our other Senate colleagues on the floor here today. He continues to make excellent progress with his recovery, and he's a shining example of how well that veterans' diversion court works. He received an honorable discharge upon the completion of his service, he had earned awards, including Army Commendation Medal, OIF Service Medal, and two campaign stars and unit citations. But now that he's back, and now that he's gone through his experience with the veterans' diversion program, he has undertaken to serve veterans as an employee of American Airlines, working in their pilot program to offer employment to veterans that have sustained physical or mental injury. He's also made himself available to support and return help to the operations of the Tarrant County veterans' diversion court that he benefited from. I would also like to recognize today with us in the south gallery, I'm honored to recognize other guests from Fort Worth who made the trip to be here with us this

morning. One of those I already mentioned, Judge Brent Carr of Tarrant County. He has been a leader in the diversion court program and has been an inspiration to so many Texans, including myself, for his leadership to our community. In particular, of course, he serves as a veterans' court judge, working closely with our veterans to help them overcome the many challenges that they face after leaving the service. And as a result of his success. Judge Carr's court has become a model for other veterans' courts around the state. Joining Judge Carr are Michael Killam. Michael served in the United States Army from 1968 to 1970. His regular duty was helicopter door gunner with a helicopter assault squadron during the Vietnam conflict. During his service, he was captured by enemy forces but managed to escape after three days of captivity. His awards include two Purple Hearts, unit citations, and the National Defense Medal. He continues to work through his military-service-connected PTSD, and he feels among his greatest achievements is his six years of sobriety. Michael continues to serve others who served in our wars throughout our nation's history and serves as a veteran coordinator for Liberty House, which is a transitional home in Tarrant County for homeless veterans. He's a mentor for the Tarrant County veterans' diversion court. He's a certified veteran peer specialist and a clerk for the Tarrant County Bar Association's Texas Lawyers for Texas Vets program. And then finally with us is Scott Smith, Scott enlisted and served in the U.S. Marine Corps from 1966 to 1970. In Vietnam, he served as a rifleman and regularly participated in day and nighttime patrols. His awards include three Purple Hearts, a Bronze Star, the Navy Marine Corps Commendation Medal, as well as other awards. As a result of his service, Scott, too, contracted PTSD. His continued service to veterans has played a large role in achieving a healthy life and a strong marriage. Scott maintains his commitment to veterans by serving also as a veterans' court mentor for both the Tarrant and the Dallas County Veterans' Court Diversion programs. He is a certified peer specialist and volunteer for the Tarrant County Texas Lawyers for Texas Vets program. Members, it's an honor to recognize these incredible men here who join us from Tarrant County today, and thank you, Mr. President, for allowing me to speak on their behalf.

Senator Campbell: Thank you, Mr. President. I will tell you that there is no better place to live in the world than the United States and that is because of our military and our veterans. There is no profession more honorable, and there are no persons that have more valor than you. Welcome to your Capitol.

Senator Hinojosa: Thank you, Mr. President. I would also like to say a few words in support of our American soldiers. I'm just so proud of our American soldiers. Many times, go throughout the day enjoying our families, our liberty and freedoms, and we forget the young men and women throughout the world protecting our country and protecting those freedoms. I will tell you that having served in Vietnam in the United States Marine Corps, I lost three of my high school friends, classmates, in Vietnam, so a day doesn't go by that I don't remember the sacrifice that our soldiers make, that your families and our families make, and to me, whether it's Vietnam, Iraq, Afghanistan, Korea, World War I, World War II, it's really amazing the courage that our American soldiers from all over the country, different regions, different races, get together and bond and are willing to die for our country. So, I thank you for your service to our country.

WHEREAS, S. M. True, Jr., former president of the Texas Farm Bureau, passed away on May 15, 2012, at the age of 88; and

WHEREAS, The son of Snoden Maddox and Nettie Belle Stalcup True, S. M. True was born in Goree on July 8, 1923, and raised on a farm; in 1933, his family relocated to the Snyder community near Plainview, and he graduated from Plainview High School before enrolling and attending classes at Texas Tech University; when World War II intervened, he enlisted in the U.S. Navy and served as a carrier-based night fighter pilot; and

WHEREAS, Following the war, Mr. True returned to Hale County and began his career as a farmer; active in the Hale County Farm Bureau for a number of years, he went on to serve on the board of directors of the Texas Farm Bureau; he was elected president of TFB in 1982, and in his 11 years in that post, he made an indelible mark on both the organization and on the greater agricultural community; he oversaw the creation of the TFB AGFUND, which has since become a nationally recognized agriculture political action committee; along the way, he earned a reputation as a passionate advocate for Texas farmers and an effective consensus builder; and

WHEREAS, In addition to his work with TFB, this esteemed Texan was appointed to the Governor's Task Force on Immigration and Agricultural Development, the Joint Committee on Farmworker Insurance, and the Texas Family Farm and Ranch Advisory Committee; he served on a multitude of agriculture and farm insurance boards, including that of the American Farm Bureau Federation, which honored him with its Meritorious Service Award; among his rumerous other accolades were his induction into the State Fair of Texas Heritage Hall of Honor and his recognition as a Distinguished Texan in Agriculture by the Texas A&M University College of Agriculture and Life Sciences; and

WHEREAS, Mr. True shared more than six rewarding decades with his wife, the former Anna Jean Roberts, whom he married in 1946; the couple were blessed with a son, David; over the years, Mrs. Roberts frequently accompanied her husband to many Texas Farm Bureau events across the state and beyond; and

WHEREAS, During his lifetime, S. M. True contributed immeasurably to Texas agriculture, helping to preserve the livelihood of countless farmers across the state, and his legacy will be a continuing source of inspiration for all who knew him; now, therefore, be it

SB 135, Relating to the use of a public school student's performance on an end-of-course assessment instrument in determining the student's final grade for the course.

Floor Amendment No. 1

Amend **SB 135** (Senate committee printing) by striking SECTIONS 1 and 2 of the bill (page 1, line 23 through page 2, line 21) and substituting the following:

SECTION 1. Subsections (c) and (f), Section 28.014, Education Code, are amended to read as follows:

- (c) The agency, in consultation with the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board, shall adopt an end-of-course assessment instrument for each course developed under this section to ensure the rigor of the course. A school district shall, in accordance with State Board of Education rules, administer the end-of-course assessment instrument to a student enrolled in a course developed under this section. [Each school district shall adopt a policy that requires a student's performance on the end-of-course assessment instrument to account for 15 percent of the student's final grade for the course.] A student's performance on an end-of-course assessment instrument administered under this subsection may be used, on a scale of 0-40, in calculating whether the student satisfies the graduation requirements established under Section 39.025.
- (f) To the extent applicable, the commissioner shall draw from curricula and instructional materials developed under Section [Sections] 28.008 [and 61.0763] in developing a course and related instructional materials under this section. Not later than September 1, 2010, the State Board of Education shall adopt essential knowledge and skills for each course developed under this section. The State Board of Education shall make each course developed under this section and the related instructional materials available to school districts not later than the 2014-2015 school year. [As required by Subsection (c), a school district shall adopt a policy requiring a student's

performance on an end-of-course assessment instrument administered under that subsection to account for 15 percent of the student's grade for a course developed under this section not later than the 2014-2015 school year.] This subsection expires September 1, 20.5.

SECTION 2. Subsection (c), Section 39.023, Education Code, is amended to read as follows:

(c) The agency shall also adopt end-of-course assessment instruments for secondary-level courses in Algebra I, Algebra II, geometry, biology, chemistry, physics, English I, English II, English III, world geography, world history, and United States history. The Algebra I, Algebra II, and geometry end-of-course assessment instruments must be administered with the aid of technology. A school district shall comply with State Board of Education rules regarding administration of the assessment instruments listed in this subsection [and shall adopt a policy that requires a student's performance on an end of course assessment instrument for a course listed in this subsection in which the student is enrolled to account for 15 percent of the student's final-grade for the course. If a student retakes an end-of-course assessment instrument for a course listed in this subsection, as provided by Section 39.025, a school district is not required to use the student's performance on the subsequent administration or administrations of the assessment instrument to determine the student's final grade for the course]. If a student is in a special education program under Subchapter A, Chapter 29, the student's admission, review, and dismissal committee shall determine whether any allowable modification is necessary in administering to the student an assessment instrument required under this subsection. The State Board of Education shall administer the assessment instruments. The State Board of Education shall adopt a schedule for the administration of end-of-course assessment instruments that complies with the requirements of Subsection (c-3).

The amendment to SB 135 was read and was adopted by a viva voce vote.

Senator Eltife offered the following resolution:

WHEREAS, The Senate of the State of Texas takes pride in recognizing William Powers, Jr., president of The University of Texas at Austin, who has recently been honored in diverse areas of endeavor including winning an award for legal scholarship and being elected vice chair of an association of preeminent research universities; and

WHEREAS, Bill Powers is a 2012 corecipient of the prestigious John G. Fleming Memorial Prize for Torts Scholarship; widely recognized as a leading American legal scholar, he was awarded the prize for his definitive interpretations of juridical concepts and for coauthoring a treatise on the general principles of tort law; his extensive writing on personal injury and emotional damages is considered one of the major achievements of modern jurisprudence; and

WHEREAS, President Powers is highly respected for his leadership on issues related to higher education, and he was recently elected vice chair of the Association of American Universities; the association's programs encourage improved funding for research to enable leading universities to continue functioning as centers of innovation

and scientific advancement; with his successful record as an advocate for undergraduate and graduate education, he enriches the association, bringing his expertise and keen intellect to bear on the critical task of maintaining financial resources for programs of advanced learning; and

WHEREAS, President Powers has also been appointed as a member of a group of senior advisors to guide a new initiative of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences entitled the Lincoln Project: Excellence and Access in Public Higher Education; this initiative seeks to advocate for the importance of public colleges and universities; as key engines of economic growth, innovation, and upward mobility, these schools are facing fundamental challenges from cutbacks in government support, competition from for-profit education providers and foreign universities, and emerging technological changes; and

REMARKS ORDERED PRINTED

On motion of Senator Eltife and by unanimous consent, the remarks regarding **SR 234** were ordered reduced to writing and printed in the *Senate Journal* as follows:

Senator Eltife: Thank you, Mr. President and Members. I am pleased today to present this resolution, along with my fellow Senators, honoring University of Texas at Austin President Bill Powers. I'll be brief in my remarks, as I know many other Members would like to speak, A few years ago I attended UT Austin. Coming from the small town of Tyler to the University was very intimidating. I knew very few people and had very little means to pay for college. With the help of financial aid and a lot of prayers, somehow I graduated. Some of my best friends to this very day are those I made here at UT. I attribute my success in business to the education I received at UT. The University means a lot to me, and I'm very thankful for having the opportunity to attend. This is the reason that I admire and respect President Powers so much. I see in this President a man who shares the love for the University that so many of the current students and former students have for this great institution. I see a man who always puts the University first, someone who stands up for what he believes in, even if it may not be politically popular. President Powers, I want to thank you for your outstanding leadership. I want to thank you for leading the University with honesty and integrity and thank you for allowing us to honor you here today. May God bless you and your family.

Senator Watson: Thank you very much, Mr. President, and thank you, Senator Eltife, for bringing forward this resolution. It's a distinct pleasure to have the opportunity to not only say thank you to President Powers for the role he plays at The University of Texas at Austin but to also recognize him for that role. I'm going to speak a little bit about, from the perspective of having been the Mayor of the City of Austin and the Chair of the Chamber of Commerce and, now, getting to play this wonderful role of being a State Senator that represents this Central Texas region the way I get to. You know, the truth of the matter is that so much good about the economy of Central Texas and therefore, the economy of the State of Texas is a result of the work that goes on at The University of Texas at Austin. It's no coincidence that the City of Austin in Central Texas enjoys a reputation and has become a focal point in a worldwide information and knowledge economy at the same time that it has sitting in its midst an internationally-recognized Tier One research university. It's no coincidence that we are that focal point that people talk of us being the next Silicon

Valley only better, at the same time that, and we're cultivating an economy based upon intellectual capital, at the same time we can point to The University of Texas at Austin and the role that it plays. I remember just a few years ago, leading a delegation to Korea, because what we were hoping to do, was we were hoping to get Samsung to make another multibillion dollar investment in Texas, one of those investments that would make it one of the largest international and foreign investments in the United States in a long time. And when we were in that meeting, one of the people that was there with us was one of the folks from The University of Texas at Austin. And he was able to point out that, at that point in time, and I don't know whether it's still true today, the number one foreign population at The University of Texas at Austin doing research and learning was from South Korea. It made a real difference, Members, in the fact that today we had, we got that investment. Samsung has made that investment. The University of Texas at Austin is a magnet for economic development. And, importantly, it's a magnet for economic development in large part because of leadership from someone like Bill Powers. It's interesting that we ought to point outthat UT was recently ranked the 25th best university in the world by the London-based Times Higher Education. That is a direct result of leadership from Bill Powers. During his, President Powers' time in office, the number of University of Texas programs ranked in the nation's top 10 has increased by 50 percent. And I just want to pause on that for a minute, because what that means is, that when we are selling Texas to the world, one of our key selling points is that we have The University of Texas at Austin, and it ranks in such a way that its programs are in the top 10 of programs in the country. He's also led reform of the core curriculum, and he has made a number of landmark changes on The University of Texas campus. Members, for an Austin guy, I will tell you, The University of Texas at Austin is the soul of Austin. It's been the heart of this city since the 19th century. But as that, it also makes a difference in the State of Texas, and we would not as a state be able to brag the way we do and attract and retain the talent that we so desperately need to enjoy the kind of economy that we enjoy without the leadership of President Bill Powers. So, President Powers, this is my opportunity to say thank you publicly to you for all you mean, not just to UT and the City of Austin, but to the State of Texas, but also to take a moment so that we might all recognize the great value you bring to our wonderful state. God bless you and thank you.

Senator Lucio: Thank you, Mr. President. Thank you, Senator Eltife, Senator Watson. I, too, rise to honor this distinguished gentleman. A gentleman that I have had the pleasure of knowing for many years now. President Bill Powers is exemplary to say the least, and I am happy to have this opportunity, though, to publicly tell everyone on a personal basis what you have meant to me, my family, and to so many in South Texas. President Powers is not a stranger to any part of the state, especially my part in South Texas, which he traveled to and from many times. And the reason he's gone down there is because he's opened the doors of opportunities for so many countless numbers of young men and women seeking to further their education at this wonderful university we call Texas. And I just want to say that when my son first entered law school, it was Dean Powers at the time that greeted him and greeted so many others at the same time in such a professional, and with a lot of warmth and affection, and I'll never forget that moment. Eddie was so encouraged and so happy

that he became a good student, a very good student in law school, and I was very proud. And that came because of the leadership that you provided and the remarks that you made to him and others at the time when I was present that obviously led to successes in their lives—Eddie now is a State Representative and many others, leaders, young leaders in our state. So, we are indebted to this incredible leader, Texas leader that we call our President, right here in Austin, Texas, and I just, I'm happy that we finally brought you on the floor to let everyone know what you've meant to The University of Texas and what you've meant to us individually. God bless you, President Powers.

Senator Nelson: Thank you, Mr. President. Senator Eltife, thank you for bringing this resolution to the floor. I'm not going to repeat all the nice things that have been said, but I totally agree with them, and I want to thank you, President Powers, for your service to this state, for your many years of service to our education system. I want to congratulate you on your award and just to tell you all that since being named President of, in what, 2006, President Powers has faithfully led The University of Texas, our state's largest university, one of the largest in the nation. He has done it so well, and we are very grateful, wish you continued success, and, you know, today is Presidents' Day. I thought it was, you know, we were bringing you here because you're President and we're honoring you, but thank you for all you've done. We wish you well.

Senator Ellis: Thank you, Mr. President. Senator Eltife, thank you for bringing this forward. I noticed in your comments, you said that you graduated from The University of Texas a few years ago; I think you meant to say, a few too many years ago. I fall in that category as well. When I was at the law school, Mr. President, in 1977, when I started, you were the most popular law professor at the law school then, and I guess we had pretty good judgment back then because you have remained one of the most popular figures in education throughout your career. I remember being on the Law School Foundation Board when you were advising us on a number of issues. And then you became the Dean; you were a very popular Dean, did a great job. Senator Nelson mentioned that this is Presidents' Day, and I'm not going to repeat all the things that have been said about you, but I want to remind you and remind anybody who's listening, this is not a eulogy. You've been such a great President, we want you to keep being the President of The University of Texas. I used to think this was a tough job that the 32 of us, one missing now, but the 31 State Senators and the Lieutenant Governor have. I think being president of a major university in this day and age is probably far more difficult, far more political, far more challenging than the task that we have of being in elected office, because you don't get to just put your name before the voters, and then if you can persuade enough of them, you can get another term. You have to respond to a whole host of interests, and you have done that well. You've done that admirably, and, Sir, we appreciate you. This is an honor today, we'll sing the accolades to you today, but it's only because we respect you, we love you, we want you to keep doing the great job you're doing for my university. The University of Texas. Thank you.

Senator Huffman: Thank you, Mr. President. I join today to support Senator Eltife's resolution. I was proud to sign on to that resolution with him. And although, if you'll excuse me, because I'm an LSU graduate and not from The University of Texas, I wanted to let you know that you are renowned throughout the state for your leadership at UT. You bring pride throughout the state, to the way you've led the University with such dignity. And I thought it was interesting to note that, and I don't think anyone has said this yet, that when you were Dean of the UT School of Law, among other things, you recruited a world-class faculty, which you were known for, but also you quadrupled the number of African American students and doubled the number of Hispanics at the Law School, and I think that that's an admirable accomplishment. So, thank you for all you've done for UT, and through your work at the UT, you've made the entire state proud. Congratulations, Sir. Thank you very much.

Senator Deuell: Thank you, Mr. President, Members. Thank you, Senator Eltife, for bringing this up. President Powers, I just want to say thank you for the great job you're doing and thank you for being a straight shooter with the Texas Senate. When you testify, we can take what you tell us to the bank, and we deeply appreciate that, because that's not always the case. Thank you.

Senator West: Thank you very much, Mr. President. I join with my colleagues, also, and say to you, President Powers, thank you very much for what you have done and what you will do in the future. What is political capital? You know, political capital is the currency here in this building, that individuals have in order to, when they talk to different legislators here about issues that they feel passionate about. When I think about you, I know that you have political capital here in this building, and that's why you're so important to The University of Texas. You're able to come to this building, articulate the priorities of the University, and each and every one of us. I think Senator Deuell kind of hit the nail on the head, he said, you know, we can take your word to the bank. Not only can we take your word to the bank, we can also use it as collateral. And that's real important because if you don't have integrity, if you are a person that cannot be trusted or flip-flops, you get nowhere in this building. You're serving at the helm of The University of Texas. Those issues that are important to Texas have always been considered here as we look at higher education issues and a whole multitude of issues. When I think about issues that we have dealt with, with Texas, in terms of its image, and we know that over the years there's been some image problems, if you will, as it relates to accessibility there, and acceptability. Some of those issues have, in fact, subsided, that's based on your leadership. And, Members, if you haven't had the opportunity to go over to the campus and just kind of hang out with the President, you ought to do that. When I say hang out with the President, I'm talking about going to some of the student organization meetings and watch how students receive him. They receive him with enthusiasm. They know he's the President, and they know that he cares about what they're doing there on the campus, as well as, obviously, them matriculating in a timely fashion so they can be on time, so to speak. When I think about The University of Texas, I can recall, Senator Birdwell, sitting pretty much in the chair that you're sitting in right now when we were looking at recruiting ethnic minority students at The University of Texas, and I made a personal privilege speech encouraging Texas to not only go after the best and brightest linebackers and point guards that I have coming out of the Dallas area but

also go after the students that want to major in engineering and teaching to some of the other areas. I can say that President Powers has made that, in fact, a priority. Is there still work to be done? Yes, there's still work to be done. And I know that, Senator Seliger, that with Bill Powers at the helm, that those issues will, in fact, be addressed. I think The University of Texas looks more like Texas now, and under his continued stewardship, I know that the best days for the University are ahead of it. Thank you.

Senator Seliger: Thank you, Mr. President. As Senator Ellis intimated when, want to make sure that this doesn't sound like a funeral oration, but we have to keep a sense of perspective, because if we go back 300 years in the history of higher education in this nation, what made institutions special were special people. There is a stratum of leaders, visionary leaders in the history of higher education in this country that have taken their institutions to new levels and taken higher education to new levels. Names like John Sloan Dickey, Harry Emerson Fosdick, Derek Bok, Hanna Gray, Barry Thompson, have all provided the kind of leadership that essentially took their universities to the next level, as it were, and to see to it that they were as esteemed as their mission. One of the things that I was asked recently about Bill Powers, and I said, in addition to his many gifts, he overreacts to nothing. And think about this. Take a city of 50 some-odd thousand people with a lot of academics and a lot of teenagers and a lot of highly motivated athletes, there's about a crisis a day. And still things go smoothly and the mission is met. It has never been a challenge during this administration to make The University of Texas a large institution. It already is. But I think what sets Bill Powers aside is his dedication toward making it a better institution, an institution that doesn't just prize its size or the number of programs it has but the excellence that it provides. And there are things that people don't often see a lot about, freshman interest groups that take a very large university and try to bring interaction groups down to the size that it is a small college experience-not easy to do. The effort to see to it that more classes are taught by faculty members and not graduate students-not easy to do in a multibillion dollar operation. It is a great honor to have the association with The University of Texas that we get to have. But the point has always been not just the education of those young people but an education that makes those young people truly a benefit to the State of Texas. Congratulations, and thank you for being with us today.

Senator Duncan: Thank you, Mr. President. Members, I, too, rise to congratulate President Powers, who's been a good friend for a long time. He has been a wise counsel to the Texas Senate over many years, beginning with the civil justice reforms that we have done over the years to make this state more competitive in this country. He was the guy that we would always go to for the wise balance, and did a great job for us. But more than that, as President of The University of Texas here in Austin, one of the largest, one of our flagship institutions in the state, he has provided not only leadership for that institution but leadership for all of us and higher education generally with an unselfish approach to giving us advice. And I know on many occasions, you've given me good advice, sat down with me, and given me good advice over the years of how to address issues and problems in an unselfish way, and I

appreciate that. And for that, I thank you on behalf of the constituents I represent but also recognize the great leadership you provided in higher education as well as in our civil justice reforms over the years.

Senator Zaffirini: Thank you, Mr. President. Mr. President and Members, it is truly my pleasure to rise in support of Senate Resolution 234 and thank you. Senator Eltife. for your leadership in making this wonderful day possible. I applaud you. It's an opportunity to recognize a wonderful leader for higher education and a great Texan who is doing a phenomenal job as President of our beloved University of Texas at Austin. As President he has focused on excellence in all arenas, including by enhancing undergraduate teaching, graduate programs, and research. He's now implementing recommendations made by a task force he created to address undergraduate graduation rates, which developed an ambitious goal, a 70 percent four-year graduation rate by 2016. I'm confident that he will succeed. He's fostered deeper relationships than ever with alumni and with leading corporations. He's improved institutional productivity and efficiency, including by overhauling the University's budget process and reforming its approach to information technology. Because he has prioritized increasing diversity at UT Austin, the University today is a diverse learning community with students from more than 100 countries. African American, Hispanic, and Asian American students now make up more than 35 percent of the enrollment and nine percent are international students. President Powers is a proven leader, not only in Texas but also nationally and internationally. A President who understands the importance of research, he recently was elected Vice-chair of the Association of American Universities, a prestigious organization that is considered the gold standard at designating national research universities. What's more, he serves as a senior advisor to a new initiative of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences called the Lincoln Project: Excellence and Access in Public Higher Education. Interestingly, he also has served as a legal consultant for the United States Congress, the Texas Legislature, and even the Brazilian Legislature. Known for his phenomenal support of students, faculty, and alumni, President Powers is a Texas leader who cares deeply about excellence in higher education. He implemented signature courses to give every freshman an experience to take a course taught by an outstanding faculty member who focuses on writing, critical thinking, and big issues. He even teaches one of the courses, and the students love him, just as he loves them. Many universities in our great nation would covet the opportunity to have Bill Powers as their President, but we are the fortunate ones. He is our President at The University of Texas at Austin, and we are so proud and so appreciative of his leadership, his ability, and his future. As a Texas Ex who is also married to a Texas Ex and the mother of a Texas Ex, some of you know that I bleed burnt orange, and I'm proud to do that, but I know, President Powers, that your support runs deep, not only among Texas Exes but among the alumni and students from throughout our state and even throughout our country, those who recognize what you have done for higher education in general. We are so proud that you will continue as our President, and we will continue to be appreciative of everything that you do for the students, especially, for the communities, and for our great state. Thank you from the bottom of our hearts. Hook 'em horns.

Senator Whitmire: Thank you, Mr. President and Members. Dean Powers, from one Dean to another Dean, let me tell you first of all. I'm not real keen on these resolutions. I've had to kind of change my position since I had a real nice resolution addressing my 40 years of service recently. So, in this business, you have to be open-minded, a little flexible, so let me just say, I certainly concur with this resolution today, and I hope to spend a couple of minutes to tell you why. First of all, one of the nicest things that day when I was honored was Senator West said, You're a good man, Whitmire. And that really struck because in this business and in the world you work in, you get a lot of plaques and recognition and awards, but for someone just in public to say you're a good man, just means so much. Similar to that, quite often, I'll describe my daughters who have grown up their entire life while I've been a Senator. is I'm proud to call them normal children because they've been around public service and the opportunities that we get, and they're normal. And I'll describe you as a normal individual in the most positive sense of the word. To put it in perspective, Members, when I was a young State Rep in the '70s, it was a different world. UT was iust as powerful as it is today, but the rules of engagement was different. Frank Erwin would come by my office after a week of voting in 1974 when we had the constitutional convention where we looked at the governance of all elements of state government, and he'd come by in his rough voice-I was a young State Rep-and he'd say, Representative Whitmire, last week we voted, we had 19 votes that we monitored that pertained to The University of Texas, 19 votes that we watched, and you were 12 and 7, Representative, and we really are going to pay attention this next week. That was then, this is now. That wouldn't work, probably wouldn't get back in my office under those type of measures. In this day and time of transparency and better governance. Bill Powers is the right man for the right time and the right place in history. Bill, I cannot, and I speak to you on a first name because of our relationship. when we were dealing with, Senator West, a couple of years ago, trying, it's one of the toughest and emotional and meaningful issues that I've dealt with in my career, the top 10 percent. People love it or hate it, appreciate it or disrespect it. Royce, we could not have gotten anywhere without the skill, the credibility of Bill Powers. And I've got to just share also and put a face on that issue. It was so tough. I've actually been in meetings where all the Members weren't invited. Senator Van de Putte held a meeting early one morning, and I and half a dozen of us, very diverse group of individuals were working on it, all Senators, Senator Eltife. We were making what we thought was some progress. There was one person that had not been invited to about a 14-member Senate working group, was Royce West. Royce had not because we knew how he felt-don't mess with the top 10 percent rule. And, you know, what are they going to do to you around here? I knew he wasn't going to beat us up, but we just thought we could maybe make some headway, Royce, if you weren't invited. There was one individual that we trusted to be in that meeting that was not a Senator, it was Bill Powers. I don't know of another human in this state, Mr. President, another college president or chancellor or regent that would've been in that meeting, but we needed Bill Powers because he was the facilitator. We respected him on both sides of that issue. and we were, what we thought, making some progress, Senator Eltife. And about that time, that door swung open, we were over in Senator Van de Putte's annex office, and that door swung open, and it was Senator West. And he said, Excuse me.

did y'all, did I not get the call to this meeting? And I said-you know, you don't get to be Dean because you're going to stand up to Royce West-I said, Oh, excuse me, Senator, you know, I would've invited you, I was, let me, we just, it wasn't planned, we just kind of got together. And it broke up pretty quick, and I told Bill, I said, Bill, you're our partner. We respect you. You have the credibility to make this happen, and he stayed with it, and we made some improvements, and it's still an issue is why we need Bill Powers running The University of Texas to help us address tough issues like that. I can't begin to tell you the thousands of people that we impact on this floor that we never meet. In fact, most of the people we impact, we do never meet. President Powers, I'm certain you understand the impact you have on thousands of Texans that you never meet, in fact, most of them, you never meet. Let me close by saying, in my opinion and the opinion of this body, the best is yet to come, Bill. We need you to continue to be in those closed working sessions of diverse groups of Republican and Democrat and ethnic diverse State Senators and State Representatives. This state needs you. You're an asset. And so, you take care of your health, we're all a phone call away, but I truly believe I'm speaking for this body, that the best is yet to come, because we've got some really tough challenges before us. Thank you for allowing us to honor you today.

WHEREAS, An advocate for social justice, he interceded on behalf of migrants and refugees worldwide, speaking for those whose voices would not have been heard otherwise, and he has called for an equitable distribution of world resources and for environmental protections to ensure human health; and

WHEREAS, A proponent of religious freedom, tolerance, and cooperation, Benedict deepened ties with many religions during his tenure as Pope, including Judaism and Islam; he was the first Pope to visit and pray at a Mosque in more than 2,000 years; within his own Church, he expanded the use of the traditional Latin Mass and eased rules regarding the conversion of Anglicans to Catholicism; and

WHEREAS, Born Joseph Ratzinger on April 16, 1927, in Marktl am Inn, Germany, he was ordained a priest in 1951 and was a professor of theology at numerous European universities; he served as the Archbishop of Munich and Freising and was made a cardinal in 1977 by Pope Paul VI; he also served as the Prefect of the

Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith and as Vice-Dean of the College of Cardinals; in April 2005, he was elected to the papacy at the age of 78, the oldest cardinal to become Pope in 275 years; and

WHEREAS, Known as an academic, scholar, and teacher, Pope Benedict is a prolific writer, having written 66 books throughout his life; he also has authored numerous articles and established a journal devoted to theology, and he oversaw the preparation of the new Catechism of the Catholic Church; he is noted for writings that promote maintaining traditional Christian values in the modern world; now, therefore, he it

RESOLVED, That the Senate of the State of Texas, 83rd Legislature, hereby pay tribute to the service of Pope Benedict XVI; and, be it further

RESOLVED, That a copy of this Resolution be prepared in honor of Pope Benedict XVI.

