# **TEXAS IN THE PRESS**

he September issue of Audubon magazine ranks the Great Texas Coastal Birding Trail as one of the best in the nation. Although 19 birding trails are listed in the article, the Texas trail is one of only six destinations honored with a feature write-up. Here's a sample from the story: "Often called the great-granddaddy of birding trails, the Texas coastal trail was the first—and at approximately 2,110 miles, it's still the biggest—birding trail around."

The piece also mentions **Texas' two new wildlife trails**, which are scheduled to debut by early 2003. The **High Plains trail** in the Panhandle and the **Heart of Texas trail**, which stretches from Central Texas down to Laredo, will provide travelers with a road map to dozens of the areas' top spots for viewing birds and other wildlife.

# **ALL ABOARD**

alveston welcomed its first passenger train in nearly eight years on Labor Day weekend. An estimated 3,000 visitors used the service—which links League City and Galveston—over the weekend. The train, known as the Texas GulfLiner, is an Amtrak-operated charter service that will run only on selected holiday weekends. This experiment with passenger rail, scheduled to run through 2003, is designed to ease traffic on the Galveston Causeway.


Partnership, the Galveston Economic Development Alliance, the University of Texas Medical Branch, and the Galveston CVB.

# **MAZE CRAZE**

uman mazes are cropping up in cornfields across the state, according to the Sept. 8 Dallas Morning News.
Even in parts of Texas where corn isn't typically grown as a cash crop, farmers are cutting labyrinth-type mazes into cornfields and inviting paying visitors to get lost. According to the News, there are at least seven corn mazes operating in Texas this season, all hoping to cash in on a trend that caught on in Pennsylvania in 1993:

This new form of "agritainment" is drawing visitors to rural areas. Many of the farms offer additional diversions, including scavenger hunts, petting zoos, hayrides, barrel trains and mini-mazes made of hay bales. Farmers also use the opportunity to educate kids about agriculture. The *News* reports that some mazes attract busloads of schoolchildren.

Although the season varies from farm to farm, most of these mazes will be open through the end of October or November.

The centerpiece of the new wing will be the Chaparral Gallery, soon to be home to seven race cars built by the legendary Jim Hall. Hall, born in Abilene, revolutionized auto racing with the Chaparral cars he engineered. built, and drove in the 1960s. According to the museum, Hall's innovations-including the aerodynamic wing, ground effects, and **GARDEN TAKES FLIGHT** Austin's Lady Bird Johnson Wildflower Center will hold a grand opening for its new Ann and O.J. Weber Butterfly Garden Oct. 13. The visual centerpiece for the new area is the **newly**restored 1885 carriage house, now home to the Margaret
and Eugene McDermott Learning Center. The historic structure, which was recently moved to the Wildflower Center's

You've probably heard of the Gonzales "Come and Take It" cannon—which was at the center of a conflict that led to the first action in the Texas Revolution on Oct. 2, 1835. Back in 1831, Mexican officials loaned the settlers in Gonzales a small cannon for protection from hostile Indians.

state parks will soon be in the midst of major repairs, thanks to \$36.6 million in funding from Proposition 8— a bond package approved last fall by voters statewide. Among the many facilities in line for major projects are Indian Lodge (inside Davis Mountains State Park) and the following state parks: Goliad, Caprock Canyons, Tyler, and Mustang Island. Although some of the work is more high-profile (e.g., renovations to historic buildings), other plans—such as water and electric improvements—are also important for visitors.

Work will get under way on this round of projects over the next two years. Additional appropriations from the \$100 million bond package are expected for further repairs several years in the future.
