Travel and Information Division director Don Clark bids his farewell March 31, to take advantage of the state employees' early retirement incentive program. Since Don took the reins in 1986, all sorts of great things have gone on, not only for the division but for the Texas tourist industry, as well. One of the first things Don did was to bring back the full-color, 272page Texas State Travel Guide. A closer relationship with the private sector resulted in the Texas Accommodations Guide, a cooperative effort between the Texas Hotel & Motel Association and TxDOT, and distribution of TxDOT's travel literature at city information centers throughout the state. He's played a major role in antilitter efforts on both the state and national levels, managing the Don't Mess With Texas campaign from its inception, and chairing an AASHTO task force, which resulted in an Adopt-A-Highway program nationwide. He fought hard for the TRAX and TIDE systems, and TourTex 2000, and even put the Panhandle back on top of the Texas map where it belonged. Renovation and reconstruction of all Texas Travel Information Centers began under his charge. And it was Don's idea to start a 1-800 number to provide better customer service. In fact, "better customer service" is behind all Don's ideas. So adiós, my friend. Can't wait to see where you'll pop up next. Because we know you're just as hooked on the travel industry as the rest of us.

TEXAS HOWDY ect

Motor coaches crossing into Texas can now begin their tour with a big Texas "howdy." TxDOT's **Texas Travel Information Centers** recently introduced a Texas Howdy Service, where a professional travel counselor steps on board with an official Texas welcome and a free information packet for every passenger. The information centers offer a park atmosphere with plenty of motor coach parking, clean rest rooms, and a special Texas video. Tour operators can schedule a stop at the information centers just by calling ahead. Travel and Information Division director Don Clark said, "TxDOT has been a major partner in tourism for 58 years. COMING UP

Dallas Cowboys owner Jerry Jones has proposed a \$200-million improvement project for Texas Stadium in Irving, according to The Dallas Morning News. City officials said Jones wants to expand the stadium to 104,000 seats, and add a retractable roof, air conditioning, and a grass field by the year 2000. Additional improvements include a NFL theme park, Dallas Cowboys hall of fame, restaurants, and more parking. One question surrounding the project is financing. Although there is no financial plan, Mayor Bobby Joe Raper said taxpayers will not pay for improvements.

1996. And, as usual, folks there plan to celebrate in a big way. A giant-sized birthday party will honor the community's German, Hispanic, and Native American heritage with ten days of music and dancing, fireworks, pageants, and parades. Festivities include seven fest nights, German entertainment, demonstrations by Native Americans, a Cinco de Mayo celebration, a trail ride, cowboy cookout, fiddlers contest, and an original

STATE PARKS

Texas Parks & Wildlife Department began taking reservations for 1995 on December 1 for most state park campsites, group facilities, and cabins. The big change this year is an 11-month rolling reservation window, which means reservations, as long as they are made three days in advance, can be for any date in the following 11 months. The automated system allows customers to book almost any park with one phone call, get referrals to other nearby parks if their first choice is full, pay deposits by credit card, and get faster service. Reservations are accepted for all state parks, except Indian Lodge in Davis Mountains State Park, and the Texas State Railroad. For reservations, call 512/389-8900. HISTORY

The **San Jacinto Monument** near **Houston**, in San Jacinto Battleground State Historic Park, "is falling apart," reports *The Dallas Morning News*. The giant structure, which is the tallest monumental column in the world, stands at the site of the decisive battle where Texas won independence from Mexico on April 21, 1836. Experts say a half century of rain, wind, and pollution has taken its toll, and it could take as much as \$9 million to restore it. The monument draws 450,000 visitors each year, making it and the surrounding 1,002-acre park one of Texas' most popular historic sites.

The exhibition is the culmination of eight years of labor and many additional years of study for Judy Chicago and husband-photographer Donald Woodman, and examines the Nazi genocide of six million Jews during WWII. The 3,000-squarefoot installation features 16 major works of painting, manipulated photography, stained glass, and tapestry, based, in part, on historic photographs from the era and contemporary photographs taken at Treblinka, Auschwitz and other concentration camps and Jewish cemeteries in Europe.