On motion of Senator Williams and by unanimous consent, the remarks by Senator Lucio regarding **SR 328** were ordered reduced to writing and printed in the *Senate Journal* as follows:

Thank you, Mr. President. Members, ladies, and gentlemen, I would like to take this moment and honor the service of the 265th Pope. His Holiness Pope Benedict the 16th. The world was shocked by Pope Benedict XVI's announcement just before Lent that he no longer has the strength to exercise ministry over the Catholic Church and that he would resign the papacy effective this day after an eight-year pontificate-the first Pope to resign in more than 600 years. It is clear that this was not a snap decision. He said that after having repeatedly examined his conscience before God. he became convinced that his strength and advanced age were no longer suited to an adequate exercise of the papacy. In our modern world of flashy media and massive ego, Pope Benedict's decision can seem perplexing. Many cannot understand why anyone would give up the power, the prestige, and trappings of office to retire and quietly fade away from the limelight. We should recognize that despite his age, Pope Benedict has always been well attuned to the modern world; he is the first Pope who joined Twitter, after all, and has noted that the rapid changes of today's world require a Pope who has both strength of mind and body. The key is that the decision. related by those close to Pope Benedict XVI, was his love and respect for the importance of a job of leading a church which represents the largest number of Christians in the world. His decision is a humble and brave one, and his wisdom is evident. Pope Benedict has honored his faith greatly through self-denial at the start of Lent. His was an unusual act of a remarkable man. It should teach and remind us all of something he knows well: the papacy is not about the man, but about our communion with the Holy Spirit. The weakness of our mortal flesh is secondary to our commitment to God and our faith. His was a selfless expression of his devotion to the church's primary mission of spreading the Gospel. Pope Benedict XVI reminds us all that a faithful head of the Roman Catholic Church, he offers an example of selflessness and timeless leadership for which we should all respect.

WHEREAS, Mark Hasse was a man of courage, integrity, and generosity; he gave unselfishly to others and was noted for his love of animals, his story-telling ability, and his enthusiasm for living each day to the fullest; now, therefore, be it

WHEREAS, The State of Texas and the entire nation are mourning the tragic loss of Christopher Scott Kyle of Midlothian, an American hero who died on February 2, 2013, at the age of 38; and

WHEREAS, Chris Kyle was born in Odessa on April 8, 1974, to Wayne and Deby Kyle; growing up on his parents' ranch, he enjoyed an active life; he learned marksmanship at an early age, hunting deer and pheasant, and when he was older, he challenged himself further as a professional bronco and bull rider; and

WHEREAS, After studying ranch and range management for two years at Tarleton State University and then working as a ranch hand, Mr. Kyle answered his nation's call to duty and joined the U.S. Navy in 1999; his skill and determination quickly led to his transfer to the SEALs, the navy's elite special operations force, where he prevailed throughout the team's strenuous selection process and was chosen to receive sniper training; and

WHEREAS, Throughout four combat tours, Mr. Kyle served with SEAL Team 3 in the thick of battle in such places as Ramadi, Fallujah, and Baghdad, and his exceptional ability as a marksman enabled him to save countless American lives and earned him legendary status as the most successful sniper in U.S. history; his outstanding record was recognized with two Silver Stars and five Bronze Stars with Valor, among many other decorations; following his combat deployments, he served as a chief instructor for training other navy snipers, and he wrote the first Navy SEAL sniper manual; and

WHEREAS, Chris Kyle retired from the navy in 2009 as a chief petty officer and returned to his family in Texas; his combat memoir, *American Sniper*, became a worldwide bestseller, with proceeds from the book going to the families of two fellow SEALs who were killed in battle; in addition, he cofounded Craft International, which trains military, police, and civilian security forces, and he also appeared on the NBC show *Stars Earn Stripes*; and

WHEREAS, More importantly, Mr. Kyle devoted himself to caring for his fellow veterans, and he helped found the FITCO Cares Foundation, which provides at-home fitness equipment to veterans recovering from the emotional and physical wounds of war; his commitment to the support of servicemen and servicewomen and their families was heartfelt, deep, and enduring; and

WHEREAS, Chris Kyle was an outstanding soldier, a humble patriot, a man of strong faith, and a loving husband, father, son, and brother; his generosity, good humor, and compassion encompassed not just those closest to him, but all those men and women who accept, as he did, both the sacrifice and the privilege of serving their nation; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Senate of the 83rd Texas Legislature hereby pay tribute to the life of Christopher Scott Kyle and extend heartfelt condolences to the members of his family: to his wife, Taya, and their two children; to his parents, Wayne and Deby Kyle; to his brother, Jeff Kyle, his wife, Amy, and their two daughters; to his grandmothers, Joyce Kyle and Louise Mercer; to his parents-in-law, Kent and Kim Studebaker; to his sister-in-law, Ashley Purvis-Smith, her husband, Stewart, and their four children; and to his other relatives, friends, and many admirers across the Lone Star State and beyond; and, be it further

JOINT SESSION

(To hear the State of the Judiciary Address by the Honorable Wallace B. Jefferson, Chief Justice, Supreme Court of Texas)

The President announced the time had arrived for the Joint Session pursuant to the provisions of **HCR 66**.

The President of the Senate and the Senators present, escorted by the Secretary of the Senate and the Sergeant-at-Arms, proceeded to the Hall of the House of Representatives at 11:15 a.m.

The Honorable David Dewhurst was announced and, on invitation of the Speaker, occupied a seat at the Speaker's Rostrum.

The Senators were announced and were admitted and escorted to seats prepared for them along the aisle.

The Honorable Wallace B. Jefferson was announced and was escorted to the Speaker's Rostrum by Senators West, Chair; Duncan, Estes, Schwertner, and Whitmire on the part of the Senate, and Representatives Lewis, Chair; Moody, Carter, Herrero, and Riddle on the part of the House.

The Honorable David Dewhurst, President of the Senate, called the Senate to order and announced a quorum of the Senate present.

The Honorable Joe Straus, Speaker of the House of Representatives, called the House to order, announced a quorum of the House present, and stated the purpose of the Joint Session.

Speaker Straus introduced Rhonda Jefferson, wife of Chief Justice Wallace B. Jefferson.

The President introduced the Honorable Chief Justice Wallace B. Jefferson, who addressed the Joint Session as follows:

Governor Perry, Governor Dewhurst, Speaker Straus, Members of the Legislature, Presiding Judge Keller, and all of my judicial colleagues throughout Texas. This presentation is entitled "State of the Judiciary," but as I began to think about the message I would like to convey, it occurred to me that the challenges we face are much larger than whether our courts are funded adequately. The question is not how is the Judiciary? We must ask instead whether our system of justice is working for the people it has promised to serve. Do we have liberty and justice for all? Or have we come to accept liberty and justice only for some? So let's not limit our inquiry to whether the judiciary is healthy. Courts exist not to perpetuate the judicial branch for its own sake, but to ensure that the conflicts human beings encounter, whether criminal or civil, are adjudicated in a neutral forum, at an efficient price, producing fair outcomes.

Basic Civil Legal Services

For those who can afford legal services, we have a top-notch judicial system. Highly qualified lawyers help courts dispense justice fairly and efficiently. But that kind of representation is expensive. A larger swath of litigation exists in which the contestants lack wealth, insurance is absent, and public funding is not available. Some of our most essential rights—those involving families, homes, and livelihoods—are the least protected. Veterans languish for months before their disability, pension, and educational benefits arrive. As a result of the recent financial crisis, lower- and middle-income homeowners and tenants face foreclosure and eviction. Ever-increasing numbers of consumers and small businesses have filed for bankruptcy. And few can afford a lawyer to guide them through these crises. Nearly six million Texans qualify for legal aid. Yet our state's legal aid programs meet but 20% of the needs of indigent Texans, forcing many to go it alone in our courts. In South Texas, 2.6 million people qualify for legal

aid. That means that there are 21,000 potential clients for each lawyer employed by the region's main legal aid office. It is clear to me, then, that we must fund our state's legal aid programs. Fortunately, for our great state, it is clear to you, too. When we told you that the largest source of funding for these programs, interest on lawyers trust accounts, plummeted 75% in the last 5 years, you came to the rescue. The 81st Legislature appropriated \$20 million in general revenue for the 2010-2011 biennium. Even as the fiscal crisis hit Texas hard, the 82nd Legislature provided \$17.5 million for this biennium. And in this session, the House and Senate have indicated general-revenue funding will remain at these levels. On behalf of desperate Texans who have no other options, I thank you for your continued support of basic civil legal services. Without your assistance, the situation would be utterly hopeless. The legal profession is doing its part. Texas lawyers donate about 2.5 million hours of free legal services to the poor each year. In the Supreme Court, we have had tremendous success with a pro bono program that matches some of our pro se litigants with appellate lawyers who have donated their expertise to the cause of justice. More than 300 lawyers have signed up to participate, and we have referred dozens of cases to that program since 2007. Several of our intermediate appellate courts have adopted similar initiatives. But even if we were to require every Texas lawyer to represent at least one indigent client, we would serve less than 40% of the poor who seek help. We must do more, not to preserve the judiciary, but to keep the courthouse doors open for all of our neighbors.

Indigent defense

I have been talking about basic civil legal services. But on the 50-year anniversary of Gideon v. Wainwright, I cannot resist a few words about our criminal justice system. Gideon, charged with breaking and entering in Florida, asked for a lawyer; was denied counsel; and then was convicted. While in prison, he scrawled a petition on prison stationery, and asked the Supreme Court to reverse his conviction. In that famous case, the Court concluded unanimously that the Constitution guarantees a defendant the right to counsel in criminal proceedings. After retrial, with appointed counsel, Gideon was acquitted. And this brings up my second point. To sound Gideon's trumpet in Texas, we must insist that criminal defendants have qualified counsel who are equipped with the time and resources to mount a meaningful defense. Texas ranks 48th in per capita funding for indigent defense. As alarming as that figure sounds, it masks extraordinary improvements implemented here in just a few short years. The Texas Indigent Defense Commission, chaired by Presiding Judge Keller, has developed innovative programs to increase delivery of indigent defense services. With the Legislature's financial help, thousands more Texans now receive constitutionally guaranteed defense representation. A prime example is the Regional Public Defender Office for Capital Cases, headquartered in Lubbock. The pool of lawyers qualified to handle these complex cases is quite thin and, until recently, local communities had few resources to pay for these incredibly costly matters. This regional office,

serving more than 155 counties, both ensures quality legal representation for the defendant and mitigates the expense a capital case inflicts on the county. The Harris County Public Defender office opened two years ago through a grant from the Indigent Defense Commission. Among other responsibilities, that office represents juvenile clients who are also victims of human trafficking. And Bell County developed a program, with assistance from the Commission, that provides specialized representation and legal support services to defendants who have mental health concerns. The most innovative project is happening right now in Comal County. The Commission gave the county a grant to fund a pilot project that will allow indigent defendants to select the qualified attorney of their choice, rather than receiving attorneys appointed by judges or court administrators. With this idea, new for the United States but standard practice in England and elsewhere, defense lawyers will be more directly aligned with the interests of their clients. Comal County will work with indigent defense experts to assess the current system and to recommend qualitative and quantitative improvements. A caveat. As with basic civil legal services, funding for indigent defense does not currently meet the demand. State funding through the Commission covers only 15 percent of the total indigent defense expenditures in Texas. For that reason, the Commission's appropriations request seeks to close the funding gap, providing relief to counties by sharing the costs of indigent defense equally with county government. We have seen the Commission's success in forging successful programs and partnerships with county governments. I encourage you to increase funding to the Commission so it can carry on this important work and ensure effective representation for all indigent defendants. A final, but important, word about our criminal justice system. If innocent people are rotting in prison for crimes they did not commit, we certainly have not achieved justice for all. Michael Morton's recent exoneration epitomizes the need to address the issue of wrongful convictions in Texas. He spent 25 years in prison, convicted of murdering his wife, until DNA evidence confirmed his innocence. In the last 25 years, 117 Texans have been exonerated. Forty-seven were cleared based on DNA testing, more than any other state. Wrongful convictions leave our citizens vulnerable, as actual perpetrators remain free. And they leave us with the distinct impression that we today suffer from a systemic deficit in our collective approach to the way we decide how to administer criminal justice. As in years past, I continue to recommend the creation of a commission to investigate each instance of exoneration, to assess the likelihood of wrongful convictions in future cases, and to establish statewide reforms. I appreciate the leadership of Senator Ellis and Representative McClendon in this area. I also appreciate the Legislature's support of the innocence projects at our state's four public law schools. Since 2006, the projects have helped identify and overturn ten wrongful convictions in our state. In many of these cases, the same investigation that cleared an innocent person also identified the actual perpetrator.

Pro Se Litigants

I have spoken about the indigent. But there is a dark secret that plagues our justice system as a whole. We in the judiciary must bring this secret to light. The sad fact is that the middle class and small businesses find our system unworkable and unaffordable. They believe there are too many unnecessary lawsuits, coupled with incessant legal wrangling that drags out cases. And they feel that even if they are entitled to a remedy for a legal wrong, they cannot afford the fees a lawyer quotes for vindication. It is time for us to do our part to answer these concerns, because if the remedy is unaffordable, justice is denied. Eligibility for legal aid is generally capped at 125% of federal poverty guidelines. A family of four with an income of \$30,000 does not qualify. After that family pays for shelter, sustenance, and the other necessities of daily life, it cannot possibly afford a lawyer for the most basic legal necessities of life. The most generous legal aid programs limit eligibility to those within 200% of federal poverty levels, meaning that a four-person household with income over \$46,100 does not qualify. Statutory rights to counsel generally apply only to the indigent, as do most pro bono efforts. Increasingly, litigants are representing themselves, because they have no real alternative. We have more lawyers in America than at any time in our history. In 1960, there was one lawyer for every 627 people in the United States. Today, there is one for every 252. Isn't it ironic that as litigants are increasingly forced to represent themselves, law school graduates cannot find jobs? I believe that we have to shift our thinking. Access to justice is about more than giving a poor person a lawyer. An accessible justice system requires that even broader segments of our society be able to use it, including those that are forced to navigate the judicial system alone. Our remedies must be expansive and creative. We must change the way we do business in our courts to meet the needs of all citizens and businesses while at the same time improving customer service, increasing transparency, and investing in technology to decrease costs and increase efficiency. We must develop a judicial climate in which people who lack money to hire a lawyer have a reasonable chance to vindicate their rights. To address this, the Supreme Court recently approved forms that litigants may use when seeking an uncontested divorce involving no children and no real property. Forty-eight states have court-approved family-law forms. Of the thirty-seven states that have forms for divorce proceedings, all have reported a positive impact on the overall efficiency of those cases. I commend the efforts of the Real Estate, Probate and Trust Law Section and Appellate Section of the State Bar, both of which have undertaken similar forms efforts in their respective specialties. Through the promulgation of procedural rules, we can reduce the expense and delay of litigation while simultaneously protecting the rights of litigants. At the Legislature's direction, the Supreme Court recently adopted rules to simplify proceedings in cases involving claims for monetary relief of less than \$100,000. Discovery is limited; the cases are expedited. Now, a case that is vital to the success of a small business owner can actually be tried, to

a verdict. A remedy for a legal injury—even for the individual who cannot afford to pay a lawyer \$500 an hour. The Supreme Court also adopted a rule allowing trial courts to dismiss cases that have no basis in law or fact. The net result is that cases that have no business in the courts will be shown the door, expediting relief for litigants who are subject to frivolous suits. Finally, we are working on rules to simplify and consolidate small claims cases in our justice courts. These rules will be comprehensible for citizens who are representing themselves in Court, and ensure the fair, expeditious, and inexpensive resolution of their cases.

E-filing

One of the more intractable barriers to justice is antiquity. Our courts operate much like they did in 1891, with paper, stamps on paper, cabinets for paper, staples, storage, shredding of paper. To paraphrase, the era of big paper is over. We must modernize the courts so that the people can swiftly find case information, instructions for how to resolve their disputes, even videos demonstrating proper court protocol. Since 2007, all of the Supreme Court's arguments are webcast. And a new case management system, designed by the Office of Court Administration and now used by the Supreme Court and ten of the 14 intermediate appellate courts, has increased the speed with which we decide cases. The effect? The child from a broken home is returned to normalcy faster, the building tied up in litigation can finally be sold. Responsible investment in technology saves money and promotes efficiency. If paper is dead, what will take its place? In December, the Supreme Court mandated electronic filing in civil cases by attorneys in appellate, district, county, and statutory probate courts on a rolling schedule, beginning next year. The Court's order requires the use of one uniform, statewide e-filing system overseen by the Office of Court Administration. With e-filing, document storage expenses for court clerks decrease. Staff that formerly spent time sorting and file-stamping paper can be assigned to higher-skilled tasks. Important court documents are less likely to be damaged or lost. Attorneys can file their pleadings across the state without the need to master various filing systems. And litigants can more quickly access documents online. But e-filing currently requires litigants to pay a fee each and every time a document is filed. Those expenses add up quickly, even if only a few documents are filed in a case. This week Senator West and Senator Duncan filed SB 1146 and Representative Hunter and Representative Senfronia Thompson filed HB 2302 to address this problem. These bills decrease the cost of e-filing by shifting from a per-document fee to a one-time fee, paid at the beginning of each case. If these bills are passed, the per-case cost to e-file will be less than the per-document cost to e-file now. I commend and support efforts like these to lower the cost of litigation in our state, a key to ensuring access to our judicial system.

Juvenile Justice

Now, if antiquity is the root of our paper problem, modernity is the curse of our juvenile justice system. In modern times, we have elected to give our children tickets for the kind of misbehavior that, in the old days, landed you and me in the principal's office. Class C misdemeanor tickets for "disruptive" school conduct. The child must appear in court to answer the charges. She has no right to counsel and no guarantee that her record will be sealed. Cash-strapped families forego representation, often with devastating consequences, like arrest warrants and criminal records. An estimated 300,000 misdemeanor tickets are issued in our state's schools each year. We are criminalizing our children for non-violent offenses. Students receiving these tickets are stigmatized. They often miss class or drop out of school altogether. We must keep our children in school, and out of our courts, to give them the opportunity to follow a path of success, not a path towards prison. Senator Whitmire leads in this area, not just in Texas, but nationally. He and Senator West have joined forces this session to address some of these issues. They both understand that we must work together-legislators. judges, educators, law enforcement officers, and others-to address misbehavior in our schools, promote good behavior, maintain the safety of our students, increase graduation rates, decrease students' exposure to the court system, refer students to proper community and mental-health resources when needed, and apply these policies consistently across schools and student bodies.

Guardianship

After "liberty and justice for all," one of the most revered phrases I know is "honor thy father and mother." I am incredibly fortunate to have both my mother and father here with me today, and two of my siblings, Leah and Lamont, who love and care for them in San Antonio. But for each member of the greatest generation that has the tender care of family, there is an elderly citizen for whom Texas provides few protections from abuse. The population over age 65 in this state will increase by almost 50% by 2020 and will more than double by 2040. Many of those individuals will need help managing their affairs-some through the appointment of a guardian. But Texas currently has only 368 state-certified guardians who handle only 5,000 of the 40,000 pending guardianships. Families, friends, and attorneys serve as guardians in the remaining cases. Only ten of our 254 counties have probate courts with resources to adequately prevent abuse. An exploding elderly population will stress the guardianship system. We must begin to address these issues and prepare. For this reason, I am today announcing the creation of a special committee of the Texas Judicial Council whose sole mission will be to honor our mothers and fathers. The committee will make recommendations to ensure their safety and financial security, and I hope you will all support the effort.

Conclusion

We must provide legal aid for the poor, modernize our system for the middle class, build a sane disciplinary regime for our children, protect our parents. We should do one more thing. Discard our broken system in which judges of enormous talent are removed from office not for ineptitude, but only because they happen to be a member of the wrong political party when partisan winds shift. All of these reforms are encompassed in the judiciary's obligation to provide access to justice. That phrase is often thought of in terms of providing legal services to the poor. It is that, to be sure, but an accessible justice system requires that even broader segments of our society be able to utilize it. Viewed this way, our remedies must be more expansive as well. Just as no single defect created the barriers, there is no unitary solution. So we must marshal all of our forces. On February 24, 1836, Texas forces were under siege from the Mexican army at the battle of the Alamo. William Barret Travis, the commander of the Texian soldiers, sent a desperate plea for help. Addressed to "the People of Texas & All Americans in the World," he asked "in the name of Liberty, of patriotism & everything dear to the American character, to come to our aid, with all dispatch." He vowed never to surrender or retreat, promising "victory or death." His fate was sealed March 6th, exactly 177 years ago. We are at a crossroads 177 years later. Addressing the challenges in our justice system requires a fundamental shift in thinking. Our courts are the final line of protection for individual rights. They provide access to justice, protect us from abuses of power by corporations or the government; they protect our most basic constitutional rights. But the courts must, themselves, reform. We need to change the way we do business to better meet the needs of citizens and employers across our state. That's why we are investing in technology to save taxpayers money and to provide better customer service to those who come to us for justice. My presentation today is not a State of the Judiciary. It is a call to arms. "[I]n the name of Liberty, of patriotism & everything dear to the American character," Commander Travis urged Texans to act with dispatch. Today, let's marshal our forces to confront our challenges so that we can better serve the people. We may not win the entire battle today. But, as we Texans like to say, remember the Alamo!

WHEREAS, The Senate of the State of Texas honors and commemorates the life of United States Air Force Master Sergeant James H. Calfee, who died March 11, 1968, while bravely serving his country in the Vietnam War; and

WHEREAS, A native of Newgulf, Master Sergeant Calfee was one of a select number of highly skilled individuals of the 1st Combat Evaluation Group chosen to staff a top secret radar installation on a mountaintop in Laos known as Lima Site 85; he had specifically requested deployment to this dangerous mission and had to receive a special medical waiver to be able to participate; and

WHEREAS, The installation soon came under fire from North Vietnamese troops; Master Sergeant Calfee played an important role in training the detachment, most of whom were technicians rather than combat soldiers, in the use of the M-16 rifles they were supplied; and

WHEREAS, On the morning of March 11, 1968, North Vietnamese troops launched a concerted attack on the facility; despite being gravely wounded, Master Sergeant Calfee continued to engage the enemy, and thanks to his efforts, some of the other men were able to reach safety; for his valor and his courage under fire, he was posthumously awarded a Bronze Star with Valor device, which, when further details of the raid were established, was upgraded to a Silver Star; and

WHEREAS, Master Sergeant Calfee gave his last full measure of devotion in service to his country, and he joins the long line of courageous men and women whose selfless courage and strength have left an indelible mark on the world; it is truly fitting that this patriot who fought so bravely in defense of our nation's safety, security, and ideals be recognized for his heroism and devotion to duty; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Senate of the State of Texas, 83rd Legislature, hereby pay tribute to the life and legacy of United States Air Force Master Sergeant James H. Calfee and commemorate his posthumous receipt of the Silver Star; and, be it further

WHEREAS, Although Mr. Morton spent a quarter of a century in prison, and no amount of expiation can restore those years or erase the mental anguish of his detention, he has chosen to channel his energy into life-affirming works; this tenacious individual is indeed deserving of recognition for his indomitable spirit and his constructive outlook; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Senate of the State of Texas, 83rd Legislature, hereby commend Michael Morton for his fortitude in the face of extreme adversity and his determination to take positive action in the wake of his exoneration and extend to him sincere best wishes in all his future endeavors; and, be it further

RESOLVED, That a copy of this Resolution be prepared for Michael Morton as an expression of high regard from the Texas Senate.

REMARKS ORDERED PRINTED

On motion of Senator Uresti and by unanimous consent, the remarks by Senators Ellis and Whitmire regarding **SR 447** were ordered reduced to writing and printed in the *Senate Journal* as follows:

Senator Ellis: Thank you, Mr. President and Members. I have the honor of introducing an incredible human being, a man of courage, perseverance, and most of all, someone whose story none of us can fully comprehend. We have with us today one of the Dallas Morning News' 2012 Texans of the Year. Two exonerges were going to be here today, one didn't make it, but this one is here, and I'm so glad that he did come. I want to just quote the words from you that they used in the Dallas Morning News to describe this incredible human being. "Any man would need an ocean of inner strength to survive arrest, conviction, and hard prison time for a crime he did not commit. It takes even more strength to cling to the hope that someday, the system will make things right so he can clear his name and walk free. Rare is the man who emerges from the ordeal without bitterness and a hunger for revenge against those who wronged him." Michael Morton is such a man. Twenty-five years in prison for a crime he did not commit, he was accused and convicted of murdering the woman that he loved, incarcerated by the State of Texas, shunned by his family and friends, sustained for years by only hope. Members, Mr. Morton would have harbored incredible bitterness and simply tried to rebuild his own life outside the spotlight. He could've done that, but instead he concentrates on trying to make life better for other people who are wrongfully convicted in Texas. I want you to just think about what he went through. When he went to prison, he did not have a college degree. He got a college degree while he was in prison and then got a master's degree. Going against incredible odds, with all the full force of the State of Texas against him, he was fortunate enough that some folks decided to take on his case because there was DNA. He was testifying in a Senate committee on vesterday about an important piece of legislation. He's decided to devote a good bit of his time and energy to helping us understand and comprehend a number of criminal justice reforms. And I, I just, I'm amazed at how articulate, how kind, and how gentle he is. With him on the floor he happens to have his bride, because he was married. Most of us would be on a honeymoon, but he is here with his wife. Some of you know, I chair the board of the Innocence Project. Mr. Morton was married recently, and he was trying to decide where to register because so many people were calling saying, we want to give you gifts. He and his wife decided, instead of registering, they would ask that in lieu of gifts, that donations be made to the Innocence Project of New York. There was a great film about his life which premiered on Monday night. I think they're going to have another showing tonight at the Drafthouse and again on Saturday. Members, he is a remarkable human being. And before I close on the resolution, I'd like to yield to my friend and mentor on criminal justice issues, the Dean of the Texas Senate.

Senator Whitmire: Thank you, Senator Ellis, and Mr. President, Members. We have very impressive people come before us to be recognized, all-star athletes, presidents of universities, war heroes, and the list goes on and on. I cannot think of anyone more deserving to come before us and stand on this Senate floor than Michael Morton, Mr. Morton, to be recognized on this floor as a good man usually says it all. But you're more than a good man; you deserve more than to be called a good man. You're a remarkable man, a remarkable human being, and we can learn so much from you. You can be a role model, you are as you stand before us. We have already, in my office. started saying, What would Michael Morton do? And I do that as a practice of being down here a number of years. Similarly, when we're tied up in a legislative mess, we say, What would Bill Hobby do? Bill Hobby was a longtime Lieutenant Governor that could get us to where we needed to be legislatively. Now, when we're in a storm, we're upset about someone messing with a bill of ours, keeping it from going to local, we're going to say, What would Michael Morton do? Because you have demonstrated what a human being can do when you're in the eye of a storm. Members, I cannot imagine, and, Senator Ellis, and it's been so well-documented, not just losing 25 years of your life but being separated from your son, knowing that you're an innocent man. Mr. Morton, thank you for who you are, thank you for willing to work with us to go forward. Your lack of bitterness and being so upset with your adversaries, to want to get back at them, doesn't exist. And we want to thank you for that. You're here with your lovely wife, Cynthia, which we want to recognize as well. But let me just say something, Members, all he's asking for at this stage, he's probably the best witness I've ever had before Criminal Justice, is accountability-accountability that the facts will be what dictates criminal justice. He's agreed to work with me to examine the prison system, to help those that are still incarcerated and our correction officers to have a better working environment. This gentleman is a Texas asset. And I don't think, Mr. Morton, you actually fully recognize how an impact you can have on state government. Let me close by saying, when Mr. Morton left his cellblock for the last time, Members, the other inmates applauded him, not only because they knew he was innocent but because of the type of person he was when he served his 25 years. He counseled other inmates in their moments of depression and frustration, but let me tell you another thing he did. He was lucky and had some money in his commissary. And I have been told that he would take his goods that he bought from the commissary and share with the other inmates. I think it is a real treat to have Michael Morton and his wife and his friends with us today. I want to take this opportunity to give you a collective apology of the Members sitting before you today. The system failed you. We apologize, and we thank you for being here and look forward to watching you through the remainder of your life make such a difference in others' lives. Members, I am so proud that Senator Ellis brought Michael Morton and Cynthia before us today, and let's show him a real Senate welcome and let him join the Senate family that we so cherish among ourselves. Thank you for being here.

Senator Ellis: I should mention that along with Mr. Morton, we have Rodger Jones and Tod Robberson of the *Dallas Morning News*. They're going to present him, along with some of us, a copy of the framed article naming him one of the Texans of the Year. And I just want to reiterate, Dean, as you know, Mr. Morton is not alone. There are over 100 people who have been exonerated in Texas, and every time one of these

cases comes up, I think it's an opportunity for us to look at our criminal justice system and realize that we can do better. In closing, I want to say that Mr. Morton's faith, grace, courage, and strength remind us all that humanity can shine through even the darkest and most inhumane of treatment and that hope and belief in truth can move mountains and save lives.

