The Texas Stream Team

Texas Stream Team is a network of more than 1,400 trained volunteers who collect data on the water quality of our state's lakes, rivers, streams, wetlands, bays, bayous, and estuaries.

The program is administered through a partnership between Texas State University,

the TCEQ, and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

About 40 percent of the monitoring groups are composed of teachers and their students.

By showing students how to measure what is happening in the



environment around them, Texas Stream Team helps teachers effectively present many abstract concepts behind biology, chemistry, and ecology.

Teachers can become certified water quality monitors by completing a three-phase training program. Students in grades K–12 and college can monitor a body of water under a qualified teacher's supervision, with activities based on the educational objectives of the class.

A teacher can advance to a certified trainer (see <txstreamteam.rivers.txstate.edu/monitors/become-trainer.html>, and then train students (in grades 6–12 and college) to become certified monitors. As monitors, students can form their own groups to monitor sites.

Manual (8 \times 12 in., 122 pp.) familiarizes the reader with a variety of important freshwater ecosystems, including water quality and freshwater invertebrates, fish, and plants.

Teacher's manual (8.5 × 11 in., 66 pp.) on the basics of water-quality education, with resources, lessons, and reference section.
