6	SECTION 1. Subchapter Z, Chapter 51, Education Code, is
7	amended by adding Section 51.9194 to read as follows:
8	Sec. 51.9194. REQUIRED INFORMATION FOR ENTERING STUDENTS
9	REGARDING MENTAL HEALTH AND SUICIDE PREVENTION SERVICES. (a) A
10	general academic teaching institution shall provide to each
11	entering full-time undergraduate, graduate, or professional
12	student, including each full-time undergraduate, graduate, or
13	professional student who transfers to the institution, information
14	about:
15	(1) available mental health and suicide prevention
16	services offered by the institution or by any associated
17	organizations or programs; and
18	(2) early warning signs that are often present in and
19	appropriate intervention for a person who may be considering
20	suicide.
21	(b) The information required under this section:
22	(1) may be provided through:
23	(A) a live presentation; or
24	(B) a format that allows for student interaction,

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1 such as an online program or video; and

- 2 (2) may not be provided in a paper format only.
- 3 SECTION 2. Section 51.9194, Education Code, as added by
- 4 this Act, applies to full-time entering students who are admitted
- 5 to an undergraduate, graduate, or professional degree program at a
- 6 general academic teaching institution beginning with the 2016 fall
- 7 semester.
- 8 SECTION 3. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives
- 9 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as
- 10 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this
- 11 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this
- 12 Act takes effect September 1, 2015.