REMARKS ORDERED PRINTED

On motion of Senator Rodríguez and by unanimous consent, the remarks regarding CSSB 24 were ordered reduced to writing and printed in the Senate Journal as follows:

Senator Hinojosa: Thank you, Mr. President and Members. Myself and Senator Zaffirini and Senator Lucio and Senator Seliger move to suspend the Senate regular order of business, take up and consider Senate Bill 24, and I will provide a brief explanation to the Members. Senate Bill 24 creates a new university in South Texas and what it does, it merges two existing universities: One is The University of Texas-Pan American located in Edinburg, the other one is The University of Texas located in Brownsville. And in addition the university will bring the RAHC, the Regional Academic Health Center, which is located in Harlingen, and the research center, which is located in Edinburg at UT-Pan American campus, under the new umbrella. This university would also allow for it to qualify for PUF funds, under the Permanent University Fund. And the Board of Regents, who recommended this piece of legislation, in addition, all the presidents from the different University of Texas System colleges have voted support to Senate Bill 24, in access to the Permanent University Fund. Where I was born in the valley in South Texas is one of the fastest-growing areas in the country, and we need more room to grow. Most of you know that our economy now has commerce over a billion dollars a day through Mexico. We don't have any room in our present buildings, universities, to educate all the growth that's taking place in South Texas. Many of you have heard me many times say that education is the best equalizer we have in our society. Education gives the knowledge, knowledge gives the power to succeed. I will also add that this would not cost any additional funds. The funds that are already appropriated will continue supporting the new university. On the contrary, this merger and creation of a new university will save anywhere of six to seven million dollars because of efficiency in the administration of a new university. There're two issues that might come up in terms of cost that were brought to my attention, one is the Center for Border Economic and Enterprise Development. That is presently funded out of our university funds and would not cost any additional money out of state funds. The same for the Texas Academy of Mathematics and Science, which is presently being supported by funds that are appropriated by the state and the local universities. There will be no additional cost to the state. And it is time, Mr. President, Members, if there are no questions, I would like to yield to my colleague, Senator Eddie Lucio. Senator Lucio.

Senator Lucio: Thank you, Mr. President, and thank you, Senator Hinojosa. Members, I am deeply honored to rise today to encourage passage of Senate Bill 24. Today is a historic day for the Rio Grande Valley. Today, by your vote, we place South Texas on the path to establishing a Tier One university for the 21st century with the state of the art facilities, top-notch faculty, and the future medical school. I want to take this moment to recognize some visitors from my district in the northwest corner of the gallery, Mayor Tony Martinez of Brownsville, a delegation from Brownsville Economic Development Corporation, Mary Rose Cardenas and David Oliveira, former trustees of Texas Southmost College, University of Texas at Brownsville President Juliet Garcia—and I want to thank her for giving me this tie this morning that

I'm wearing; I'm breaking tradition of wearing my bowtie on Wednesday-and also, Pan American President Robert Nelsen. I. along with Senator Hinojosa, are alumnis at Pan American University. They all came here, and others, to witness history in the making. I commend my fellow joint authors on the bill. Senator Hinoiosa. Senator Seliger, and, of course, Senator Zaffirini, as well as all of my colleagues who subsequently signed on as co-authors-the up-to-date list that we have is Senators Campbell, Carona, Davis, Deuell, Ellis, Eltife, Hegar, Paxton, Rodríguez, Taylor, Uresti, Van de Putte, Watson, West, Whitmire, and Williams-for recognizing and supporting the once-in-a-lifetime opportunity this new university presents to transform the valley into a future center for multinational culture, science, and commerce. Indeed, marshalling our higher education resources for the creation of a new university of this scale just makes sense. For one, it capitalizes on the region's bicultural heritage. The Rio Grande Valley is one of the largest and fastest-growing geographical areas in Texas. Our demographics already offer a preview of what the nation's demographics will look like within a generation. This new university will immediately become one of the largest Hispanic-serving institutions in the country. The passage of Senate Bill 24, of course, also offers more immediate, positive impacts to the valley in terms of jobs, access to health care, and greater educational opportunities. Through our actions today, we begin to correct generations of inequity in this economically distressed area of the state. Right now, the median household income in the valley is less than \$30,000 a year. Passage of Senate Bill 24 is a first step toward building a vibrant health care industry that will attract professionals from all over the world as well as build multinational industry around our water and international ports. Right now, the valley doesn't have nearly enough doctors to serve the citizens. Passage of Senate Bill 24 and the creation of the valley's first four-year medical school will ensure that as many as 75 to 80 percent of future medical students will be able to stay, train, and practice medicine in the valley after they complete their residencies. Right now, we're desperate to find ways to educate our young people. young people that President Garcia at UTB and President Nelson at UTPA will tell you are eager and hardworking, they just need a chance to prove it. After passage of Senate Bill 24, we will attract more students by using technology, online learning, and the additional state of the art campus facilities that will be made possible with access to the Permanent University Fund. To me, Members, this is quite special. Today marks the culmination of work that spans three decades of increasing education and special care in the valley that I have been involved with, with many of you, from the creation of The University of Texas at Brownsville, creation of South Texas College. to the creation of The University of Texas Health Science Center San Antonio, Regional Academic Health Center in the valley, to passage of Senate Bill 98 in 2009 to create the region's first medical school, and finally today. In particular, building the medical school has always been intended to be a regional project. I couldn't be more proud to stand here with my colleagues and take one more certain step toward realizing that goal. We knew when we started the session that creating this new valley-spanning university would be monumental; we couldn't afford to limit ourselves. So, congratulations, Members, on taking this bold step creating a more prosperous Texas, and thank you, Mr. President, for your position and your support. And, Members, I yield as well to Senator Zaffirini and other Senators that might want to say a word or two, thank you. Thank you, Mr. President.

Senator Zaffirini: Thank you, Mr. President. Mr. President and Members, today I rise as a proud author of Senate Bill 24 along, especially, with my colleagues Senator Hinojosa and Senator Lucio, for the three of us together represent the Valley Region of South Texas. Great progress has been made in recent years, but the Border Region still has many, and Starr County in particular, faces many, many higher educational needs. I'm proud to represent Starr County in the valley and understand how this important legislation would contribute to the growth of the entire Valley Region of South Texas. It would provide numerous educational and health care benefits for the families of our region. Senate Bill 24 would have a significant impact on Starr County specifically through the incorporation of The University of Texas-Pan American Starr County campus. Rio Grande City in Starr County is host to UT-Pan American's upper level center, and this bill would further expand academic offerings in Starr County through an academic center. This academic merger was granted access to the Permanent University Fund, enabling the new institution to pool resources that would enable the Valley Region to serve more residents, therefore more families. What's more, as a larger institution, it would be able to serve more students from outside the immediate region, thereby expanding educational opportunities and improving access to health care for all of South Texas, including those from Laredo. The UT Health Science Center at San Antonio's regional campus in Laredo also would benefit especially by working with the new medical school. I'm delighted to co-author this transformative legislation which would meet critical investment needs in a region that historically was underserved but is now demonstrating great progress and rapid growth. Thank you, Mr. President, and thank you, Senators, for your confidence in this legislation, for your support of our region, and especially for passing this important legislation, Senate Bill 24. Together we thank you for your support.

Senator Hinojosa: Thank you, Mr. President, and I want to thank all of the co-authors and the valley delegation for working together to support this bill. I'd just like to point out one more issue and that is the medical school, that is just to clarify the medical school is not a new item on this piece of legislation. It was authorized in 2009, so it's in the process of getting there one way or the other.

Senator Rodríguez: Thank you, Mr. President and Members. The Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 120 is a culmination of nearly two decades of hard work and close collaboration by the El Paso community and the Texas Tech University System. Last March, the Texas Tech University System Board of Regents voted to initiate the process of establishing a freestanding health science center university with the re-granting authority in El Paso. The new university will be the fourth component of the Texas Tech University System and will join Texas Tech University, Texas Tech University Health Science Center, and Angelo State University. As an independent health sciences university, the health science center in El Paso will be able to focus its efforts to reduce the shortage of health care professionals in the region, continue its research on diseases that affect Latino and Border populations, and provide high quality health care in a medically underserved region. In addition, the creation of a stand-alone health sciences university will grow our Medical Center of the Americas and spur economic development in the region. Mr. President, the Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 120 establishes a Texas Tech Health Sciences Center in El Paso as an independent component institution of the Texas Tech University System.

Senator Duncan: Senator, I want to congratulate you on your hard work to get this done. I also want to talk a little bit about the vision for the Texas Tech Health Science Center in El Paso. As everyone knows, it was initially a two-year school, an upper division medical school, and about 1998, with the vision of Eliot Shapleigh, who, as our former colleague here and your friend and mine, the Texas Tech four-year medical school came into being. And, but for the tenacity of Eliot Shapleigh on this floor and in this body and with the Tech System, this four-year medical school would never have been done. And this is the last leg of that, where it's now a freestanding institution. I know that he would be proud of the work you've done on that to get it to this point. But I just wanted to recognize the work he did and his vision to bring this forward. And so, with that also, I want to say, and I think El Paso is a good example

of how a community can rally around a vision and an issue and make it happen. And that's what happened. And this medical school wouldn't be here either without the support, political and financial support, given to it by the community leaders in El Paso. So, I want to congratulate you, Senator Shapleigh, and El Paso, and the community leaders in El Paso for reaching this point in the maturity of the Texas Tech University Health System in El Paso. I think it's a great, great opportunity for both the system and for the city and the region.

Senator Rodríguez: Thank you, Senator, for those kind remarks. I share your view about the tremendous contribution that Senator Shapleigh made to this effort and certainly want to thank you for your support and, of course, the community in El Paso, as you pointed out. And also, last but not least, Chancellor Hance, whose vision has been very key to the point where we are today on this legislation. Thank you for those remarks.

Senate Resolution 452

WHEREAS, The Senate of the State of Texas honors and pays tribute to the life of former El Paso mayor Raymond L. Telles, who died March 8, 2013, at the age of 97; and

WHEREAS, This remarkable pioneer was the first Mexican American mayor of a major Southwestern city and was a former ambassador to Costa Rica; he spent his life in public service and in the political limelight; he was an advisor to President John F. Kennedy, but he also remained committed to local politics; he was particularly dedicated to elevating Hispanics to public office; and,

WHEREAS, Born September 5, 1915, Raymond Telles grew up in a very different El Paso than the one he left behind; Mr. Telles is credited with challenging certain beliefs held by the political establishment in the 1940s and 1950s and disproving the notion that Mexican Americans were not electable and were not capable of effectively running a city; he was elected to four terms as El Paso County clerk and two terms as mayor of El Paso, holding the latter office from 1957 to 1961; he ran his campaigns with dignity and served as a model for a whole generation; and,

WHEREAS, In the 1960s, Mr. Telles was one of the highest-ranking Mexican Americans in the federal government; he was a trusted advisor to many national politicians and agencies; and,

WHEREAS, This highly regarded public servant has been called a founding father of contemporary Latino politics in the United States; his accomplishments while serving El Paso included securing the world-renowned Kress art collection for the El Paso Art Museum and pushing the city to hire more Hispanics for police and fire department jobs; he was recognized in 2006 as Mayor Emeritus of El Paso, and in 2008, he received a lifetime achievement award from the Hispanos Triunfadores Awards program; and,


WHEREAS, A loving husband and father, he shared more than 65 years with his late wife, Delfina, and he taught his children to value service, honesty, loyalty, and community; and

WHEREAS, In his death, this honorable patriot and decorated military veteran leaves behind an extraordinary legacy as a dedicated public servant who gave Mexican Americans a voice in politics and who truly served his city, state, and country; his memory will long be cherished by those who shared in his life; now, therefore, be it

SENATE RESOLUTION 479

Senator Ellis offered the following resolution:

WHEREAS, The Senate of the State of Texas is pleased to recognize the 50th anniversary of the United States Supreme Court decision in *Gideon v. Wainwright*; and

WHEREAS, It was 50 years ago on March 18, 1963, that the United States Supreme Court unanimously decided the landmark case of *Gideon v. Wainwright* and ruled that state courts are required under the Constitution to provide counsel in criminal cases for defendants who are unable to afford to pay their own attorneys; and

WHEREAS, The court thus recognized that our adversarial system of criminal justice depends upon a fair contest between the prosecution and the defense, and it further recognized that the adversarial system is an effective means of arriving at just results only when both the prosecution and defense are adequately prepared and equipped to present their case effectively under the law; and

WHEREAS, In the words of Justice Hugo Black, "This noble ideal cannot be realized if the poor man charged with crime has to face his accusers without a lawyer to assist him"; and

WHEREAS, Because the assistance of counsel is essential to effectuate a meaningful defense when faced with prosecution by the state, Texas passed the *Fair Defense Act of 2001* to better ensure that the constitutional rights of all Texans would be more reliably safeguarded; and

WHEREAS, Implementation of the Fair Defense Act has led to many more people receiving public defense services, along with earlier access to counsel and improved quality of the services provided; and

WHEREAS, The Fair Defense Act created the Task Force on Indigent Defense, now known as the Texas Indigent Defense Commission, to provide technical support to counties to develop and maintain quality, cost-effective public defense systems and for the first time to provide financial assistance to meet the new requirements and foster innovation in the way public defense services are provided; and

WHEREAS, The new state grant funds administered by the commission have led to the creation of 13 new public defender offices and three managed assigned counsel programs to provide public defense services in more than 180 counties; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Senate of the State of Texas, 83rd Legislature, hereby affirm that the principles of fairness and justice recognized in *Gideon v. Wainwright* represent an important and historic step forward in American justice and, upon this occasion of the 50th anniversary of *Gideon v. Wainwright*, recognize and salute the important work being done across the United States and the State of Texas to ensure fairness and justice by guaranteeing access to counsel for all; and, be it further

Floor Amendment No. 1

Amend SJR 13 (senate committee report) as follows:

(1) Add the following appropriately numbered SECTION to the resolution and renumber subsequent SECTIONS accordingly:

SECTION ___. Article V, Texas Constitution, is amended by adding Section 28a to read as follows:

- Sec. 28a. (a) A person who has been elected to serve two consecutive terms as the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, as a Justice of the Supreme Court, as the Presiding Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, as a Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, as the Chief Justice of a Court of Appeals, or as a Judge of a District Court is not eligible for election to serve a third consecutive term in the same office to which the Justice or Judge was elected for two consecutive terms. This provision does not limit a person's eligibility for election to serve nonconsecutive terms.
- (b) The term of a person appointed or elected to serve for the remainder of a term to fill a vacancy in the office of Chief Justice, Justice, Presiding Judge, or Judge is not counted in determining whether a person is eligible to serve under Subsection (a) of this section.
- (2) In SECTION 2 of the resolution, in Subsection (a) of the TEMPORARY PROVISION (page 1, line 45), between "state offices" and the period, insert "or may be elected to serve as a justice or judge of the supreme court, the court of criminal appeals, a court of appeals, or a district court in this state".
- (3) In SECTION 2 of the resolution, immediately following Subsection (b) of the TEMPORARY PROVISION (page 1, between lines 48 and 49), insert the following:
- (c) Section 28a, Article V, of this constitution applies only to a justice or judge elected on or after January 1, 2014.
- (4) In SECTION 2 of the resolution, in proposed Subsection (c) of the TEMPORARY PROVISION (page 1, line 49), strike "(c)" and substitute "(d)".
- (5) In SECTION 3 of the resolution, in the ballot proposition (page 1, line 58), between "railroad commissioner" and the period, insert "or may be elected to serve as a justice or judge of the supreme court, the court of criminal appeals, a court of appeals, or a district court in this state".

The amendment to SJR 13 was read.

POINT OF ORDER

Senator Eltife raised a point of order that Floor Amendment No. 1 was not germane to the body of the resolution.

POINT OF ORDER RULING

The President ruled that the point of order was well-taken and sustained.

Senator Estes offered the following amendment to the resolution:

Floor Amendment No. 2

Amend SJR 13 (senate committee report) as follows:

- (1) Add the following appropriately numbered SECTION to the resolution and renumber subsequent SECTIONS accordingly:
- SECTION ____. Article III, Texas Constitution, is amended by adding Section 7a to read as follows:
- Sec. 7a. (a) A person who has been elected to serve two consecutive terms as a senator or two consecutive terms as a representative is not eligible for election to serve a third consecutive term. This provision does not limit a person's eligibility for election to serve nonconsecutive terms.
- (b) The term of a person elected to serve for the remainder of a term to fill a vacancy in the legislature is not counted in determining whether a person is eligible to serve under Subsection (a) of this section.
- (2) In SECTION 2 of the resolution, in Subsection (a) of the TEMPORARY PROVISION (page 1, line 45), between "state offices" and the period, insert "or may be elected to serve as a member of the legislature".
- (3) In SECTION 2 of the resolution, immediately following Subsection (b) of the TEMPORARY PROVISION (page 1, between lines 48-49), insert the following:
- (c) Section 7a, Article III, of this constitution applies only to a senator or a representative elected on or after September 1, 2013.
- (4) In SECTION 2 of the resolution, in proposed Subsection (c) of the TEMPORARY PROVISION (page 1, line 49), strike "(c)" and substitute "(d)".
- (5) In SECTION 3 of the resolution, in the ballot proposition, (page 1, line 58), between "railroad commissioner" and the period, insert "or may be elected to serve as a member of the legislature".

The amendment to SJR 13 was read.

Senator Estes withdrew Floor Amendment No. 2.

SJR 13 was passed to engrossment by a viva voce vote.

All Members are deemed to have voted "Yea" on the passage to engrossment except as follows:

The sum-certain appropriation to the Foundation School Program in Rider 3, Foundation School Program Funding, of the Texas Education Agency's bill pattern is increased by the amount appropriated under this rider. The comptroller of public accounts shall certify to the Legislative Budget Board and the governor each amount appropriated under this rider.

- (7) a person who provides one health service through a contract with a person licensed under this chapter;
 - (8) a durable medical equipment supply company;
- (9) a pharmacy or wholesale medical supply company that does not furnish services, other than supplies, to a person at the person's house;
- (10) a hospital or other licensed health care facility that provides home health or personal assistance services only to inpatient residents of the hospital or facility;
- (11) a person providing home health or personal assistance services to an injured employee under Title 5, Labor Code;
 - (12) a visiting nurse service that:
- (A) is conducted by and for the adherents of a well-recognized church or religious denomination; and
- (B) provides nursing services by a person exempt from licensing by Section 301.004, Occupations Code, because the person furnishes nursing care in which treatment is only by prayer or spiritual means;
- (13) an individual hired and paid directly by the client or the client's family or legal guardian to provide home health or personal assistance services;
- (14) a business, school, camp, or other organization that provides home health or personal assistance services, incidental to the organization's primary purpose, to individuals employed by or participating in programs offered by the business, school, or camp that enable the individual to participate fully in the business's, school's, or camp's programs;
- (15) a person or organization providing sitter-companion services or chore or household services that do not involve personal care, health, or health-related services;

- (16) a licensed health care facility that provides hospice services under a contract with a hospice;
- (17) a person delivering residential acquired immune deficiency syndrome hospice care who is licensed and designated as a residential AIDS hospice under Chapter 248;
 - (18) the Texas Department of Criminal Justice;
- (19) a person that provides home health, hospice, or personal assistance services only to persons receiving benefits under:
 - (A) the home and community-based services (HCS) waiver program;
 - (B) the Texas home living (TxHmL) waiver program; or
- (C) Section 534.152, Government Code [enrolled in a program funded wholly or partly by the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation and monitored by the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation or its designated local authority in accordance with standards set by the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation]; or
- (20) an individual who provides home health or personal assistance services as the employee of a consumer or an entity or employee of an entity acting as a consumer's fiscal agent under Section 531.051, Government Code.
- SECTION 1.__. (a) In this section, "health and human services agencies" has the meaning assigned by Section 531.001, Government Code.

- (C) aging and disability resource centers established under the Aging and Disability Resource Center initiative funded in part by the federal Administration on Aging and the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services;
 - (D) community mental health and intellectual disability centers; and
- (E) the NorthSTAR Behavioral Health Program provided under Chapter 534, Health and Safety Code.
- (c) The executive commissioner shall appoint the presiding officer of the advisory committee.
- (d) To the greatest extent possible, the executive commissioner shall appoint members of the advisory committee who reflect the geographic diversity of the state and include members who represent rural Medicaid program recipients.
- SECTION 2.__. Section 533.042, Government Code, is amended to read as follows:
- Sec. 533.042. MEETINGS. (a) The advisory committee shall meet at the call of the presiding officer at least semiannually, but no more frequently than quarterly.
 - (b) The advisory committee:
- (1) [5] shall develop procedures that provide the public with reasonable opportunity to appear before the committee [eommittee] and speak on any issue under the jurisdiction of the committee; [5] and
 - (2) is subject to Chapter 551.

- (C) the efficiency and quality of services delivered by Medicaid managed care organizations;

- (3) an intermediate care facility operated by the state and providing services for individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities.
- (b-1) In developing a comprehensive assessment instrument for purposes of Subsection (b), the department shall evaluate any assessment instrument in use by the department. In addition, the department may implement an evidence-based, nationally recognized, comprehensive assessment instrument that assesses the functional needs of an individual with intellectual and developmental disabilities as the comprehensive assessment instrument required by Subsection (b). This subsection expires September 1, 2015.
 - (30) Strike SECTION 5.02 of the bill (page 21, lines 38 through 49).
- (31) In ARTICLE 7 of the bill, add the following appropriately numbered SECTION and renumber subsequent SECTIONS of the ARTICLE accordingly:

SECTION 7.__. If the Health and Human Services Commission determines that it is cost-effective, the commission shall apply for and actively seek a waiver or authorization from the appropriate federal agency to allow the state to provide medical assistance under the waiver or authorization to medically fragile individuals:

- (1) who are at least 21 years of age; and
- (2) whose costs to receive care exceed cost limits under existing Medicaid waiver programs.

- (d) The custodian shall issue and deliver the trust receipt as soon as practicable on the same business day on which the investment security is received.
- (2) In SECTION 2 of the bill, in added Section 2257.046(d), Government Code, strike "the public entity, the public entity's custodian shall provide to the appropriate public entity officer" and substitute "the appropriate public entity officer, the public entity's custodian shall provide".
- (3) Strike SECTION 3 of the bill, amending Section 116.051, Local Government Code.
 - (4) Renumber SECTIONS of the bill appropriately.

Senator Paxton offered the following resolution:

WHEREAS, A valiant son of Texas, United States Congressman Sam Johnson demonstrated unflinching bravery and a resolute commitment to defending his country while a member of the armed forces, and February 2013 marks the 40th anniversary of his release as a prisoner of war; and

WHEREAS, Born in San Antonio, Sam Johnson grew up in Dallas, where he graduated from Woodrow Wilson High School and Southern Methodist University; he joined the U.S. Air Force at the age of 20, and he completed 62 combat missions during the Korean War; and

WHEREAS, Lieutenant Colonel Johnson went on to complete two tours of duty in Vietnam; on April 16, 1966, while flying his 25th combat mission of that war, he was shot down over enemy territory; and

WHEREAS, Sustaining severe injury after ejecting from his plane, he was captured and held at the infamous "Hanoi Hilton" prison camp, where he and his fellow prisoners endured horrific treatment; he ultimately spent nearly seven years in captivity, half of it in solitary confinement, before returning to his beloved country on February 17, 1973; and

WHEREAS, This distinguished officer retired from the air force with the rank of colonel in 1979, having earned a host of prestigious honors over the course of his 29-year career; his book *Captive Warriors: A Vietnam POW's Story* was published in 1992 by the Texas A&M University Press; and

WHEREAS, In 1984, Sam Johnson won election to the Texas House of Representatives, where he served for more than six years, and he has ably represented his constituents as a member of the U.S. Congress since 1991; in that capacity, he has worked tirelessly in behalf of current and former members of the military, and in 2009, his efforts were recognized with the National Patriot Award, the highest civilian accolade conferred by the Congressional Medal of Honor Society; and

WHEREAS, The people of our state and nation owe a tremendous debt of gratitude to Sam Johnson, a courageous aviator whose patriotism and iron determination remain a source of inspiration to all Americans; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Senate of the 83rd Texas Legislature hereby honor U.S. Congressman Sam Johnson on the 40th anniversary of his return from Vietnam and commend him for his service to his country; and, be it further

RESOLVED, That an official copy of this resolution be prepared for Congressman Johnson as an expression of high regard by the Texas Senate.

Senator Paxton: Thank you, Mr. President. Members, I rise today in support of SR 540 and to recognize my Congressman, Sam Johnson, for his distinguished public service and to celebrate the 40th anniversary of his release as a prisoner of war and return to the USA. Congressman Johnson has dedicated his life to serving our country

and our state on the front lines of both the Korean and Vietnam wars and our State Legislature and in Congress. In 1966, while flying his 25th combat mission in Vietnam, he was shot down over Vietnam. He was captured and spent the next seven years as a prisoner of war, much of it in solitary confinement, where he was subjected to horrific treatment at the hands of his captors. This February marks the 40th anniversary of his release and return to a nation forever grateful for his service. This distinguished officer retired from the Air Force with the rank of Colonel in '79 having earned many, many rewards during his career. Following his military career, Sam established a home building business in North Dallas, served in the Texas Legislature, and is currently representing his friends and neighbors in the U.S. House. Congressman Johnson's courage is admired, and I have to say just a few personal stories. There's one that he's told me. Right after he was shot down, he had a broken back, a broken arm, a dislocated shoulder, and probably many other injuries that he didn't even know about. And after a short time there, they brought him out, put him in front of a ditch, told him that he had been convicted of a crime that was worthy of death, and they put him in front of a firing squad. And they all lined up to fire and went click, click, and no shots were fired. And I asked him, What did you do then? He said, I laughed. Now, they apparently didn't appreciate that very much, and they pushed him in the ditch. But I think he said, after that he knew that God would take care of him, and he would be taken care of. And I think that story is indicative of the kind of courage that this man shows. A personal story that I'd like to tell: If you ever get invited to lunch by Congressman Johnson, you should go, and I can tell you what you're going to experience. You're going to go to El Fenix, you're going to order the chicken enchiladas, and you're going to eat this horrible lemon pie. But do it anyway because it's well worth the experience. So, anyway, thank you so much. It's an honor for me to be here recognizing you. You're truly my hero. You're a man that we all admire and respect, and we thank you for what you've done for our country and for what you've done for each of us.

Senator Fraser: Sam, welcome back to the Capitol. I hope I can get through this. This is a wonderful moment for us to recognize not only a great Texas hero but a great American hero. Sam and I have about as much history as anybody in the room. I sat next to him on the floor of the Texas House. We shared an office together. While he was in the House, we fought a lot of battles and got to know both he and his wife, Shirley. And if you'll allow me, I've got a couple of personal stories, because we've got history that some of you may not be aware of. Sam had written a book at that time. He gave me a copy of the book and signed it. And I would lay in bed, and I would read three or four pages, then I'd have to put it down. Knowing him and knowing Shirley, I was having trouble even getting through the book of his account of what he went through as a prisoner of war and the atrocities that they did to Sam. And I'm going to repeat my understanding. Shirley, during this whole period, they'd gone to her and they said, Shirley, Sam, we don't think he's coming back. We hadn't heard from him in years. We think you should go ahead and just accept. I don't think he's going to make it; you should start accepting benefits. Shirley said, Sam is not dead. Sam will come back, and I'm not going to accept that Sam is dead. And when the prisoners were released from Vietnam and those planes starting landing, the way I remember the story, that's the first time Shirley saw Sam get off that plane, and that's

when she realized that Sam was alive. Sam, when we served in the Legislature, was one of the strongest Members and great leaders that I can ever imagine. We shared a common bond. He was a pilot. Obviously, he'd crashed in Vietnam. continued to fly when he got back, and he had rented a plane while we were in the Legislature, in Addison, and I remember the story. He had four people in the plane, and as they took off, the engine failed, and he ended up having to crash-land the plane in Dallas, the tollway, came down, and as he was landing, he clipped one of the poles. The fuel tank blew up. The airplane caught on fire. Sam was getting out, he realized, and I believe it is his brother-in-law that was in the back of the plane, he went back into the airplane and pulled his brother-in-law out of the airplane and suffered a lot of burns. He went to the hospital. They treated him. He stayed in the hospital for several days, treated for the burns, and as they got in the car to go home, again, this is the way I remember the story, is that Sam went directly back to the airport and rented an airplane and got back up. And his thinking was, if I don't get back in the plane and fly it now, I'll never do it again. And he rented a plane and went back up again. That tells you a lot about this man and the strengths he has. Sam, you've been an unbelievable influence for a lot of us watching your career. Obviously, I hated to lose you in '91 when you went to Congress, but your career has been just fabulous. You've been a great friend, a great leader, a great mentor. The State of Texas and the United States of America are very, very fortunate to have people like Colonel Sam Johnson that was willing to put it all on the line, to represent not only the defense of the country but also now the defense of the nation in Congress. Thank you for your friendship.

