

Now Eastern European fans of the famed "Dallas" television series can live the fantasy of the wealthy West. The Dallas Morning News reports Ilie Alexander, a businessman in Slobozia, Romania, has turned "reel life into real life," rebuilding the fictional ranch and opening it as a hotel. The Dallas hotel/dude ranch was re-created from the architectural plans from the mansion on the real Southfork Ranch near Plano, and has the same long driveway and the same arched Southfork welcoming sign. A gray stretch limo parked in front of the main house bestows a rich Ewing-like feel. Two clocks at the reception desk display Slobozia time and Dallas time. And a rodeo arena for riding and watching prize-winning horses adds a real taste of Texas life-style to the Romanian hotel.

Dallas on Ice opened November 24 in a splashy debut that included a skating performance and the lighting of the West End's

Christmas tree. In the coming weeks, the 150-by-60-foot rink, at Munger Avenue between Market and Record Streets, will host carolers, a skating Santa, and possibly even a couple of Dallas Stars practices. Promoters hope the rink will become the "Rockefeller Plaza of Dallas." They insist the four inches of ice will not turn to slush, even if unseasonably warm temperatures continue. Dallas on Ice will welcome skaters until March 3. Open noon to 10:30 p.m. Sunday through Thursday, noon to midnight Friday, and 10 a.m. to midnight Saturday. Admission is \$6; skate rental is \$3. Only in Dallas. Happy skating!

a new Tigua Indian Cultural Center in El Paso, reports The Dallas Morning News. Two years ago, the Tiguas closed their cultural center to make way for Speaking Rock Bingo, a state-of-Ysleta Mission. Without the center, the 1,500-member tribe has had no place to display centuriesold clothing and pottery, no place

to bake their traditional bread, and no permanent home for tribal dances. But even as the decision was being made to close the old center, tribal leaders were already planning to one day plow gaming profits into new facilities. Now the tribe has spent more than \$400,000 of those profits on their new pueblo-style center. The new cultural center includes a museum. seven Tigua gift shops, a cafe serving traditional and modern dishes, a courtyard for Indian ceremonies and dances, and two outdoor ovens to bake their traditional Tigua bread. Future plans call for a chain of Tigua convenience stores.

The first of five large convoys began moving the 3rd Armored Cavalry, along with its museum, to its new home in Fort Carson, Colorado, after a 23-year history at Fort Bliss near El Paso. The move is part of the downsizing and reorganization of the military, reports The Dallas Morning News. The real Lonesome Dove is not a town, but rather a Baptist church near Southlake,
Texas, north of Fort Worth. Lonesome Dove Baptist Church, the oldest Protestant church in Tarrant County, was formed by settlers who moved from Missouri to Texas in 1844-45. The church was organized in 1846, and has stood in the same spot with the same name since 1847. The congregation will celebrate its 150th anniversary next year.

THE EAGLE HAS LANDED For several years now, a colony of eagles has called the Lake Buchanan area home. And each year thousands of nature-lovers take advantage of the Vanishing Texas River Cruise to view this magnificent American symbol from the

FOR THE BIRDS

The Dallas Morning News reports that a larger-than-usual number of whooping cranes have arrived at the Texas Gulf Coast, prompting experts to predict a record population this year. Tom **Stehn**, a biologist with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, said that 122 whoopers had arrived last month at or near their winter home at Aransas National Wildlife Refuge. The birds typically begin their 2,500-mile trek from Canada in mid-October, with the entire whooper population completing the migration by mid-December. Only 133 of the endangered birds made it to the Texas coast last year. Stehn predicts about 145 whoopers will make it to the Aransas area this winter, coming close to their record of 146 in 1990.

MUSEUMS

Visitors can view a fascinating collection of *Birds in Flight*, by photographer Russell Hansen, at the Corpus Christi Museum of Science and History. The exhibit is timed to

correspond with the Christmas bird count in the Coastal Bend. Hansen has been photographing birds in flight for more than 17 years, capturing on film over 100 species within three feet of the camera, using a variety of special techniques. HISTORY

Six months after the Texas Legislature granted new powers in their search for the historic Alamo flag, state officials are no closer to bringing the banner home. The flag was captured by Mexican General Santa Anna and his troops at the March 6, 1836, Battle of the Alamo. Since then, the government of Mexico has held possession of the flag. But, according to The Dallas Morning News, even if the battle flag is retrieved, Texans should not expect to regain full possession. "I don't feel a return strategy is a winning strategy," said Secretary of State Tony Garza. "We're going to focus on some sort of ability to display the flag or a loan strategy. In my mind, the flag is theirs and it should remain there."
