




THREE CHEETAH CUBS recently made Fossil Rim Wildlife Center history when they became the first full second generation of natural bred cheetahs born there. The world population, including both captive and free ranging animals, is estimated between 9,000 and 12,000, making the cheetah one of the world's most endangered species. In the past, cheetahs have been the most difficult of the large cats to breed in captivity. Fossil Rim, however, has achieved a high success rate, both artificially and naturally, with nearly 20 percent of the nation's population derived from Fossil Rim's breeding program. In addition, the museum houses a library and research center, an auditorium for performances, and a children's center equipped with 15 computers. 
IN A POWERFUL EXHIBIT of 53 stained-glass windows, Dallas artist Jean Lacy depicts biblical history from a black perspective and tells the story of African-American history and culture. Rev. Zan Holmes Jr., minister at St. Luke Community United Methodist Church in East Dallas where the imagery is displayed, said, as a youth, he studied the imposing stained-glass windows at his father's church in Waco. "I didn't see anybody in those windows who looked like me," he remembers. "The windows should reflect the people who worship in the building." Images include likenesses of Moses, Martin Luther King Jr., and other religious and black leaders, as well as more telling figures such as a maid, stoop-shouldered. waiting at a bus stop, and the body of a man, lynching ropes slack on his shoulders.

THE INSTITUTE OF TEXAN CULTURES in San Antonio presents a dramatic, 36-panel exhibit on El Camino Real through January 2. The display invites visitors to take a fascinating journey through time with explorers, missionaries, settlers, and traders who etched one of the most important historical trails linking Mexico with the present-day United States. WONDER WORLD in San Marcos joined the ranks of several other Texas attractions by going from year-round to seasonal operation. Corporate president Buddy Mostyn said the park will operate daily from March 1 through October 31, and be open 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. during summer months, and 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. in spring and fall. TEXAS COMMISSION ON THE ARTS now offers a new County Arts Expansion Program with opportunities for arts programs in all parts of the state. The six-year plan is designed to target underserved counties and to provide funding for communities without an arts infrastructure in place. HUNDREDS OF INVITED GUESTS paid tribute last month to the one-year anniversary of the USS Lexington as a floating museum. The November 8 "berthday" bash was highlighted by plenty of pomp and circumstance as Secretary of the Navy John Dalton delivered the keynote address. The crowd also witnessed the formal dedication of a Grumman Avenger, which joins the ship's growing fleet of vintage aircraft. The Lexington was the oldest working carrier in the United States Navy before modern technology removed her from service, and she set more records than any other carrier in the history of naval aviation. CITING FINANCIAL SHORTFALLS, Amtrak announced reduced service on the Texas Eagle route between Texas and Chicago. Amtrak officials said the cutbacks from daily departures to three weekly departures will save more than \$6.7 million annually, and that 83.6 percent of revenue is expected to be retained. Though the 1910 depot in Temple closed last month, the train will continue to stop there and will be saved as part of a museum complex.



BE SURE TO ENCOURAGE VISITORS to stop a moment at our major rest areas (those with rest room facilities, drinking water, and picnic areas) and read the highway InfoBords posted there. InfoBords are attractive exhibits at more than 105 rest areas scattered along many routes. The displays summarize tourism features that lie just off the highway lanes, inviting folks to stop and visit instead of just driving through. Each InfoBord location includes a highway map, panels devoted to nearby attractions, and still others that feature attractions down the road.

GOVERNOR ANN RICHARDS appointed a 17-member Governor's Task Force on Nature Tourism in Texas to seek ways to promote economic development, and protect wildlife and habitat across the state. Members were selected from state and national authorities, private industry, and special interest groups. Private landowners are expected to play a key role in developing nature tourism in a state where more than 95 percent of the land is privately owned.

THE FORT WORTH MUSEUM of Science and History presents *Science in Toyland* through January 2. The hands-on exhibit allows children to explore scientific principles using favorite toys like tops, sailboats, and dominoes. Thirteen play areas invite visitors of all ages to discover science in everyday things, like rolling balls, soap bubbles, shooting stars, plants, bugs, airplanes, and balloons. ANSWER TO TEXAS TRIVIA: David Ingram, one of three survivors in a 114-man expedition, reported to English authorities in 1582 that in Texas he saw "great rockes (sic) of Chrystal (sic), Rubies, being four inches long, and two inches broad, a great aboundance (sic) of pearls, sundry pieces of golde (sic) some as big as a man's fist and other precious minerals by the shipload."



The 59th Annual River Oaks Garden Club Azalea Trail is set for March 5-6 and 12-13, 1994, in Houston. Since 1935, this garden pilgrimage has heralded the arrival of spring in the Bayou City. A highlight of the tour will be the recently restored Bayou Bend Collection and its 14-acre gardens on the banks of Buffalo Bayou. Mineral Wells Chamber of Commerce marked the beginning of an ambitious plan to preserve West Texas heritage and history. Chamber director Nancy Ray said the \$2-million project includes construction of an amphitheater where an historical re-enactment will bring to life the Loving-Goodnight cattle drive days. "It's all part of a long-standing effort by the people of our community to preserve our heritage," said Ms. Ray. "The Loving-Goodnight production is a natural since the famous trail drive from Texas to Colorado had its beginnings just north of here."