Senator Van De Putte: Thank you, Mr. President. Mr. President and Members, I rise with my colleagues in offering the greatest respect to Colonel Johnson. Representative Johnson, back then, I don't know if you remember me, I was a little baby House freshman in the Texas House, and rather intimidated by the surroundings over there. And you were always so very gracious. At one point I was having some difficulty, and you recognized it. And I told you that I was being threatened by a vote, of course, that would never happen in any Chamber, but years back, it did. And what you told me was that if I had faith and conviction in what I believed in, that I couldn't be intimidated by anybody. And coming from you, knowing that your spirit was never broken and that your career in public service is so highly respected because there was no one, not any organization, business group, or another human being that could ever intimidate Sam Johnson. As Chair of the Veteran Affairs and Military Installations Committee now, I have the opportunity to interact with our Vietnam veterans. And in fact, we celebrated just a few days ago the dedication of our Vietnam veterans monument right here on the northeast part of our Capitol grounds. But when our Vietnam veterans learned that I served with you, they asked me, Do you know him? Have you met Colonel Johnson? Do you know his story? And so, I have to tell you that with your career in public service, please know that our veterans, and particularly our Vietnam veterans, ask about you, they know about you, and they just want to know if I've ever met you. Today, I am honored to have you here along with many of the people in this gallery. But there is a special young man that I'm going to ask to come join me over here. His name is Noble Wilson. Noble is in the fourth grade at Brentwood Christian. He is the son of Bill and Kathy Wilson, two Army veterans. He is the grandson of Van Wilson, who was in the 1st Cavalry, 7th Regiment, in Vietnam. So, this young man today will get to meet you, and he is the grandson of one of the comrades that you had in our Vietnam War. It is an honor for us to be here today just to recognize you, and generation after generation of Texans will hold in high esteem Sam Johnson, including this young man here, whose grandfather served with you. Congratulations and best wishes.

Senator Lucio: Thank you, Mr. President. I, too, rise to honor a dear friend, a gentleman who I had the privilege to serve with in the 1980s in the House of Representatives, a gentleman that defines the words that I often use, that my father shared with us every day of his life, that was "Americanism" and "patriotism," a gentleman who deserves all the honors in the world, to remind us of the men and women that we're so blessed to have in our country who have gone over and beyond their call of duty as Americans to ensure that we here on this floor and in the gallery can live in the greatest country in the world. I lost about 12 buddies during the Vietnam War, very close friends and high school chums that graduated with me. It was a hard time during my life. A consolation that I had, along with my nine brothers and sisters, Sam, was that we had our dad always to remind us of being respectful and mindful of the men and women who had done so much for our country over the years. This is a time. Members, that we can embrace each other as Americans and blend together as one people of different cultures, different backgrounds, different socioeconomic statuses or categories, if you want to call it that, of people, and understand that we need to rise to the occasion in that respect and understand that we belong to one another as citizens of this great country. So, I'm so happy to see you back on this floor, which you visited many times as a State Rep, and I did, too, back in the '80s, to visit with Senators then. And I want to tell you, these Members here, Congressman, will say it's gotten a lot better than the 1980s in terms of those serving on the Senate floor. But I think we had men and women there, and we have men and women today who truly are engaged and doing the best thing for this state and being part of what we need to be in terms of making our country even better. So, welcome back on behalf of so many that I represent down in the southern part of the state where you find a lot of patriotic people and a lot of members of the Vietnam era, military men and women who dedicated a part of their lives to making our state and our country better. So, we can't thank you enough. And I can't thank you enough also for the support and the help you gave me as a freshman Representative, as well, back in 1987. Thank you, and God bless you, Sam. We're fortunate to have you here.

Senator Hinojosa: Thank you, Mr. President, Members. I, too, rise to support Senate Resolution 540. I served with Sam Johnson in the Texas House of Representatives, and I also served in Vietnam. Sam, for us, it was always a welcome sight when we saw those planes coming to help us out when we got stuck. But I have heard your stories, and you and I have shared experiences. It's really amazing, your valor and courage after you were shot down over Vietnam, to put up with abuses, the torture, the mental torture. And for me, when I hear your stories, it sends chills up my spine. Having served in Vietnam, losing three of my classmates from high school, having to walk through the swamps of Vietnam, the leeches, it's really nothing compared to what you went through, what we call Hanoi Hilton. And for me, I just want to thank you for your courage, for your valor. I know that the war was unpopular, but people

confused the unpopular war with the courage and valor of American soldiers like you. And for us as a country, what's really amazing, from all walks of life, rich or poor, African American, Hispanic, we're all Americans. And, Sam, thank you so much for serving our country. You still continue serving our country as a public official, and thank you so much for your valor and courage.

Senator Deuell: Thank you, Mr. President. Members, Congressman, it's an honor to have you here. We honor many people on the floor of the Senate and many of them do honor us with their presence. And I can think of no one who would honor us more than just to have you come and spend some time with us. I'm very honored to have my Senate district overlap with your Congressional district. Two of our three children are actually constituents of yours and think very highly of you. And I think you probably could have come home 40 years ago and just ran your business and no one would have faulted you for not wanting to give anymore. And yet, you chose to serve again in the House of Representatives here and in the U.S. Congress. I don't think people realize how much of a sacrifice that is, again, to be away from family, to commute back and forth to Washington, D.C. If the people listening to me have not read your book, they should. It's a story of courage, fortitude, faith in God. My wife and I collect memorabilia from our lives, and we're putting together sort of a scrapbook for our children and grandchildren, Senator Nelson. And I can assure you, every contact we've had with you, every photograph, your book, are in the materials that we accumulate that we hope will be passed on to our family. And thank you for your service.

Senator Birdwell: Thank you, Mr. President. Members, I've only had the opportunity to meet Congressman Johnson since, to get to know him, since 2006. And in those few occasions, as I feel now, I want to strive to be adequate to be in the room with you. When you returned home from Vietnam, a war that I watched on TV, and so many my age and generation did, you came home not to shower away the sting of battle or the smell of jungle but the contempt of your fellow Americans who didn't honor your service and your willingness to sacrifice and suffer. And it would not be until my own experience of being in a hospital, being tormented, and the agony that was inflicted upon me, but out of the love of the people doing it to me and for my very survival. And as I say that, I want folks to understand that are here in the building and listening on the Internet, that it is that description that makes me so inadequate to what you experienced and so many other veterans experienced. Because what was being done to me was for my survival and out of love for me, and as anguishing as that was, I cannot imagine what it was like for seven years to know that the people doing this to you was for the sheer torment and their enjoyment of doing it. I want everybody out there to understand that. That war was unpopular as you're very correct to say, Senator Hinojosa. But liberty is not. Men and women of this state and this nation that are enjoying those liberties, they may be God-given, because they are, but they're secured by men and women like yourself. I tease with my colleagues about when we have disagreements and arguments that if you want to take me on, you've got to bring something bigger than a 757. Ladies and gentlemen, a personality and a character and an honor bigger than a 757 stands before us. It's our privilege to honor you, Congressman Johnson. Thank you, Sir.

President: All of those comments were well-said. I rarely editorialize from the podium, but let me just say, it's an honor for you to be with us. You've always been a personal hero of mine. God bless you.

Senator Paxton: Mr. President, Members, thank you for sharing your thoughts of Congressman Johnson. I've not been here in this body long, but I can say for me, personally, there's no better honor that I've had than having you in this building with us, standing before us. And thank you for not only your service but just for the kind of person you are and the kind of friend you've been to all of us. And despite all of your accomplishments, you're one of the most humble, decent people I've ever met. So, God bless you, and thank you for being here today.

SECTION 1. AUDIT. Chapter 321, Government Code, is amended by adding Section 321.024 to read as follows:

- Sec. 321.024. CERTAIN RIVER AUTHORITIES SUBJECT TO AUDIT. (a) The financial transactions of a river authority listed in Subsection (b) are subject to audit under this chapter.
 - (b) This section applies only to the:
 - (1) Brazos River Authority; and
 - (2) Lower Colorado River Authority.
- (c) A river authority shall pay the cost incurred by the state auditor in conducting an audit of the authority under this section. The state auditor shall determine the cost, and the authority shall pay the amount promptly on receipt of a statement from the state auditor detailing the cost.

SECTION 2. BRAZOS RIVER AUTHORITY. Chapter 8502, Special District Local Laws Code, is amended by adding Section 8502,0051 to read as follows:

Sec. 8502.0051. AUDIT. The authority is subject to the audit provisions of Section 321.024, Government Code.

SECTION 3. LOWER COLORADO RIVER AUTHORITY. Section 8503.015, Special District Local Laws Code, is amended to read as follows:

Sec. 8503.015. AUDIT. The authority is subject to the audit provisions of:

- (1) Subchapter G, Chapter 49, Water Code; and
- (2) Section 321.024, Government Code.

SECTION 4. TRANSITION. (a) Subject to approval by the Legislative Audit Committee for inclusion in the audit plan under Section 321.013(c), Government Code, the state auditor shall audit the Brazos River Authority and the Lower Colorado River Authority under Section 321.024, Government Code, as added by this Act.

- (b) A river authority audited under this section shall cooperate and provide assistance and access to all necessary records, confidential or nonconfidential, to the state auditor in conducting the audit under this section.
- (c) Not later than December 31, 2015, the state auditor shall prepare a written report for an audit conducted under this section and file the report in accordance with Section 321.014, Government Code.

SECTION 5. EFFECTIVE DATE. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this Act takes effect September 1, 2013.

COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE SENATE BILL 213 ON SECOND READING

On motion of Senator Whitmire and by unanimous consent, the regular order of business was suspended to take up for consideration **CSSB 213** at this time on its second reading:

CSSB 213, Relating to the continuation and functions of the Texas Board of Criminal Justice, the Texas Department of Criminal Justice, and the Windham School District and to the functions of the Board of Pardons and Paroles and the Correctional Managed Health Care Committee.

The bill was read second time.

Senator Carona offered the following amendment to the bill:

Floor Amendment No. 1

Amend CSSB 213 (senate committee printing) as follows:

- (1) In SECTION 7 of the bill, in amended Section 501.133(a), Government Code (page 5, line 17), strike "five" and substitute "seven [five]".
- (2) In SECTION 7 of the bill, in amended Section 501.133(a), Government Code, strike page 5, lines 28-36, and substitute the following:
- [(4)] two public members appointed by the governor who are not affiliated with the department or with any contracting entity [with which the committee has contracted to provide health care services under this chapter], at least one of whom is licensed to practice medicine in this state;
- (4) two members appointed by the governor who are licensed mental health professionals; and

- (5) the state Medicaid director or a person employed full-time by the Health and Human Services Commission and appointed by the Medicaid director, to serve ex officio as a nonvoting member.
- (3) In SECTION 7 of the bill, in added Section 501.133(c), Government Code (page 5, line 37), strike "(a)(4)" and substitute "(a)(5)".
- (4) Add the following appropriately numbered SECTION to the bill and renumber the remaining SECTIONS of the bill accordingly:

SECTION _____. Not later than January 31, 2014, the governor shall appoint the two mental health professionals to the Correctional Managed Health Care Committee as required by Section 501.133(a), Government Code, as amended by this Act.

The amendment to CSSB 213 was read and was adopted by a viva voce vote.

All Members are deemed to have voted "Yea" on the adoption of Floor Amendment No. 1.

Senator Hinojosa offered the following amendment to the bill:

Floor Amendment No. 2

Amend CSSB 213 on page 13, after line 19, to read as follows:

SECTION 10. Section 501.147, Government Code, is amended to read as follows:

- Sec. 501.147. POWERS AND DUTIES OF DEPARTMENT; AUTHORITY TO CONTRACT. (a) In conjunction with the contracting entities the department shall:
- (1) establish a managed health care provider network of physicians and hospitals to provide health care to persons confined by the department; and
- (2) evaluate and recommend to the board sites for new medical facilities that appropriately support the managed health care provider network.

The amendment to CSSB 213 was read and was adopted by a viva voce vote.

All Members are deemed to have voted "Yea" on the adoption of Floor Amendment No. 2.

Senator West offered the following amendment to the bill:

Floor Amendment No. 3

Amend **CSSB 213** (Senate committee printing) by adding the following appropriately numbered SECTIONS to the bill and renumbering subsequent SECTIONS of the bill accordingly:

SECTION ____. Section 9(a), Article 42.12, Code of Criminal Procedure, is amended to read as follows:

(a) Except as provided by Subsection (g) [of this section], before the imposition of sentence by a judge in a felony case, and except as provided by Subsection (b) [of this section], before the imposition of sentence by a judge in a misdemeanor case the judge shall direct a supervision officer to report to the judge in writing on the circumstances of the offense with which the defendant is charged, the amount of restitution necessary to adequately compensate a victim of the offense, the criminal and social history of the defendant, and any other information relating to the defendant or the offense requested by the judge. It is not necessary that the report contain a sentencing recommendation, but the report must contain a proposed client

supervision plan describing programs and sanctions that the community supervision and corrections department would provide the defendant if the judge suspended the imposition of the sentence or granted deferred adjudication. If the defendant is charged with a state jail felony, the report must contain recommendations for conditions of community supervision that the community supervision and corrections department considers advisable or appropriate based on the circumstances of the offense and other factors addressed in the report.

SECTION _____. Section 15(a)(2), Article 42.12, Code of Criminal Procedure, is amended to read as follows:

- (2) On conviction of a state jail felony punished under Section 12.35(a), Penal Code, other than a state jail felony listed in Subdivision (1), the judge may:
- (A) suspend the imposition of the sentence and place the defendant on community supervision; or
 - (B) [may] order the sentence to be executed:
 - (i) in whole; or
- (ii) in part, with a term of community supervision to commence immediately on release of the defendant from confinement.

SECTION ____. Section 15(c)(1), Article 42.12, Code of Criminal Procedure, is amended to read as follows:

(1) Before imposing a sentence in a state jail felony case, the judge shall review the presentence investigation report prepared for the defendant under Section 9 and shall determine whether the best interests of justice require the judge to suspend the imposition of the sentence and place the defendant on community supervision or to order the sentence to be executed in whole or in part as provided by Subsection (a)(2). A judge may impose any condition of community supervision on a defendant that the judge could impose on a defendant placed on supervision for an offense other than a state jail felony and, if the judge suspends the execution of the sentence or orders the execution of the sentence only in part, shall impose conditions of community supervision consistent with the recommendations contained in the presentence investigation report prepared for the defendant.

SECTION _____. The changes in law made by this Act to Sections 9 and 15, Article 42.12, Code of Criminal Procedure, apply only to the sentencing and placement on community supervision of a defendant for an offense that is committed on or after the effective date of this Act. The sentencing and placement on community supervision of a defendant for an offense that is committed before the effective date of this Act is governed by the law in effect on the date the offense was committed, and that law is continued in effect for that purpose. For purposes of this section, an offense was committed before the effective date of this Act if any element of the offense occurred before that date.

The amendment to **CSSB 213** was read.

Senator West withdrew Floor Amendment No. 3.

- Sec. 801.106. TERMS OF OFFICE. Members of the board hold office for staggered terms of six years, with the terms of two or three members, as appropriate, expiring on January 31 of each odd-numbered year.

SECTION _____. Section 801.1061(a), Government Code, is amended to read as follows:

- (a) It is a ground for removal from the board that a member:
- (1) does not have at the time of taking office the qualifications required by Section 801.103 [or 801.104];
- (2) does not maintain during service on the board the qualifications required by Section 801.103 [or 801.104];
 - (3) is ineligible for membership under Section 801.1021;
- (4) cannot, because of illness or disability, discharge the member's duties for a substantial part of the member's term; or
- (5) is absent from more than half of the regularly scheduled board meetings that the member is eligible to attend during a calendar year without an excuse approved by a majority vote of the board.
- SECTION _____. (a) A person who is serving as a member of the State Pension Review Board appointed under Section 801.103, Government Code, on the effective date of this Act continues to serve until the person's term expires.
- (b) The governor shall make appointments to fill vacancies on the State Pension Review Board so that board members' terms of office expire in compliance with Section 801.106, Government Code, as amended by this Act, and, if necessary for compliance with that section, a person may be appointed to a term of office that expires in less than six years.
- (c) The term of a person who is serving as a member of the State Pension Review Board appointed under Section 801.104, Government Code, expires on the effective date of this Act.

(2) In SECTION 11 of the bill (page 6, line 20), strike "Section 802.103(c), Government Code, is" and substitute "Sections 801.104 and 802.103(c), Government Code, are".

The amendment to SB 200 was read and was adopted by a viva voce vote.

- (1) "Committee" [,"committee"] means the Correctional Managed Health Care Committee.
- (2) "Contracting entity" means an entity that contracts with the department to provide health care services under this chapter.
- (3) "Medical school" means the medical school at The University of Texas Health Science Center at Houston, the medical school at The University of Texas Health Science Center at Dallas, the medical school at The University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio, the Baylor College of Medicine, the college of osteopathic medicine at the University of North Texas Health Science Center at Fort Worth, or the Texas A&M University Medical Program.

SECTION 7. Section 501.133, Government Code, is amended by amending Subsection (a) and adding Subsection (c) to read as follows:

- (a) The committee consists of $\underline{\text{nine}}$ [five] voting members and one nonvoting member as follows:
- (1) one member employed full-time by the department, appointed by the executive director;
- (2) two members who are physicians, each of whom is [one member who is a physician and] employed full-time by a medical school [The University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston], appointed by the governor [president of the medical branch];
- (3) one member who is a physician and employed full-time by the Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center, appointed by the president of the university;
- (4) one member who is a physician and employed full-time by the University of Texas Medical Branch, appointed by the president of the medical branch;
- (5) two members appointed by the governor who are licensed mental health professionals;

- (6) two public members appointed by the governor who are not affiliated with the department or with any contracting entity [with which the committee has contracted to provide health care services under this chapter], at least one of whom is licensed to practice medicine in this state; and
- (7) the state Medicaid director or a person employed full-time by the Health and Human Services Commission and appointed by the Medicaid director, to serve ex officio as a nonvoting member.
- (c) A committee member appointed under Subsection (a)(6) shall assist the department with developing the expertise needed to accurately assess health care costs and determine appropriate rates.

The amendment to CSSB 213 was read and was adopted by a viva voce vote.

All Members are deemed to have voted "Yea" on the adoption of Floor Amendment No. 4.

On motion of Senator Whitmire and by unanimous consent, the caption was amended to conform to the body of the bill as amended.

(a) The Mansion renewal trust fund is created as a trust fund outside the treasury with the comptroller and shall be administered by the board, as a trustee on behalf of the people of this state, to maintain and preserve the Governor's Mansion. The fund consists of:

- (1) money transferred to the fund at the direction of the legislature; or
- (2) money donated to the board for the purposes of preserving and maintaining the Governor's Mansion.
- (b) money in the fund may be used only for the purpose of major repairs to or preservation of the Governor's Mansion, as determined by the board.
- (c) The interest received from investment of money in the fund shall be credited to the fund.

SECTION ____. Chapter 445, Government Code, is amended by adding Section 445.014 to read as follows:

Section 445.014. The board shall formulate and adopt reasonable policies for naming spaces within the museum, including the designation of rooms, exhibition halls, or other areas in honor of donors or other benefactors, if appropriate.

The amendment to SB 201 was read and was adopted by a viva voce vote.

- (1) consistent with Capitol Complex design guidelines or standards adopted as part of a 1989 planning process or subsequently adopted based on a Capitol Complex master plan; and
- (2) submitted to the board for its review and comment at the earliest planning stages of any such project.
- (b) Not later than the 60th day after the date the board receives final designs for a building in the Capitol complex, the board may by a public vote disapprove the project if the board determines that the project does not meet the requirements of Subsection (a)(1) or is not in the best interest of the state or of the Capitol complex.
- (c) The project is considered to be approved by the board if the board does not hold the public vote authorized by Subsection (b) on or before the date required under that subsection.
- (d) In this section, "Capitol complex" means the state-owned property within the area bounded on the north by Martin Luther King, Jr., Boulevard, bounded on the east by Trinity Street, bounded on the south by 10th Street, and bounded on the west by Lavaca Street.

The amendment to SB 201 was read and was adopted by a viva voce vote.

Notwithstanding any other provision of law and in addition to other remedies available, a person who brings an action under this section is entitled to recover reasonable attorney's fees and costs and:

- (1) actual damages if, not later than the 30th day after the date the suit is filed and not earlier than the date of the court's final determination of the case, the municipality repeals the regulation adopted in violation of this section;
- (2) an amount equal to three times the total of actual prejudgment damages if, after the 30th day after the date the suit is filed and not earlier than the date of the court's final determination of the case, the municipality repeals the regulation adopted in violation of this section; or
- (3) an amount equal to three times the total of actual damages if the court makes a final determination in favor of the person bringing the action under this section.
- (h) Sovereign immunity to suit and from liability is waived and abolished to the extent of liability created by Subsection (g), and a claimant may sue a municipality for damages allowed by that subsection.
- (3) In SECTION 2 of the bill, in amended Section 236.002, Local Government Code (page 1, between lines 39 and 40), insert the following:
- (c) A person or an organization whose membership is adversely affected by a regulation adopted by a county in violation of this section may file suit against the county in the appropriate court for equitable relief, including a declaratory judgment and injunctive relief, and for actual and consequential damages. Notwithstanding any other provision of law and in addition to other remedies available, a person who brings an action under this section is entitled to recover reasonable attorney's fees and costs and:
- (1) actual damages if, not later than the 30th day after the date the suit is filed and not earlier than the date of the court's final determination of the case, the county repeals the regulation adopted in violation of this section;
- (2) an amount equal to three times the total of actual prejudgment damages if, after the 30th day after the date the suit is filed and not earlier than the date of the court's final determination of the case, the county repeals the regulation adopted in violation of this section; or
- (3) an amount equal to three times the total of actual damages if the court makes a final determination in favor of the person bringing the action under this section.
- (d) Sovereign immunity to suit and from liability is waived and abolished to the extent of liability created by Subsection (c), and a claimant may sue a county for damages allowed by that subsection.

 - (9) [(8)] whether the physician participates in the Medicaid program;
- (10) [(9)] a description of any conviction for a felony, a Class A or Class B misdemeanor, or a Class C misdemeanor involving moral turpitude;

- (11) [(10)] a description of any charges reported to the board to which the physician has pleaded no contest, for which the physician is the subject of deferred adjudication or pretrial diversion, or in which sufficient facts of guilt were found and the matter was continued by a court;
- $\frac{(12)}{(11)}$ a description of any disciplinary action against the physician by the board;
- (13) [(12)] a description of any disciplinary action against the physician by a medical licensing board of another state;
- $\frac{(14)}{(13)}$ a description of the final resolution taken by the board on medical malpractice claims or complaints required to be opened by the board under Section 164.201;
- $\underline{(15)}$ [(14)] whether the physician's patient service areas are accessible to disabled persons, as defined by federal law;
- (16) [(15)] a description of any formal complaint against the physician initiated and filed under Section 164.005 and the status of the complaint; and
- (17) [(16)] a description of any medical malpractice claim against the physician, not including a description of any offers by the physician to settle the claim, for which the physician was found liable, a jury awarded monetary damages to the claimant, and the award has been determined to be final and not subject to further appeal.

- (k-1) If, on the date of The University of Texas at Austin's general deadline for applications for admission of first-time undergraduate students for an academic year, federal law as then interpreted by applicable judicial decisions prohibits the institution from considering an applicant's race or ethnicity as a factor in the institution's decisions relating to first-time undergraduate admissions:
- (1) the percentage of the institution's designated enrollment capacity for those students that authorizes the institution to elect to offer admission as provided by Subsection (a-1) for that academic year is 80 percent rather than 75 percent; and
- (2) the percentage of the institution's designated enrollment capacity for first-time resident undergraduate students that must be offered admission for that academic year according to high school grade point average under Subsection (a-1) is 80 percent rather than 75 percent.

(a) Not later than December 31 of each year, an organization described by Section 822.102(a)(13) or a wildlife sanctuary described by Section 822.102(a)(14) shall provide to the animal registration agency and the department an annual notification, on a form provided by the department, that includes:
- (1) the name, address, and telephone number of the organization or sanctuary;
- (2) a complete identification of each dangerous wild animal in the custody and control of the organization or sanctuary, including species, sex, and age, if known; and
 - (3) the exact location where each animal is to be kept.
- (b) Not later than the 10th day after the date on which an organization described by Section 822.102(a)(13) or a wildlife sanctuary described by Section 822.102(a)(14) acquires a dangerous wild animal, the organization or sanctuary shall provide to the animal registration agency and the department an update to the annual notification described by Subsection (a).
- (c) The animal registration agency may establish and charge reasonable fees for the notification under this section in order to recover the costs associated with the administration and enforcement of this section. The fee under this subsection may not exceed \$50 for each animal listed in the notice and may not exceed \$500, regardless of the number of animals listed in the notice.
- (d) The department may charge a reasonable fee in an amount sufficient to recover the costs associated with accepting and processing a notification under this section.
- (e) Sections 822.107 and 822.110 apply to an organization described by Section 822.102(a)(13) or a wildlife sanctuary described by Section 822.102(a)(14).

- (f) An organization described by Section 822.102(a)(13) or a wildlife sanctuary described by Section 822.102(a)(14) that violates Subsections (a)-(d) is subject to Sections 822.113-822.115 as if the organization or sanctuary had violated Section 822.103(a). An organization or sanctuary that violates Subsection (e) is subject to Sections 822.113 and 822.115, as applicable.
- (5) Add the following appropriately numbered SECTION and renumber subsequent SECTIONS accordingly:
- SECTION _____. (a) Except as otherwise provided by Subsection (b) of this section, each animal registration agency in this state and the Department of State Health Services shall establish procedures to comply with Section 822.1025, Health and Safety Code, as added by this Act, not later than January 1, 2014.
- (b) An animal registration agency is not required to establish procedures under Subsection (a) of this section if the municipality or county in which the agency is located prohibits the ownership, possession, or confinement of dangerous wild animals as defined by Section 822.101, Health and Safety Code.

- (7) In amended Article $\overline{39.14}$ (a), Code of Criminal Procedure (page 1, lines 45-47), strike the second sentence of the subsection and substitute the following: The state may provide to the defendant electronic duplicates of any documents or other information described by this article.

- (8) In the first sentence of added Article 39.14(c), Code of Criminal Procedure (page 2, lines 1-2), between "remaining portion" and "and may withhold", insert "that is not subject to discovery".
- (9) In the third sentence of added Article 39.14(d), Code of Criminal Procedure (page 2, lines 18-19), between "inspection of" and "document", strike "the" and substitute "a".
- (10) In the third sentence of added Article 39.14(d), Code of Criminal Procedure (page 2, lines 21-23), between "information but" and the underlined period, strike ", notwithstanding Subsection (a), is not required to allow electronic duplication of the document, item, or information" and substitute "is not required to allow electronic duplication as described by Subsection (a)".
- (11) In added Article 39.14(f), Code of Criminal Procedure (page 2, lines 30-31), between "The state shall" and "information provided", strike "document or otherwise electronically record the documents, items, and" and substitute "electronically record or otherwise document any document, item, or other".
- (12) In added Article 39.14(g), Code of Criminal Procedure (page 2, lines 35-36), between "list of" and "documents", strike "the" and substitute "all".
- (13) In added Article 39.14(h), Code of Criminal Procedure (page 2, line 39), between "any additional" and "information", strike "documents, items," and substitute "document, item,".
- (14) In added Article 39.14(h), Code of Criminal Procedure (page 2, line 41), between "existence of the" and "or information", strike "documents, items," and substitute "document, item,".
- (15) In added Article 39.14(i), Code of Criminal Procedure (page 2, lines 44-45), between "may not exceed" and "Chapter 552", strike "those provided for by" and substitute "the charges prescribed by Subchapter F,".

The amendment to CSSB 1611 was read and was adopted by a viva voce vote.

All Members are deemed to have voted "Yea" on the adoption of Floor Amendment No. 1.

Senator Huffman offered the following amendment to the bill:

Floor Amendment No. 2

Amend CSSB 1611 as follows:

- (1) In SECTION 2 of the bill, in amended Article 39.14(a), Code of Criminal Procedure, (Committee Printing page 1, line 32), strike "Article 39.15" and substitute "Section 264.408, Family Code, and Article 39.15 of this code".
- (2) In SECTION 2 of the bill, in added Subsection (d), Article 39.14, Code of Criminal Procedure, strike the first two sentences (Committee Printing page 2, lines 8-17).
- (3) In SECTION 2 of the bill, in amended Article 39.14, Code of Criminal Procedure, after added Subsection (d) (Committee Printing page 2, between lines 23 and 24), add new Subsections (e), (f), and (g) and reletter the remaining subsections and cross-references accordingly:

- (e) Except as provided by Subsection (f), the defendant, the attorney representing the defendant, or an investigator, expert, consulting legal counsel, or other agent of the attorney representing the defendant may not disclose to a third party any documents, evidence, materials, or witness statements received from the state under this article unless:
- (1) a court orders the disclosure upon a showing of good cause after notice and hearing after considering the security and privacy interests of any victim or witness; or
- (2) the documents, evidence, materials, or witness statements have already been publicly disclosed.
- (f) The attorney representing the defendant, or an investigator, expert, consulting legal counsel, or agent for the attorney representing the defendant, may allow a defendant, witness, or prospective witness to view the information provided under this article, but may not allow that person to have copies of the information provided, other than a copy of the witness's own statement. Before allowing that person to view a document or the witness statement of another under this subsection, the person possessing the information shall redact the address, telephone number, driver's license number, social security number, date of birth, and any bank account or other identifying numbers contained in the document or witness statement. For purposes of this section, the defendant may not be the agent for the attorney representing the defendant.
- (g) Nothing in this section shall be interpreted to limit an attorneys' ability to communicate regarding his or her case within the Texas Disciplinary Rules of Professional Conduct, except for the communication of information identifying any victim or witness, including name, except as provided in subsections (e) and (f), address, telephone number, driver's license number, social security number, date of birth, and bank account information or any information that by reference would make it possible to identify a victim or a witness. Nothing in this subsection shall prohibit the disclosure of identifying information to an administrative, law enforcement, regulatory or licensing agency for the purposes of making a good faith complaint.
- (4) In SECTION 2 of the bill, in amended Article 39.14, Code of Criminal Procedure, after added Subsection (j) (Committee Printing page 2, between lines 46 and 47), add new Subsection (k) to read as follows:
- (k) This article does not prohibit the parties from agreeing to discovery and documentation requirements equal to or greater than those required under this article.
- (5) Reletter the existing subsections of amended Article 39.14, Code of Criminal Procedure, accordingly.

