It's not too early to mark your calendar for April 11-14, when travel professionals from throughout the state gather in Beaumont for the **39th Annual Texas Travel Counselors Conference**. The popular Travel Fair, sponsored by the Texas Travel Industry Association, will be Thursday, April 14. More to follow.

## PLANNING

**Travel and Information Division** top staffers met recently with architects to discuss plans to renovate or replace the Wichita Falls and Amarillo Travel Information Centers. Meeting in Amarillo were division director **Don Clark**, **David Linzey**, assistant director of Travel Services, **Rosemary Eaves**, manager of the Amarillo Center, and **Cheryl Cash**, manager of the Center in Wichita Falls. T. S. Orendain Associates, a Dallas architectural firm, has begun preparation of preliminary plans and cost estimates, which will then be presented to the Texas Transportation Commission for approval.

## COMING UP

Ground breaking for the new **Nolan Ryan Center** on Alvin Community College campus is just weeks away, reports Michelle Domingue of the Nolan Ryan Foundation. The new facility should be open to the public within the year. Though plans for specific displays still are not firm, the center will feature exhibits regarding the life and career of one of Texas' favorite sons. **The Texas Rangers** have hired an historical consultant to head development of a **Baseball Hall of Fame Museum**, auditorium, and learning center that will be the first of its kind in the nation. The museum will teach patrons about baseball and its role in society, while the learning center will feature interactive exhibits that will tie academic skills to sports. The \$2.25-million project opens April 11, 1994, the same day **The Ballpark in Arlington** opens with the Rangers' first home game of the season. For more information,

**Tiger Field in Wharton** will be the site of the **Babe Ruth World Series**, scheduled for August 20-27, 1994. National president and CEO Ronald Tellefsen singled out citizens coming together as a team as the decisive factor in site selection. "I think the major thing is that Wharton has a total community effort, with all the outlying towns also pitching in," said Tellefsen. The series is expected to draw an average daily attendance of almost 5,000, bringing in big bucks to area businesses, restaurants, and motels.

Next year marks the **150th birthday of New Braunfels**. And, as usual, the folks there plan to celebrate in a big way. The 130-member Sesquicentennial Commission already has lined up 10 days of major events, including a giant parade, barbecue, fireworks, and a trail ride from Indianola, site of the first landing of German immigrants to Texas. Now, the folks in the **Brazosport area** are ready to spread the word. They say cheaper costs and the area's excellent marine life could help build Freeport into a divers destination. Popular diving spots include the Flower Garden Banks National Marine Sanctuary, a series of coral reefs about 100 miles offshore, numerous oil rigs, and Stetson Bank. swampland near Orange may be one of the most important for the preservation of a natural area in the state. The two agencies have entered into an agreement to buy about 3,000 acres of **Blue Elbow Swamp** near Orange, a unique ecological system in private ownership. If the deal goes through, some of the land will be used to modernize the Texas Travel Information Center on I-10 and for other TxDOT uses. The bulk of the land will be administered by TP&WD as a wildlife management area.
