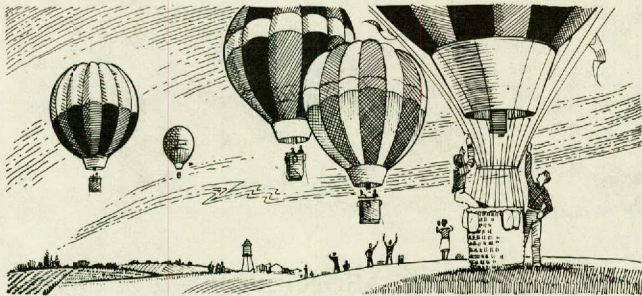
SAN ANTONIO'S VIA VISTAS Cultural Bus Routes are sporting a bright new logo to help visitors identify the routes. Initiated a year ago by the VIA Metropolitan Transit Service, two routes take visitors to the Alamo City's cultural sites and attractions. Route #7 departs Alamo Plaza and travels north to the San Antonio Zoo, the McNay Art Museum, the Witte Museum, and the San Antonio Botanical Gardens. Bus Route #40 also starts at Alamo Plaza but goes south to La Villita, HemisFair Park, Southtown, Yturri-Edmunds House and Mill, San Antonio Missions National Historical Park, and the Lone Star Brewery's Buckhorn Hall of Horns Museum. 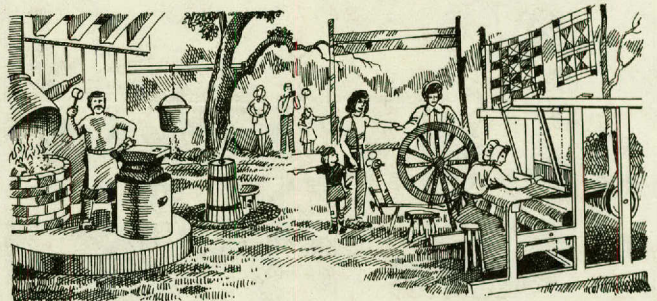

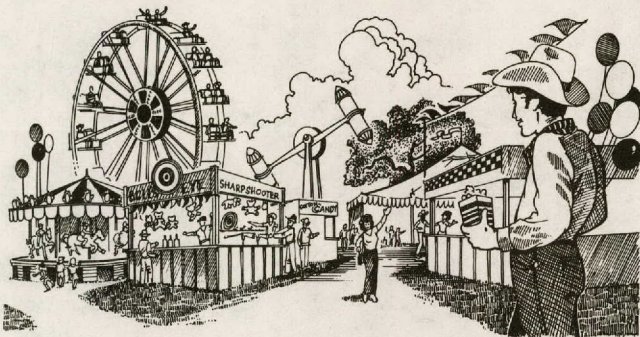