The amendment to CSSB 1611 was read and was adopted by a viva voce vote.

All Members are deemed to have voted "Yea" on the adoption of Floor Amendment No. 2.

On motion of Senator Ellis and by unanimous consent, the caption was amended to conform to the body of the bill as amended.

CSSB 1611 as amended was passed to engrossment by a viva voce vote.

All Members are deemed to have voted "Yea" on the passage to engrossment.

COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE SENATE BILL 1611 ON THIRD READING

Senator Ellis moved that Senate Rule 7.18 and the Constitutional Rule requiring bills to be read on three several days be suspended and that **CSSB 1611** be placed on its third reading and final passage.

The motion prevailed by the following vote: Yeas 31, Nays 0.

The bill was read third time and was passed by the following vote: Yeas 31, Nays 0.

REMARKS ORDERED PRINTED

On motion of Senator Ellis and by unanimous consent, the remarks regarding CSSB 1611 were ordered reduced to writing and printed in the Senate Journal as follows:

President: Chair recognizes Senator Ellis for a motion to suspend the Senate's regular order of business to take up and consider Committee Substitute to Senate Bill 1611.

Senator Ellis: Thank you, Mr. President and Members. Senator Robert Duncan and I came together to work on this Committee Substitute to Senate Bill 1611 because there's nothing more vital than the reliability and quality of our justice system in Texas than bringing all of the relevant facts to light to ensure we're protecting the innocent, convicting only the guilty, and providing justice to people that we can trust. Members, I want to take a moment, if I might, to thank Senator Duncan, in particular, and his staff, as well as my staff, and a lot of other people who worked on this bill, my friend and colleague, Senator West, whom I've nicknamed Thurgood, going through this process, Dean Whitmire, Senator Huffman, the Lieutenant Governor's staff, and the Lieutenant Governor personally, the District and County Attorneys Association, the defense bar, the Governor's office, and Thomas Ratliff. I want to thank all of the stakeholders who've been involved in this issue in trying to put justice first, working out an agreement in the best interest of everybody of Texas, and coming together on this important step toward making our criminal justice system a much better one. In particular, I want to thank someone over to my right that I took the privilege of bringing on the floor, with permission from Senate Administration. I want to thank Michael Morton for using his life's tragedy to make a difference to protect others, to make sure they wouldn't end up in a similar predicament. There were times when this bill fell apart, when I, quite frankly, was ready to walk away and work on something else. But I thought about Dean Whitmire's comments when he introduced Michael Morton on one of his bills and we had them on the floor, and he said, What would Michael do? But Michael Morton and his lovely bride really worked on this and did a lot to bring us all together over the last couple of days. Michael's tragic case brought to the forefront something that we already knew in Texas, but we too long neglected. Our criminal discovery process in Texas needs serious reform. Clearly, exculpatory evidence was in the possession of the state in his case, but it was never revealed for over 25 years. Regardless of whether those facts were intentional or not, what is clear is that a more open and transparent discovery process would've helped Michael Morton and hopefully many other people in Texas. Mr. Morton was kind enough to

work on this bill; we decided to name it after him. So, henceforward, hoping it passes today, this will be known as the Michael Morton Act. Here are the four important things that the bill does. It removes barriers to discovery processes in Texas to ensure a more relevant evidence procedure comes forward and evidence that is relevant will be disclosed: it has to be disclosed. It allows prosecutors to withhold information through a protective order to protect a victim or witness to make sure that they are safe. Number three, it provides greater transparency by requiring a record of all items disclosed to avoid disputes later in the process. And fourth, which is the other main component, it requires continuing discovery after trial has commenced. Members, the discovery statute in Texas has not been changed since 1965. I know we had a lot of former Members here today, and if any of them were in this body in 1965. I'm sure they tried to do a good job. But God knows, we were not ahead of our time in 1965. As I stated earlier, it is an agreed-to bill. I have a perfecting amendment to correct typos that Senator Huffman and Senator Whitmire have looked at and approved, and Senator Huffman has an amendment that she's going to offer at the appropriate time to address some of her concerns. There'll be some Q&A in terms of legislative intent, hopefully to make sure that no unintended consequences in this bill, but I think we have an agreed-to product. I would respectfully move that the Senate suspend all necessary rules to take up and consider the Committee Substitute to Senate Bill 1611, the Michael Morton Act.

Senator Davis: Thank you. Senator Ellis, I just want to compliment your incredible work on the bill that we're voting on right now. I know it has not been an easy process for you, and, unfortunately, it resulted from experiences like those borne by Mr. Morton in our criminal justice system, but it is an incredibly important piece of work going forward to make sure that, hopefully, we don't have more Michael Morton stories in Texas' future. You are to be congratulated for what you have done in putting this bill together. I know it has not been an easy process, and I just want you to know how much I admire the difference that you're making in people's lives, that we will never know, will be impacted by the work that you put forward in this bill today. Thank you very much.

Senator Ellis: Thank you, Senator. I have good staff and a good co-sponsor, so we've been pretty lucky. But thank you, Members, one and all.

Senator Huffman: Senator Ellis, you and I worked on this, and I am absolutely certain you're going to take my amendment, but just to quell some of the questions that I'm receiving here on the floor, you do intend to accept the amendment that I will be offering?

Senator Ellis: That is correct, I will. And I appreciate the time and work that you put into it, Senator, and all of the Members. We had a long collaborative meeting on yesterday and over a lot of days, and so, I appreciate the work of everyone.

Senator Whitmire: Senator Ellis, as you well know, sometimes some of the grassroots of ours and grassroots of Senator Huffman and Senator Duncan will ask us, well, are you familiar that sometimes they say, Why do y'all work with the Republicans? Why don't you distinguish our side from their side? Would you not agree with me, this is a classic example of where you and Senator Duncan came

together to craft some legislation in a bipartisan form? Senator Huffman had some concerns based on her experiences as a prosecutor and a judge, but I was in the working session yesterday, and I'm going to tell you publicly, it was as fine a moment for the legislative process as I've seen, maybe ever, certainly in a long time. You've been here a long time, as well. Do you not agree with me that as we pass this piece of legislation with Mr. Morton and his wife, Cynthia, here, isn't it a great tribute to this body, to the Mortons, that they would stay involved and make a difference? Not only for future cases, I mean, we can't undo the harm and the tragedy of his case but, I mean, I just can't tell you how impressed I was yesterday to watch how serious you and Duncan and Huffman and Senator West and your advisors took this subject with Mr. Morton at the table. So, would you not agree with me that that is why we're sent down here to legislate and to make a difference in state policy?

Senator Ellis: Dean, it is, and it's really a testament to all of us. I mean, we know that our law enforcement people have a tough job to do. And you and Members of your committee do a good job of advocating for them, but it is a government program, and sometimes the government makes mistakes. Every other state in the country has a discovery process. Some people on my side of the aisle would say, well, why do you have to do anything, because it's pretty clear from court precedents from the Supreme Court, most of this stuff should've been given over anyway, 254 counties, it's not always given over. So, I think all sides came together. I had a good conversation with the prosecutor from Bexar County on yesterday, and I think she raised some legitimate concerns. Senator Huffman put a lot of time into it. Dean, you helped a lot. It's a tough issue. You know, I point out all the time, I'm not a criminal lawyer, and Senator Duncan is not either, but we've had a lot of good experts and a lot of goodwill in this body, including the Presiding Officer, to do a meeting with Mr. Morton on short notice on yesterday when the wheels fell off. I think it's a good product that we'll all be proud of.

Senator Whitmire: Having been here a while, I have referenced many times that long-time Lieutenant Governor Bob Bullock would put us in the Ramsey Room and tell us not to come out until we have an agreement. Well, yesterday, our current Lieutenant, Dewhurst, because the Ramsey Room was full, he put us in the great room and told us not to come out until we had an agreement. So that's, once again, what it's all about, to come together. We'll disagree on the budget, and we're going to have some heated discussions about charters, but for the moment, let me just tell you, this is why we're sent down here. And I hope our friends and supporters understand why we agree to disagree sometime, and then we come up with a package that'll make our constituents have better opportunities when they go to court.

Senator Ellis: Thank you, Dean.

President: Well said, Senator Whitmire.

Senator Rodríguez: I'm just rising to express my appreciation for the great work that was done by Senator Ellis, Senator Duncan, and Senator Huffman, and I did find out about your key role, Mr. President. And having been a prosecutor and also having done some criminal defense work when I was in private practice, in my brief stint as a private practice lawyer, I have an appreciation for how difficult it was to reach this

point where there was some resistance on both sides, and yet the role that Mr. Morton and his wife played in it was able to convince all of us, and I especially want to thank Senator Huffman for her key role in working out this compromise that is in the bill today, to have us at least move forward, finally. For many, many years we hadn't done any changes, significant changes to the discovery rules in the criminal arena, and this is a major step forward in promoting a fair, a more just criminal justice system, so I wanted to thank you for that great work, all of you, for having done this for the state. Thank you, Mr. President.

Senator Ellis: Senator, I want to thank you for having dinner with me and the Mortons the other night, a good three hours. You told me you were going to stop by, and I'm sure the fact that he was there, his wife was there—they're trying to go on their honeymoon sometime soon—that you and Senator West stayed a couple of hours working through this bill a couple of nights ago. Thank you very much.

Senator West: Senator Ellis, I know that there had to be a lobbyist group that brought this bill to you. There had to be a lobbyist group, so what lobbyist group brought this bill to you?

Senator Ellis: No lobbyist group brought this and, Senator, you know, I think back to last session and some of the controversy on the Forensic Science Commission. You remember that, and it was a very heated exchange between me and some of our friends in the prosecutor community and, you know, of course, you roll forward. I guess history sort of proved I knew that there was something going on when Michael Morton walked out of that courtroom as a free man after our last session, but really, this is not one, I attribute my staff. I mean, there were a lot of meetings about what could be done, and a lot of proposals were put on the table as a result of the Morton tragedy. I mean, he's just one, there are many others. You know, there are about 312 people that have been exonerated in this country. That's a tough thing when you go up against the full force of the federal government or any state, but this is not one that, to be honest with you, it wouldn't have been on my top list of things to do coming into this session. I understand there was a meeting in which our staff members were there, your staff may have been there, the stakeholders, Mr. Morton, and old Thomas Ratliff, and nobody was picking this one up off the table. So, a young gal, my staff, picked it up, and I said, Well, you know, good luck, maybe we'll do a bill. We had a long, I think 30-page bill that you had a little heartburn over.

Senator West: I had a lot of heartburn over.

Senator Ellis: Yeah, we had some deep discussions about that late at night where we were going to bust up the Black Caucus on that bill, so we decided to go with something we could pass, but this is not one. You know, I chair the board of the Innocence Project. The Innocence Project will not take a position on this issue because there are still people in the defense community who are going to get some heartburn. I mean, there'll be some discussion when your amendment comes up that I'm going to accept, and I suspect there are some people in the prosecutor community who will still have some heartburn. Change does not come easily, although we're the

last state not to have an open discovery process. But no, no, this is not one where it was the lobby, it was really our staffs and us really wanting to do something because of what this man went through.

Senator West: You know, there's, and I'm going to introduce them in a few minutes. I'm glad that I've got some students down from my senatorial district that I'll introduce in a minute, so they can hear what's going on on the floor of the Senate. Because Senator Whitmire is correct, this is probably one of our finest moments. I think that even though we're dealing with juvenile issues, truancy, and all of that, I think this is going to be one of the-we get it through the House, and the whole nine yards-it's going to be one of the top criminal justice bills this legislative session because it's going to make a difference. And I concur with Senator Whitmire. When vou think about the talent-and I think Lebron James took his talents to South, what was it, South Beach, okay-you think about the talents on this floor that had input into this particular process, the experience, we had judicial experience, prosecutorial experience, defense counsel experience, and then everyday people experience, in terms of the impact that it has, that some of the things that have happened in our criminal justice, that have on our citizens. All of those experiences, as well as the leadership of our Lieutenant Governor came to bear on this particular issue. That's why I'm glad that we're taking a moment to just kind of reflect on how this particular bill ultimately will be passed in the Senate, hopefully become law, and use this as a blueprint as we go through other issues of importance. Sitting down-yes, we get noise and knots out all the time, in terms of what we should and shouldn't do-but we should use it as a blueprint to go forth on other issues. So, I applaud the work group that we were able to put together in getting this particular bill to the floor and, hopefully, passage today.

Senator Ellis: Senator, I thank you, and you know I nicknamed you Thurgood because when my friends come to me with these technical questions about the criminal justice system in terms of a practitioner's perspective, that's above my pay grade. And you and John Whitmire made a really big difference on this bill, and I appreciate it.

President: Members, well said. And, Senator Ellis, you've got my commitment and partnership to work with the House on this bill, make sure that it passes. Members, you've heard the motion by Senator Ellis, is there objection from any Member as to the suspension of the Senate's rules? Hearing no objection, the rules are suspended. Chair lays out on second reading, Committee Substitute to Senate Bill 1611, the Secretary will read the caption. Chair lays out Floor Amendment 1 by Senator Ellis, the Secretary will read the amendment.

Secretary of the Senate: Floor Amendment Number 1 by Ellis.

President: Chair recognizes Senator Ellis to explain Floor Amendment 1.

Senator Ellis: Mr. President and Members, it is purely cleanup, this floor amendment is simply a Lege Council cleanup of the Committee Substitute to Senate Bill 1611, so we don't have things like hysterical instead of historical, and Senator Huffman has looked at it. Purely cleanup, no trick stuff in here. I may have something in another bill, but not on this one. If there are no questions, I move adoption.

President: Well, thank you for giving us an insight into your other bills. Members, you've heard the motion by Senator Ellis, is there objection from any Member? Chair hears no objection and Floor Amendment Number 1 is adopted. Chair lays out Floor Amendment Number 2 by Senator Huffman. The Secretary will read the amendment.

Secretary of the Senate: Floor Amendment Number 2 by Huffman.

President: Chair recognizes Senator Huffman to explain Floor Amendment Number 2.

Senator Huffman: Thank you, Mr. President. As Senator Ellis explained, this is an amendment which I felt was necessary to complete the bill. I was very supportive and, I think most, the great majority of those in the prosecutor community, I think, were very supportive of change in the discovery process, knowing that, as Senator Ellis said, it's been over 40 years since we've made any changes, and it was time to do it. Many of the big urban counties had started to implement open-file policies and started to make their own discovery reforms, but I think many of us believed that it was necessary in the interest of justice that it be uniform throughout the State of Texas. That seemed like the right thing to do. But it's very difficult in these situations to balance the need to get the information that a defendant needs to adequately prepare defense and balance that with just the duties that we have as a state, as the prosecutors have, the duties they have to protect the vulnerability of witnesses and victims who find themselves in the criminal justice system, many times, of course, through no fault of their own. And so, I worked with the prosecutors and with the other stakeholders to kind of come up with some language that would, hopefully we could all agree on, and after a little head butting, but some good substantive discussion, we were able to do that. So, I feel comfortable with this amendment, that it brings us to a place of balance that will be both fair to the defendant and fair to the victims and witnesses. Basically. the amendment just goes a little step farther, tightens up protections of a witness or a victim's identity, though it still allows the defendant all the tools that he needs and the access to information by his inner circle, and by inner circle I mean his defense lawyer, his group of experts, his investigators, and so forth, will have the information they need, but it provides for steps if that information needs to be released outside of the inner circle. It also provides something in there that would allow a defense counsel to do what he or she would need to publicly speak about the case that's pending within the rules of professional responsibility. So, I think it's a good amendment, I think it makes this bill a workable bill, and I move adoption of the amendment.

President: Senator West, for what purpose do you rise, Sir?

Senator West: A couple of questions for legislative intent purposes of Senator Huffman.

President: Will Senator Huffman yield?

Senator Huffman: Yes, Sir.

Senator West: Senator Huffman, I got about three questions I want to ask you. Will your amendment permit a defense attorney to confer with a more experienced defense attorney who is not a part of the defense team on the case about issues raised by discovery received from the state?

Senator Huffman: Yes, the amendment specifically refers to consulting legal counsel, and I believe that what you're asking would certainly be under the definition of a consulting legal counsel. So, that would be within that inner circle because that's a person that would be under the same ethical rules of professional responsibility, so certainly be willing to respect the parameters of the bill in keeping the confidentiality that is required under the bill.

Senator West: With the amendment, does the legislation allow lawyers to fulfill their ethical obligations by reporting misconduct to the State Bar and oversight agencies, when reporting misconduct involves providing information received in discovery and identifying a witness by name?

Senator Huffman: Yes, under Subsection (g), we specifically address that an attorney who wanted to make a complaint could do that, to whatever administrative law enforcement regulatory or licensing agent. If they made a good faith complaint, it did not violate the bill.

Senator West: And last question, will your amendment allow defense attorneys to comply with their professional responsibilities pursuant to Rule 3.07 as to trial publicity of the Texas Disciplinary Rules of Professional Conduct and the Supreme Court decision in *Gentile v. State Bar of Nevada* and respond publicly the statements made by law enforcements or the state characterizing the strength of the case or the evidence to the press?

Senator Huffman: Yes, and that again is covered in Subsection (g), and as discussed, the Texas rules of professional responsibility lay out the obligations and ethical duties of a lawyer and the parameters that they can follow when they're publicly discussing a pending criminal case or a pending case.

Senator Hinojosa: Senator Huffman, I'm just reading your amendment. I just want to make sure I understand it. Down where I practice law we have an open policy, open-file policy, which helps a lot in process cases for us attorneys who represent the defendant in criminal cases to make better decisions on the plea or go to trial or punishment. And basically, if I understand your amendment correctly, you do not allow an attorney who receives any information from the prosecuting lawyer to disclose any information to a third party dealing with witnesses, other personal information, that may be in the file.

Senator Huffman: That's correct. You are allowed to show a witness information and documents, but you can't, you have to redact certain information, and that's laid out in the bill. And you can discuss information, and you can let them look at information. You can't give them a copy unless it's a copy of the witness' own statement.

Senator Hinojosa: Now, if the press has already disclosed information such as the names of the witnesses or victims, then I'm not under the same obligations.

Senator Huffman: Correct, and the bill, again, the amendment specifically addresses the issue of information that has already been publicly disclosed is not covered by the bill. So, if the newspaper's already put it on their front page or if it's in a probable cause affidavit, that's become public record, not sealed, then all of that could be considered public record.

Senator Hinojosa: Okay, and I guess the reality is when you look at the, most defense lawyers will not disclose this information to a client, in terms of social security, bank accounts, other identifying information, as to address. But here you have, we could get a court order to disclose this information, a showing of good cause, I guess. For what purpose? I'm trying to figure that out.

Senator Huffman: Well, I think there was a concern by the defense bar, if there were a situation that it was necessary to disclose, for purpose of trial preparation in some way, shape, or form. If they just felt they needed to do that, it just gave them an opportunity to do that by going before the court. And if they had a good reason, if they had good cause, then the judge could set the parameters, and it may, I would envision it would be set within very strict parameters, whatever the judge felt was necessary for the defense to properly prepare their defense.

Senator Hinojosa: And actually, I guess, as I get to read the amendment, and I apologize, I didn't have it beforehand, as a defense lawyer, I'm allowed to actually show the information to an expert or even the defendant, my client, as long as I read the information that will be personal to that particular victim or other witness.

Senator Huffman: That's correct. Of course, you can't give copies, but you can show, as long as you redacted the information as set out in the amendment.

Senator Hinojosa: Okay, and well, the amendment is getting better now that I'm getting to read it and discuss it with you. I have, I guess, as I look, I guess the other one is, and you have an amendment, or you have here in your amendment that I'm not prohibited from discussing any information that I have, if it's properly requested by law enforcement or any disciplinary agency or is required by law to provide that information.

Senator Huffman: I think that came, that was added, there was a concern if you needed to maybe file a complaint against, if you felt like a police officer needed to be complained against or, I think, a chemist and so forth, so we wanted to make sure that we weren't making it impossible for lawyers to complain against individuals in that capacity. So, that's why they were excluded.

GUESTS PRESENTED

Senator Ellis was recognized and introduced to the Senate Michael Morton and his wife, Cynthia.

The Senate welcomed its guests.

(Senator Eltife in Chair) GUESTS PRESENTED

Senator Watson: Thank you, Mr. President. Thank you, Chairman Fraser. I support this bill, but I want to ask you one question for the purpose of establishing some legislative intent. As you've just laid out, and I think when I read the bill, Senate Bill 958 appears to create a narrow waiver of sovereign immunity in the limited instance of a suit against a special purpose district or authority for breach of contract for the sale of water supply for use in connection with the generation of electricity. But your bill, by creating this waiver, doesn't imply or become a basis, and you don't intend for it to imply or become a basis, for arguing that sovereign immunity would apply in any other contract situations. In other words, its silence as to all other contract situations isn't a statement that there is sovereign immunity in those instances. So, here's my question. For purposes of establishing legislative intent, this bill's about one narrow instance and doesn't speak to whether sovereign immunity would or would not apply in any other breach of contract situation. It's your intent that those other instances are to be guided by other statute, common law, the specific contract language, or otherwise. Is that correct?

Senator Fraser: Senator Watson, your description and the question, you're correct. Senate Bill 958 speaks only to these narrow facts and says in this limited instance immunity is waived. It does not address any other breach of contract action and does not say whether immunity is waived or not waived in any other contract situation. Any other contract situation in which the law is solid presents an issue for the courts to decide.

Senator Watson: Thank you, Chairman Fraser.

- (i) The [Except as provided by Subsection (e), the] responsible governmental entity may not negotiate [begin negotiation of] an interim or comprehensive agreement for a detailed proposal that has been disapproved by [until] the commission [has submitted its recommendations or declined to accept the detailed proposals for review].

SECTION _____. Section 2268.058(d), Government Code, is repealed.

- Sec. 2165.259. CAPITOL COMPLEX. (a) In this section, "Capitol Complex" has the meaning assigned by Section 443.0071.
- (b) Notwithstanding Subchapter D, the commission may not lease, sell, or otherwise dispose of real property or an interest in real property located in the Capitol Complex.

(c) This section does not affect the commission's authority under Subchapter E to lease space in state office buildings and parking garages.

- (3) any telecommunications, cable television, video service, or broadband infrastructure other than technology installed as part of a qualifying project that is essential to the project; or
- (4) a qualifying project located in the Capitol Complex, as defined by Section 443.0071.

- (h) Except as provided by Subsection (h-1), the [The] board has [exclusive] jurisdiction over the physical assets of the school and shall administer and spend appropriations made for the benefit of the school.
- (h-1) The Texas Facilities Commission shall provide facilities maintenance services for the physical facilities of the school, including facilities construction, cabling, facility reconfiguration, and any other services as provided by a memorandum of understanding between the board and the Texas Facilities Commission.

SECTION _____. Section 2165.007(b), Government Code, is amended to read as follows:

- (b) Notwithstanding any other law, the commission shall provide facilities management services in relation to all state agency facilities in Travis County or a county adjacent to Travis County. The commission's duty does not apply to:
 - (1) a facility owned or operated by an institution of higher education;
 - (2) military facilities;
- (3) facilities owned or operated by the Texas Department of Criminal Justice;
- (4) facilities owned or operated by the Texas Department of Juvenile Justice [Youth Commission];
 - (5) facilities owned or operated by the Texas Department of Transportation;
- (6) the Capitol, including the Capitol Extension, the General Land Office building, the Bob Bullock Texas State History Museum, any museum located on the Capitol grounds, the Governor's Mansion, and any property maintained by the Texas Historical Commission under Sections 442.0072 and 442.0073;
 - (7) a facility determined by the commission to be completely residential;
 - (8) a regional or field office of a state agency;
 - (9) a facility located within or on state park property;
- (10) the property known as the Finance Commission Building described by deed recorded in Volume 5080, Page 1099, of the Deed Records of Travis County, Texas; [or]
- (11) the property known as the Credit Union Department Building described by deed recordec in Volume 6126, Page 27, of the Deed Records of Travis County, Texas;
- (12) facilities owned or operated by the Texas School for the Blind and Visually Impaired; or
 - (13) facilities owned or operated by the Texas School for the Deaf.
- SECTION _____. (a) Not later than January 1, 2014, the following are transferred from the Texas School for the Blind and Visually Impaired to the Texas Facilities Commission:
- (1) the powers, duties, functions, programs, and activities of the Texas School for the Blind and Visually Impaired relating to the maintenance of the school's physical facilities;
- (2) any obligations and contracts of the Texas School for the Blind and Visually Impaired that are directly related to implementing a power, duty, function, program, or activity transferred under this subsection; and
- (3) all property and records in the custody of the Texas School for the Blind and Visually Impaired that are related to a power, duty, function, program, or activity transferred under this subsection and all funds appropriated by the legislature for that power, duty, function, program, or activity.
- (b) The Texas Facilities Commission and the Texas School for the Blind and Visually Impaired shall enter into a memorandum of understanding as provided by Section 30.022(h-1), Education Code, as added by this Act, that:
- (1) identifies in detail the applicable powers and duties that are transferred between the two agencies by this Act; and

(2) establishes a plan for the identification and transfer of the records, personnel, property, and unspent appropriations of the Texas School for the Blind and Visually Impaired that are used for purposes of the commission's powers and duties directly related to the maintenance of the school's physical facilities under Section 30.022, Education Code.

SECTION _____. (a) Not later than January 1, 2014, the following are transferred from the Texas School for the Deaf to the Texas Facilities Commission:

- (1) the powers, duties, functions, programs, and activities of the Texas School for the Deaf relating to the maintenance of the school's physical facilities;
- (2) any obligations and contracts of the Texas School for the Deaf that are directly related to implementing a power, duty, function, program, or activity transferred under this subsection; and

SECTION ___. Section 2267.001, Government Code, as added by Chapter 1334 (S.B. 1048), Acts of the 82nd Legislature, Regular Session, 2011, is amended by adding Subdivision (1-a) to read as follows:

(1-a) "Commission" means the Partnership Advisory Commission established under Chapter 2268.

SECTION ___. Subchapter A, Chapter 2267, Government Code, as added by Chapter 1334 (S.B. 1048), Acts of the 82nd Legislature, Regular Session, 2011, is amended by adding Sections 2267.005, 2267.006, 2267.007, and 2267.008 to read as follows:

- Sec. 2267.005. APPLICABILITY OF MUNICIPAL ZONING REGULATIONS. (a) Except as provided by Subsection (b) and Section 2267.006, a qualifying project that is to be performed or located in a municipality must comply with the zoning and land use regulations of the municipality.
 - (b) This section does not apply to a qualifying project that:
- (1) uses a building, other structure, or land under the control, administration, or jurisdiction of a state agency for the same public purposes for which the state agency is authorized under the governing law that established the agency to use the building, structure, or land; or
- (2) is located within the Capitol Complex, as defined by Section 411.061(a)(1).
- Sec. 2267.006. SPECIAL BOARD OF REVIEW. (a) If a qualifying project does not comply with the zoning and land use regulations of a municipality as required by Section 2267.005 and the municipality denies a rezoning request for the qualifying project, the matter may be appealed to a special board of review consisting of the following members:
 - (1) the land commissioner;
- (2) the administrative head of the governing body of the responsible governmental entity;
 - (3) the mayor of the municipality;
 - (4) the county judge of the county in which the municipality is located;
 - (5) one state senator selected by the lieutenant governor;
- (6) one member of the house of representatives selected by the speaker of the house; and
 - (7) the commission member appointed by the governor.
- (b) The land commissioner shall serve as presiding officer of the special board of review.
- (c) The special board of review shall conduct one or more public hearings to consider the proposed qualifying project. The hearings must be conducted in accordance with rules adopted by the General Land Office for conduct of special review. The hearings are not considered a contested case proceeding under Chapter 2001.
- (d) If after the hearings, the special board of review determines that the zoning and land use regulations are detrimental to the best interest of this state, the special board of review shall issue an order establishing a development plan to govern the use of the real property related to the qualifying project. Development of the real property must be in accordance with the plan and comply with all applicable municipal regulations, orders, or ordinances except as specifically identified by the order of the special board of review. If substantial progress is not made in implementing the qualifying project before the fifth anniversary of the date the development plan is adopted by the special board of review, the municipal zoning and land use regulations become applicable to development of the property, unless the special board of review adopts a new development plan.

- (e) A development plan adopted by the special board of review and any plan accepted by a responsible governmental entity is final and binding on the state, the responsible governmental entity, lessees, successors in interest and assigns, and the affected municipality unless revised by the special board of review.
- (f) A responsible governmental entity, builder, developer, or any other person may not modify the development plan without specific approval by the special board of review.

Sec. 2267.007. CONFLICT OF INTEREST. An employee of a responsible governmental entity or a person related to the employee within the second degree by consanguinity or affinity, as determined under Chapter 573, may not accept money, a financial benefit, or other consideration from a contracting person that has entered into a comprehensive agreement with the responsible governmental entity.

Sec. 2267.008. PROHIBITED EMPLOYMENT WITH FORMER OR RETIRED GOVERNMENTAL ENTITY EMPLOYEES. (a) A contracting person may not employ or enter into a professional services contract or a consulting services contract under Chapter 2254 with a former or retired employee of the responsible governmental entity with which the person has entered into a comprehensive agreement before the first anniversary of the date on which the former or retired employee terminates employment with the entity.

