BRIDGING THE GAP Construction of a new causeway bridge — attaching Galveston to the mainland — is under way.

Texas Department of Transportation spokesperson Janelle Gbur says this \$135 million project is happening because "the old bridges are structurally deficient. One went up in the late '30s, the other in the '60s. They're just beyond their design life." The new bridge will be one complete structure featuring (in each direction) three continuous lanes of traffic, one auxiliary traffic lane for local traffic and one full emergency shoulder.

"It's more than just a new bridge, it's a beautification project," Gbur says. "We'll have extra landscaping. There will be towers on each end to signify that it is a gateway, and it will feature some architectural treatments."

Construction is not expected to disrupt travel. Traffic will be redirected to the new bridge once it is complete and the old bridges will then be demolished.
