Hats off to Ann Dean, 1995 recipient of the prestigious Roadrunner Award. The award was presented last month during special ceremonies at the Texas Travel Counselors Conference, held in West Texas, and recognizes Dean's outstanding service to TxDOT's Travel and Information Division, to the tourism industry, and to the state. The 25-year TxDOT veteran was one of the first women to manage an information center, and has been manager of the Texarkana TIC since 1979. In presenting the award, travel services director Milton Meharg said the Texarkana center has served as the official training ground for new managers and manager trainees for many years. "This is quite a testament to Ann's capabilities, as well as to the respect she has in the department," he said.

In further ceremonies at last month's TTCC. Michael K. Benton, executive director of the Irving C&VB, was honored with the 1995 Gene Phillips Hospitality Award. The award recognizes Benton's contributions to the travel industry in Texas and his leadership role in promoting travel and tourism. COMING UP

As the **Hill Country Flyer** steam-excursion train moved into its fourth successful season this spring, the **Austin Steam**

Train Association announced plans for extension of service into downtown Austin. The Flyer now plys a scenic 33-mile route between Cedar Park and Burnet on Saturdays and Sundays. The extended service would allow for some short regularly scheduled trips on some weekday afternoons or evenings, and for weekday demand service, such as convention charters. The project includes renovation of 16.3 miles of former Southern Pacific track to passenger-carrying standards, and will allow operation of steam-excursion trains anywhere along the line from McNeil. between Austin and Round Rock, southward through north and east Austin into the downtown and Convention Center area. THEME PARKS

Time Warner Corporation is selling 51 percent of its Six Flags theme park division for \$1 billion in debt and cash to an investment group led by Boston Ventures, reports The Dallas Morning News. The sale includes operating rights for Six Flags Over Texas in Arlington and Six Flags AstroWorld/WaterWorld in Houston. With a 49 percent stake, Time Warner will remain Six Flags' largest single shareholder, and will still help manage the attractions and feature trademark characters in rides, stores, and restaurants. Negotiations for Six Flags to buy Wet 'n Wild water park in Arlington continue (see the April issue of Texas Travel Log).

For those with a zeal for rollercoaster thrills, Six Flags **AstroWorld** in **Houston** will unveil Texas' first indoor roller coaster, May 13. The Mayan Mindbender takes riders on an adventure into an ancient temple where they become part of a lost civilization. State-of-the-art lighting and sound effects add to the mystery of the culture whose secrets remained hidden for so many years. The Mindbender brings the total of roller coaster rides at AstroWorld to 10, making it number one in the number of coasters in the state and Southwest, and number three in the world. A site north of Clarendon may soon become the site of a multimillion-dollar theme park, reports The Dallas Morning News. Thunder Junction will capitalize on the region's historic "thunder" of buffalo, cavalry, steam engines, and oil derricks, and will include water activities, rides by train and canoe, musical shows, and a hotel built from rail cars. The idea for the park was conceived in 1988 as a way to help senior citizens. Pat Kaiser, president of Yesterday's Children, based in Amarillo, estimates \$150,000 already has been spent, including state and federal grants, to get the project going.

Backing and ownership come from a private British investment group, and will, in part, benefit the nonprofit senior citizen's organization. Investors hope to open the park's first phase within the next month or two.

Down from a record low of 158 birds in 1994, only an estimated 68 birds are left in the wild in four remnant populations. Over the past two years the native Texas grouse has lost two-thirds of its population annually. Only two birds remain in the Austin County population and only 10 on the Attwater Prairie Chicken National Wildlife Refuge near Eagle Lake. In addition to Fossil Rim, the Houston Zoo and Texas A&M University make up the captive breeding component of the recovery effort.

HISTORY

The City of San Antonio accepted as a gift a statue of Mexican-American hero Jose Antonio Navarro. The celebrated defender of Tejano rights was honored at a statue dedication on May 6 commemorating the 200th year of his birth. The event coincided with the 20th anniversary of the opening of nearby Jose Antonio Navarro State Historic Site, which includes the home where the statesman lived from 1853 until his death in 1871. Navarro was

one of only two native Texans to sign the Texas Declaration of Independence in 1836 and helped draft the Constitution of the Republic of Texas. He also served as a member of the State Constitutional Convention and Texas Legislature. The ninefoot-tall bronze overlooks the Commerce Street entrance to Market Square.

MUSEUMS

In an unprecedented alliance between a museum, a university, and a major corporation, the Fort **Worth Museum of Science** and History opened Hands On Science on April 6. The first-of-its-kind lab is funded by **Lockheed Martin Corpo**ration and supported by grants awarded to Texas Christian University's School of Education. "Hands On Science will allow people to begin to comprehend that math and science can be fun," said museum president Donald R. Otto.