- (b) This section does not prohibit the contracting person from entering into a professional services contract with a corporation, firm, or other business organization that employs a former or retired employee of the responsible governmental entity before the first anniversary of the date the former or retired employee terminates employment with the entity if the former or retired employee does not perform services for the corporation, firm, or other business organization under the comprehensive agreement with the responsible governmental entity that the former or retired employee worked on before terminating employment with the entity.
- SECTION ___. (a) Section 2267.051, Government Code, as added by Chapter 1334 (S.B. 1048), Acts of the 82nd Legislature, Regular Session, 2011, is amended by amending Subsection (a) and adding Subsection (a-1) to read as follows:
- (a) Except as provided by Subsection (a-1), a [A] person may not develop or operate a qualifying project unless the person obtains the approval of and contracts with the responsible governmental entity under this chapter. The person may initiate the approval process by submitting a proposal requesting approval under Section 2267.053(a), or the responsible governmental entity may request proposals or invite bids under Section 2267.053(b).
- (a-1) A person may not develop or operate a qualifying project on property located within the Capitol Complex, as defined by Section 411.061(a)(1), unless the person obtains the approval of and contracts with the responsible governmental entity under this chapter. The person may not initiate the approval process by submitting a proposal requesting approval under Section 2267.053(a). The responsible governmental entity may request proposals or invite bids under Section 2267.053(b).
- (b) If S.B. No. 894, Acts of the 83rd Legislature, Regular Session, 2013, or similar legislation relating to real property within the Capitol Complex is enacted and becomes law, this section has no effect.

- SECTION ____. Section 2267.052, Government Code, as added by Chapter 1334 (S.B. 1048), Acts of the 82nd Legislature, Regular Session, 2011, is amended by amending Subsections (b) and (c) and adding Subsection (d) to read as follows:
- (b) The guidelines for a responsible governmental entity described by Section 2267.001(5)(A) must:
 - (1) require the responsible governmental entity to:
- (A) make a representative of the entity available to meet with persons who are considering submitting a proposal; and
 - (B) provide notice of the representative's availability;
 - (2) provide reasonable criteria for choosing among competing proposals;
- (3) contain suggested timelines for selecting proposals and negotiating an interim or comprehensive agreement;
- (4) allow the responsible governmental entity to accelerate the selection, review, and documentation timelines for proposals involving a qualifying project considered a priority by the entity;
- (5) include financial review and analysis procedures that at a minimum consist of:
 - (A) a cost-benefit analysis;
 - (B) an assessment of opportunity cost;
- (C) consideration of the degree to which functionality and services similar to the functionality and services to be provided by the proposed project are already available in the private market; and
- (D) consideration of the results of all studies and analyses related to the proposed qualifying project;
- (6) allow the responsible governmental entity to consider the nonfinancial benefits of a proposed qualifying project;
 - (7) include criteria for:
- (A) the qualifying project, including the scope, costs, and duration of the project and the involvement or impact of the project on multiple public entities;
- (B) the creation of and the responsibilities of an oversight committee, with members representing the responsible governmental entity, that acts as an advisory committee to review the terms of any proposed interim or comprehensive agreement; and
 - (C) compliance with the requirements of Chapter 2268;
- (8) require the responsible governmental entity to analyze the adequacy of the information to be released by the entity when seeking competing proposals and require that the entity provide more detailed information, if the entity determines necessary, to encourage competition, subject to Section 2267.053(g);
- (9) establish criteria, key decision points, and approvals required to ensure that the responsible governmental entity considers the extent of competition before selecting proposals and negotiating an interim or comprehensive agreement; and
- (10) require the posting and publishing of public notice of a proposal requesting approval of a qualifying project, including:
- (A) specific information and documentation regarding the nature, timing, and scope of the qualifying project, as required under Section 2267.053(a);

- (B) a reasonable period, as determined by the responsible governmental entity, of not less than 45 days or more than 180 days, or a longer period specified by the governing body of the responsible governmental entity to accommodate a large-scale project, [as determined by the responsible governmental entity,] to encourage competition and partnerships with private entities and other persons in accordance with the goals of this chapter, during which the responsible governmental entity must accept submission of competing proposals for the qualifying project; and
- (C) a requirement for advertising the notice on the governmental entity's Internet website and on TexasOnline or the state's official Internet website.
- (c) The guidelines of a responsible governmental entity described by Section 2267.001(5)(B) must include:
 - (1) [may include] the provisions required under Subsection (b); and
- (2) [must include] a requirement that the governmental entity engage the services of qualified professionals, including an architect, professional engineer, or certified public accountant, not otherwise employed by the governmental entity, to provide independent analyses regarding the specifics, advantages, disadvantages, and long-term and short-term costs of any proposal requesting approval of a qualifying project unless the governing body of the governmental entity determines that the analysis of the proposal is to be performed by employees of the governmental entity.
- (d) A responsible governmental entity described by Section 2267.001(5)(A) shall submit a copy of the guidelines adopted by the entity under this section to the commission for approval by the commission. The commission shall prescribe the procedure for submitting the guidelines for review under this section. The governmental entity may not request or consider a proposal for a qualifying project until the guidelines are approved by the commission.
- SECTION ___. Section 2267.053, Government Code, as added by Chapter 1334 (S.B. 1048), Acts of the 82nd Legislature, Regular Session, 2011, is amended by amending Subsections (a) and (b) and adding Subsections (a-1), (b-1), and (b-2) to read as follows:
- (a) A private entity or other person may submit a proposal requesting approval of a qualifying project by the responsible governmental entity. The proposal must be accompanied by the following, unless waived by the responsible governmental entity:
- (1) a topographic map, with a 1:2,000 or other appropriate scale, indicating the location of the qualifying project;
 - (2) a description of the qualifying project, including:
- (A) the conceptual design of any facility or a conceptual plan for the provision of services or technology infrastructure; and
- (B) a schedule for the initiation of and completion of the qualifying project that includes the proposed major responsibilities and timeline for activities to be performed by the governmental entity and the person;

- (6) a list of any facilities that will be affected by the qualifying project and a statement of the person's plans to accommodate the affected facilities;
- (7) a statement on the person's general plans for financing the qualifying project, including the sources of the person's funds and identification of any dedicated revenue source or proposed debt or equity investment for the person;
- (8) the name and address of each individual who may be contacted for further information concerning the request;
- (9) user fees, lease payments, and other service payments over the term of any applicable interim or comprehensive agreement and the methodology and circumstances for changes to the user fees, lease payments, and other service payments over time;
- project; (10) a statement of the specific public purpose served by the qualifying
- (11) a statement describing the qualifying project's compliance with the responsible governmental entity's best value determination under Subsection (b-1); and
- $\underline{(12)}$ [(10)] any additional material and information the responsible governmental entity reasonably requests.
- (a-1) A responsible governmental entity that approves a proposal for a qualifying project under Subsection (a) shall select the contracting person for the project by soliciting additional proposals through a request for qualifications, request for proposals, or invitation to bid.
- (b) A responsible governmental entity may request proposals or invite bids from persons for the development or operation of a qualifying project.
- (b-1) A responsible governmental entity shall make a best value determination in evaluating the proposals received and consider the total project cost as one factor in evaluating the proposals. The responsible governmental entity [received, but] is not required to select the proposal that offers the lowest total project cost and [.—The responsible governmental entity] may consider the following factors:
 - (1) the proposed cost of the qualifying project;
- (2) the general reputation, industry experience, and financial capacity of the person submitting a proposal;
 - (3) the proposed design and overall quality of the qualifying project;
- (4) the eligibility of the project for accelerated selection, review, and documentation timelines under the responsible governmental entity's guidelines;
 - (5) comments from local citizens and affected jurisdictions;
 - (6) benefits to the public;
- (7) the person's good faith effort to comply with the goals of a historically underutilized business plan;
 - (8) the person's plans to employ local contractors and residents;
- (9) for a qualifying project that involves a continuing role beyond design and construction, the person's proposed rate of return and opportunities for revenue sharing;

- (10) the relationship and conformity of the qualifying project to a state or local community plan impacted by the qualifying project or to the uses of property surrounding the qualifying project;
- (11) the historic significance of the property on which the qualifying project is proposed to be located;

(12) the environmental impact of the qualifying project; and

- (13) [(10)] other criteria that the responsible governmental entity considers appropriate.
- (b-2) A responsible governmental entity may approve a qualifying project that the governmental entity determines serves a public purpose. The responsible governmental entity must include in the comprehensive agreement for the qualifying project a written declaration of the specific public purpose served by the project.

SECTION ____. Subsection (a), Section 2267.058, Government Code, as added by Chapter 1334 (S.B. 1048), Acts of the 82nd Legislature, Regular Session, 2011, is amended to read as follows:

- (a) Before developing or operating the qualifying project, the contracting person must enter into a comprehensive agreement with a responsible governmental entity. The comprehensive agreement shall provide for:
- (1) delivery of letters of credit or other security in connection with the development or operation of the qualifying project, in the forms and amounts satisfactory to the responsible governmental entity, and delivery of performance and payment bonds in compliance with Chapter 2253 for all construction activities;
- (2) review of plans and specifications for the qualifying project by the responsible governmental entity and approval by the responsible governmental entity indicating that [if] the plans and specifications conform to standards acceptable to the responsible governmental entity, except that the contracting person may not be required to provide final design documents for [complete the design of] a qualifying project before the execution of a comprehensive agreement;
- (3) inspection of the qualifying project by the responsible governmental entity to ensure that the contracting person's activities are acceptable to the responsible governmental entity in accordance with the comprehensive agreement;
- (4) maintenance of a public liability insurance policy, copies of which must be filed with the responsible governmental entity accompanied by proofs of coverage, or self-insurance, each in the form and amount satisfactory to the responsible governmental entity and reasonably sufficient to ensure coverage of tort liability to the public and project employees and to enable the continued operation of the qualifying project;
- (5) monitoring of the practices of the contracting person by the responsible governmental entity to ensure that the qualifying project is properly maintained;
- (6) reimbursement to be paid to the responsible governmental entity for services provided by the responsible governmental entity;
 - (7) filing of appropriate financial statements on a periodic basis; and
- (8) policies and procedures governing the rights and responsibilities of the responsible governmental entity and the contracting person if the comprehensive agreement is terminated or there is a material default by the contracting person, including conditions governing:

- (A) assumption of the duties and responsibilities of the contracting person by the responsible governmental entity; and
- (B) the transfer or purchase of property or other interests of the contracting person to the responsible governmental entity.
- SECTION ___. The heading to Section 2267.066, Government Code, is amended to read as follows:
- Sec. 2267.066. POSTING OF PROPOSALS; PUBLIC COMMENT; PUBLIC ACCESS TO PROCUREMENT RECORDS; FINAL VOTE.
- SECTION ____. Section 2267.066, Government Code, is amended by amending Subsections (c) and (d) and adding Subsection (e-1) to read as follows:
- (c) Chapter 552 applies to qualifying project proposals [Trade secrets, financial records, or other records of the contracting person excluded from disclosure under Section 552.101 may not be posted or made available for public inspection except as otherwise agreed to by the responsible governmental entity and the contracting person].
- (d) The responsible governmental entity shall hold a public hearing on the proposal during the proposal review process not later than the 30th day before the date the entity enters into an interim or comprehensive agreement. The public hearing shall be held in the area in which the proposed qualifying project is to be performed.
- (e-1) After making the proposed comprehensive agreement available as required by Subsection (e), the responsible governmental entity shall hold a public hearing on the final version of the proposed comprehensive agreement and vote on the proposed comprehensive agreement after the hearing. The hearing must be held not later than the 10th day before the date the entity enters into a comprehensive agreement with a contracting person.
- SECTION ___. (a) Subchapter B, Chapter 2267, Government Code, as added by Chapter 1334 (S.B. 1048), Acts of the 82nd Legislature, Regular Session, 2011, is amended by adding Section 2267.067 to read as follows:
- Sec. 2267.067. QUALIFYING PROJECT IN CAPITOL COMPLEX. (a) A qualifying project for property located in the Capitol Complex, as defined by Section 411.061(a)(1), must be consistent with Capitol Complex design guidelines or standards adopted as part of the Capitol Complex master plan developed under Section 2166.105.
- (b) A responsible governmental entity shall include design guidelines and standards defined in Subsection (a) in the request for proposals or invitation for bids for the development or operation of a qualifying project and inform the persons who submit proposals of the requirement to comply with the design guidelines and standards. The final proposal or invitation must be submitted to the State Preservation Board for verification that the proposal complies with the design guidelines and standards.
- (c) A responsible governmental entity shall submit a final qualifying project proposal for property in the area described by Subsection (a) to the State Preservation Board. SECTION ____. Subsection (a), Section 2268.052, Government Code, is amended to read as follows:

- (a) The commission consists of the following five [11] members:
- (1) the chair of the House Appropriations Committee [or the chair's designee];
- (2) <u>one representatives</u> [three representatives] appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives;
 - (3) the chair of the Senate Finance Committee [or the chair's designee];
 - (4) one senator [three senators] appointed by the lieutenant governor; and
- (5) one public member [three representatives of the executive branch,] appointed by the governor.

SECTION ___. Subsection (a), Section 2268.056, Government Code, is amended to read as follows:

(a) The State Preservation Board [legislative body that the presiding officer serves] shall provide administrative staff support for the commission.

Not later than December 1, 2016, the Partnership Advisory Commission established under Chapter 2268, Government Code, shall submit to the lieutenant governor, the speaker of the house of representatives, and the appropriate legislative standing committees recommendations on proposed amendments to Chapters 2267 and 2268, Government Code.

SECTION ____. Section 552.153, Government Code, as added by Chapter 1334 (S.B. 1048), Acts of the 82nd Legislature, Regular Session, 2011, is repealed.

HOUSE CHAMBER

Floor Amendment No. 1 on Third Reading

Amend Second Reading Amendment No. 2 by Watson to **CSSB 21** on third reading in the proposed Section 207.026(c)(2), Labor Code, between "enrolls in" and "a treatment program" by inserting "and attends".

The amendment to CSSB 21 was read and was adopted by a viva voce vote.

All Members are deemed to have voted "Yea" on the adoption of Floor Amendment No. 1 on Third Reading.

On motion of Senator Williams and by unanimous consent, the caption was again amended to conform to the body of the bill as amended.

CSSB 21 as again amended was finally passed by the following vote: Yeas 31, Nays 0.

COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE SENATE BILL 215 ON SECOND READING

On motion of Senator Birdwell and by unanimous consent, the regular order of business was suspended to take up for consideration CSSB 215 at this time on its second reading:

The bill was read second time.

Senator Birdwell offered the following amendment to the bill:

Floor Amendment No. 1

Amend CSSB 215 (senate committee printing) in SECTION 15 of the bill as follows:

- (1) In amended Section 61.0512(b), Education Code (page 7, lines 17 through 19), strike "secure preliminary approval from [eollege or university shall notify] the board to carry out that planning" and substitute "[eollege or university shall] notify the board before the institution may carry out that planning".
- (2) In added Section 61.0512(c), Education Code (page 7, line 23), strike "begins preliminary planning for" and substitute "requests to implement".

The amendment to CSSB 215 was read and was adopted by a viva voce vote.

All Members are deemed to have voted "Yea" on the adoption of Floor Amendment No. 1.

Senator Duncan offered the following amendment to the bill:

Floor Amendment No. 2

Amend **CSSB 215** (senate committee printing) in SECTION 2 of the bill, in added Section 51.406(d), Education Code (page 1, line 37), by striking "consult" and substituting "engage in negotiated rulemaking under Chapter 2008, Government Code,".

The amendment to CSSB 215 was read and was adopted by a viva voce vote.

All Members are deemed to have voted "Yea" on the adoption of Floor Amendment No. 2.

Senator Duncan offered the following amendment to the bill:

Floor Amendment No. 3

Amend **CSSB 215** (senate committee printing) by striking SECTION 10 of the bill (page 3, line 66, through page 4, line 11), striking SECTION 29 of the bill (page 10, line 59, through page 11, line 1), and renumbering the remaining SECTIONS of the bill accordingly.

The amendment to CSSB 215 was read and was adopted by a viva voce vote.

All Members are deemed to have voted "Yea" on the adoption of Floor Amendment No. 3.

Senator Watson offered the following amendment to the bill:

Floor Amendment No. 4

Amend **CSSB 215** (senate committee printing) by striking SECTION 13 of the bill (page 4, line 46, through page 5, line 63) and substituting the following appropriately numbered SECTION:

SECTION _____. Subchapter B, Chapter 61, Education Code, is amended by

adding Section 61.035 to read as follows:

Sec. 61.035. COMPLIANCE MONITORING. (a) The board by a negotiated rulemaking process in accordance with Chapter 2008, Government Code, shall establish an agency-wide, risk-based compliance monitoring function for:

(1) funds allocated by the board to institutions of higher education, private or independent institutions of higher education, and other entities, including student financial assistance funds, academic support grants, and any other grants, to ensure that those funds are distributed in accordance with applicable law and board rule; and

(2) data reported by institutions of higher education to the board and used by the board for funding or policymaking decisions, including data used for formula

funding allocations, to ensure the data is reported accurately.

(b) For purposes of this section, student financial assistance includes grants,

scholarships, loans, and work-study.

- (c) After considering potential risks and the board's resources, the board shall review a reasonable portion of the total funds allocated by the board and of data reported to the board. The board shall use various levels of monitoring, according to risk, ranging from checking reported data for errors and inconsistencies to conducting comprehensive audits, including site visits.
- (d) In developing the board's risk-based approach to compliance monitoring under this section, the board shall consider the following factors relating to an institution of higher education or private or independent institution of higher education:
- (1) the amount of student financial assistance or grant funds allocated to the institution by the board;
- (2) whether the institution is required to obtain and submit an independent audit;
 - (3) the institution's internal controls;
 - (4) the length of time since the institution's last desk review or site visit;

(5) past misuse of funds or misreported data by the institution;

(6) in regard to data verification, whether the data reported to the board by the institution is used for determining funding allocations; and

(7) other factors as considered appropriate by the board.

- (e) The board shall train compliance monitoring staff to ensure that the staff has the ability to monitor both funds compliance and data reporting accuracy. Program staff in other board divisions who conduct limited monitoring and contract administration shall coordinate with the compliance monitoring function to identify risks and avoid duplication.
- (f) If the board determines through its compliance monitoring function that funds awarded by the board to an institution of higher education or private or independent institution of higher education have been misused or misallocated by the

institution, the board shall present its determination to the institution's governing board and provide an opportunity for a response from the institution. Following the opportunity for response, the board shall report its determination and the institution's response, together with any recommendations, to the institution's governing board, the governor, and the Legislative Budget Board.

- (g) If the board determines through its compliance monitoring function that an institution of higher education has included errors in the institution's data reported for formula funding, the board:
- (1) for a public junior college, may adjust the appropriations made to the college for a fiscal year as necessary to account for the corrected data; and
- (2) for a general academic teaching institution, a medical and dental unit, or a public technical institute, shall calculate a revised appropriation amount for the applicable fiscal year based on the corrected data and report that revised amount to the governor and Legislative Budget Board for consideration as the basis for budget execution or other appropriate action, and to the comptroller.
- (h) In conducting the compliance monitoring function under this section, the board may partner with internal audit offices at institutions of higher education and private or independent institutions of higher education, as institutional resources allow, to examine the institutions' use of funds allocated by, and data reported to, the board. To avoid duplication of effort and assist the board in identifying risk, an internal auditor at an institution shall notify the board of any audits conducted by the auditor involving funds administered by the board or data reported to the board. The board by rule may determine the timing and format of the notification required by this subsection.
- (i) The board may seek technical assistance from the state auditor in establishing the compliance monitoring function under this section. The state auditor may periodically audit the board's compliance monitoring function as the state auditor considers appropriate.
 - (j) In this section:
- (1) "Desk review" means an administrative review by the board that is based on information reported by an institution of higher education or private or independent institution of higher education, including supplemental information required by the board for the purposes of compliance monitoring, except that the term does not include information or accompanying notes gathered by the board during a site visit.
- (2) "Site visit" means an announced or unannounced in-person visit by a representative of the board to an institution of higher education or private or independent institution of higher education for the purposes of compliance monitoring.

The amendment to CSSB 215 was read and was adopted by a viva voce vote.

All Members are deemed to have voted "Yea" on the adoption of Floor Amendment No. 4.

Senator Patrick offered the following amendment to the bill:

Floor Amendment No. 5

Amend CSSB 215 (senate committee printing) in SECTION 15 of the bill, in amended Section 61.0512(a), Education Code, (page 7, line 13) insert the following sentence at the end of the subsection: "A new degree or certificate program is considered approved if the board has not completed a review under this section and acted to approve or disapprove the proposed program before the first anniversary of the date on which an institution of higher education submits a completed application to the board. The board may not summarily disapprove a program without completing the review required by this section."

The amendment to **CSSB 215** was read.

Senator West offered the following amendment to Floor Amendment No. 5:

Floor Amendment No. 6

Amend Floor Amendment No. 5 to CSSB 215, on page 1, line 11, after "section.", insert "The board shall specify by rule the elements that constitute a completed application and shall make an administrative determination of the completeness of the application not later than the fifth business day after receiving the application. A request for additional information in support of an application that has been determined administratively complete does not toll the period within which the application is considered approved under this section. The board may not summarily disapprove a program without completing the review required by this section."

Amend **CSSB 215** (senate committee printing) in SECTION 23 of the bill by striking added Section 61.07761, Education Code (page 9, lines 27 through 36), and substituting the following:

Sec. 61.07761. FINANCIAL AID AND OTHER TRUSTEED FUNDS ALLOCATION. (a) For any funds trusteed to the board for allocation to institutions of higher education and private or independent institutions of higher education, including financial aid program funds, the board by rule shall:

(1) establish and publish the allocation methodologies; and

(2) develop procedures to verify the accuracy of the application of those allocation methodologies by board staff.

(b) The board shall engage in negotiated rulemaking as described by Chapter 2008, Government Code, in adopting rules under this section.

The amendment to CSSB 215 was read.

Senator Birdwell moved to table Floor Amendment No. 7.

Sec. 61.033. [NEGOTIATED RULEMAKING;] ALTERNATIVE DISPUTE RESOLUTION. (a) The board shall develop and implement a policy to encourage the use of [:

[(1) negotiated rulemaking procedures under Chapter 2008, Government Code, for the adoption of board rules; and

 $[\frac{(2)}{2}]$ appropriate alternative dispute resolution procedures under Chapter 2009, Government Code, to assist in the resolution of internal and external disputes under the board's jurisdiction.

- (b) The board's procedures relating to alternative dispute resolution must conform, to the extent possible, to any model guidelines issued by the State Office of Administrative Hearings for the use of alternative dispute resolution by state agencies.
 - (c) The board shall designate a trained person to [:
- [(1) coordinate the implementation of the policy adopted under Subsection (a);
- [(2)] serve as a resource for any training needed to implement the procedures for negotiated rulemaking or alternative dispute resolution[; and
- [(3) collect data concerning the effectiveness of those procedures, as implemented by the board].

SECTION ____. Subchapter B, Chapter 61, Education Code, is amended by adding Section 61.0331 to read as follows:

Sec. 61.0331. NEGOTIATED RULEMAKING REQUIRED. If the board is required by this code or other law to consult or cooperate with institutions of higher education in the development of a policy, procedure, or rule, the board must engage the institutions in a negotiated rulemaking process as described by Chapter 2008, Government Code, before the policy, procedure, or rule may take effect.

The amendment to **CSSB 215** was read.

- (f) The board may not order the consolidation or elimination of any degree or certificate program offered by an institution of higher education but may, based on the board's review under Subsections (d) and (e), recommend such action to an institution's governing board. If an institution's governing board does not accept recommendations to consolidate or eliminate a degree or certificate program, the university system or, where a system does not exist, the institution, must identify the programs recommended for consolidation or elimination on the next legislative appropriations request submitted by the system or institution.

(2) In Subsection (h), Section 61.0512, Education Code (Committee printing page 7, line 54), strike "(h)" and substitute "(g)".

The amendment to CSSB 215 was read and was adopted by a viva voce vote.

All Members are deemed to have voted "Yea" on the adoption of Floor Amendment No. 10.

Senator Seliger offered the following amendment to the bill:

Floor Amendment No. 11

Amend **CSSB 215** by adding the following appropriately numbered SECTION to the bill and renumbering the remaining SECTIONs of the bill accordingly:

SECTION _____. Subsection (f), Section 130.0012, Education Code, is amended to read as follows:

(f) Each public junior college that offers a baccalaureate degree program under this section must enter into an articulation agreement for the first five years of the program with one or more general academic teaching institutions to ensure that students enrolled in the degree program have an opportunity to complete the degree if the public junior college ceases to offer the degree program. The coordinating board may require a general academic teaching institution that offers a comparable degree program to enter into an articulation agreement with the public junior college as provided by this subsection.

SECTION ___. Subchapter C, Chapter 61, Education Code, is amended by adding Section 61.0763 to read as follows:

Sec. 61.0763. STUDENT LOAN DEFAULT PREVENTION AND FINANCIAL AID LITERACY PILOT PROGRAM. (a) In this section, "career school or college" has the meaning assigned by Section 132.001.

- (b) Not later than January 1, 2014, the board shall establish and administer a pilot program at selected postsecondary educational institutions to ensure that students of those institutions are informed consumers with regard to all aspects of student financial aid, including:
- (1) the consequences of borrowing to finance a student's postsecondary education;
- (2) the financial consequences of a student's academic and career choices; and
 - (3) strategies for avoiding student loan delinquency and default.
- (c) The board shall select at least one institution from each of the following categories of postsecondary educational institutions to participate in the program:
 - (1) general academic teaching institutions;

- (2) public junior colleges;
- (3) private or independent institutions of higher education; and
- (4) career schools or colleges.
- (d) In selecting postsecondary educational institutions to participate in the pilot program, the board shall give priority to institutions that have a three-year cohort student loan default rate, as reported by the United States Department of Education:
 - (1) of more than 20 percent; or
- (2) that has above average growth as compared to the rates of other postsecondary educational institutions in this state.
- (e) The board, in consultation with postsecondary educational institutions, shall adopt rules for the administration of the pilot program, including rules governing the selection of postsecondary educational institutions to participate in the pilot program consistent with the requirements of Subsection (d).
- (f) The board may contract with one or more entities to administer the pilot program according to criteria established by board rule.
 - (g) Not later than January 1 of each year, beginning in 2016:
- (1) the board shall submit a report to the governor, the lieutenant governor, and the speaker of the house of representatives regarding the outcomes of the pilot program, as reflected in the federal student loan default rates reported for the participating institutions; and
- (2) each participating institution shall submit a report to the governor, the lieutenant governor, and the speaker of the house of representatives regarding the outcomes of the pilot program at the institution, as reflected in the federal student loan default rate reported for the institution.
 - (h) This section expires December 31, 2020.
- SECTION _____. The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board shall adopt rules for the administration of Section 61.0763, Education Code, as added by this Act, as soon as practicable after this Act takes effect. For that purpose, the coordinating board may adopt the initial rules in the manner provided by law for emergency rules.

Senator Patrick offered the following amendment to the bill:

Floor Amendment No. 1

Amend **CSSB 2** (senate committee printing) by striking all below the enacting clause and substituting the following:

SECTION 1. Subchapter D, Chapter 11, Education Code, is amended by adding Sections 11.1542 and 11.1543 to read as follows:

Sec. 11.1542. OPEN-ENROLLMENT CHARTER SCHOOL OFFER FOR DISTRICT FACILITY. (a) The board of trustees of an independent school district that intends to sell, lease, or allow use for a purpose other than a district purpose of an unused or underused district facility must give each open-enrollment charter school located wholly or partly within the boundaries of the district the opportunity to make

an offer to purchase, lease, or use the facility, as applicable, in response to any terms established by the board of trustees, before offering the facility for sale or lease or to any other specific entity.

(b) This section does not require the board of trustees of a school district to

accept an offer made by an open-enrollment charter school.

Sec. 11.1543. CHARTER SCHOOL PAYMENT FOR FACILITIES USE OR FOR SERVICES. (a) An independent school district may not require a campus or campus program that has been granted a charter under Subchapter C, Chapter 12, and that is the result of the conversion of the status of an existing school district campus to pay rent for or to purchase a facility in order to use the facility.

(b) An independent school district may not require a campus or campus program described by Subsection (a) or an open-enrollment charter school to pay for any service provided by the district under a contract between the district and the campus, campus program, or open-enrollment charter school an amount that is greater than the amount of the actual costs to the district of providing the service.

SECTION 2. Subchapter C, Chapter 12, Education Code, is amended by adding Section 12.0522 to read as follows:

- Sec. 12.0522. DISTRICT CHARTER AUTHORIZATION. (a) Notwithstanding Section 12.052, in the manner provided by this section, the board of trustees of a school district or the governing body of a home-rule school district may grant a district charter to a campus to the extent authorized under this section.
- (b) Except as otherwise provided by this subsection or Subsection (c), a district charter may be granted under this section only to one or more campuses serving in total a percentage of the district's student enrollment equal to not more than 15 percent of the district's student enrollment for the preceding school year. The percentage limit may not prevent a district from granting a district charter to at least one feeder pattern of schools, including an elementary, middle or junior high, and high school.
- (c) A district charter may be granted to any campus that has received the lowest performance rating under Subchapter C, Chapter 39.
- (d) Subchapter D applies to a campus granted a district charter under this section as though the campus were granted a charter under Subchapter D, and the campus is considered an open-enrollment charter school.
- (e) A charter granted under this section is not considered for purposes of the limit on the number of charters for open-enrollment charter schools imposed by Section 12.101.
- (f) The commissioner may adopt rules as necessary for the administration of this section.

SECTION 3. Section 12.055, Education Code, is amended to read as follows:

Sec. 12.055. APPLICABILITY OF LAWS AND RULES TO CAMPUS OR PROGRAM GRANTED CHARTER. (a) A campus or program for which a charter is granted under this subchapter is subject to federal and state laws and rules governing public schools, except that the campus or program is subject to this code and rules adopted under this code only to the extent the applicability to a campus or program for which a charter is granted under this subchapter of a provision of this code or a rule adopted under this code is specifically provided.

(b) A school district may contract with another district or an open-enrollment charter school for services at a campus charter. An employee of the district or open-enrollment charter school providing contracted services to a campus charter is eligible for membership in and benefits from the Teacher Retirement System of Texas if the employee would be eligible for membership and benefits if holding the same position at the employing district or open-enrollment charter school.

SECTION 4. Section 12.056(b), Education Code, is amended to read as follows:

- (b) A campus or program for which a charter is granted under this subchapter is subject to:
 - (1) a provision of this title establishing a criminal offense; and
- (2) a prohibition, restriction, or requirement, as applicable, imposed by this title or a rule adopted under this title, relating to:
- (A) the Public Education Information Management System (PEIMS) to the extent necessary to monitor compliance with this subchapter as determined by the commissioner:
 - (B) criminal history records under Subchapter C, Chapter 22;
 - (C) high school graduation under Section 28.025;
 - (D) special education programs under Subchapter A, Chapter 29;
 - (E) bilingual education under Subchapter B, Chapter 29;
 - (F) prekindergarten programs under Subchapter E, Chapter 29;
 - (G) extracurricular activities under Section 33.081;
 - (H) health and safety under Chapter 38; and
- (I) public school accountability under Subchapters B, C, \underline{D} , E, \underline{F} , and J, Chapter 39.

SECTION 5. Section 12.057, Education Code, is amended by adding Subsection (b-1) to read as follows:

(b-1) An employee of a charter holder, as defined by Section 12.1012, who is employed on a campus or in a program granted a charter under this subchapter and who qualifies for membership in the Teacher Retirement System of Texas shall be covered under the system in the same manner and to the same extent as a qualified employee of an independent school district who is employed on a regularly operating campus or in a regularly operating program.

SECTION 6. Section 12.059, Education Code, is amended to read as follows:

Sec. 12.059. CONTENT. Each charter granted under this subchapter must:

- (1) describe the educational program to be offered, which may be a general or specialized program;
- (2) provide that continuation of the charter is contingent on satisfactory student performance under Subchapter B, Chapter 39, satisfactory financial performance under Subchapter D, Chapter 39, and [on] compliance with other applicable accountability provisions under Chapter 39;
- (3) specify any basis, in addition to a basis specified by this subchapter, on which the charter may be [placed on probation or] revoked;
- (4) prohibit discrimination in admission on the basis of national origin, ethnicity, race, religion, or disability;
 - (5) describe the governing structure of the campus or program;

- (6) specify any procedure or requirement, in addition to those under Chapter 38, that the campus or program will follow to ensure the health and safety of students and employees; and
- (7) describe the manner in which an annual audit of financial and programmatic operations of the campus or program is to be conducted, including the manner in which the campus or program will provide information necessary for the school district in which it is located to participate, as required by this code or by commissioner [State Board of Education] rule, in the Public Education Information Management System (PEIMS).
- SECTION 7. Section 12.101, Education Code, is amended by amending Subsections (a) and (b) and adding Subsections (b-0), (b-1), (b-2), (b-3), (b-4), (b-5), and (b-6) to read as follows:
- (a) In accordance with this subchapter, the <u>commissioner</u> [State Board of Education] may grant a charter on the application of an eligible entity for an open-enrollment charter school to operate in a facility of a commercial or nonprofit entity, an eligible entity, or a school district, including a home-rule school district. In this subsection, "eligible entity" means:
 - (1) an institution of higher education as defined under Section 61.003;
- (2) a private or independent institution of higher education as defined under Section 61.003;
- (3) an organization that is exempt from taxation under Section 501(c)(3), Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (26 U.S.C. Section 501(c)(3)); or
 - (4) a governmental entity.
- (b) After thoroughly investigating and evaluating an applicant, the commissioner [The State Board of Education] may grant a charter for an open-enrollment charter school only to an applicant that meets any financial, governing, educational, and operational standards adopted by the commissioner under this subchapter, that the commissioner determines is capable of carrying out the responsibilities provided by the charter and likely to operate a school of high quality, and that:
- (1) has not within the preceding 10 years had a charter under this chapter or a similar charter issued under the laws of another state surrendered under a settlement agreement, revoked, denied renewal, or returned; or
- (2) is not, under rules adopted by the commissioner, considered to be a corporate affiliate of or substantially related to an entity that has within the preceding 10 years had a charter under this chapter or a similar charter issued under the laws of another state surrendered under a settlement agreement, revoked, denied renewal, or returned.
- (b-0) The commissioner shall notify the State Board of Education of each charter the commissioner proposes to grant under this subchapter. Unless, before the 90th day after the date on which the board receives the notice from the commissioner, a majority of the members of the board present and voting vote against the grant of that charter, the commissioner's proposal to grant the charter takes effect. The board may not deliberate or vote on any grant of a charter that is not proposed by the commissioner.

- (b-1) In granting charters for open-enrollment charter schools, the commissioner [The State Board of Education] may not grant a total of more than:
 - (1) 215 charters through the fiscal year ending August 31, 2014;
 - (2) 225 charters beginning September 1, 2014;
 - (3) 240 charters beginning September 1, 2015;
 - (4) 255 charters beginning September 1, 2016;
 - (5) 275 charters beginning September 1, 2017;
 - (6) 295 charters beginning September 1, 2018;
 - (7) 315 charters beginning September 1, 2019; or
- (8) 330 charters beginning September 1, 2020 [for an open enrollment charter school].
- (b-2) Beginning September 1, 2021, the total number of charters for open-enrollment charter schools that may be granted is the sum of the number of charters authorized to be granted as of the preceding fiscal year plus 10 additional charters.
- (b-3) The commissioner may not grant more than one charter for an open-enrollment charter school to any charter holder. The commissioner may consolidate charters for an open-enrollment charter school held by multiple charter holders into a single charter held by a single charter holder with the written consent to the terms of consolidation by or at the request of each charter holder affected by the consolidation.
- (b-4) A charter holder having an accreditation status of accredited and at least 50 percent of its student population in grades assessed under Subchapter B, Chapter 39, may establish one or more new open-enrollment charter school campuses under an existing charter held by the charter holder if:
- (1) the charter holder is currently evaluated under the standard accountability procedures for evaluation under Chapter 39 and received a district rating in the highest or second highest performance rating category under Subchapter C, Chapter 39, for three of the last five years with at least 75 percent of the campuses rated under the charter also receiving a rating in the highest or second highest performance rating category and with no campus with a rating in the lowest performance rating category in the most recent ratings;
- (2) the charter holder provides written notice to the commissioner of the establishment of any campus under this subsection in the time, manner, and form provided by rule of the commissioner; and
- (3) not later than the 60th day after the date the charter holder provides written notice under Subdivision (2), the commissioner does not provide written notice to the charter holder disapproving a new campus under this section.
 - (b-5) The initial term of a charter granted under this section is five years.
- (b-6) The commissioner shall adopt rules to modify criteria for granting a charter for an open-enrollment charter school under this section to the extent necessary to address changes in performance rating categories or in the financial accountability system under Chapter 39.
- SECTION 8. Subchapter D, Chapter 12, Education Code, is amended by adding Section 12.1011 to read as follows:

- Sec. 12.1011. CHARTER AUTHORIZATION FOR HIGH-PERFORMING ENTITIES; LIMIT NOT APPLICABLE. (a) Notwithstanding Section 12.101(b), the commissioner may grant a charter for an open-enrollment charter school to an applicant that is:
- (1) an eligible entity under Section 12.101(a)(3) that proposes to operate the charter school program of a charter operator that operates one or more charter schools in another state and with which the eligible entity is affiliated and, as determined by the commissioner in accordance with commissioner rule, has performed at a level of performance comparable to performance under the highest or second highest performance rating category under Subchapter C, Chapter 39; or
- (2) an entity that has operated one or more charter schools established under this subchapter or Subchapter C or E and, as determined by the commissioner in accordance with commissioner rule, has performed in the highest or second highest performance rating category under Subchapter C, Chapter 39.
- (b) A charter holder granted a charter for an open-enrollment charter school under Subsection (a) may vest management of corporate affairs in a member entity provided that the member entity may change the members of the governing body of the charter holder before the expiration of a member's term only with the express written approval of the commissioner.
- (c) The initial term of a charter granted under this section is five years.
 (d) A charter granted under this section is not considered for purposes of the limit on the number of charters for open-enrollment charter schools imposed by Section 12.101.
- (e) The commissioner shall adopt rules to modify criteria for granting a charter for an open-enrollment charter school under this section to the extent necessary to address changes in performance rating categories under Subchapter C, Chapter 39.
- SECTION 9. Subchapter D, Chapter 12, Education Code, is amended by adding Section 12.1013 to read as follows:
- Sec. 12.1013. CHARTER AUTHORIZER ACCOUNTABILITY. (a) The commissioner shall annually report under Subchapters J and K, Chapter 39, the performance of open-enrollment charter schools by authorizer compared to campus charters and matched traditional campuses based on student achievement indicators adopted under Section 39.053.
- (b) The format of the report must enable the public to distinguish and compare the performance of each type of public school by classifying the schools as follows:
 - (1) open-enrollment charters granted by the State Board of Education;
 - (2) open-enrollment charters granted by the commissioner;
 - (3) charters granted by school districts; and (4) matched traditional campuses.
- (c) The report must include the performance of each public school in each class described by Subsection (b) as measured by the student achievement indicators adopted under Section 39.053.
 - (d) The report must also:

- (1) aggregate and compare the performance of open-enrollment charter schools granted charters by the State Board of Education, open-enrollment charter schools granted charters by the commissioner, campuses and programs granted charters by school districts, and matched traditional campuses; and
- (2) rate the aggregate performance of elementary, middle or junior high, and high schools within each class described by Subsection (b) as indicated by the composite rating that would be assigned to the class of elementary, middle or junior high, and high schools if the students attending all schools in that class were cumulatively enrolled in one elementary, middle or junior high, or high school.

SECTION 10. Section 12.102, Education Code, is amended to read as follows:

- Sec. 12.102. AUTHORITY UNDER CHARTER. An open-enrollment charter school:
- (1) shall provide instruction to students at one or more elementary or secondary grade levels as provided by the charter;
 - (2) is governed under the governing structure described by the charter;
- (3) retains authority to operate under the charter to the extent authorized under Sections 12.1141 and 12.115 and Subchapter E, Chapter 39 [contingent on satisfactory student performance as provided by the charter in accordance with Section 12.111]; and
 - (4) does not have authority to impose taxes.

SECTION 11. Section 12.104(b), Education Code, is amended to read as follows:

- (b) An open-enrollment charter school is subject to:
 - (1) a provision of this title establishing a criminal offense; and
- (2) a prohibition, restriction, or requirement, as applicable, imposed by this title or a rule adopted under this title, relating to:
- (A) the Public Education Information Management System (PEIMS) to the extent necessary to monitor compliance with this subchapter as determined by the commissioner;
 - (B) criminal history records under Subchapter C, Chapter 22;
- (C) reading instruments and accelerated reading instruction programs under Section 28.006;
 - (D) accelerated instruction under Section 28.0211;
 - (E) high school graduation requirements under Section 28.025;
 - (F) special education programs under Subchapter A, Chapter 29;
 - (G) bilingual education under Subchapter B, Chapter 29;
 - (H) prekindergarten programs under Subchapter E, Chapter 29;
 - (I) extracurricular activities under Section 33.081;
- (J) discipline management practices or behavior management techniques under Section 37.0021;
 - (K) health and safety under Chapter 38;
- (L) public school accountability under Subchapters B, C, D, E, \underline{F} , G, and J, Chapter 39;
- $\ensuremath{\left(M\right)}$ the requirement under Section 21.006 to report an educator's misconduct; and
 - (N) intensive programs of instruction under Section 28.0213.

SECTION 12. Section 12.1051, Education Code, is amended by amending Subsection (b) and adding Subsection (c) to read as follows:

- (b) With respect to the operation of an open-enrollment charter school, except as provided by Subsection (c), any requirement in Chapter 551 or 552, Government Code, or another law that concerns open meetings or the availability of information, that applies to a school district, the board of trustees of a school district, or public school students applies to an open-enrollment charter school, the governing body of a charter holder, the governing body of an open-enrollment charter school, or students attending an open-enrollment charter school.
- (c) Notwithstanding Subchapter F, Chapter 551, Government Code, the commissioner shall provide by rule for meetings by telephone conference call or video conference call where a majority of the quorum of the governing body of a charter holder or charter school is not physically present at one location of the meeting. The rule may apply only to meetings of the governing body of a charter holder or charter school with its central administrative offices in a state other than this state.

SECTION 13. Section 12.1053(a), Education Code, is amended to read as follows:

(a) This section applies to an open-enrollment charter school unless the school's charter otherwise describes procedures for purchasing and contracting and the procedures are approved by the commissioner [State Board of Education].

SECTION 14. Section 12.1057(a), Education Code, is amended to read as follows:

(a) An employee of an open-enrollment charter school [operating under a charter granted by the State Board of Education] who qualifies for membership in the Teacher Retirement System of Texas shall be covered under the system to the same extent a qualified employee of a school district is covered.

SECTION 15. Sections 12.110(a), (c), and (d), Education Code, are amended to read as follows:

- (a) The commissioner [State Board of Education] shall adopt:
- (1) an application form and a procedure that must be used to apply for a charter for an open-enrollment charter school; and
 - (2) criteria to use in selecting a program for which to grant a charter.
- (c) As part of the application procedure, the <u>commissioner</u> [board] may require a petition supporting a charter for a school signed by a specified number of parents or guardians of school-age children residing in the area in which a school is proposed or may hold a public hearing to determine parental support for the school.
- (d) The $\underline{\text{commissioner shall}}$ [board may] approve or deny an application based on:
 - (1) documented evidence collected through the application review process;
 - (2) merit; and
- (3) other criteria as adopted by the commissioner, which eriteria the board adopts must include:
- (A) criteria relating to the capability of the applicant to carry out the responsibilities provided by the charter and the likelihood that the applicant will operate a school of high quality;

- (B) (H) criteria relating to improving student performance and encouraging innovative programs; and
- $\underline{(C)}$ [$\underline{(2)}$] a statement from any school district whose enrollment is likely to be affected by the open-enrollment charter school, including information relating to any financial difficulty that a loss in enrollment may have on the district.

SECTION 16. Section 12.1101, Education Code, is amended to read as follows:

- Sec. 12.1101. NOTIFICATION OF CHARTER APPLICATION OR ESTABLISHMENT OF CAMPUS. The commissioner by rule shall adopt a procedure for providing notice to the following persons on receipt by the commissioner [State Board of Education] of an application for a charter for an open-enrollment charter school under Section 12.110 or of notice of the establishment of a campus as authorized under Section 12.101(b-4):
- (1) the board of trustees of each school district from which the proposed open-enrollment charter school <u>or campus</u> is likely to draw students, as determined by the commissioner; and
- (2) each member of the legislature that represents the geographic area to be served by the proposed school or campus, as determined by the commissioner.

SECTION 17. Section 12.111(a), Education Code, is amended to read as follows:

- (a) Each charter granted under this subchapter must:
- (1) describe the educational program to be offered, which must include the required curriculum as provided by Section 28.002;
 - (2) [specify the period for which the charter or any charter renewal is valid;
- [(3)] provide that continuation [or renewal] of the charter is contingent on the status of the charter as determined under Section 12.1141 or 12.115 or under Subchapter E, Chapter 39 [acceptable student performance on assessment instruments adopted under Subchapter B, Chapter 39, and on compliance with any accountability provision specified by the charter, by a deadline or at intervals specified by the charter];
- (3) specify the academic, operational, and financial performance expectations by which a school operating under the charter will be evaluated, which must include applicable elements of the performance frameworks adopted under Section 12.1181 [(4) establish the level of student performance that is considered acceptable for purposes of Subdivision (3)];
 - (4) [(5)] specify:
- (A) any basis, in addition to a basis specified by this subchapter or Subchapter E, Chapter 39, on which the charter may be [placed on probation or] revoked, [or on which] renewal of the charter may be denied, or the charter may be allowed to expire; and
- (B) the standards for evaluation of a school operating under the charter for purposes of charter renewal, denial of renewal, expiration, revocation, or other intervention in accordance with Section 12.1141 or 12.115 or Subchapter E, Chapter 39, as applicable;

- (5) [(6)] prohibit discrimination in admission policy on the basis of sex, national origin, ethnicity, religion, disability, academic, artistic, or athletic ability, or the district the child would otherwise attend in accordance with this code, although the charter may:
- (A) provide for the exclusion of a student who has a documented history of a criminal offense, a juvenile court adjudication, or discipline problems under Subchapter A, Chapter 37; and
- (B) provide for an admission policy that requires a student to demonstrate artistic ability if the school specializes in performing arts;
 - (6) [(7)] specify the grade levels to be offered;
 - (7) [(8)] describe the governing structure of the program, including:
 - (A) the officer positions designated;
 - (B) the manner in which officers are selected and removed from office;
- (C) the manner in which members of the governing body of the school are selected and removed from office;
 - (D) the manner in which vacancies on that governing body are filled;
 - (E) the term for which members of that governing body serve; and
 - (F) whether the terms are to be staggered;
- (8) [9] specify the powers or duties of the governing body of the school that the governing body may delegate to an officer;
- (9) [(10)] specify the manner in which the school will distribute to parents information related to the qualifications of each professional employee of the program, including any professional or educational degree held by each employee, a statement of any certification under Subchapter B, Chapter 21, held by each employee, and any relevant experience of each employee;
- (10) [(11)] describe the process by which the person providing the program will adopt an annual budget;
- (11) [(12)] describe the manner in which an annual audit of the financial and programmatic operations of the program is to be conducted, including the manner in which the person providing the program will provide information necessary for the school district in which the program is located to participate, as required by this code or by commissioner [State Board of Education] rule, in the Public Education Information Management System (PEIMS);
 - (12) [(13)] describe the facilities to be used;
 - $\overline{(13)}$ [(14)] describe the geographical area served by the program; [and]
 - (14) [(15)] specify any type of enrollment criteria to be used;
- (15) provide information, as determined by the commissioner, relating to any management company that will provide management services to a school operating under the charter; and
- (16) specify that the governing body of an open-enrollment charter school accepts and may not delegate ultimate responsibility for the school, including the school's academic performance and financial and operational viability, and is responsible for overseeing any management company providing management services for the school and for holding the management company accountable for the school's performance.

SECTION 18. Section 12.112, Education Code, is amended to read as follows:

Sec. 12.112. FORM. A charter for an open-enrollment charter school shall be in the form of a written contract signed by the <u>commissioner</u> [ehair of the State Board of Education] and the chief operating officer of the school.

SECTION 19. Section 12.113(a), Education Code, is amended to read as follows:

- (a) Each charter the <u>commissioner</u> [State Board of Education] grants for an open-enrollment charter school must:
 - (1) satisfy this subchapter; and
- (2) include the information that is required under Section 12.111 consistent with the information provided in the application and any modification the commissioner [board] requires.

SECTION 20. Subchapter D, Chapter 12, Education Code, is amended by adding Section 12.1141 to read as follows:

- Sec. 12.1141. RENEWAL OF CHARTER; DENIAL OF RENEWAL; EXPIRATION. (a) The commissioner shall develop and by rule adopt a procedure for renewal, denial of renewal, or expiration of a charter for an open-enrollment charter school at the end of the term of the charter. The procedure must include consideration of the performance under Chapter 39 of the charter holder and each campus operating under the charter and must include three distinct processes, which must be expedited renewal, discretionary consideration of renewal or denial of renewal, and expiration. To renew a charter at the end of the term, the charter holder must submit a petition for renewal to the commissioner in the time and manner established by commissioner rule.
- (b) At the end of the term of a charter for an open-enrollment charter school, if a charter holder submits to the commissioner a petition for expedited renewal of the charter, the charter automatically renews unless, not later than the 30th day after the date the charter holder submits the petition, the commissioner provides written notice to the charter holder that expedited renewal of the charter is denied. The commissioner may not deny expedited renewal of a charter if:
- (1) the charter holder has been assigned the highest or second highest performance rating under Subchapter C, Chapter 39, for the three preceding school years;
- (2) the charter holder has been assigned a financial performance accountability rating under Subchapter D, Chapter 39, indicating financial performance that is satisfactory or better for the three preceding school years; and
- (3) no campus operating under the charter has been assigned the lowest performance rating under Subchapter C, Chapter 39, for the three preceding school years or such a campus has been closed.
- (c) At the end of the term of a charter for an open-enrollment charter school, if a charter holder submits to the commissioner a petition for renewal of the charter and the charter does not meet the criteria for expedited renewal under Subsection (b) or for expiration under Subsection (d), the commissioner shall use the discretionary consideration process. The commissioner's decision under the discretionary consideration process must take into consideration the results of annual evaluations under the performance frameworks established under Section 12.1181. The renewal of the charter of an open-enrollment charter school that is registered under the

agency's alternative education accountability procedures for evaluation under Chapter 39 shall be considered under the discretionary consideration process regardless of the performance ratings under Subchapter C, Chapter 39, of the open-enrollment charter school or of any campus operating under the charter, except that if the charter holder has been assigned a financial accountability performance rating under Subchapter D. Chapter 39, indicating financial performance that is lower than satisfactory for any three of the five preceding school years, the commissioner shall allow the charter to expire under Subsection (d). In considering the renewal of the charter of an open-enrollment charter school that is registered under the agency's alternative education accountability procedures for evaluation under Chapter 39, such as a dropout recovery school or a school providing education within a residential treatment facility, the commissioner shall use academic criteria established by commissioner rule that are appropriate to measure the specific goals of the school. The criteria established by the commissioner shall recognize growth in student achievement as well as educational attainment. For purposes of this subsection, the commissioner shall designate as a dropout recovery school an open-enrollment charter school or a campus of an open-enrollment charter school:

- (1) that serves students in grades 9 through 12 and has an enrollment of which at least 50 percent of the students are 17 years of age or older as of September 1 of the school year as reported for the fall semester Public Education Information Management System (PEIMS) submission; and
- (2) that meets the eligibility requirements for and is registered under alternative education accountability procedures adopted by the commissioner.
- (d) At the end of the term of a charter for an open-enrollment charter school, if a charter holder submits to the commissioner a petition for renewal of the charter, the commissioner may not renew the charter and shall allow the charter to expire if:
- (1) the charter holder has been assigned the lowest performance rating under Subchapter C, Chapter 39, for any three of the five preceding school years;
- (2) the charter holder has been assigned a financial accountability performance rating under Subchapter D, Chapter 39, indicating financial performance that is lower than satisfactory for any three of the five preceding school years;
- (3) the charter holder has been assigned any combination of the ratings described by Subdivision (1) or (2) for any three of the five preceding school years; or
- (4) any campus operating under the charter has been assigned the lowest performance rating under Subchapter C, Chapter 39, for the three preceding school years and such a campus has not been closed.
- (e) Notwithstanding any other law, a determination by the commissioner under Subsection (d) is final and may not be appealed.
- (f) Not later than the 90th day after the date on which a charter holder submits a petition for renewal of a charter for an open-enrollment charter school at the end of the term of the charter, the commissioner shall provide written notice to the charter holder, in accordance with commissioner rule, of the basis on which the charter qualified for expedited renewal, discretionary consideration, or expiration, and of the commissioner's decision regarding whether to renew the charter, deny renewal of the charter, or allow the charter to expire.

- (g) Except as provided by Subsection (e), a decision by the commissioner to deny renewal of a charter for an open-enrollment charter school is subject to review by the State Office of Administrative Hearings. Notwithstanding Chapter 2001, Government Code:
- (1) the administrative law judge shall uphold a decision by the commissioner to deny renewal of a charter for an open-enrollment charter school unless the judge finds the decision is arbitrary and capricious or clearly erroneous; and

(2) a decision of the administrative law judge under this subsection is final and may not be appealed.

- (h) If a charter holder submits a petition for renewal of a charter for an open-enrollment charter school, notwithstanding the expiration date of the charter, the charter term is extended until the commissioner has provided notice to the charter holder of the renewal, denial of renewal, or expiration of the charter.
 - (i) The term of a charter renewed under this section is 10 years for each renewal.
- (j) The commissioner shall adopt rules to modify criteria for renewal, denial of renewal, or expiration of a charter for an open-enrollment charter school under this section to the extent necessary to address changes in performance rating categories or in the financial accountability system under Chapter 39.

SECTION 21. Section 12.115, Education Code, is amended to read as follows:

- Sec. 12.115. BASIS FOR <u>CHARTER</u> [<u>MODIFICATION</u>, <u>PLACEMENT ON PROBATION</u>,] REVOCATION[5] OR <u>MODIFICATION</u> OF GOVERNANCE [<u>DENIAL OF RENEWAL</u>]. (a) Except as provided by Subsection (c), the [<u>The</u>] commissioner <u>shall</u> [<u>may modify</u>, <u>place on probation</u>,] revoke[, <u>or deny renewal of</u>] the charter of an open-enrollment charter school <u>or reconstitute the governing body of</u> the charter holder if the commissioner determines that the charter holder:
- (1) committed a material violation of the charter, including failure to satisfy accountability provisions prescribed by the charter;
- (2) failed to satisfy generally accepted accounting standards of fiscal management;
- (3) failed to protect the health, safety, or welfare of the students enrolled at the school; [er]
 - (4) failed to comply with this subchapter or another applicable law or rule:
- (5) failed to satisfy the performance framework standards adopted under Section 12.1181; or
- (6) is imminently insolvent as determined by the commissioner in accordance with commissioner rule.
- (b) The action the commissioner takes under Subsection (a) shall be based on the best interest of the <u>open-enrollment charter</u> school's students, the severity of the violation, [and] any previous violation the school has committed, and the accreditation status of the school.
- (c) Except as provided by Subsection (d), the commissioner shall revoke the charter of an open-enrollment charter school if:
- (1) the charter holder has been assigned an unacceptable performance rating under Subchapter C, Chapter 39, for the three preceding school years;

- (2) the charter holder has been assigned a financial accountability performance rating under Subchapter D, Chapter 39, indicating financial performance lower than satisfactory for the three preceding school years; or
- (3) the charter holder has been assigned any combination of the ratings described by Subdivision (1) or (2) for the three preceding school years.
- (d) Subsections (c)(1) and (3) do not apply to a charter holder registered under the agency's alternative education accountability procedures for evaluation under Chapter 39.
- (e) This section does not limit the authority of the attorney general to take any action authorized by law.
- (f) A charter holder rated as academically unacceptable under Subchapter D, Chapter 39, as that subchapter existed on January 1, 2009, for the 2010-2011 school year is considered to have been assigned an unacceptable performance rating for that school year under Subsection (c)(1). This subsection expires September 1, 2015.

SECTION 22. Section 12.116, Education Code, is amended to read as follows:

- Sec. 12.116. PROCEDURE FOR [MODIFICATION, PLACEMENT ON PROBATION,] REVOCATION[5] OR MODIFICATION OF GOVERNANCE [DENIAL OF RENEWAL]. (a) The commissioner shall adopt an informal [a] procedure to be used for [modifying, placing on probation,] revoking[5, or denying renewal of] the charter of an open-enrollment charter school or for reconstituting the governing body of the charter holder as authorized by Section 12.115.
- (b) [The procedure adopted under Subsection (a) must provide an opportunity for a hearing to the charter holder and to parents and guardians of students in the school. A hearing under this subsection must be held at the facility at which the program is operated.
- [(e)] Chapter 2001, Government Code, does not apply to a <u>procedure [hearing]</u> that is related to a <u>[modification, placement on probation,]</u> revocation[,] or <u>modification of governance [denial of renewal]</u> under this subchapter.
- (c) A decision by the commissioner to revoke a charter is subject to review by the State Office of Administrative Hearings. Notwithstanding Chapter 2001, Government Code:
- (1) the administrative law judge shall uphold a decision by the commissioner to revoke a charter unless the judge finds the decision is arbitrary and capricious or clearly erroneous; and
- (2) a decision of the administrative law judge under this subsection is final and may not be appealed.
- (d) If the commissioner revokes the charter of an open-enrollment charter school, the commissioner may:
- (1) manage the school until alternative arrangements are made for the school's students; and
- (2) assign operation of one or more campuses formerly operated by the charter holder who held the revoked charter to a different charter holder who consents to the assignment.
- SECTION 23. Section 12.1161(a), Education Code, is amended to read as follows:

- (a) If [Except as provided by Subsection (b), if] the commissioner revokes or denies the renewal of a charter of an open-enrollment charter school[5] or [if] an open-enrollment charter school surrenders its charter, the school may not:
 - (1) continue to operate under this subchapter; or
 - (2) receive state funds under this subchapter.

SECTION 24. Section 12.1163(c), Education Code, is amended to read as follows:

(c) Unless the commissioner has specific cause to conduct an additional audit, the commissioner may not conduct more than one on-site audit [under Section 12.1163] during any fiscal year, including any financial and administrative records. For purposes of this subsection, an audit of a charter holder or management company associated with an open-enrollment charter school is not considered an audit of the school.

SECTION 25. Section 12.1164(a), Education Code, is amended to read as follows:

(a) The commissioner must notify the Teacher Retirement System of Texas in writing of the revocation, denial of renewal, <u>expiration</u>, or surrender of a charter under this subchapter not later than the 10th business day after the date of the event.

SECTION 26. Subchapter D, Chapter 12, Education Code, is amended by adding Section 12.1181 to read as follows:

- Sec. 12.1181. PERFORMANCE FRAMEWORKS; ANNUAL EVALUATIONS. (a) The commissioner shall develop and by rule adopt performance frameworks that establish standards by which to measure the performance of an open-enrollment charter school. The commissioner shall develop and by rule adopt separate, specific performance frameworks by which to measure the performance of an open-enrollment charter school that is registered under the agency's alternative education accountability procedures for evaluation under Chapter 39. The performance frameworks shall be based on national best practices that charter school authorizers use in developing and applying standards for charter school performance. In developing the performance frameworks, the commissioner shall solicit advice from charter holders, the members of the governing bodies of open-enrollment charter schools, and other interested persons.
- (b) The performance frameworks may include a variety of standards. In evaluating an open-enrollment charter school, the commissioner shall measure school performance against an established set of quality standards developed and adopted by the commissioner.
- (c) Each year, the commissioner shall evaluate the performance of each open-enrollment charter school based on the applicable performance frameworks adopted under Subsection (a).

SECTION 27. Section 12.119, Education Code, is amended to read as follows:

Sec. 12.119. BYLAWS; ANNUAL REPORT. (a) A charter holder shall file with the <u>commissioner</u> [State Board of Education] a copy of its articles of incorporation and bylaws, or comparable documents if the charter holder does not have articles of incorporation or bylaws, within the period and in the manner prescribed by the <u>commissioner</u> [board].

- (b) Each year within the period and in a form prescribed by the <u>commissioner</u> [State Board of Education], each open-enrollment charter school shall file with the commissioner [board] the following information:
- (1) the name, address, and telephone number of each officer and member of the governing body of the open-enrollment charter school; and
- (2) the amount of annual compensation the open-enrollment charter school pays to each officer and member of the governing body.
- (c) On request, the <u>commissioner</u> [State Board of Education] shall provide the information required by this section and Section 12.111(a)(7) [12.111(a)(8)] to a member of the public. The <u>commissioner</u> [board] may charge a reasonable fee to cover the commissioner's [board's] cost in providing the information.

SECTION 28. Subchapter D, Chapter 12, Education Code, is amended by adding Section 12.1211 to read as follows:

Sec. 12.1211. NAMES OF MEMBERS OF GOVERNING BODY LISTED ON WEBSITE. An open-enrollment charter school shall list the names of the members of the governing body on the home page of the school's Internet website.

SECTION 29. Section 12.122(a), Education Code, is amended to read as follows:

(a) Notwithstanding the applicable provisions of the Business Organizations Code [Texas Non-Profit Corporation Act (Article 1396-1.01 et seq., Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes)] or other law, on request of the commissioner, the attorney general may bring suit against a member of the governing body of an open-enrollment charter school for breach of a fiduciary duty by the member, including misapplication of public funds.

SECTION 30. Section 12.128(a), Education Code, is amended to read as follows:

- (a) Property purchased or leased with funds received by a charter holder under Section 12.106 after September 1, 2001:
 - (1) is considered to be public property for all purposes under state law;
- (2) is <u>property of this state</u> held in trust by the charter holder for the benefit of the students of the open-enrollment charter school; and
- (3) may be used only for a purpose for which a school district may use school district property.

SECTION 31. Subchapter D, Chapter 12, Education Code, is amended by adding Section 12.1231 to read as follows:

Sec. 12.1231. TRAINING FOR AGENCY EMPLOYEES. Not later than October 1, 2013, each agency employee assigned responsibility related to granting charters for open-enrollment charter schools or providing oversight or monitoring of charter holders or open-enrollment charter schools must participate in training on charter school authorization, oversight, and monitoring provided by a nationally recognized organization of charter school authorizers identified by the commissioner. This section expires January 1, 2014.

SECTION 32. Sections 12.152 and 12.154, Education Code, are amended to read as follows:

- Sec. 12.152. AUTHORIZATION. [(a)] In accordance with this subchapter and Subchapter D, the commissioner [State Board of Education] may grant a charter on the application of:
- (1) a public senior college or university for an open-enrollment charter school to operate on the campus of the public senior college or university or in the same county in which the campus of the public senior college or university is located; or
- (2) a public junior college for an open-enrollment charter school to operate on the campus of the public junior college or in the same county in which the campus of the public junior college is located.
- Sec. 12.154. CONTENT. (a) Notwithstanding Section 12.110(d), the commissioner [State Board of Education] may grant a charter under this subchapter to a public senior college or university only if the following criteria are satisfied in the public senior college's or university's application, as determined by the commissioner [State Board of Education]:
- (1) the college or university charter school's educational program must include innovative teaching methods;
- (2) the college or university charter school's educational program must be implemented under the direct supervision of a member of the teaching or research faculty of the public senior college or university;
- (3) the faculty member supervising the college or university charter school's educational program must have substantial experience and expertise in education research, teacher education, classroom instruction, or educational administration;
- (4) the college or university charter school's educational program must be designed to meet specific goals described in the charter, including improving student performance, and each aspect of the program must be directed toward the attainment of the goals;
- (5) the attainment of the college or university charter school's educational program goals must be measured using specific, objective standards set forth in the charter, including assessment methods and a time frame; and
- (6) the financial operations of the college or university charter school must be supervised by the business office of the public senior college or university.
- (b) Notwithstanding Section 12.110(d), the <u>commissioner</u> [State Board of Education] may grant a charter under this subchapter to a public junior college only if the following criteria are satisfied in the public junior college's application, as determined by the commissioner [State Board of Education]:
- (1) the junior college charter school's educational program must be implemented under the direct supervision of a member of the faculty of the public junior college;
- (2) the faculty member supervising the junior college charter school's educational program must have substantial experience and expertise in teacher education, classroom instruction, or educational administration;
- (3) the junior college charter school's educational program must be designed to meet specific goals described in the charter, such as dropout recovery, and each aspect of the program must be directed toward the attainment of the goals;

- (4) the attainment of the junior college charter school's educational program goals must be measured using specific, objective standards set forth in the charter, including assessment methods and a time frame; and
- (5) the financial operations of the junior college charter school must be supervised by the business office of the junior college.

SECTION 33. Section 12.156(b), Education Code, is amended to read as follows:

(b) A charter granted under this subchapter is not considered for purposes of the limit on the number of open-enrollment charter schools imposed by Section 12.101 [12.101(b)].

SECTION 34. Section 39.152, Education Code, is amended to read as follows:

- Sec. 39.152. REVIEW BY STATE OFFICE OF ADMINISTRATIVE HEARINGS: SANCTIONS. (a) A school district or open-enrollment charter school that intends to challenge a decision by the commissioner under this chapter to close the district or a district campus or the charter school or to pursue alternative management of a district campus or the charter school must appeal the decision under this section [the procedures provided for a contested case under Chapter 2001, Government Code].
- (b) A challenge to a decision under this section is under the substantial evidence rule as provided by Subchapter G, Chapter 2001, Government Code. The commissioner shall adopt procedural rules for a challenge under this section.
 - (c) Notwithstanding other law:
- (1) the State Office of Administrative Hearings shall <u>conduct</u> [provide] an expedited review of a challenge under this section;
- (2) the administrative law judge shall issue a final order not later than the 30th day after the date on which the hearing is finally closed; [and]
- (3) the decision of the administrative law judge is final and may not be appealed; and
- (4) the decision of the administrative law judge may set an effective date for an action under this section.

SECTION 35. Section 221.0071(a), Human Resources Code, is amended to read as follows:

(a) Notwithstanding any other law and in addition to the number of charters allowed under Subchapter D, Chapter 12, Education Code, the <u>commissioner of education [State Board of Education]</u> may grant a charter on the <u>application of a detention</u>, correctional, or residential facility established only for juvenile offenders under Section 51.12, 51.125, or 51.126, Family Code.

SECTION 36. Section 221.056(d), Human Resources Code, is amended to read as follows:

(d) Notwithstanding any other law and in addition to the number of charters allowed under Subchapter D, Chapter 12, Education Code, the commissioner of education [State Board of Education] shall grant a charter on the application of a residential treatment facility established under this section for a school chartered for the purposes of this section.

SECTION 37. The following provisions of the Education Code are repealed:

(1) Section 12.113(b); and

(2) Section 12.1161(b).

SECTION 38. This Act takes effect September 1, 2013.

The amendment to **CSSB 2** was read.

 - (1) 215 charters through the fiscal year ending August 31, 2014;
 - (2) 225 charters beginning September 1, 2014;
 - (3) 240 charters beginning September 1, 2015;

- (6) 285 charters beginning September 1, 2018 [for an open-enrollment charter school].

- (b-7) A charter granted under this section for a dropout recovery school is not considered for purposes of the limit on the number of charters for open-enrollment charter schools imposed by this section. For purposes of this subsection, an open-enrollment charter school is considered to be a dropout recovery school if the school meets the criteria for designation as a dropout recovery school under Section 12.1141(c).
- (4) In SECTION 8 of the bill, in the heading to added Section 12.1011, Education Code (page 8, line 24), strike "; LIMIT NOT APPLICABLE".
- (5) In SECTION 8 of the bill, strike added Section 12.1011(d), Education Code (page 9, lines 17-19).
- (6) In SECTION 8 of the bill, in added Section 12.1011(e), Education Code (page 9, line 20), strike "(e)" and substitute "(d)".

- (1) a plan to increase the educational and performance levels of students in campuses that received unacceptable performance ratings under Section 39.054; and
 - (2) educate populations of students to be enrolled at the campus.

The amendment to Floor Amendment No. 1 to CSSB 2 was read and was adopted by a viva voce vote.

All Members are deemed to have voted "Yea" on the adoption of Floor Amendment No. 3.

rules and state regulations than charters. Unfortunately, **CSSB 2** does not adequately address these two important issues. Until the playing field is leveled and school funding is addressed, I cannot support further charter expansion.

- (d) The commission shall establish a process by which providers may submit proposed marketing activities for review and prior authorization to ensure that providers are in compliance with the requirements of this section and, if applicable, Section 533.008, or to determine whether the providers are exempt from a requirement of this section and, if applicable, Section 533.008. The commission may grant or deny a provider's request for authorization to engage in a proposed marketing activity.
- (e) The executive commissioner shall adopt rules as necessary to implement this section, including rules relating to provider marketing activities that are exempt from the requirements of this section and, if applicable, Section 533.008.
- (3) Strike SECTION 3 of the bill (page 2, line 47, through page 3, line 9) and substitute the following appropriately numbered SECTION:
- SECTION _____. Section 531.02414, Government Code, is amended by amending Subsection (d) and adding Subsections (g) and (h) to read as follows:
- (d) <u>Subject to Section 533.00254, the</u> [The] commission may contract with a public transportation provider, as defined by Section 461.002, Transportation Code, a private transportation provider, or a regional transportation broker for the provision of public transportation services, as defined by Section 461.002, Transportation Code, under the medical transportation program.

- (g) The commission shall enter into a memorandum of understanding with the Texas Department of Motor Vehicles and the Texas Department of Public Safety for purposes of obtaining the motor vehicle registration and driver's license information of a provider of medical transportation services, including a regional contracted broker and a subcontractor of the broker, to confirm that the provider complies with applicable requirements adopted under Subsection (e).
- (h) The commission shall establish a process by which providers of medical transportation services, including providers under a managed transportation delivery model, that contract with the commission may request and obtain the information described under Subsection (g) for purposes of ensuring that subcontractors providing medical transportation services meet applicable requirements adopted under Subsection (e).
- (4) Strike SECTION 6 of the bill (page 3, lines 42-64) and substitute the following appropriately numbered SECTION:
- SECTION _____. (a) Subchapter A, Chapter 533, Government Code, is amended by adding Section 533.00254 to read as follows:
- Sec. 533.00254. DELIVERY OF MEDICAL TRANSPORTATION PROGRAM SERVICES. (a) In this section:
- (1) "Managed transportation organization" means:

 (A) a rural or urban transit district created under Chapter 458, Transportation Code;
- (B) a public transportation provider defined by Section 461.002, Transportation Code;
- (C) a regional contracted broker defined by Section 531.02414;
 (D) a local private transportation provider approved by the commission to provide Medicaid nonemergency medical transportation services; or
 (E) any other entity the commission determines meets the requirements
- of this section.
- (2) "Medical transportation program" has the meaning assigned by Section $531.0241\overline{4}$.
- (3) "Transportation service area provider" means a for-profit or nonprofit entity that provides demand response, curb-to-curb, nonemergency transportation under the medical transportation program.

 (b) Subject to Subsection (h), the commission shall provide medical transportation program services on a regional basis through a managed transportation delivery model using managed transportation organizations and providers, as appropriate, that:

 - (1) operate under a capitated rate system;(2) assume financial responsibility under a full-risk model;
 - (3) operate a call center;
- (4) use fixed routes when available and appropriate; and (5) agree to provide data to the commission if the commission determines that the data is required to receive federal matching funds.
- (c) The commission shall procure managed transportation organizations under the medical transportation program through a competitive bidding process.

- (d) A managed transportation organization that participates in the medical transportation program must attempt to contract with medical transportation providers that:
- (1) are considered significant traditional providers, as defined by rule by the executive commissioner;
- (2) meet the minimum quality and efficiency measures required under Subsection (g) and other requirements that may be imposed by the managed transportation organization; and
- (3) agree to accept the prevailing contract rate of the managed transportation organization.
- (e) To the extent allowed under federal law, a managed transportation organization may own, operate, and maintain a fleet of vehicles or contract with an entity that owns, operates, and maintains a fleet of vehicles.
- (f) The commission shall consider the ownership, operation, and maintenance of a fleet of vehicles by a managed transportation organization to be a related-party transaction for purposes of applying experience rebates, administrative costs, and other administrative controls determined by the commission.
- (g) The commission shall require that managed transportation providers participating in the medical transportation program meet minimum quality and efficiency measures as determined by the commission.
- (h) The commission may delay providing medical transportation program services through a managed transportation delivery model in areas of this state in which the commission on September 1, 2013, is operating a full-risk transportation broker model.
- (b) The Health and Human Services Commission shall begin providing medical transportation program services through the delivery model required by Section 533.00254, Government Code, as added by this section, not later than September 1, 2014, subject to Section 533.00254(h), Government Code, as added by this section.

- (C) an action or decision that, under a statute of this state or the United States, was a misdemeanor or felony at the time the action was taken or the decision was made.

REASON FOR VOTE

Senator Birdwell submitted the following reason for vote on CSSB 346:

Today I cast my vote in opposition to Senate Bill 346. The bill was primarily captioned to address transparency—"Relating to reporting requirements of certain persons who do not meet the definition of a political committee"—and while I am certainly a strong proponent for such open government and transparency, I had

constitutional concerns on the bill. First, the bill establishes separate reporting requirements for corporations. Some corporations like labor unions are exempt, while other corporations like 501(c)(4) entities are not. In 1990, the Supreme Court determined in Austin vs. Michigan Chamber of Commerce that different restrictions on speech related to spending based upon corporate identity were constitutional. Had SB 346 been passed while that 1990 case had still been the prevailing precedent, I believe it would have been constitutional. However, in 2010 the Supreme Court decision in the Citizens United vs. Federal Election Commission case determined that the First Amendment to the U.S. Constitution prohibited the government from restricting independent political expenditures by corporations, associations, or labor unions. The court also found that the First Amendment protects associations or individuals in additional to individual speakers. Corporations, as associations of individuals, therefore have First Amendment rights. Second, SB 346 treats corporations differently from labor unions and associations in what they must report. SB 346 requires that corporations which spend less than \$25,000 must report expenditures, while those corporations which spend more than \$25,000 must not only report expenditures, but report their donors. Again, this is a disparate treatment not only among corporations based upon their spending levels, but corporations as they are treated in relation to labor unions and associations. The reporting requirement of donors also begs another constitutional question. In 1995, in McIntyre vs. Ohio Election Commission, the Supreme Court determined that citizens had the right to engage in anonymous political speech. Since corporations now have the same First Amendment rights as individuals to anonymous political speech, requiring the reporting of donors strikes me as a violation of the First Amendment. For these reasons and concerns I voted against SB 346 today.

Senator Taylor: Thank you, Mr. President. I do rise today in honor of the passing of a great Texan and American patriot. Bob Perry, who died this past Saturday, was a man of legendary compassion and integrity who had the vision to see the unlimited

potential of this great state and all the people that he knew here. His passing is a great loss to our state and to the nation. As you've heard, he was born in Bosque County, attended Baylor University, and then started the very well known Perry Homes in 1968. He was a pillar of industry in our state as well as a philanthropist who moved and improved the lives of thousands of people and changed the face of our state. His commitment to his community as well as to politics is obviously well known and been well publicized, but lesser known has been his commitment and his contributions to those orphans and children in Mexico and Central America. That kind of legacy of giving and compassion will continue to inspire all of us in the years to come. Bob was, indeed, fearless in the defending of freedom and liberty and never wavered in the courage of his convictions, no matter the politics or the bad press. No challenge was too great for Mr. Perry to take on when he believed it was the right thing to do. He was also a man with deeply held faith who believed in life and family and followed the commandment of love to others and to give generously. In the words of the Apostle Paul, Bob Perry fought the fight, he finished the race, and he kept the faith. Mr. Perry's generosity and compassion, his zeal for principles and freedom, have made an indelible mark on Texas and those of us who knew him. Bob's passing is a great loss for this state and for our nation, and he will be greatly missed.

Senator Lucio: Thank you, Mr. President, and thank you, Senator Taylor. I, with a heavy heart, I, today, join with all of you, and I join with the family and countless numbers of friends of Bob Perry in mourning his passing this weekend. He was a godly man, and he was one of my personal heroes. Over the course of my career in the Legislature, we had many wonderful opportunities to develop a meaningful relationship and friendship. He, obviously, will be sorely missed by those of us that knew him and knew him well in South Texas. I also had the opportunity to work with Mr. Perry on humanitarian issues. The love he had for the less fortunate was incredible, absolutely tremendous. In his life he made an impact on thousands of people, including young orphans throughout Central and South America. I personally saw the fruits of his labors as we visited Casa Hogar orphanage in Matamoros, Mexico, which borders my Senate District just south of the border. I want to say that on that particular trip it was in the height of the war on drugs that was going on, and Mr. Perry came to me, says Senator, Senator would you take me there? And I said, You know, it's okay if they take me, but if they take you they'll hit a gold mine. We'll go, but we can't announce that we're going, to let anybody know that we're going to go visit because the press will, obviously, come to us. And we were able to go into Matamoros, visit little over 300 orphans, go into the kitchen, saw a beautiful kitchen, Senator Patrick, that was full of food based on his generosity. Saw the schoolhouse, saw the dormitories and a big reception room where we embraced each other and we cried together, we laughed together, it was a moment that I will never, ever forget. And I looked at him, and his profile, and I saw a man that truly, truly cared. A man with great compassion and a man that I knew was in union with God even as he lived and walked this Earth. So, my respect for him escalated to the heavens, quite frankly. Mr. Perry was a humble man who gave unselfishly and who never asked for anything. My 26 years here in Austin, not once did I get one phone call demanding any kind of help even though he had supported me and many others on this floor and many others that were no longer on this floor over the years. All of us can learn a lot from this man

who belonged to a conservative political party but whose heart and generosity guided his personal policy position. His legacy will be one of service to God's people. Because of his good works on Earth, I know, I truly know that he is in union with God. I extend, on behalf of my family and all of us that got to know him well in South Texas, our personal sympathies to Mrs. Perry and to the Perry family. Thank you, Mr. President, and thank you, Senator Taylor.

Senator Patrick: Thank you, Mr. President. I'm proud to join Senator Taylor and Senator Lucio in authoring this resolution. And I'm really going to miss Bob Perry. My dad died in 2002. And one of the things I really miss about my dad is, I couldn't call him up and ask for his advice at times, or just counsel on how to handle a situation in personal life. And as I got to know Bob Perry, about five years after my dad died, and I knew him for a period of time, but I got to know him well after I came into office, and, like Senator Lucio said, even though he was a supporter of mine, I never had a phone call from him about anything political. But I would call him, and I would talk to him about the issues that I would talk to my father about, and he would listen, and he would give me counsel. Because no matter how old we are, we always need someone to turn to, I think, for advice at times. So, I'll really miss him. His soft voice, his gentle spirit, he was truly a humble man. When you look at the, it's reported, millions and millions of dollars that he gave to Republicans and Democrats and conservative causes over the years, you never saw him on Fox News or CNN. He wasn't in the headlines of the papers. He didn't go to political events. He cared about the republic. He cared about the country. And if you were standing tall for our republic, he stood with you. And the only time I would ever get a call is just to say thank you or encourage me if he thought I had a bad day. So, as I get older, I'm running out of people older than me to call for advice. But I'll miss Bob Perry. He was a great Texan, just an absolutely fantastic human being. Thank you, Mr. President.

And so, what my concern is is that we need to turn that "shall" into a "may" at the beginning or as funds are appropriated. Because otherwise, you know, they had a big request, we weren't able to meet everything, and this is actually going back and changing how those funds would be allocated to the DPS. And I don't think that was your intention.

Senator Patrick: No, and I have an amendment to do that. My amendment, Senator, I'll tell you in advance, will say, only if sufficient funds under Subsection (b), and state funds allocated for training program are available. And that will address that issue.

Senator Williams: Where, okay.

Senator Patrick: No, this is an amendment I'm going to offer on the floor.

Senator Williams: Okay, I had not seen this, okay. That, I think, let me read this. I think this may address my concerns.

Senator Patrick: Yes.

- (b) On a showing of good cause, or for the purpose of a United States Constitutional challenge to the array after indictment, the court shall permit disclosure of necessary information sought to an attorney representing a party to the proceeding. Upon disclosure, the court shall order the attorney not to disclose the information to any other person, unless the third party is an investigator, expert, consulting legal counsel, or other agent for the attorney. The nondisclosure requirements shall apply to any third party receiving information under this article.

The amendment to SB 834 was read.

- SECTION 1. Section 56.023, Utilities Code, is amended by amending Subsection (b) and adding Subsections (f), (g), (h), (i), (j), (k), (l), (m), (n), and (o) to read as follows:
- (2) In Section 1 of the bill strike the added Sections 56.023(f) through (p), Utilities Code (page 1, line 42 through page 2, line 60), and substitute:
- (f) Except as provided by Subsection (g), for an incumbent local exchange company or cooperative that served greater than 31,000 access lines in this state on September 1, 2013, or a company or cooperative that is a successor to such a company or cooperative, the support that the company or cooperative is eligible to receive on December 31, 2016, under a plan established under Section 56.021(1)(A) is reduced:
- (1) on January 1, 2017, to 75 percent of the level of support the company or cooperative is eligible to receive on December 31, 2016;
- (2) on January 1, 2018, to 50 percent of the level of support the company or cooperative is eligible to receive on December 31, 2016; and

- (3) on January 1, 2019, to 25 percent of the level of support the company or cooperative is eligible to receive on December 31, 2016.
- (g) After the commission has adopted rules under Subsection (j), an incumbent local exchange company or cooperative that is subject to Subsection (f) may petition the commission to initiate a contested case proceeding as necessary to determine the eligibility of the company or cooperative to receive support under a plan established under Section 56.021(1)(A). A company or cooperative may not file more than one petition under this subsection. On receipt of a petition under this subsection, the commission shall initiate a contested case proceeding to determine the eligibility of the company or cooperative to receive continued support under a plan established under Section 56.021(1)(A) for service in the exchanges that are the subject of the petition. To be eligible to receive support for service in an exchange under this subsection, the company or cooperative must demonstrate that it has a financial need for continued support. The commission must issue a final order on the proceeding not later than the 330th day after the date the petition is filed with the commission. Until the commission issues a final order on the proceeding, the company or cooperative is entitled to receive the total amount of support the company or cooperative was eligible to receive on the date the company or cooperative filed the petition. A company or cooperative that files a petition under this subsection is not subject to Subsection (f) after the commission issues a final order on the proceeding. If the commission determines that a company or cooperative has demonstrated financial need for continued support under this subsection, it shall set the amount of support in the same proceeding. The amount of support set by the commission for an exchange under this subsection may not exceed:
- (1) 100 percent of the amount of support that the company or cooperative will be eligible to receive on December 31, 2016, if the petition is filed before January 1, 2016;
- (2) 75 percent of the amount of support that the company or cooperative will be eligible to receive on December 31, 2016, if the petition is filed on or after January 1, 2016, and before January 1, 2017;
- (3) 50 percent of the amount of support the company or cooperative is eligible to receive on December 31, 2016, if the petition is filed on or after January 1, 2017, and before January 1, 2018; or
- (4) 25 percent of the amount of support that the company or cooperative is eligible to receive on December 31, 2016, if the petition is filed on or after January 1, 2018, and before January 1, 2019.
- (h) Except as provided by Subsection (i), for an incumbent local exchange company that is an electing company under Chapter 58 or 59 or a cooperative that served greater than 31,000 access lines in this state on September 1, 2013, or a company or cooperative that is a successor to such a company or cooperative, the support that the company or cooperative is eligible to receive on December 31, 2017, under a plan established under Section 56.021(1)(B) is reduced:
- (1) on January 1, 2018, to 75 percent of the level of support the company or cooperative is eligible to receive on December 31, 2017;
- (2) on January 1, 2019, to 50 percent of the level of support the company or cooperative is eligible to receive on December 31, 2017; and

- (3) on January 1, 2020, to 25 percent of the level of support the company or cooperative is eligible to receive on December 31, 2017.
- (i) After the commission has adopted rules under Subsection (j), an incumbent local exchange company or cooperative that is subject to Subsection (h) may petition the commission to initiate a contested case proceeding as necessary to determine the eligibility of the company or cooperative to receive support under a plan established under Section 56.021(1)(B). A company or cooperative may not file more than one petition under this subsection. On receipt of a petition under this subsection, the commission shall initiate a contested case proceeding to determine the eligibility of the company or cooperative to receive continued support under a plan established under Section 56.021(1)(B) for service in the exchanges that are the subject of the petition. To be eligible to receive support for service in an exchange under this subsection, the company or cooperative must demonstrate that it has a financial need for continued support. The commission must issue a final order on the proceeding no later than the 330th day after the date the petition is filed with the commission. Until the commission issues a final order on the proceeding, the company or cooperative shall continue to receive the total amount of support it was eligible to receive on the date the company or cooperative filed a petition under this subsection. A company or cooperative that files a petition under this subsection is not subject to Subsection (h) after the commission issues a final order on the proceeding. If the commission determines that a company or cooperative has demonstrated financial need for continued support under this subsection, it shall set the amount of support in the same proceeding. The amount of support set by the commission for an exchange under this subsection may not exceed:
- (1) 100 percent of the amount of support that the company or cooperative will be eligible to receive on December 31, 2017, if the petition is filed before January 1, 2017;
- (2) 75 percent of the amount of support that the company or cooperative will be eligible to receive on December 31, 2017, if the petition is filed on or after January 1, 2017, and before January 1, 2018;
- (3) 50 percent of the amount of support that the company or cooperative is eligible to receive on December 31, 2017, if the petition is filed on or after January 1, 2018, and before January 1, 2019; or
- (4) 25 percent of the amount of support that the company or cooperative is eligible to receive on December 31, 2017, if the petition is filed on or after January 1, 2019, and before January 1, 2020.
- (j) The commission by rule shall establish the standards and criteria for an incumbent local exchange company or cooperative to demonstrate under Subsection (g) or (i) that the company or cooperative has a financial need for continued support for residential and business lines under a plan established under Section 56.021(1).
- (k) Subsections (g) and (i) do not authorize the commission to initiate a contested case hearing concerning a local exchange company that has elected to participate in a total support reduction plan under 16 T.A.C. Section 26.403 that requires the company to forego funding under a plan established under Section 56.021(1) after January 1, 2017. This section does not affect any obligation of a local exchange company subject to such a total support reduction plan.

- (l) Subsections (f), (g), (h), and (i) do not apply to an incumbent local exchange company that elects, not later than March 1, 2014, to eliminate, not later than September 1, 2018, the support it receives under a plan established under Section 56.021(1).
- (m) Nothing in this chapter relieves any party of an obligation entered into in the commission's Docket No. 40521.
- (n) Nothing in this section is intended to affect the rate rebalancing proceeding in the commission's Docket No. 41097.
- (o) Notwithstanding the provisions of this chapter, the commission has no authority, except as provided by Subsections (f), (g), (h), (i), (j) (k) (m), and (n) to reduce support provided to an incumbent local exchange company that is an electing company under Chapter 58 or 59 or is a cooperative that served greater than 31,000 access lines in this state on September 1, 2013:
- (1) under a plan established under Section 56.021(1)(A) before January 1, 2019; or
- (2) under a plan established under Section 56.021(1)(B) before January 1, 2020. This subsection expires on January 2, 2020.
- (3) In Section 2 of the bill, in added Section 56.024(d), Utilities Code (page 3, lines 7-8), strike "public information." and substitute "confidential and not subject to disclosure under Chapter 552, Government Code."
 - (4) Strike Section 5 of the bill (page 3, lines 39-56).
 - (5) Add a new section to the bill, numbered appropriately, to read as follows:
- SECTION ____. The Public Utility Commission of Texas shall adopt rules under Section 56.023(j), Utilities Code, as added by this Act, not later than December 1, 2014. The commission shall initiate the rulemaking proceeding not later than January 1, 2014.
 - (6) Renumber the sections of the bill accordingly.

The amendment to CSSB 583 was read.

Senator Duncan offered the following amendment to Floor Amendment No. 1:

The support received by the eligible telecommunications provider during the forty-eight-month period shall be at the same monthly per-line support level in effect for that exchange as of the date the incumbent local exchange provider or cooperative ceases receiving funding in that exchange.

(2) Add the following appropriately numbered section to the amendment and renumber subsequent sections of the amendment appropriately:

SECTION ______. (a) The standing committee of the senate that has primary jurisdiction over telecommunications shall conduct an interim study regarding competitive local exchange carriers providing service as eligible telecommunications providers receiving support under Section 56.021(1)(A), Utilities Code.

(b) This section expires on January 1, 2015.

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
























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
